APRIL 24, 2024 BOARD MEETING

PURCHASES/CONTRACTS

ADMINISTRATION

FY24 - \$28,400 - Oklahoma State Auditor – Audit will be conducted to determine whether the agency’s internal controls provide reasonable assurance that revenues, expenditures (miscellaneous and payrolls) and inventory were accurately reported in the accounting records and financial operations complied with applicable finance-related state laws and regulations. This audit is mandatory.

FY25 – OMES Central Printing - \$7,000

FY25- Presort Mail Services - \$7,000

FY25- ImageNet Consulting – \$13,000

Annual Laserfiche software maintenance (LSAP) renewal for the agency document scanning software.

FY25 - Compsource - Rural Firefighters Workers Compensation - \$171,300

Premiums for insurance to cover the claims of injured rural firefighters. ODAFF would be in violation of state law. This would increase the state’s liability in the event of the injury of uninsured rural firefighter. Legislative directed spending.

FY25 - Rural Fire Pension Fund - \$92,000

The Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System shall determine the number of persons who are eligible members of the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System. Upon adequate documentation of membership in the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System pursuant to the provisions of subsection D of Section 351 of Title 19 of the Oklahoma Statutes, the State Department of Agriculture shall make a transfer payment from the Volunteer Firefighter Employer Contribution Payment Revolving Fund to the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System. The amount transferred shall equal the sum of Sixty Dollars (\$60.00) multiplied by the number of members as certified by the System to the Department. Legislative directed spending.

FY25 AT&T Wireless - \$70,000.00

This purchase is for the agency pooled plan cellular service. This purchase allows agency employees to conduct state official abroad which increases efficiency and productivity. This allows for internet connectivity to cell phones, hotspots and iPads. If not approved, the agency will become less efficient and greatly reduce agency response times and agency deliverables. This expense is vital to agency operations.

FY25 Comdata Inc. - \$1,500,000

This purchase is for agency fuel and maintenance of the fleet. Each agency vehicle is issued a credit card for fuel and maintenance purposes which are tracked on a monthly basis. If not approved, the agency will become less efficient and greatly reduce agency response times and agency deliverables. This expense is vital to ensure agency operations

FY25 Agency Workers Comp Insurance premium - \$340,000

Premiums for insurance to cover the claims of injured workers. ODAFF would be in violation of state law. If not approved, this would increase the State's liability in the event of the injury of uninsured state employees.

FY25 Onsite Security Guard Services (Prosecur Security) - \$70,000

The agency has onsite security services for building and personnel safety. Without this service agency property and employee safety would be placed at a greater risk daily.

FY25 Bank of America – Credit Card charges - \$30,000

The State contracts with Bank of America to process credit card payments. If not approve, ODAFF will not be able to accept credit card payments in person, mail order or for the online store operated by Forestry.

FY25 Federal Express - \$65,000

This purchase is a release against the mandatory statewide contract for small package delivery. This allows for the agency to conduct daily mail services. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to send packages, thus resulting in potential work stoppage of agency activities.

FY25 Petroleum Traders (Bulk Fuel) - \$95,000

Forestry Services has several remote office locations with heavy firefighting equipment. Providing bulk fuel allows for these locations to fuel it firefighting equipment and remain in a ready status when dispatched. Without this purchase this could greatly reduce agency response times, thus putting the public and property at greater risk.

FY25 National Association of State Departments of Agriculture (NASDA) - \$17,000

NASDA grows and enhances agriculture by forging partnerships and creating consensus to achieve sound policy outcomes between state departments of agriculture, the federal government, and stakeholders. Without this membership the agency would no longer be allowed to vote/approve NASDA policy priorities. This would weaken agency partnerships and discontinue agency resources; such as member leadership, regulatory expertise, political connections, white papers and subject matter experts. NASDA's tactics support the strategic initiatives, which carry out the business objectives of our mission statement and strategic intent statement.

FY25 Oklahoma Capital Improvement Authority – Bond Payments - \$1,706,470

Payments on the bond that financed the construction of the Agriculture Lab building. These payments are required by state law.

FY25 Oklahoma Employment Security Commission – Unemployment benefits - \$32,000

This is an estimate of the claims that ODAFF would have to pay former employees who file for unemployment and are approved. These payments are required by state law.

FY25 Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System – Retirees unused sick leave \$100,000

When an employee retires, they can use the balance of their accrued sick leave to “purchase” time to count for retirement eligibility. These payments are to transfer the value of the leave to the OPERS system. These payments are required by state law.

FY25 Oklahoma Management Enterprise Services (OMES) – Risk Management- \$120,000

Purchase of insurance for liability, vehicle, equipment, agency contents, tort and Directors & Officers.

The agency would be uninsured and unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY25 Oklahoma Management Enterprises Services (OMES) FICA Savings \$30,000

When an employee selects 'Premium Conversion' they can see a lowering of their tax base for tax purposes and for the withholding of FICA. Since the State matches FICA withholding, this results in a savings for the state as well. These payments transfer that savings to EBC to administer the program. These payments are required by state law.

FY25 Oklahoma Management Enterprises Services (OMES) - Facility Services - \$365,505.72

Service Management Agreement with OMES, OMES agrees to furnish janitorial services, maintenance services, and all utilities. OMES maintains the building's existing heating, ventilating and air-conditioning (HVAC) system, water system, electrical system, and plumbing system. If not approved, laboratory operations would cease, and the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY25 Oklahoma Management Enterprises Services (OMES) – Information Technology - \$650,000

Pursuant to the Information Technology Consolidation and Coordination Act codified at 62 O.S. §35.1 et seq., as amended (the "Act"), OMES -ISD shall provide information technology shared services to each State Agency. The agency will have no computer operations and would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY25 Oklahoma Management Enterprises Services (OMES) – OPM - \$26,000

Payment of ODAFF's portion towards mandated Merit Protection Act. These payments are required by state law.

FY25 Pitney Bowes – Mail Machine Lease - \$20,000

Statewide mandatory contract for leased mailroom postage equipment. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY25 Oklahoma Turnpike Authority – Pikepass - \$21,000

Agency payment of toll expenses for agency vehicles which use toll roads. Without this contract, the agency would be unable to use toll roads.

FY25 United State Postal Services (Postage) - \$90,000

Purchase of postage for the agency mail machine. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY25 Xerox - \$78,500

Lease of multifunction devices for agency operations, these devices are used as printers, copiers, scanners, faxes. Also, maintenance and supply services for agency laser printers. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY25 Galt Temporary Services - \$150,000

Purchase from the mandatory statewide contract for temporary services. These individuals provide a variety of agency mission critical functions which allow the agency to operate in an efficient as possible manner. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY25 BancFirst - \$17,900

ODAFF lockbox services. This service allows for agency deposits to be received directly by BankFirst staff and deposited directly into agency accounts.

FY25 Oklahoma Governor’s Office - \$37,500

This MOU will provide shared office space, furniture, and salaries for OG staff for its office in Washington D.C. with the support of funds provided by ODAFF. ODAFF will receive access and use of the facilities, subject to availability, and support from the staff in Washington D.C.

FY25 Oklahoma Management Enterprise Services (OMES) Fleet Management (AVL services) \$100,000

This purchase is required per Governor Stitt’s executive order 2020-04, that all state agencies are mandated to install “Automatic Vehicle Locator (AVL)” equipment on all state-owned vehicles. This directive will be achieved through a “shared services agreement” with OMES Fleet Management.

FY25 SHI – Adobe Subscription Services - \$13,000

Purchase of the Adobe subscription services. The agency will purchase (5) Creative Cloud licenses for Enterprise All Apps. We also purchase of (68) licenses of Acrobat Pro DC for enterprise for agency staff and one Adobe Captivate license for ODAFF staff for a 12-month period.

FY25 \$6,000 – Asset Panda – Renewal of subscription agency inventory software system. This system will allow for easy asset tracking. It is a cloud-based technology that offers complete flexibility to manage assets for our agency. The software offers a mobile application for users and customizable content creation. This system will replace an outdated Microsoft Database, the system will allow for migration of those assets into this new cloud-based program.

FY24 \$250,000 – Requesting an additional \$250,000 to our original request of \$700,000 which was approved at the March 2024 Board meeting. This increase is needed as we had to replace one vehicle due to a failed transmission that was not initially targeted for replacement. We have also identified other high mileage vehicles that need to be replaced and dealerships which have vehicles that are available for order and purchase. Replacement of these vehicles are critical to the agency mission and if not replaced may put the employee and public at greater risk.

FY24 – New Computers & Monitors - \$68,950

Purchase of nine (9) Dell Pro Wireless Keyboard & Mouse - KM5221W, one (1) Dell 27 Monitor - P2725H, one (1) Dell 27 Video Conferencing Mon-P2724DEB, fourteen (14) Dell 24 Monitor - P2425H, fourteen (14) Dell 24 Video Conferencing Mon-P2424HEB, nine (9) SI# BJ6X02 OptiPlex Small Form Factor (7010), twenty-five (25) SI# BJ6X06 Mobile Precision 3580, nine (9) SI# BJ6X06 Dell Latitude 7440, five (5) SI# BJ6X06 Dell Latitude 7450, one (1) SI# BJ6X06 Dell Latitude 5430 Rugged, two (2) Inspiron 16 2-in-1, needed for the remaining ODAFF CPU refresh. This phase includes Market Development, Animal Industries, Admin, Forestry. If this refresh is not done we will continue to use aging CPU’s which are failing at an alarmingly high rate. Without this purchase, this would hamper our ability to fulfill our ODAFF statutory mission efficiently.

CONSUMER PROTECTION SERVICES

FY2025 South Dakota Agricultural Laboratories testing fees for pesticide samples and feed samples - \$9,800.00

FY2025 OSU laboratory testing fees for soil and water samples related to environmental

pollution investigations - \$9,800.00

FY2025 Oklahoma State University Soil Fertility Research --\$450,000.00

Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 8-77.7 (A), ODAFF is required to collect an inspection fee of \$1.00 per ton of which \$0.50 per ton shall be forwarded directly to a special Soil Fertility Research Account in the Department of Plant and Soil Sciences of the Division of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at Oklahoma State University (OSU) for the purpose of conducting soil fertility research and extension involving efficient fertilizer use for agronomic crops and forages and groundwater and surface water protection from plant food nutrients. Though tonnage amounts vary each year due to when a crop is planted, commodity prices, fertilizer prices and the weather we use the upper range of inspection fees paid annually to determine the amount of \$450,000.00 that could potentially be paid out to OSU. However, the actual amount paid to OSU will be based on the amount of inspection fees paid to ODAFF.

This is a statutory requirement of the Oklahoma Fertilizer Act and needs to be done to further research to prevent the pollution of lands and waters of Oklahoma from fertilizers.

FY2025 Unwanted Pesticide Disposal Program --\$350,000.00

Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 3-82(J) (3), ODAFF is required to collect a registration fee of \$210.00 for each pesticide or device label registered. A portion of these fees, in the amount of \$300,000.00 annually, shall be dedicated for conducting programs for unwanted pesticide disposal. This amount shall be deposited into the State Department of Agriculture Unwanted Pesticide Disposal Fund and shall be dedicated for this use only. Since not all the \$300,000.00 in the funds is utilized each year they are then carried forward into the next fiscal year and the amount available for unwanted pesticide disposal in fiscal year 2024 is \$350,000.00.

This is a statutory requirement of the Combined Pesticide Law and needs to be done to prevent the pollution of lands and waters of Oklahoma from unwanted pesticides.

FY2025 Oklahoma State University Pesticide Program Contract Approval --\$130,000.00

Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 3-82 (B), applicators are required to be certified in a category or categories in which they make pesticide applications. ODAFF administers these exams under state law and delegated federal authority from EPA. Additionally, the law also requires a practical training exam after the written exams have been passed for certain categories such as fumigation, structural and general pest. To support the certification and training program the EPA grant includes monies for development of study manuals specific for each exam and for a practical exam when necessary. Other uses of the EPA grant monies include assisting applicators, owners, and farmers with compliance for the federal worker protection standards. To comply with these requirements assistance was requested from Oklahoma State University (OSU) for the purpose of study manuals, WPS compliance support and providing a venue for the practical examination school.

OSU as a land grant university has proven expertise in each of the pesticide categories and education that lends itself well into writing study material for the written examinations. They also have a state-of-the-art training facility for practical exams that allows each applicator to experience many different application sites during an exam. This has resulted in two positive outcomes for ODAFF. The first is a large decrease in the number of complaints which frees up agency time and resources. The second is the ability to do these exams as a group instead of individually for each applicator which requires fewer personnel to complete the task. Finally, since education is one of the universities main purposes, they are an excellent source to provide training for the federal worker protection standard.

Currently, ODAFF does not have the resources to develop, print and distribute study material for the certification and training program. The agency also does not have enough staff to monitor all practical exams individually so additional staff would be necessary without OSU. The federal WPS program would also be problematic without the assistance of OSU. OSU provides a neutral party to review a facilities compliance with WPS and provide assistance and education to show them how to comply with federal law.

OSU provides critical support in the pesticide program through training material and assistance that would be difficult for the agency to provide without additional personnel. The loss of OSU's assistance would place a great strain on ODAFF's limited resources.

FY2025 Kelly Registration System (KRS)—maintenance, ACH reimbursement and inspection program fees--\$88,000.00

KRS paid ODAFF for licenses, tonnage and registrations that were initially completed in the online system using an ACH transaction. The persons/companies later canceled the payments, so Kelly did not receive payment for what they had already paid to ODAFF. ODAFF has since collected the money from these entities and needs to repay KRS for the overpayment. Also, pays the fees for a subcontracted online inspection program for MI Corporation and the Kelly yearly maintenance fee.

This money is an overpayment by KRS and needs to be returned. We do not have an inspection program for field staff to use when conducting their inspections and it is the maintenance fee for our online program.

FY2025 GIS Programing with Oklahoma University --\$43,125.00

GIS programing would provide ODAFF with the ability to GPS hemp grower fields to provide required data to USDA. It also will allow us to do a better job of collecting and reporting our USDA CAPS survey information under our grant programs. Finally, it will assist us in collecting information on complaints, inspections and licensees.

Without the GIS programming we will have more difficulty meeting USDA hemp reporting requirements and CAPS reporting requirements. This will also limit our efficiency in sampling, trapping and inspections.

FY2025 Verizon Wireless --\$25,000.00

Verizon is used as the main form of communication for field staff and office staff. Additionally, with the Agency moving forward with online services having access to a mobile wireless for field staff is essential to their job duties.

Without wireless there would be no way to communicate or move forward with our online system for inspections. Additionally, it will slow response times to complaints including those that are time sensitive like human health related and environmental.

FY2025 OSU Plant Disease and Insect Diagnostic Lab (PDIDL) --\$ 25,000.00

This is for payment to the PDIDL lab for processing of plant pest and disease samples. This can include reoccurring pests such as red imported fire ant or new pests such as vascular streak dieback in redbud. Sampling events may be funded by an USDA APHIS cooperative agreement but not all samples are funded.

The nursery will be unable to ship any plants or ODAFF will have to pay the costs of sample analysis.

FY2024 OSU Plant Disease and Insect Diagnostic Lab (PDIDL) --\$28,000.00

A plant pest emergency occurred in December with the detection of Boxwood Blight in Boxwood. ODAFF spent January and February testing Boxwoods at the positive nursery for the disease to prevent the further spread of infected plant material. This request is to recover the sampling that has already occurred.

Infected boxwoods would be sold to the public all of which will die and also may spread to existing boxwoods which are very common in landscaping.

Computers --\$13,600.00

Updated computers are needed to replace existing computers for CPS office staff. CPS office staff's computers are out of warranty and beginning to have issues. When their computers fail it causes down time while they get repaired or replaced.

Computers are essential for us to be able to complete our work. without them inspection, licensing, registrations, tonnage and complaint response time will be slowed. Additionally, communication with field staff and the public will be affected causing undo frustrations.

FORESTRY

FY24: Class 8 Tractor - \$204,600 (SFA – Forest Action Plan)

Purchase of one (1) Class 8 Truck Tractor. This tractor will be used to carry a John Deere 650P firefighting bulldozer. This is a mission critical piece of equipment that will respond to wildfires and all-hazard situations throughout the entire state. The transports will be replacing trucks that are undersized, has excessive mileage and require costly repairs. Funding for this purchase will come from the FY22 US Forest Service, State Fire Assistance – Forest Action Plan Grant. 100% of this purchase will be reimbursed.

FY24: Development of Leadership Training Course - \$7,500 (SFA Response)

Contract with the Arkansas Division of Forestry to develop a staff ride based on the Civil War battle of Pea Ridge. The course will focus on leadership lessons of mission alignment, strategic/operational focus, effective communication, and prioritization. This course will be utilized for Forestry Service leadership as well as all ODAFF leadership to enhance job performance. Funding for this purchase will come from the FY22 US Forest Service, State Fire Assistance Grant. 100% of this purchase will be reimbursed.

FY24- \$60,000 – Replacement Vehicle Purchase

ODAFF Forestry Services is requesting approval for the purchase of a truck cab and chassis to replace a Rural Fire Department's fire truck burned during fires. From the funds appropriated to the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry in Enrolled House Bill No. 1004 of the 1st Extraordinary Session of the 59th Oklahoma Legislature, the sum of Six Million Nine Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$6,950,000.00) shall, under the direction of the Commissioner of Agriculture, be allocated to rural fire departments for replacement of equipment and gear burned during fires including truck chassis.

FY24- \$100,000.00 – Purchase Wet Hydrants

ODAFF Forestry Services is requesting approval for the purchase of wet hydrants in the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00). From the funds appropriated to the Oklahoma Department

of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry in Enrolled House Bill No. 1004 of the 1st Extraordinary Session of the 59th Oklahoma Legislature, the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) shall, under the direction of the Commissioner of Agriculture, be allocated to rural fire coordinators to administer a wet hydrant program.

LABORATORY SERVICES

FY24 - \$5,439.00 – Preventive Maintenance

Purchase of a one-year preventive maintenance agreement for the ICP (Inductively Coupled Plasma Optical Emission Spectrometry Unit) in the Inorganic Section to ensure continuous and consistent operation of the instrument and ensures the overall quality of the data being reported.

FY24 - \$31,318.56 – Service Contract

Renewal for one-year preventative maintenance agreement for the HPLC-MSMS Triple Quad 6470 in the Pesticide Section to ensure continuous and consistent operation of the instrument and improves overall quality of the data being reported.

Justification: Without a maintenance agreement the laboratory would not be able to verify the accuracy of the test results and the equipment could possibly fail rendering it unusable.
(To be purchased by Consumer Protection Service)

FY24 - \$13,500.00 – Service Contract

Purchase of a one-year service maintenance contract renewal for a dual HPLC System LC 1260 Infinity II dual system.
(To be purchased by Consumer Protection Service)

FY24 – \$8,539.38 – Probe Calibration

Purchase for recalibration of nine Thermistor Probes.

FY25 - \$5,800.00 – DI Water and Maintenance

Contract purchase of analytical grade water for laboratory testing and tank maintenance. Contract effective 07/01/24 – 06/30/25.

FY25 - \$7,800.00 – Dairy Farmers of America Inc.

Contract to provide Somatic Cell Standards (SCC) for milk testing. Contract effective 07/01/024 – 06/30/25.

MARKET DEVELOPMENT

FY2024 – 32 hotel rooms x 2 days (at the state per diem rate) - Ag in the Classroom Teacher Road Trip - \$6,848.00

FY2024 – Agritourism Wine Trails Digital Advertising – funded entirely by the Viticulture and Enology Revolving Grant Fund - \$18,100.00

FY2024 – Made in Oklahoma bags & state fair bags - \$14,000.00

FY2025 – Agreement with Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department to promote the Agritourism industry through the development of consumer marketing campaigns. - \$35,000.00

Justification: The Agritourism program is entering a partnership with Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department (OTRD) as part of our marketing plan for FY2025. As a part of this partnership, Agritourism gets to use their existing marketing channels including free ads in their guides, website presence, travel show co-ops and brochure inventory, warehousing, and distribution. If

this proposed expense is not approved, we will lose an opportunity to share in a campaign that gains exponentially more reach than we could obtain on our own. OTRD already has the channels set up and by not partnering we would be looking at well over \$100,000 to replace what they can give us in ad placement, website presence and Search Engine Optimization. We have evaluated the warehousing and postage costs; this alone would be over \$50,000 in hard costs and does not include the advertising and marketing part of our agreement.

FY2025 – Contract with Freestyle, graphic design firm, to work with the Agritourism program in creating promotional and print items to further promote the program and help establish continuity with advertising and marketing pieces. - \$40,000.00

Justification: This is the graphic design firm that maintains the Agritourism brand while developing new print materials, refreshing website content, strategically updating social media channels and assisting with social and website analytics. It is the goal of the Agritourism Program to utilize all marketing channels to create a consistent brand awareness campaign and utilize social channels for seasonal promotions within the many categories of Agritourism. If this expense is not approved, there will be a negative impact on the ability of the Agritourism Program to promote and advertise the 350+ Agritourism venues in the state, resulting in an economic loss of those businesses and the local economy in those areas.

FY2025 – Agreement with Food Export Association of the Midwest USA (Food Export – Midwest) for membership to provide small and medium size food and agricultural companies’ access to international markets through a variety of exporter programs and to increase volume and value of agricultural exports from the region in represents. - \$7,000.00

FY2025 – Contract with Oklahoma State University for Year 1 of 4 - Viticulture and Enologist Extension Specialist – Project funded entirely by the Viticulture and Enology Center Development Revolving Fund Grant - \$70,000.00

Justification: This project is entirely funded by the Oklahoma Viticulture and Enology Center Development Revolving Fund. This employee will coordinate an annual grape management course, create online grape management and wine making classes, write grant applications and research vineyard and viticulture projects as needed. The employee will also assist grape growers and wine makers through field days, correspondence, and site visits. If this proposed expense is not approved and therefore the project is not completed, the State not only loses money immediately that is important to the grape and wine industry through the economic impact, but also runs the risk of not being awarded money from the Oklahoma Viticulture and Enology Center Development Revolving Fund in the future.

OFFICE OF GENERAL COUNSEL

FY25 - \$48,450.77 for SHI-Granicus (GovQA Service) – A continued statewide contract for an online system for the public to submit Open Records Requests which then allows the agency to easily and efficiently compile and redact the requested files. It also allows transfer of large files and provides the capability to invoice the requester according to Open Records Request requirements in the event the files or record sources are large. Without this contract, the agency will lose the online capability for the public to request these records and will put additional tracking and review efforts on the agency.

FY 25 - \$5,184 for Thomson-Reuter Clear – This is a continued service with Thomson-Reuter. The Clear service allows OGC access to current, legal addresses and other information regarding

individuals in enforcement, background checks or other business matters with the agency. Without having these services, investigative research and enforcement efforts would be slowed.

FY 25 - \$21,060 for Thomson-Reuter Westlaw Precision – This is a continued service, previously noted as Westlaw Classic, with Thomson-Reuter. Westlaw allows OGC the ability to quickly access and review Oklahoma, federal, and other states' case law and statutes thereby speeding up legal research efforts. Without having these services, investigative research and enforcement efforts would be slowed.


Available Cash at Month End

Months Ending: July 2020 – April 2024





Total Revenues, Appropriations and Expenses July 2023 – April 2024










Revenue By Division July 2023 – April 2024




FY 2024 Total Expenses by Month with Budget Year



QUALITY MANAGEMENT SECTION: (Daniel Tripp, QA Manager)

The QA Manager completed all assigned findings regarding the Food & Dairy Section 2023 Internal Audit. The remaining findings will need to be completed prior to the Section’s FDA External Audit on August 19, 2024.


The Food & Dairy Section has started validation testing to use a modified Listeria method for routine sample testing. Early results have displayed consistent/repeatable results and shows promise.

The QA Manager will perform timer verification checks with NIST traceable timers that have been purchased for all Sections. Each timer has undergone preliminary checks, as well as control charted, according to NIST specifications. Verification checks will be performed once a year during standard equipment checks. The QA Manager is working on an SOP for performing timer verifications.


PT Results

During the month of April, the Food and Dairy Section successfully validated a cycle that can sterilize up to ten liters of media after one cycle run in the Autoclave. Media is dispensed among 10 one-liter jars. By doing this it will allow the Section to double its output after a single cycle run. This will allow the Section to be more efficient and focus on other daily tasks. The Section is currently working on validating a cycle to sterilize up to 4 liters of media dispensed throughout 250 ml jars.


The now vacant Serology Laboratory is being considered by the FDA for a possible training Laboratory. They are planning to host the FDA's yearly Milk Analyst Workshop Laboratory Course here.

USDA/FSIS recently concluded its audit of the Food and Dairy Section. The Section will be required to start identifying non-O157 *E. coli* groups as part of STEC testing. This includes *E. coli* O26, O45, O111, O103, O121, and O145. Additional requirements are to save and retain Certificates of Analysis for all purchased media, reagents, and testing materials, and maintain Quality System and SOP/SAP Updates. The QA Manager will need to create an In-House PT for the Section that includes detection and confirmation of STEC, Salmonella, and Listeria, and will also include Document Control, adjust temperature requirements of FSIS sample receiving and SOP implementation and training documentation.


PT Results

The routine distribution of quality control samples to respective sections of the Laboratory continued. Collection and submission of data to the respective study groups for statistical analysis was conducted.





Determinations Breakdown**





DAIRY/FOOD SAFETY SECTION: (Sharon Swyear, Environmental/Chemical Laboratory Scientist IV)

The month of March was a typical testing month for the Section. Two dairies were not tested, and one dairy closed. There are currently sixty-two dairies with ten dairies closing in 2023, and five closing in 2024 so far.

There were no notifications of any antibiotic positives. One dairy is on warning for bacteria count in their retail raw milk.

The Section was approved through the AFDO grant to purchase a new analytical balance, which was received this month. This one will replace the older one that is not as accurate as the Section's needs.

The FDA will be hosting the Milk Program Training and the Southwest Regional Seminar in Golden, Colorado on April 22-26, 2024. The LEO training course will be held in Alameda, California on May 14-16, 2024, with a two-day virtual training the week before. The Laboratory Examination of Dairy Products training class is tentatively scheduled in Alameda, California for September 2024. Two of the Section's Scientists will be attending the seminar in Golden, Colorado, and at least one will attend the training class in Alameda, California.




The month of April was a normal testing month for the Section. Three dairies were not tested, and two dairies closed. There are currently fifty-eight dairies tested monthly with five of these dairies tested out of state. A total of seven dairies have closed since January. April is a down month for Inorganic water testing. The winter LMFO testing has ended, and the summer Oklahoma Conservation Commission water testing will begin in May.

Byran Fritz and Ebby Eubanks attended the Southwest Regional Seminar in Golden, Colorado April 22-26, 2024. While there, it was announced that the next NCIMS meeting will be held in Minneapolis in April 2025.

With both analysts and all the dairy inspectors attending the Southwest Regional Seminar, no dairy samples as well as meat samples were tested that week.


Total Determinations

SEED SECTION: (Tori Gillispie, Agriculture Services Administrator I and Wade Krivanek, State Seed Program Administrator)

Activity in the Seed Section remained normal for the month of March. Records indicate a total of 184 samples received for testing. Crop types continue to consist mainly of corn, sorghum, soybean, peanuts and spring grasses. Most samples were collected by CPS inspectors following up on carry over seed needing updated germination tests. The seed quality was acceptable for official samples, however there were label violations discovered on four different seed lots of grasses resulting in 200 pounds of grass seed being placed under stop sale.

The Section continues to complete proficiency tests through the Association of Official Seed Analysts (AOSA) for continuing education.

The activity in the Seed Section had a slight increase in samples for the month of April. Records indicate a total of 184 samples received for testing. Crops being tested consisted primarily of sorghum, soybean, corn, cotton, cowpeas, and summer grasses. Up to now there have been no quality issues discovered pertaining to summer crop seed. There were no Seed Law violations discovered during the month.

Two Seed analysts attended the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) Seed ID and Germination Workshop for training in Sacramento, California on April 3-5, 2024. The workshop was a great learning experience, especially for our newest analyst Karen. The analysts brought back useful information to help the laboratory and prepare for the AOSA certification test.

GENERAL CHEMISTRY SECTION: (Johnathan White, Environmental/Chemical Laboratory Scientist IV)

March was a good month for the Section, we were able to smoothly transition to the fertilizer rush without having any major issues with our testing abilities or turnaround times. We have also been able to ask for an increase in fertilizer samples over our initial targets due to an established group of employees whom are able to handle the increased work load associated with fertilizer. Given this we expect to be able to receive and test around 3000 samples for FY 2024, a 500 sample increase over our initial goals.

Interviews were conducted for a new chemist position. After a second round of interviews, we were able to select a great candidate. Savanna Henson will start working for the agency on Monday April 22nd. We have also made strides in our efforts to consolidate and organize all defunct equipment for surplus hopefully freeing up counter space for the new Near Infrared System when it arrives.

Our turnaround time is currently at 14.95 days, we are well within our target time. Times may go back up a little in April as we get more fertilizers but we are hopeful that we will be able to stay within our 18 day target even with an increase in samples.

April was a good month for moving our Section forward. We were able to begin our new chemist's initial training. It is our intention that Savanna will be running the Near Infra-Red scanner when it arrives, but while we wait for its delivery she will be training on multiple other tests to allow us some redundancy for people to use leave or work on other projects (LIMS upgrade).

We had an issue with the Leco Nitrogen analyzer at the end of the month with a component failure. We received a replacement part and have been able to get the unit back in service. As this unit analyzes over 95% of the samples moving through the Section we want to make sure we are planning ahead and not left without a Nitrogen/Protein Analyzer.

Even with the Leco unit being down at the end of month we were still able to complete 186 samples, consisting of 727 determinations. These numbers are slightly down due to the hold up of reporting for Nitrogen/Protein testing. I expect any held-up samples for the Leco unit will be reported out before the end of the month.

Our turnaround time is currently at 18.79 days, slightly exceeding our target time. These times are up due to the increase in fertilizer samples which have longer processing and testing times. The issue with our Protein/Nitrogen Analyzer also has a large impact on turn-around times. The quick turnaround associated with samples just tested on this machine normally helps to lower our turnaround times.




Fig A. Pie charts representing the number of samples received by type (left) and matrix (right).




Fig B. Graph showing the number of samples received by the Section each month.




Fig C. Graph showing the number of determinations completed each month.




Fig A. Pie charts representing the number of samples received by type (left) and matrix (right).




Fig B. Graph showing the number of samples received by the Section each month.




Fig C. Graph showing the number of determinations completed each month.






FIRE MANAGEMENT

WILDFIRE ACTIVITY & OUTLOOK EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Wildfire Activity & Outlook Executive Summary:

In the last report, Oklahoma Forestry Services highlighted that fire activity significantly increased across the state with a number of fires resulting in significant impact to the lives and livelihoods of Oklahomans. Two of these fires were awarded Fire Management Assistance Grants by FEMA. OFS continues to assemble required documentation to submit to OEM for assistance reimbursement.

In the month of April and so far in May, fire activity slowed down with the increase in precipitation. OFS embraced the opportunity by slowly pushing forward with hazardous fuels mitigation projects; train Fire Departments in wildland firefighting; maintain and enhance our own wildland firefighting skills by attending academies; and return to the Catesby fire for suppression repair.





Weather Outlook



Wildland Fire Trainings

In order to maintain and upgrade Incident Command System qualifications, 30 OFS Rangers will attend 12 wildland fire courses at the Arkansas River Valley Wildland Fire Academy this month. In addition, OFS will provide 3 instructors to help facilitate two courses.

Since the beginning of the fiscal year, OFS has provided three types of training courses to volunteer fire departments; (8) Basic Wildland Fire, (3) Expanding Incidents and (1) Incident Commander training. In total, OFS has conducted 12 external wildland fire trainings with 282 firefighters in attendance.

Protecting life and property outside Oklahoma

As Oklahoma fire season slows down, other states are showing signs of drought resulting in a high potential for wildfire and need for our assistance. Resources have been deployed to Texas, including: one dozer with two operators, one Type 3 Incident Commander, one Division/Group Supervisor and one initial attack dozer operator staffing a Texas A&M Forest Service dozer.

Catesby Fire Suppression Repair

Our firefighters not only protect life and property from fires, they will also return to provide suppression repair when needed. An OFS Taskforce of two dozers and two skidsteers returned to Ellis County at the request of a land owner near Wolf Creek. The drainage system was hindered when containment lines were built to stop the progression of the fire. OFS returned to remove some pushed timber from Wolf Creek drainage. In addition, they cleared and piled cedar trees that were pushed up against some trees and a fence row. Once all the trees were piled, the Task Force burned the debris and rehabilitated the road used for access to the site.

Community Wildfire Defense Grant (CWDG) Update:

The CWDG program, authorized by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, represents a \$1 billion, five-year initiative designed to support at-risk local communities and Tribes. Its goal is to aid in planning and reducing wildfire risk.

Eligibility and Funded Projects:

Eligible communities include those in areas identified as having high or very high wildfire hazard potential. This also encompasses low-income communities or those impacted by severe disasters that affect wildfire risk. The program has funded a variety of projects, with a focus on developing and revising Community Wildfire Protection Plans. It also supports the implementation of related projects outlined in existing plans, provided they are not more than 10 years old.

For the 2023-2024 CWDG Grant Cycle, Oklahoma had nine applicants. The following three were awarded a total of \$6,317,630:

- **City of McAlester Wildfire Prevention Project:** \$5,842,630 to establish a sustainable wildfire prevention approach with a dedicated Wildfire Mitigation Unit by providing assets to facilitate mitigation efforts, clearing of combustible materials and vegetation, establishing firebreaks, conducting controlled burns, and ongoing public outreach and community engagement.
- **Comanche County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (“CWPP”):** \$225,000 to create a plan to mitigate the risk of wildfires.
- **Tulsa County Regional Wildfire Planning and Preparedness Plan:** \$250,000 to coordinate, plan, write, and implement a Multi-Jurisdictional CWPP which will incorporate and cover all fire districts within Tulsa County.

Turner Falls CWDG Update:

Turner Falls was the sole recipient of the CWDG grant in Oklahoma during the first year. Wildfire mitigation crews successfully completed three miles of firebreaks and cleared approximately 20 acres of hazardous fuels. Additionally, they burned slash piles across 10 acres. Turner Falls Park has recently acquired a UTV skid unit and other essential tools for the ongoing maintenance of mechanical work and the prescribed fire program within the park.

Wildfire Hazardous Mitigation Update:

Wildfire Mitigation Crews continue work on the Tinker B-21 Bomber Campus project and have completed approximately 50% to-date. Unfortunately, set backs and delays have been experienced due to the wet weather causing soggy ground conditions.


As mentioned in a previous report, the State Fire Capacity Grant (SFC) application for the Gilcrease Museum hazardous fuels mitigation project was submitted in January. This grant was funded at \$274,000 and consists of hazardous fuels mastication, prescribed fire, and chemical mitigation work. Hold harmless documents signed by property owners have been acquired so work can begin without delay.

Prescribed Fire Update:

Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS), in collaboration with the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR), is updating a Fire Management Plan (FMP) for the six project areas throughout Oklahoma that encompasses approximately 61,000 acres and seven reservoirs. The FMP will address the potential of significant wildfire occurrence on BOR lands by conducting prescribed fires to consume ground fuels such as downed woody debris, the duff layer, and thatch buildup, as well as killing ladder

fuels. As a result of these prescribed burns, it will also return the properties to a natural, fire-dependent ecosystem that benefits wildlife, water quality, and the aesthetic views for recreationalists.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND COMMUNICATIONS

FORESTRY EDUCATION

Forestry Education Highlights

On April 5th through 7th, Education Coordinator Tony Pascall and Information Representative Keith Merckx worked with Forester Jacob Lewis and Forest Rangers Bryan Walker, Blayne Hardaway, Brock Marble, Woodrow Wilson, and Josh Bates to host a fire prevention education campaign in Beavers Bend State Park for eclipse weekend. The team passed out Smokey Bear material and talked with approximately 2500 campers and people staying in cabins for the weekend about how to be safe with their campfires.



On April 12th, Tony and Foresters Evan Long and Elizabeth Bland-Corbishley taught 120 elementary and middle school students about the importance of trees and helped plant several trees on the school property.

On April 16th, State Forester Mark Goeller, Tony, and Keith represented OFS at Ag day at the Capitol. There, they spoke with approximately 300 members of state congress and the public about our agency and our programs, and passed out educational seedlings.



On April 17th, Tony hosted a booth at the UCO Earth Day in Edmond and spoke with over 500 people about the importance of urban forests, and of forest management.



On April 19th, Tony judged the forestry section of the state Envirothon test in Stillwater, and taught the competing teams about forest management and tree ID.

On April 20th, Tony taught about forest habitats to 7 students at an Earth Day event hosted by STEMforce in Edmond.

On April 23rd, Tony, Brock, and Forest Legacy Coordinator Madison Gore taught 3rd graders at Bryan County Outdoor Classroom in Durant. They taught about forest management and the importance of prescribed fire to 175 students.

On April 30th, Tony and Madison taught 275 4th graders at the outdoor classroom event in Weatherford. They taught about the importance of protecting forests from invasive species, and the benefits of trees.



COMMUNICATIONS

Urban Outreach

Information Representative Keith Merckx accompanied the Urban Forestry Strike Team to the Chickasaw National Recreation Area following the devastating tornado that hit Sulphur causing extensive damage to the town as well as to the national park. Keith documented work the team is doing with the National Park Service to assess damage to the park's tree canopy. Of particular interest is a heavily-damaged tree known to generations of area children as The Monkey Tree – so called because its low-hanging branches are excellent for climbing.

The tree long predates CCC work in the area in the 1930s; CCC reports mention the tree being near work cabins in the Walnut Grove picnic area that no longer exist. The tree was the subject of a Big Tree Sunday post on Instagram and Facebook that drew a great deal of interest from the public. OFS foresters have assessed the tree and believe that with continued attention, the outlook is positive for the tree.

Conferences & Training

Keith will attend the SGSF annual meeting at Wilmington, NC in June as the Communications Liaison to the Fire Management Committee. In May, Keith completed S-203 Fire Public Information Officer training at the Arkansas River Valley Fire Academy in Russellville, AR.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

FOREST INVENTORY & ANALYSIS

The Forest Inventory and Analysis (FIA) team is working in Adair, Delaware, Cherokee, McIntosh, Muskogee, Sequoyah, Pittsburg, and Latimer counties. Data collection is a year-round priority, and the crew is hard at work to complete the few dozen remaining plots before refocusing the data collection west of I-35. While data collection has been a priority, the FIA staff members have found time to receive a training provided by OFS and OSU in McCurtain county where an invasive and devastating species of insect has been discovered for the first time ever in Oklahoma. This insect kills 99% of ash trees in a region. Monitoring the spread will be a somber task.

Since the last board report date of April 5, 2024, EC has suppressed 7 fires on a total of 2,247 acres for an average fire size of 321.1 acres. Three (3) primary structures were saved at a total value of \$47,239.00. Two secondary structures were saved valued at \$2,000. EC rangers provided fire support in western Oklahoma and as of this report, five (5) EC rangers have provided out-of-state suppression response near Ft. Stockton, TX.



Hazardous Fuels Mitigation

EC rangers installed fire lines on 2 properties totaling 420 acres and completed prescribed burning on 2 properties for a total of 177 acres treated. One EC ranger also assisted with the Fuels Mitigation Project at Tinker AFB.

East Central Forest Rangers and Talihina District forester JT Allen spent a day assisting the Forest Regeneration Center in Goldsby with potting containerized loblolly pine seed.

Forester Caleb Fields was part of an Urban Forest Strike Team deployed to assess trees damaged by the tornado that struck Sulphur, OK. The assessment occurred in the Chickasaw National Recreation Area.



Information / Education

East Central foresters and rangers assisted with the Haskell and LeFlore County fishing clinics that are aimed at getting youth outdoors. Two Wilburton rangers also conducted a Smokey Bear school program in McAlester.

Forester Eddie Woods assisted with the Southeast District forestry judging contest and judged the EOOSC Ag Speech Contest. EC rangers and foresters set up and ran the Kiamichi Tech Center forestry judging contest and set up and ran the state forestry judging contest.

Wilburton rangers constructed replacement fire reporting signage that will be installed in areas of high fire occurrence. These signs provide residents and passersby with our toll-free number to report wildfires or to call in their controlled burns. OFS is currently working with OCI to purchase up to date, high quality aluminum signage to replace the handmade plywood signs that have been used in the past.

OSU Capstone Update

OSU students gave their Capstone final presentations to the landowners and faculty on May 1st. All the student teams did well and were able to add this experience to their toolbox for future employment in the forestry profession

Safety / Training Highlights

East Central conducted the RT-130, Wildland Fire Safety Training Annual Refresher (WFSTAR) on April 19th for the area rangers and other fire personnel along with 10 personnel from the Tulsa fire department. Topics discussed included NWCG WFSTAR Introduction to Dead Fuel Moisture, Command and Control, New Generation fire shelters, fire readiness, position task books, and vehicle repair, maintenance, and upkeep.

Pesticide samples taken March-April 2024 are presented in the following chart. A total of 65 Residue, 3 Tank Mix, and 4 Concentration samples were taken.



Unwanted Pesticide Disposal Program

The collections were scheduled from 8:00am until 1:00pm. The Altus event collected 34,702 lbs. and the Shawnee event collected 29,651 lbs. for a total of 64,353 lbs. ODAFF works with our hazardous waste contractor, CleanEarth to dispose of these pesticides.

Pesticide Testing & Updates

Megan Parker, Pesticide Program Administrator, attended an EPA PREP course in Fort Collins, CO on April 22-25, 2024. The course discussed issues relating to the implementation of the EPA certification and training plan which includes timelines, potential bottlenecks, ideas on what has been successful, along with potential problems and their resolutions.

Weed-Free Forage

Andrew Keathley is our newest CPS inspector to complete the Weed-Free Forage training through NAISMA. This certification allows Andrew to do inspections and certify weed free hay fields through our Weed-Free Forage Program.

Hemp

There are currently 68 hemp growers, 45 hemp processors/handlers, 127,463 licensed sq ft, and 5856 licensed acres.

Cotton Seed Bug Multistate Survey

Cotton seed bug was detected in Los Angeles, California in 2019. In 2020, it was found in five more locations across three counties (Los Angeles, Orange, and Riverside). The multiple detections (over 6 locations) in multiple counties suggests an establishment even though not declared as established. The closest location is more than 100 miles from the commercial cotton growing areas of California. There are serious concerns that potential spread of this pest could have devastating impacts regionally or throughout the cotton growing regions of the United States.

Cotton seed bug (*Oxycarenus hyalinipennis*) is considered a serious pest of cotton worldwide. Adults and nymphs feed on the seeds causing weight loss, decrease oil quality and poor germination (Henry, 1983). Cotton fibers may also be lost due to staining created by crushed insects during the ginning process.

ODAFF received funding through an agreement with USDA PPQ to conduct a 2023 survey of cotton growing sites and retail/nursery locations selling related plants in the mallow family for Cotton Seed Bug. 2024 funding to conduct the survey is expected shortly.

Thirteen ODAFF field staff performed 184 inspections at 63 retail and nursery sites for Cotton Seed Bug (CSB), visiting once to several times to inspect Malvaceous targets. Three field staff and the State Survey Coordinator (SSC) visited eight Cotton Gins and two cotton seed storage and transfer facilities where seed is examined monthly for signs of infestation. During each inspection staff inspect storage, transfer, and work areas for evidence of CSB. The SSC created a sieve to assist with seed inspections.

CPS contracted with the Oklahoma Boll Weevil Eradication Organization (OBWEO) to increase coverage. Nine OBWEO staff placed 2,046 traps in thirty-five counties. Traps are placed at one-mile intervals and may represent more than one field. Traps were checked three times a month for up to six months. Drought in western Oklahoma resulted in widespread crop failure in non-irrigated fields causing many traps to be removed early. OBWEO visited traps 9,713 times. Each visit represents an opportunity to inspect for CSB but time constraints, weather, spray schedules and watering may prevent inspections. Out of 9,713 visits to traps, OBWEO staff inspected associated fields for CSB 1,045 times and submitted twelve samples.

Data is captured through an ESRI Field Maps app developed with the University of Oklahoma. A recent image of the data viewer is below.




Figure 2: ODAFF CSB survey data viewer. This tool is used for multiple survey targets. (Note, all 15 submitted samples are included in this map.)




Figure 3: OBWEO commercial cotton inspections = 1,045. Samples indicated in red.

The SSC conducted trainings for both staff groups and provided supplies to facilitate the survey. This included developing a wallet card to distribute to the public educating them on the pest as seen in figure 4.

AGRICULTURE RESOURCE SECTION

Weights & Measures Program

During this period the large capacity scale technicians tested 110 Vehicle scales and 3 ranch scales, 15 of the Vehicle scales were rejected for repairs and 1 ranch scale was rejected. The ranch scale testing program ended in April, and we are currently concentrating on checking vehicle scales at grain elevators prior to the start of wheat harvest.

CPS inspectors checked a total of 1267 small scales and 28 platform scales, 24 of the scales were rejected. There were 16 random pack inspections and 54 standard pack inspections conducted that resulted in 7 companies receiving letters of warning. Additionally, 72 price verification inspections were conducted at various retailers that resulted in 2 companies receiving letters of warning.

Three scale companies received a letter of warning for not properly servicing scales. One company received a letter of warning for using a scale that was not approved.

Feed Program

Program Performance

During this reporting period there were a total of 112 official feed samples analyzed, with 453 feed determinations made from these samples. These determinations resulted in the issuance of 14 violations for feeds or feed ingredients that did not meet established tolerances based on their guaranteed analysis. Most of these violations were issued for products deficient in Crude Fat. Other violation includes Zinc, Calcium, Crude Fiber, Crude Protein, Copper, Magnesium, Magnesium, and Salt. Twelve stop sale orders were issued for feed products with severe deviations from their guaranteed analysis. Six stop sales were issued for products deficient in Vitamin A. Two stop sales were issued for products deficient in Salt. Two stop sales were issued for products deficient in Crude Fat. One stop sale was issued for a product deficient in Copper. One stop sale was issued for a product deficient in Crude Protein.

The following tables show a two-month comparison of label violations and stop sale orders issued by the Department for feed products that did not meet their guaranteed analysis.

Animal Disease Traceability:

We continue to distribute the free RFID tags to interested veterinarians and producers. During this time, we shipped 19,702 tags to 13 veterinarians and nine producers.

We've had nine new account requests for our no cost electronic CVI to make a total of 238 registered users.

On April 8-10, Dr. Gorczyca, Marissa McLaughlin, and Austyn Fuss attended the USAHerds User Group Workshop in Salt Lake City, UT.

On April 30, Dr. Gorczyca and Marissa McLaughlin, along with USDA employees Bill Golightly and Vicki Ernsting, visited the livestock market in Anthony, Kansas to see a demonstration of a livestock market software that Kansas Department of Agriculture has developed to provide consistency in the livestock market reporting. Dr. G and Marissa were impressed with the software, and we will be exploring funding opportunities to purchase it for our markets.

On May 6, AIS participated in an introductory session for Ag Enterprises. This platform will replace USA Herds for premises management and data banking. Data migration will begin in late summer and the site is scheduled to be fully accessible in December of this year.

We have been assisting Investigative Services with cattle theft investigations by reviewing official identification records in USAHerds to determine if movement has occurred.

The proposed changes to the USDA ADT rule became final and were announced on April 26. These changes were published in the Federal Register on May 9, which started the 180-day implementation time frame. On November 5th, cattle required to be officially identified, will need to be identified with a device that is both electronic and visual. Cattle that have already been identified with a silver brite tag or orange metal bangs tag before November 5, will not need to be re-identified using an EID tag. This rule does not change the class of cattle that need to be identified and continues to exclude beef cattle <18 months of age for feeding purposes only. Cattle that are required to be identified today are the only cattle that fall under the new guidelines of EID official identification.

Aquaculture:

During this period, we received one new license application and two licensing inquiries.

On May 17, Dr. Gorczyca and Marissa McLaughlin met with Wade Farrar and Elaine Gainer, ODWC to discuss possible licensing crossover between ODAFF and ODWC. We

were able to get clarification on the minnow dealers license and developed strategies to assist both agencies in education and outreach for individuals to obtain the correct licensing to transport, propagate, and sell aquatic species in Oklahoma.

Biologics:

The renewal period has ended. We have 30 companies with 808 products total registered.

Marissa sent two stop sale notices due to non-renewals. One of those products was subsequently renewed and the stop sale order was released.

Our livestock inspectors continue to monitor for expired biological products in commercial retail. When these products are discovered, they are removed from retail and the store management is educated. A follow up inspection typically takes place a few weeks later. If products are still discovered expired or not at the correct temperature, a letter of warning is issued. Our Inspectors found expired biologics in four stores.

We approved a Field Safety Study requested by Cambridge Laboratories: “Field Evaluation of Bivalent Cache Valley Virus Vaccine”.

Cattle Programs:

The outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in dairy cattle is continuing. It has now affected 51 herds in nine states. USDA has implemented testing requirements for lactating dairy cattle moving across state lines. NASDA, State Animal Health Officials, and industry have worked with USDA to develop protocols to have as little impact on the industry as possible.

Viral fragments have been found in milk in grocery stores, but virus has not been grown from that milk. This proves that pasteurization is effective and pasteurized milk and meat are safe to consume.

I believe we have had a few affected dairies in Oklahoma, but the disease has not been confirmed by laboratory testing.

On April 9 I met with ODAPP Dairy Inspectors to brief them on the disease and biosecurity methods to prevent it. They were given educational handouts to distribute to the dairies they inspect, with the expectation that the face to face communication would be more effective in helping the dairies protect their business.

We continue to attend many virtual meetings with various regulatory and industry groups to discuss the syndrome and get the most current updates.

Brucellosis:


The only remaining reservoir of *B abortus* in the U.S. is in elk and bison in the Greater Yellowstone Park area.

While there is very little need to test for *B abortus* any longer, this means we have very little or no surveillance for *Brucella suis* (Swine Brucellosis) in cattle, which currently

infects approximately 20% of the feral swine that our Wildlife Services personnel test. *B suis* can, and does, infect cattle occasionally.

Trichomoniasis:

During this period there were 3,543 Oklahoma bulls tested for Trichomoniasis with two positive individuals found.



8,945 bulls tested / 14 positive = 0.16% positive

Our current statistics compare to 2.1% positive bulls in 2011, 1.4% in 2012, 1.3% in 2013, 1.4% in 2014, 1.1% in 2015, 1.1% in 2016, 0.5% in 2017, 0.32% in 2018, 0.42% in 2019, 0.35% in 2020, 0.28% in 2021, 0.3% in 2022, and 0.22% in 2023.

We have one small herd that has been certified as Trichomoniasis Free.

Tuberculosis:

No significant activities in the TB program.

Johne's Disease:

Since the last report we have received eight positive Oklahoma reports. They are all from new premises.

Year to date we have received 26 positive Oklahoma reports, all for new premise infections, similar to the nine year-to-date average of 25 new premises. Multiple reports for a previously identified positive premise is down significantly from 4.7 to 0.

A new subset population of cattle was identified during this period. Two unrelated show cattle genetic operations decided to examine the scope of the Johne's problem within their herds following a symptomatic animal that tested positive. Both operations had purchased some of the "best" genetics from multiple sources. All animals were recent additions, in wonderful condition, several recently retiring from a successful show career. Both herds were young, 4 years old or less. The first herd screening test had a 36% positive rate. The other herd's prevalence was 60%.

In both herds the incubation period to positive test detection was longer than these animals had been owned. Therefore, in both herds, multiple infected animals were purchased from multiple infected sources. We are working with these owners to keep the genetics but eliminate the disease.

Emergency Management:

On April 16, Dana Call, Marissa McLaughlin and Austyn Fuss completed the secure sheep and wool supply Advanced Train the Trainer course. This course focused on enhanced biosecurity tactics against FMD for feedlot, private and public grazing lands.

On May 2, Dr. Gorczyca met with Renee Owusu-Anasah, Medical Reserve Corps Region 6 Coordinator and Lezlie Borak, OK State MRC coordinator to discuss the OK State Animal Response Team. The OK SART is struggling to continue as a functional team without leadership and volunteer assistance. Due to this, it has come to the decision to deregister the OK SART as a statewide unit of the OKMRC and instead push animal response activities back to the county OKMRC units. This was not an easy decision to make but Dr. Gorczyca will continue to serve in a SME capacity to help the county OKMRC units prioritize animal response and build the capacity that is needed in the state to assist with emergency animal sheltering. Dr. Gorczyca will be working with the Oklahoma Large Animal First Responder team to get them registered as a statewide unit to assist them with national grant and training opportunities that otherwise would not be available to them.

On May 9, Dr. Gorczyca and Austyn Fuss met with Dr. Ruth Inman to discuss Showable, an exhibition management software that she developed but has potential to integrate into traceability systems for swine. Dr. Gorczyca will continue to work with Dr. Inman as well as with the OK Pork Council and the National Pork Board to develop a platform for Showable to provide exhibition swine movement records into AgView and thus help encourage the use of AgView for US SHIP purposes.

On May 9, AIS had a follow up meeting with Knight Fire Specialists, LLC., in Oklahoma City. The Kifco foaming unit was brought up for comparison with the equipment the Knight Fire Specialists have developed in regard to foam consistency and quantity. This gave Knight a better idea of ways to modify their equipment for AIS use during a water-based foam depopulation.

On May 10, Dr. Gorczyca participated in a planning call for the FMD in a livestock market working group. The pilot state for the tabletop exercise that is being developed will be Oklahoma. Dr. Gorczyca is working with Joe Barbour from LMA to identify an interested livestock market in the state.

On May 14, Dana Call joined the Animal Disease Traceability State only call to discuss strategies to prepare for the ADT rule that will go into effect November 5, 2024.

On May 6 an EF4 tornado hit rural Osage county and destroyed about a third of the town of Barnsdall. On May 14, Oklahoma Emergency Management relayed a request for

veterinary assistance to help with reported equine injuries and needed assistance. Dr. Stone met with local, tribal, and state emergency management, evaluated the situation, and offered ongoing assistance for veterinary needs. The good news is that most of the need had been cared for locally despite all the confusion.

Equine Programs:

There are no reported cases or quarantines for CEM, Piroplasmosis, or EIA in Oklahoma.

In April, we were notified by a Colorado brand inspector regarding an incident involving an equine rescue organization from Oklahoma. It was reported that the organization had acquired a group of horses (consisting of a mare with a nursing foal, a mule, and a stallion) in Colorado and subsequently transported them across state lines into Oklahoma without the required documentation. The brand inspector provided photographic evidence and pertinent details pertaining to the equine in question. In response to this matter, an inspection was conducted by one of our LSIs in conjunction with investigative services at the premises of the equine rescue organization in Oklahoma. During the inspection, the Colorado horses were found to be present without proper transport documentation. Subsequently, on May 6th, we issued a formal letter of warning to the equine rescue organization and the individuals involved, citing the violation of regulations pertaining to the transportation of horses into Oklahoma without the required documents.

Farmed Cervidae Programs:

It is renewal season for our farmed cervidae program and Dana Call is processing renewal applications, herd inventories and scheduling facility inspections.

The back log of cervid tuberculosis tests pending from NVSL due to a supply shortage continues. We are working with our producers and veterinarians to assure them it will not disrupt their herd status or animal movement.

The upcoming cooperative agreement grant opportunity has been the main topic of the USDA Cervid Health calls during this period. There were additional information sessions provided to all interested parties. We received a call from the Quapaw Nation asking for more information about CWD testing on their tribal land in far NE Oklahoma. They are submitting a cooperative agreement grant proposal to the USDA and we are very excited to have the opportunity to work with the Tribe. The producers working under the current cooperative agreement will soon have fawns on the ground. We anticipate beginning genetic testing of these fawns to begin in the weeks following their birth. AIS will be submitting a second cooperative agreement grant proposal for the 2024 – 2025 window.

The Chronic Wasting Disease Genetic Improvement Act will become effective October 1, 2024. The act will allow, under certain conditions, the release of captive bred native whitetail deer proven to be genetically resistant to CWD for the purpose of genetically influencing the native whitetail deer population over time, to potentially slow the spread of CWD. AIS and ODWC will be establishing rules for the program.

Feral Swine:

It is renewal season for the feral swine facilities. AIS continues to process annual renewals for feral swine handling and sporting facilities.

There have been no feral swine complaints during this period.

Users of the feral swine hunter license website continue to have occasional issues. Dana Call contacted all the feral swine sporting facilities to alert them to the ongoing issue with the website and provide a potential mitigation for their patrons.

We are in the final stages of the US SHIP feral swine working group. The US SHIP traceability project has been completed during this time and a final review was submitted by Dr. Gorczyca.

Foreign Animal Disease:

There was one FAD investigation during this time. It was a dairy cow that showed symptoms compatible with the HPAI syndrome in dairy cattle. Milk samples were submitted to OADDL and thankfully they were negative.

Livestock Market Audits:

During this period, staff followed up on a market that was issued a notice of violation the previous month. No additional violations were observed during the follow up visit. Also, staff performed a market orientation with Hobart Stockyard’s new ownership. Although Mr. Ken Russ had previous experience with the Overbrook market, the routine orientation was a refresher for the owner and his staff.

Although no new market applications were received, a number of application packets were sent to individuals interested in selling livestock in Oklahoma.

This period also allowed for the completion of several custodial account reviews in which no problems were identified.

On April 12 I attended the OADDL Board of Advisors meeting.

On April 12, Dr. Gorczyca provided an overview of the mission and duties of the Animal Industry Services Division to the class of the Oklahoma Agriculture Leadership Program.

On April 17 our Field Staff was in for our quarterly meeting. We distributed longevity awards, got fit tested for masks to protect them in case they have to work in an environment with dangerous viruses, had some biosecurity training, and updated program information.

On April 18, the AIS team listened to the Stroud FFA speech that they had prepared for the State Convention.

On April 17 Dr. Gorczyca, Secretary Arthur, Deputy Commissioner Rowlett, Justin Cooper, and I met with representatives of Herzog Company. They briefed us on their capabilities to assist in depopulation, disposal, and cleaning and disinfection activities.

On April 18, the AIS team listened to the Stroud FFA speech that they had prepared for the State Convention.

On April 22 we had our monthly Veterinary Medical Officer meeting, where AIS and APHIS veterinarians meet to get updates on the activities across the state, discuss new programs and progress on existing programs.

On April 25 I was interviewed by KSWO in Lawton about the HPAI outbreak in dairy cows.

On May 6 I was one of several ODAFF employees who visited with the FFA Chapter from Grandfield. I discussed the programs we operate, the HPAI outbreak, and the changes to the USDA ADT rule.

On May 8 I traveled to Stillwater and participated with four APHIS personnel in presenting initial Accreditation orientation to 4th year veterinary students. Veterinarians must be accredited with USDA to perform regulatory duties in their practice. After the accreditation training, I stayed and gave a presentation about Trichomoniasis and Tuberculosis to 18 4th year students who plan to do at least some food animal practice in Oklahoma.

On May 15 I gave a presentation about the HPAI outbreak in dairy cattle and the changes to the USDA ADT rule to OSU Extension's "Coffee Shop Talk" series.

Also, on May 15 we had another of our monthly VMO meetings.

Poultry Programs

There have been 20 sick or dead birds submitted for our sick bird/dead bird program since last report and a total of 54 since January 1st.

During April and May we received reports indicating the diagnosis of Avian Metapneumovirus (aMPV) in two separate commercial flocks. aMPV is classified as a reportable disease in Oklahoma; however, it has been determined that no specific action is required on our part in response to these cases. It is important to note that both affected flocks were depopulated by the respective commercial entities as part of their management protocols.

We have had no detection of HPAI in Oklahoma this year, and we continue to respond to sick bird calls with testing of suspect birds. Furthermore, we are actively engaged in

HPAI surveillance, which includes testing of avian populations at live bird markets, auctions, and feedstores.

The ongoing 2022 incursion of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza has affected domestic flocks in 48 states with the death or depopulation of over 88 million birds. Since the beginning of 2024 25 states have had positive birds/flocks with 74 HPAI confirmed domestic poultry flock detections. This is the largest foreign animal disease incursion in US history. Even though in June, July, and August we typically see a decline in cases we are continuing to stress the importance of biosecurity in both commercial and backyard flocks through outreach such as emails, social media, and county extension officers.

We hosted five Poultry Tester Classes during this time. They were at ODAFF, Tulsa, Woodward, Lawton, and Atoka. Completion of the class and passing the test allows the testers to test their own birds as well as the birds of other poultry producers.

Public Health

We're working with the State Public Health Veterinarian to enhance their knowledge of animal cases of diseases that affect humans so they can contact the owners to educate them.

We met with the State Public Health Veterinarian and State Epidemiologist, and assisted them in creating a document to dispense to Oklahoma dairies. The document explains the low risk involved with the HPAI virus in dairy cattle and offers free PPE. ODAFF Food Safety Dairy Inspectors will distribute the information.

Rabies in Livestock:

We had three cases of rabies in livestock during this time. One was a horse from Kiowa County, one was a beef calf from Kingfisher County, and the other was a goat kid from Lincoln County. The groups of livestock associated with the infected animals were quarantined, and the owners were educated about the disease and the risk to their herds.

Sheep and Goat Programs:

There were no significant activities in this program during this time.

Swine Programs:

I continue to be part of two working groups composed of swine industry representatives, USDA veterinarians, and State Animal Health Officials to plan a response strategy to African Swine Fever.

AIS continues to participate in a Secure Food Supply working group comprised of other state agents who are monitoring, approving and assisting producers with their secure food supply plan. The group has expanded to include several other states and provides a platform for discussion and training.

On April 19, Dana Call joined the Swine Health Information Center/AASV webinar discussing HPAI (Influenza A Virus) in livestock and the risk to swine. The discussion

focused on controlling wild bird incursion into swine facilities along with other enhanced biosecurity measures to minimize exposure to the virus from other sources.

Miscellaneous:

On April 23 I took our office staff to lunch for Administrative Professionals Day to show my appreciation the great work and the awesome team atmosphere they foster.

On April 30, Dr. Stone accompanied the Payne County Sheriff deputies to an “equine rescue facility” for reevaluation of animal care and conditions. Dr. Stone originally visited the facility on March 22 to assist Payne County officials in evaluating the condition of the horses. The local veterinarian and the ‘rescue facility” attorney were also present.

Although a number of changes had been made, some animals were actually worse, the health of these animals was much more fragile, and the owner was not following the local veterinarians’ recommendations. Dr. Stone supports a decision of animal seizure. Charges have been filed of animal abuse.

On April 10 I was on a panel to evaluate a group presentation from the Stillwater FFA to help them adjust and improve their presentation for a competition

On May 4, 10 ODAFF staff (seven AIS, two Market Development, one Administrative Services) met at Wheeler Park in OKC to participate in a walk to raise funds for Parkinson's disease research.

Board Report for April 2024 Activities

Introduction

Wildlife Services (WS) responds to damage complaints caused by wildlife to resources or property throughout Oklahoma. WS Specialists conduct operational damage management programs for many of the complaints they receive to resolve these wildlife damage problems. During this period, these projects were conducted on 596 properties with an estimated 1,205,128 acres of land under agreement. Additionally, WS helped 2,206 persons and entities with technical assistance which involved providing information to cooperators so they can resolve problems themselves. Cooperators reported and WS Specialists verified wildlife damage of \$20,484,814 during this period. Beaver damages accounted for losses totaling \$183,861. Predation, primarily coyotes and black vultures, were responsible for a number of damage requests, largely to livestock, with losses totaling \$43,516. Feral swine damages accounted for losses totaling \$20,256,555, while other species of wildlife were responsible for \$882 in damages to property, agriculture, and livestock.




Figure 1: Species Removed in West District by percentage during April 2024




Figure 2: Species Removed in the East District by percentage during April 2024




Figure 4: Species Removed in the Central District by percentage during April 2024




Figure 5: Species Removed in the State by percentage during April 2024

Predator Damage Management

Blaine County landowner requested assistance with coyotes depredating on his calves. The producer reported that coyotes had killed four calves valued \$3,526. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Blaine County examined one of the carcasses and verified that coyotes were responsible for the loss of the calf. Damage management efforts were successful in removing five coyotes from the property. Control efforts continue currently to help further reduce the threat to the cooperators' calves.

Beckham County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes depredating on calves. The producer reported that coyotes had killed two calves valued at \$1,763. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Beckham County examined one carcass and verified that coyotes were responsible for the loss valued at \$881. Damage management efforts were successful in removing nine coyotes from the property. No further losses have occurred, and work is ongoing currently to prevent additional losses.

Stephens County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes depredating on his calves. The producer reported that coyotes killed one calf valued at \$900. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Stephens County responded to the request and examined the carcass and confirmed coyotes were responsible for the loss of the calf. Control efforts have removed six coyotes and are continuing currently to further reduce predation losses to coyotes for the producer.

Wagoner County property owner called for assistance with black vultures roosting near a residential area and would often land on the property owners' home and vehicles. The droppings were an issue of concern for the retired property owner. He had also witnessed the vultures trying to pull the rubber sealing strips from his metal roof and he was concerned about damage they would eventually cause to his property. After getting signed agreements from several property owners in the area, vulture effigies were placed to assist in moving the vultures out of the area. The roost area was harassed each evening for 2 weeks. This project concluded when the black vultures had vacated the roost and were no longer in the neighborhood.

Love County landowner contacted WS with reports of black vultures killing calves. WS Specialist met with the landowner and verified black vultures had killed a calf and a WS Specialist built a black vulture trap and started trapping. There have been thirty-eight black vultures caught to date. Estimated damage was \$600 for the loss of calf.

Feral Swine Damage Management

Greer County landowner contacted WS needing assistance with feral swine rooting in his pastures. The landowner estimated feral swine rooted up thirty acres valued at \$5,000 in damages. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Greer County responded to the request and verified the damage. A live trap was used to remove twenty-three feral swine from the property. No additional damage has occurred, and the population in the area is being monitored to determine if additional management is needed.

Caddo County landowner contacted WS needing assistance with feral swine damaging his hayfields. The landowner estimated feral swine damage the fields to be \$10,500. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Caddo County responded to the request and verified the damage. A live trap was used to remove thirty-two feral swine from the property. No additional damage has occurred, and the population in the area is being monitored to determine if additional management is needed.

Roger Mills County farmer requested assistance with feral swine causing damage in his pastures. The farmer reported feral swine were responsible for \$2,000 in damages to his pastures. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Roger Mills County responded to the request and his field inspection verified the damages to the pastures. The Specialist utilized a live trap to remove twenty-seven feral swine from the property. The area continues to be monitored for activity to determine if additional management efforts are needed to further reduce damage.

Osage County rancher called WS for assistance with feral swine when he saw a sounder of feral swine in his cattle pastures and reported significant rooting damage to his pastures. The damage was verified and estimated at \$5,500 to approximately 6 acres of bottomland. After pre-baiting, a remote camera trap was placed, and forty-six feral swine have been removed with this project still being monitored.

Muskogee County farmer called WS for assistance with feral swine when he found rooting damage on his property near his corn field. The damage was verified and estimated at \$2,500. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed on the property. Thirteen feral swine have been removed and this project is still being monitored. The owner was advised of fencing options that could help to deter future feral swine issues.

Haskell County rancher called WS for assistance when he saw feral swine on the property. The feral swine sign was verified and rooting damage to the pastures was estimated at \$2,000. After pre-baiting, a remote camera trap was placed, and twenty-four feral swine have been removed. This project is still being monitored and the owner was informed of environmental changes that could help to deter future feral swine issues on his property.

Lincoln County landowner contacted WS with concerns regarding feral swine damage. The landowner reported seeing feral swine on trail cameras and seeing signs of damage in a pasture. A WS Specialist responded to the report and verified the damage estimated to be one acre of pasture worth \$500. A WS Specialist utilized trapping to remove twenty-one feral swine from the property with trapping efforts continuing currently.

Johnston County landowner contacted WS about feral swine rooting in his wheat fields. WS responded to the call and determined the damage to be caused by feral swine with damages estimated at \$2000. A feral swine coral trap was placed on the property and thirty-one feral swine have been removed from the property.

Aerial Operations

Aerial operations were conducted in **Tillman County** on roughly 8,000 acres in response to request with feral swine damaging pastures and corn fields. The helicopter was utilized for 6 hours with the removal of two hundred and forty-seven feral swine. Additional flight operations are planned in this area to further reduce populations and damage associated with feral swine.

Aerial operations were conducted in **Dewey County** in response to several farmers requesting feral swine damage on wheat fields, milo fields, pastures. Damage in the area flown was estimated at \$25,000. To reduce damage in this area the helicopter was utilized for 6 flying hours to remove two hundred and seventeen feral swine. This area will be closely monitored to determine if additional aerial operations are needed.

Aerial operations were conducted in **Harmon County** on roughly 10,000 acres in response to request with feral swine damaging pastures, milo, and corn fields. The helicopter was utilized for 4 hours with the removal of sixty-seven feral swine. Additional flight operations are planned in this area to further reduce populations and damage associated with feral swine.

Nowata County producer called WS for assistance with feral swine when he discovered rooting damage to his fields. The damage was verified and estimated at ten acres of rooting damage to his farm fields valued at \$4,000. The WS aerial program was utilized to remove twenty-seven feral swine from this property. The owner was advised of barrier fencing options that could assist with future feral swine issues.

Craig County cattle rancher called WS for assistance with coyotes reporting the loss of five newborn calves to coyote predation valued at \$6,000. The damage and the coyote predation activity were verified and the WS aerial program was utilized to remove eighteen coyotes from the rancher's calving pastures and conclude this project. The owner was provided information about livestock protection dogs and barrier fencing options that could assist with future coyote predation.

Beaver Damage Management

Roger Mills County Road Commissioner contacted WS for assistance with beaver that were responsible for damming up a road culvert and causing damage to the road structure. The Commissioner estimated the damage to the road to be valued at \$2,000. The Specialist for Roger Mills County responded and verified the damage. Control measures used by the Specialist were successful in removing the beavers from the creek to help reduce any additional damage to pasture.

Washita County Road Commissioner contacted WS for assistance with beaver that were responsible for damming up the creek on one of his bridges causing the water to go over the road. The Commissioner estimated the damage to the road and bridge structure to be \$3,500. The Specialist for Washita County responded and verified beaver were responsible for damage. Control measures used by the Specialist were successful in removing the beavers from the creek to help reduce any additional damage to road and bridge.

Caddo County Conservation District contacted WS for assistance with beaver causing damage on one of their flood-control structures. The Specialist for Caddo County responded and verified beaver were responsible for \$4,000 in damages from burrowing into the dam structure. The Specialist used conibear traps and spotlighting to remove eleven beavers from the flood control lake. Control efforts are completed.

Custer County landowner contacted WS for assistance with beaver that were responsible for burrowing into his pond dam on his property. The landowner estimated the damage to the dam to be valued at \$6,500. The Specialist for Custer County responded and verified beaver were responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing five beavers from the pond to help reduce any additional damage to the pond dam structure.

Hughes County property owner called WS for assistance with beavers when he found girdling damage to the trees on his property. The reported damage was verified and estimated at \$2,000. Conibear traps were placed, and four beavers have been removed with this project still being monitored.

McCurtain County property owner called WS for assistance with beavers when he noticed a flooding issue on his property. The beaver damage was verified and estimated at \$2,500. The dam causing the flooding was removed by the WS specialist to alleviate the flooding issues. Conibear traps were placed, and nine beavers have been removed with this project still being monitored.

Craig County rancher called WS for assistance with beavers when he noticed several holes that had been burrowed into the dam of his stock pond, a flooded drainage ditch, and several girdled trees in the area. The damage was verified and estimated at \$5,500. Conibear traps were placed, and two beavers have been removed with this project still being monitored. The owner was advised on environmental changes that could assist in deterring future beaver issues.

Oklahoma County Commissioner’s office called WS with a concern of beavers plugging a set of tin horns in the NE part of the county. The county personnel had already removed the plug from the tin horns prior to notifying WS. WS found another dam up stream that had not been removed. After removing a portion of the dam for water flow, WS returned for a night shoot which resulted in removal of two beavers. No further damage has observed, and monitoring will continue for any further beaver activity.

Kingfisher County called WS with reports of beavers damming up a tin horn on a county road. A WS Specialist met with them and verified it was beavers damming up the tin horn. Devices were set on the adjoining property with seven beavers being removed. The tin horn has been unplugged and water is no longer flooding county road. Estimated damages were around \$3500 for road repairs.

Agricultural Statistics Division**

General

Rainfall totals the **first week of April** in Oklahoma averaged 0.57 inches. According to the April 2nd US Drought Monitor Report, drought conditions were rated 38 percent abnormally dry to exceptional drought, down 22 points from last year. Additionally, 9 percent of the state was in the moderate drought to exceptional drought categories, down 45 points from the previous year. Statewide, temperatures averaged in the mid 50's. to lower 60's. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated adequate to short.

Rainfall totals the **second week of April** in Oklahoma averaged 0.73 inches. According to the April 9th US Drought Monitor Report, drought conditions were rated 50 percent abnormally dry to exceptional drought, down 10 points from last year. Additionally, 15 percent of the state was in the moderate drought to exceptional drought categories, down 39 points from the previous year. Statewide, temperatures averaged in the upper 50's to lower 60's. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated adequate to short.

Warm temperatures were experienced early in the **third week of April**, with cooler temperatures returning late in the week. Rainfall totals in Oklahoma averaged 0.22 inches. According to the April 16th US Drought Monitor Report, drought conditions were rated 59 percent abnormally dry to exceptional drought, down 5 points from last year. Additionally, 27 percent of the state was in the moderate drought to exceptional drought categories, down 27 points from the previous year. Statewide, temperatures averaged in the low to mid 60's. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated adequate to short.

Rainfall totals the **fourth week of April** in Oklahoma averaged 2.09 inches. According to the April 23rd US Drought Monitor Report, drought conditions were rated 66 percent abnormally dry to exceptional drought, up 1 point from last year. Additionally, 36 percent of the state was in the moderate drought to exceptional drought categories, down 18 points from the previous year. Statewide, temperatures averaged in the lower to upper 60's. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated adequate to short.

Small Grains: In the North Central, Northeast, West Central and Central Districts recent rainfalls helped improve winter wheat crop progress. Winter wheat jointing reached 97 percent, up 7 points from the previous year. Winter wheat headed reached 45 percent, up 5 points from the previous year and up 4 points from normal. Canola blooming reached 61 percent, up 8 points from the previous year but down 8 points from normal. Canola coloring reached 5 percent. Rye jointing reached 91 percent, up 8 points from the previous year and up 4 points from normal. Rye headed reached 35 percent, down 16 points from the previous year. Oats jointing reached 57 percent, down 4 points from the previous year but up 5 points from normal.

Pasture and Livestock: Pasture and range condition was rated at 73 percent good to fair. Livestock condition was rated at 87 percent good to fair.



POULTRY & EGG GRADING, PRODUCE AND ORGANIC SECTION

POULTRY AND EGG SECTION

In Broken Bow at Tyson Foods, USDA poultry grading was performed by ODAFF inspectors on 562,207 pounds of poultry – boneless/skinless leg meat & bone in/skin on parts and ground meat. ODAFF inspectors provided USDA shell egg grading on 48,520 dozen eggs at Cal-Maine Foods Inc. at Sulphur. ODAFF inspectors provided USDA poultry grading services on poultry products being shipped from National Steak & Poultry Quality Meats in Owasso. ODAFF inspectors also provided USDA poultry grading services on poultry products being shipped from OK Foods in Muldrow. Routine egg quality inspections under the Oklahoma egg law were conducted.

ORGANIC FOODS SECTION

Organic inspectors completed compliance and certification inspections at:

- Seven organic crop producers
- One organic livestock producer
- Four organic processors
- Sixteen retail organic inspections

DAIRY SECTION

Dairy staff conducted routine inspections at dairy farms, dairy plants, performed equipment checks and collected farm and plant dairy samples throughout the state.

Additionally, Dairy Services conducted dairy farm surveys for DFA Central Council 5 (BTU 40-005) in Central Oklahoma, Select 64 (BTU 40-064) in Frederick, and a Plant Survey for Hiland Dairy (PMO 40-024) in Chandler. These surveys received passing scores and information regarding these surveys is available on FDA's Interstate Milk Shippers List website.

Dairy Staff approved a brand-new, state-of-the-art, 90-stall Rotary Milking Parlor and Dairy Barn at the Vanderlaan Dairy in Frederick. This is the only rotary milking parlor in the state!

Dairy services received an AFDO grant payment in the amount of \$5,059.41 in April to reimburse expenses related to new laboratory and field-testing equipment for the dairy program.

Dairy Staff attended the Western Milk Seminar held in Golden Colorado in April. This was an educational seminar where dairy regulators and industry leaders come together and discuss current events, regulatory changes, and challenges in the dairy industry. Trending recalls related to sanitizer in milk and Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in dairy herds were highlighted topics at this conference.

Under the direction of the State Veterinarian, Dairy staff has implemented additional bio-security protocols when visiting dairy farms throughout the state. This information is being shared with our producers and they are encouraged to contact the State Veterinarian if their herd show symptoms related to HPAI. It should be noted that milk from sick cows is routinely separated and discarded. Also, pasteurization deactivates viruses and pathogens. Milk from affected herds does not pose a health risk to the public if it has been pasteurized. Consuming pasteurized dairy products is always recommended.

AG STATISTICS

Printing of Oklahoma Agricultural Statistics annual bulletins, and Oklahoma Pocket Facts for FY 2025 - \$12,000 dollars.

ANIMAL INDUSTRY

Oklahoma Veterinary Medical Association (OVMA) - \$25,000.00 – OVMA is the only entity in the State of Oklahoma that has the ability and contracts statewide to enhance pet sterilization effort is the OVMA. No other entity has access to veterinarians and humane organizations on a statewide basis.

USAHerds - \$29,000.00 – USAHerds maintenance contract allows us to receive yearly enhancements that make the USAHerds program more efficient, user friendly and to offer maintenance hours that we use to correct errors and problems and to personalize the program for us.

Acclaim Systems, Inc. - \$12,000.00 - This agreement provides use access for the State of Oklahoma to utilize the VET-CVI application for the duration of time listed in this maintenance agreement. Oklahoma must follow the intended use for this application and only approve accredited veterinarians within their state that meet the USDA requirements.

Datamars - \$20,000.00 – Purchase 15-XRS2I EID Stick Readers to distribute to Veterinarians across Oklahoma for traceability purposes.

CONSUMER PROTECTION SERVICES

FY 2024 Oklahoma State University Soil Fertility Research --\$70,000.00

This is in addition to the original request of \$450,000.00 due to fertilizer tonnage revenue exceeding 1 million dollars for FY2024. Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 8-77.7 (A), ODAFF is required to collect an inspection fee of \$1.00 per ton of which \$0.50 per ton shall be forwarded directly to a special Soil Fertility Research Account in the Department of Plant and Soil Sciences of the Division of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at Oklahoma State University (OSU) for the purpose of conducting soil fertility research and extension involving efficient fertilizer use for agronomic crops and forages and groundwater and surface water protection from plant food nutrients. Though tonnage amounts vary each year due to when a crop is planted, commodity prices, fertilizer prices and the weather we use the upper range of inspection fees paid annually to determine the amount of \$450,000.00 that could potentially be paid out to OSU. However, the actual amount paid to OSU will be based on the amount of inspection fees paid to ODAFF.

This is a statutory requirement of the Oklahoma Fertilizer Act and needs to be done to further research to prevent the pollution of lands and waters of Oklahoma from fertilizers.

FY2024 Licensing Programmer --\$19,200.00

ODAFF is currently updating the agencies licensing programs and needs additional programmers to bring all licensing, tonnage, and registration online in a timely fashion. The additional staffing should allow program and provide more access to Oklahomans. It also will allow us to do a better job of collecting and reporting required data on our programs.

Without this update in programming the current dated system will struggle with support and eventually will fail. The longer the update takes the more problems we are likely to have with the current program.

FY2025 Licensing Programmer --\$250,000.00

ODAFF is currently updating the agencies licensing programs and needs additional programmers to bring all licensing, tonnage, and registration online in a timely fashion. The additional staffing should allow program and provide more access to Oklahomans. It also will allow us to do a better job of collecting and reporting required data on our programs.

Without this update in programming the current dated system will struggle with support and eventually will fail. The longer the update takes the more problems we are likely to have with the current program.

FOOD SAFETY

Oklahoma State University Produce Safety Training Contract Approval – \$65,153.00

Outreach and education activities including teaching Produce Safety Alliance classes across the state, developing educational materials and videos, assisting farms with the On-Farm Readiness Review, measuring the effectiveness of these trainings to determine what topics need further training, and assisting ODAFF in identifying and outreach to farms that may need to comply with the law.

The Produce Safety Alliance class is the only class currently recognized by the FDA to satisfy the produce farm manager training portion of the produce safety rule. To teach this class, a team of certified trainers and a certified lead trainer is required, and OSU has several personnel certified to teach this class including the only lead trainer in the state. OSU currently assists us with teaching farms through the On-Farm Readiness Review. This program will provide an educational tool that can be taken to the individual farms and help them identify what areas they need to improve on to comply with the new law.

Win Wam computer software upkeep for produce safety inspections \$5,724.00.

This computer program is used for completing FDA produce safety compliance inspections. This would be for updates and for software update fees. This would be paid for by the FDA Produce Grant.

USDA/Food Safety & Inspection Services – \$30,000.00

Contract for USDA/FAIM to perform duties when Food Safety Meat Inspection have issues with their federal computers and to replace computers and printers with new ones when issues arise. Also, ordering new computers for new inspection. All funds are reimbursed 50% with Cooperative Agreement with USDA/FSIS.

Contract employee for Dairy Services – \$40,000.00

Perform various duties at dairy plant in Oklahoma, collect milk and milk products for sampling. Conduct Oklahoma Dairy plant and farm state surveys for sanitation compliance and enforcement. If this position is not filled, then a contractor from out-of-state would have to be brought in and paid to do this job for the facilities to remain in compliance.

FORESTRY SERVICES

FY24 - \$60,000 Gooseneck Trailer (SFA Grant)

Purchase one (1) heavy duty, tandem axle trailer with ramps. This trailer will be used to transport a skid steer with attachments for the purpose of treating hazardous fuels in and around communities at-risk from wildfire statewide. **Justification:** This program is part of the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy with the intent of developing fire adapted communities. Funding for this purchase will come from FY23 US Forest Service State Forest Action Plan funding.

FY24: Winter PPE - \$33,000 (SFA Response, SICF)

Purchase eighty-nine (89) fire-resistant fleece jackets with reinforced Nomex patches. These jackets are classified as cold weather Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and will be worn by Firefighters and Foresters while suppressing wildfires and conducting prescribed burns. **Justification:** This is a critical safety item due to the extreme fireline conditions division personnel are exposed to during winter months. Funding for this purchase will be 100% reimbursed from the FY22 US Forest Service State Fire Assistance Grant.

FY25- \$250,000 Federal Funds

Award Federal pass-through funding to assist financially-disadvantaged cities, neighborhoods, and communities for heat mitigation, promotion of food forests, increase equitable access to urban/community tree canopy and promoting other value and benefits of trees in communities – Up to \$250,000. **Justification:** These grants support projects related to helping lower income neighborhoods and non-profit entities. Without these projects, we would lose an avenue of community support and education. This money will be refunded to us through Federal funding.

FY25- \$12,000 Land Lease

Commercial Land Lease for the SE Area Headquarters Office at Broken Bow & Land Lease for the SE Office Complex. **Justification:** This is the space where Forestry Services' office complex is located.

FY25- \$166,600 SE Area Equipment Repair Costs

Equipment repair for mowers, ATV's, UTV's dozers, and trailers, tractors, chain saws, blowers, and building maintenance/repair at all SE area facilities. **Justification:** Above is a necessary expenditure so we can keep our firefighting equipment/machinery fire ready. Without these funds, our Forest Rangers would not be able to respond to wildfires when their equipment needs repaired. This money will also go towards the upkeep of our lawnmowers and trailers.

FY25- \$34,000 SE Area Utility Costs

Electric, phone/internet, utilities (natural gas, water, trash service, sewer, propane, etc..) for the

following offices: SE Area office; SE Area complex; Antler's complex; Carter Tower complex; Sobol Tower repeater; Tom Tower repeater. **Justification:** Above is a necessary expenditure to operate the offices and communications infrastructure. The operation of these offices and radio repeaters is crucial to maintain emergency response radio communication, as well as serve as a location for Forest Rangers to maintain equipment so they can perform their assigned duties.

FY25- \$5,000 Office Furniture

Purchase of 10 new office chairs at the SE area complex. **Justification:** These chairs will be replacing worn out chairs that we have had for many years. This will allow our employees to be able to accommodate meetings in more comfort.

FY25- \$12,000 Sewer Repair, SE Area

Replace existing sewer system at the Fire Control Officer Residence. **Justification:** Without a new sewer line, the office will not have a way to dispose of sewage.

**FY 25 – Forest Inventory and Analysis all-terrain vehicle (ATV) \$17,363.50
(State Matching Cost Share – FIA Grant)**

Purchase of an all-terrain vehicle equipped with 4-wheel drive, skid plates, winch, safety features, etc. for off-road access to remote forest research plots. **Justification:** The ATV will be used in remote forest health monitoring, wildfire risk assessment, and timber inventory purposes and will multiply the efforts of foresters as they visit some of the state's most wild and distant forests. Funding for this purchase matches a cost-share in salary/supplies from the US Forest Service – FY24 FIA Grant.

FY25- \$12,000 National Association of State Forester Membership Dues

National Association of State Foresters is organization composed of the directors of forestry agencies in the states, territories, and the District of Columbia. Oklahoma has been a member of this organization for decades. This grant provides Oklahoma Forestry Services with the current policies and procedures regarding fire protection and forest management. (Federal Funds)

Justification: Without this purchase we would lose our connections to other States and plans that emphasize forestry needs.

FY25 - \$1,100,000 Rural Fire Coordinator Contracts

Contract with Oklahoma Association of Regional Councils for Rural Fire Coordinators to provide technical assistance and equipment placement services to new or established Rural Fire Departments within their districts to assure the capability of meeting local fire protection needs.

Justification: Without this contract fire departments would lose technical support to acquire much needed funding, equipment, and operational assistance.

FY25-\$2,000,000 Fire Department 80/20 Grant Program

Rural Fire 80/20 Reimbursement Pass-through Grants awarded to certified rural fire departments serving communities under 10,000 in population. Funding limits per application are \$30,000 of state appropriated funds for construction and \$20,000 for fire equipment. **Justification:** Fire departments awarded these grants can fulfill a critical public safety function by purchasing firefighting equipment and/or build, remodel, or expand fire stations.

FY 25 - \$8,414,550.00 Fire Department Operational Grants

These dollars are divided equally among the certified fire departments (Rural Fire Defense) for Operational Assistance Grants. Fire Departments receiving the Operational Grant can only use the funds for items authorized in Oklahoma State Statutes, Title 19, Chapter 21, and Section 901.56. **Justification:** Fire departments awarded these grants can fulfill a critical public safety function by purchasing firefighting equipment, purchase Worker Compensation Insurance, Vehicle Insurance, etc. as outlined in the above-mentioned statute.

FY 25 - \$60,000 Geographical Information System Software Licensing

Purchase ESRI ArcGIS Online Licenses (Federal Grant) – **Justification:** This allows the OFS Incident Management Team and fire personnel to utilize ArcGIS On-Line (AGOL) which gives our firefighters real-time wildland fire data exchange. Data collected from the AGOL Field Maps application gives firefighters a tactical advantage while fighting fires and increases overall firefighter and public safety.

FY25 - \$24,750 EC Area Utility Costs

Electric, phone/internet, utilities (natural gas, water, trash service, sewer, propane, etc..) for the following offices: East Central Area offices in Wilburton and Talihina. **Justification** Above is a necessary expenditure to operate the offices and communications infrastructure. The operation of these offices and radio repeaters is crucial to maintain emergency response radio communication, as well as serve as a location for Forest Rangers to maintain equipment so they can perform their assigned duties.

FY25 - \$110,000 EC Area Equipment / Building Repair Costs

Equipment repair for mowers, ATV's, UTV's, dozers, and trailers, tractors, chain saws, blowers, and building maintenance/repair at all East Central Area facilities including but not limited to gravel, HVAC system, roof repairs, & etc. **Justification:** Above is a necessary expenditure so we can keep our firefighting equipment/machinery fire ready. Without these funds, our Forest Rangers would not be able to respond to wildfires when their equipment needs repaired. This money will also go towards the upkeep of our lawnmowers and trailers.

LABORATORY SERVICES

FY24 - \$35,000.00 – Service Contract

Correction to purchase amount

One-year preventative maintenance agreement for the HPLC-MSMS Triple Quad 6470 in the Pesticide Section to ensure continuous and consistent operation of the instrument and improves overall quality of the data being reported.

Justification: Without a maintenance agreement the laboratory would not be able to verify the accuracy of the test results and the equipment could possibly fail rendering it unusable.

FY24 - \$18,000.00 – Service Contract

Additionally, the new updates and improvements will not be completed and our forward progress and goals for the Wine Trails program will not come to fruition.

FY2025 – Urban Agrarian - Healthy Food Finance Grant - \$10,000.00

FY2025 – Osage Nation - Healthy Food Finance Grant - \$9,988.00

FY2025 – OK Roots - Healthy Food Finance Grant - \$7,000.00

FY2025 – Tulsa County Public Facilities Authority – 2024 Tulsa State Fair – Made in Oklahoma booths - \$25,616.00

Justification: ODAFF contracts with the Tulsa County Public Facilities Authority for the purpose

of providing a Made in Oklahoma Exhibit in the Exchange Center during the Tulsa State Fair. ODAFF sublets booth spaces within this exhibit area to MIO companies. The MIO Exhibit at the Tulsa State Fair is a rare opportunity for new MIO companies to introduce their products to an average of over 1 million potential customers. The average number of companies impacted each year is around 40 companies. The event falls within the purpose of the MIO Program which is to assist local agricultural companies in collectively promoting brand awareness and consumer loyalty for Oklahoma products through cooperative marketing activities. If this proposed expense is not approved, there will not be a labeled MIO exhibit at the Tulsa State Fair. The economic impact to the MIO companies intending to participate in this Exhibit will potentially lose thousands of dollars in sales during the 11-day event held each year.

WILDLIFE SERVICES

\$ 20,000.00 - ODAFF Wildlife Services is requesting approval for the City of Norman Cooperative Agreement regarding the control of wildlife for the City.

\$106,500.00 - ODAFF Wildlife Services is requesting approval for fuel and hangar rent for the five (5) Federal helicopters for FY24 that is used in the state's aerial control of wildlife. The breakdown is as follows:

- \$55,000 for Fuel
- \$37,545 Hangar Rent

\$769,000.00 - ODAFF Wildlife Services is requesting approval for the cooperative agreement with USDA APHIS Wildlife Services which will provide damage management activities to farmers and ranchers in Oklahoma. Activities are related to damages incurred from feral swine, beavers, coyotes and avian predators. Not approving this agreement would mean significant financial loss to Oklahoma Agriculture due to wildlife damage.

\$44,500 - ODAFF Wildlife Services is requesting approval to purchase 2023 Ford F150 Crew Cab 4x4 truck. This is a replacement of a fleet vehicle that has high mileage, is experiencing transmission issues and will be used for Payne and Pawnee counties. Not approving will result in excessive vehicle repairs and high mileage.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW



1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel (“OGC”) of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on 11th day of July 2024, in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

3. **Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.**

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) 14. Respondent has substantial business operations and assets within the State of Oklahoma.

15. Based upon current information and belief, at all relevant times hereto, Respondent has, among other things, engaged in the business of commercial pesticide applications.

16. Pursuant to Okla. Sta. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

18. On March 11, 2024, the Consumer Protective Services Division of the Department conducted a use inspection.

19. During this investigation, our inspector found that your company license had expired on December 31, 2021.

20. Our inspector observed your application vehicle parked at your business location; your application vehicle displayed your company name but did not have your license number on it.

21. Our inspector spoke with you over the phone about your expired license, and you informed him that you were unaware that your license was expired.

22. Making commercial pesticide applications without a license and having an improperly marked application vehicle are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules,

specifically 2 O.S. §3-82(A), 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15), 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(16), and O.A.C. 35:30-17-15.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

23. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. §3-82(A), 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15), 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(16), O.A.C. 35:30-17-15 which are listed below.

- 2 O.S. §3-82(A): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person to act, operate, or do business or advertise as a commercial, noncommercial, certified applicator, temporary certified applicator, service technician, or private applicator unless the person has obtained a valid applicator's license issued by the State Board of Agriculture for the category of pesticide application in which the person is engaged, unless the person is applying to their own property.”
- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (15) Any person to act, operate, do business, or advertise as an applicator unless the person has obtained a valid license issued by the Board for the category in which the person is engaged.”

- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(16): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (16) Any persons to be employed or represent themselves as certified applicators or service technicians unless they have met the certification standards prescribed by the Board and obtained valid certificates or identifications issued by the Board for the categories for which the persons are to be employed or supervised.”
- O.A.C. 35:30-17-15: “All vehicles, including nurse tanks and self-propelled ground applicators, used by a commercial applicator during the conduct of business shall be identified by displaying the name and license number of the licensee. The display shall be on both sides of the vehicle in letters not less than two (2) inches in height.”

24. The Department is seeking an administrative penalty in the amount of **Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00)**.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

18. On November 8, 2023, an applicator facility and use inspections were performed by the Consumer Protection Services Division of the Department in Bessie, OK.

19. During this inspection, our inspector viewed your fumigation records. One record showed that on July 16, 2023, your employee Sean Wanzer fumigated a grain bin using Hydrogen Phosphide. The certified applicator (CA) number listed on the records for Mr. Wanzer was 30684. The name associated with this CA number did not match Mr. Wanzer.

20. Upon further investigation our inspector found that Mr. Wanzer is not a certified applicator, and your location is only licensed in the agriculture plant category.

21. The ingredient Hydrogen Phosphide is a restricted use pesticide in which the product label and ODAFF require that the person applying it be a certified applicator or be under the direct supervision of a certified applicator.

22. Applying a pesticide in a manner inconsistent with the product label, applying a restricted use product without license and certification, and providing a false applicator identification number are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Laws & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(4), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(9), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(13), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15) and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(16).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

23. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(4), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(9), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(13), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15) and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(16) which are all stated below:

- 2 O.S. §3-82(A)(1): “A. LICENSE REQUIRED - 1. 23. A sample of the tank mix determined that there was Glyphosate, Pendimethalin, and Metsulfuron were detected.

24. Again, this is a stop-work order until you are licensed to make commercial applications.

25. Operating commercially without a license and certification is a violation of Oklahoma Statutes.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

26. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. §3-82(A), 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15), and 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(16) which are stated below:

8. Respondent may choose to proceed to a full evidentiary hearing on the merits, at which Respondent will be given the opportunity to cross-examine the Complainant's witnesses, present Respondent's witnesses, and present relevant evidence on Respondent's behalf.
9. **The hearing date will be determined at the Prehearing Conference.**
10. The hearing will be conducted in accordance with the Oklahoma Administrative Procedures Act and the Department's Rules of Practice and Procedure, which may be found in the OAC at Title 35.
11. Respondent has the right to be represented by counsel in this matter.

DEFAULT

Any Respondent who fails to appear after receipt of notice may be determined to have waived the right to appear and present a defense and a default may be presented by the Department to the Board at a regularly scheduled meeting proposing the relief requested by the Notice of Violation, or other relief if justice so requires.

JURISDICTION, VENUE, AND APPLICABLE LAW

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

18. On May 25, 2023, a complaint investigation was performed by ODAFF at Okemah Public School.

19. During this investigation, our inspector met with the school administration who informed ODAFF that your company was hired for pest control and performed a termite treatment to the school gymnasium.

20. The school provided our inspector with copies of invoices for the termite job dated February 23, 2023. One of the invoices was in your company's name and the other invoice was in your employee Carl Fletcher's name.

21. At the time of this treatment Mr. Fletcher was a certified applicator in the structural pest category, but he was listed as a service technician for your company.

22. Your company's business license expired in February of 2023, and our records show that you renewed your 2023 license on June 2, 2023.

23. As of today, our records show that you are not licensed in the structural pest category.

24. Performing commercial pesticide applications without a business license and a category license are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(9), and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

25. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(9), and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15) which are all stated below:

- 2 O.S. §3-82(A)(1): "A. LICENSE REQUIRED - 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to act, operate, or do business or advertise as a commercial, noncommercial, certified applicator, temporary certified applicator, service technician, or private applicator unless the person has obtained a valid applicator's license issued by the State Board of Agriculture for the category of pesticide application in which the person is engaged."
- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(9): "A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard

has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (9) Advertising or offering to perform in a category of pesticide application for which no license is held or under a name for which no license is held.”

- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (15) Any person to act, operate, do business, or advertise as an applicator unless the person has obtained a valid license issued by the Board for the category in which the person is engaged.”

20. OrkinTherm Insulation is a registered pesticide product.

21. The inspection report provided by the owner of the property has a personal recommendation from Mr. Hicks to perform the insulation remediation.

22. ODAFF sent your office a request for the inspection report, and you supplied our office with a copy of the report. The report you provided our office did not match the report the owner provided because the recommendation from Mr. Hicks was removed on the report you provided.

23. Additionally, performing inspections to determine a planned approach for a customer's pest control is considered conducting business and can only be performed by a service technician or certified applicator. ODAFF's records show that Daniel Hicks has never been a service technician nor certified applicator.

24. Performing pest inspections and making treatment recommendations without certification or direct supervision and providing altered records to ODAFF are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1) and 2 O.S. § 3-83(A).

Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on 9th day of May 2024 in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

3. **Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.**

16. Pursuant to Okla. Sta. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

18. On or about the 11th day of August 2023, the Consumer Protection Services Division of the Department conducted an applicator facility and use inspection in Oklahoma City, OK.

19. During this inspection, our inspector met with branch manager Floyd Wages and reviewed application records for your employee Nicholas Franco.

20. An application record dated August 1, 2023, shows that Mr. Franco made a general pest application at 3131 N. Pennsylvania Ave. in Oklahoma City, OK.

21. Mr. Franco is not a certified applicator or service technician.

22. Mr. Wages informed our inspector that Edward Blake supervises the new employees. Mr. Blake is a service technician and cannot supervise the application of a non-service technician.

23. ODAFF records show that Nicholas Franco is currently not a certified applicator or service technician.

24. Making commercial pesticide applications without certification or without being under the direct supervision of a certified applicator is a violation of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(16) and O.A.C. 35:30-17-25(B).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

25. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(16) and O.A.C. 35:30-17-25(B) which are all stated below:

- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(16): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (16) Any persons to be employed or represent themselves as certified applicators or service technicians unless they have met the certification standards prescribed by the Board and obtained valid certificates or identifications issued by the Board for the categories for which the persons are to be employed or supervised.”
- 35:30-17-25(B): “(b) A certified applicator shall be on site to supervise any pesticide application by a non-service technician.”

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

26. The Department is seeking an administrative penalty in the amount of **Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00)**.





The identification of witnesses and substance of testimony, exhibits, and documents; f.) The use of prehearing briefs and pre-filed testimony in the form of sworn affidavits; g.) Settlement of all or some of the issues prior to the hearing; h.) Adoption of special procedures for managing difficult or protracted actions that may involve complex issues, multiple parties, novel or difficult legal questions, or evidence problems; i.) Scheduling; and j.) Any other matters as may aid in disposition of the case.

4. The Prehearing Conference may be held by telephone; arrangements to do so should be made at least one full week in advance of the Prehearing Conference.
5. Upon request of either party, Prehearing Conferences shall be on the record.
6. A Prehearing Conference may result in a scheduling or other prehearing order and subsequent changes to any prehearing or scheduling order may be made by the ALJ by modifying the order for good cause.
7. Please note that failure to appear at the Prehearing Conference may result in a default judgment being entered against you.

HEARING AND RIGHT TO COUNSEL

8. Respondent may choose to proceed to a full evidentiary hearing on the merits, at which Respondent will be given the opportunity to cross-examine the Complainant's witnesses, present Respondent's witnesses, and present relevant evidence on Respondent's behalf.

14. Respondent has substantial business operations and assets within the State of Oklahoma.

15. Based upon current information and belief, at all relevant times hereto, Respondent has, among other things, engaged in the business of commercial pesticide applications.

16. Pursuant to Okla. Sta. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

18. On February 20, 2024, the Consumer Protective Services Division of the Department conducted a use inspection at Park's Brothers Funeral Home.

19. During this investigation, our inspector met with Park's Brothers Funeral Home's employee Erin Bradley. Ms. Bradley showed our inspector an invoice from your company dated February 15, 2024, for an herbicide application to the funeral home's lawn.

20. ODAFF records show that you are certified in the ornamental and turf category, but your company does not have a license.

21. Making commercial pesticide applications without a license is a violation of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. §3-82(A) and 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

22. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. §3-82(A) and 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15) which are listed below.

- 2 O.S. §3-82(A): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person to act, operate, or do business or advertise as a commercial, noncommercial, certified applicator, temporary certified applicator, service technician, or private applicator unless the person has obtained a valid applicator's license issued by the State Board of Agriculture for the category of pesticide application in which the person is engaged, unless the person is applying to their own property.”
- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (15) Any person to act, operate, do business, or advertise as an applicator unless the person has obtained a valid license issued by the Board for the category in which the person is engaged.”

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

23. The Department is seeking an administrative penalty in the amount of **Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00)**.





17. Under the provisions of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(2), it is unlawful for a store to charge a retail price for any consumer item which exceeds the lowest then price in that store, whether a shelf, sale, advertised, or otherwise publicly communicated price, of the consumer item.

Under the provisions of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J), failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of an inspection shall be a failed inspection subject to penalty. A fourth violation discovered within any twelve-month period will be assessed a penalty of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per consumer item which results in an overcharge or potential overcharge.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

19. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent:

20. On or about November 8, 2022, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Family Dollar in Wayne, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that twenty-one (21) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price.

21. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J). A letter of warning was sent.

22. On or about February 27, 2023, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Family Dollar in Wayne, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that ten (10) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price.

23. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a second violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J). A letter of warning was sent.

24. On or about June 27, 2023, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Family Dollar in Wayne, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that nine (9) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price.

25. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a third violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J). A letter of warning was sent.

26. On or about November 29, 2023, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Family Dollar in Wayne,

Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that ten (10) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price.

27. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a fourth violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J). A letter of warning was sent.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

28. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of the aforementioned inspections is a violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(2) and is subject to the penalty provided in 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).

Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 2-18(A), after notice and opportunity for a hearing in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act, if the State Board of Agriculture finds any person in violation of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code or any rule promulgated or order issued pursuant thereto, unless otherwise specifically provided by statute or rule, the Board shall have the authority to assess an administrative penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for each violation.

34. Each animal, each action, or each day a violation continues may constitute a separate and distinct violation.

ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS

35. Administrative penalties, civil penalties, and other fines imposed by the Board shall be enforced pursuant to the procedure outlined in 2 O.S. § 2-7(B) and the Uniform Enforcement of Foreign Judgments Act, 12 O.S. § 719 *et seq.*

INFORMAL DISPOSITION OF AN INDIVIDUAL PROCEEDING

36. Informal disposition of an Individual Proceeding may be made by Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default.

37. Resolution by Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default shall be approved by the State Board of Agriculture.

38. Proposed Final Administrative Orders shall be prepared and issued in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act and presented to the Board of Agriculture for review and approval.

STIPULATION

39. If Respondent desires to resolve this matter without a hearing or further action, Complainant proposes an administrative penalty of **Twenty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00)**. **(10 violations at \$250.00 per violation)**.

40. If you wish to waive your right to hearing and stipulate to the above alleged findings of fact and conclusions of law, you may pay the full amount of the recommended penalty by check or money order and sign and return the attached Resolution by Stipulation along with your full payment of this penalty prior to the stated hearing date.

Summary of Facts: An investigator conducted a complaint investigation at the Okemah Public School gymnasium. The school provided our inspector with a copy of an invoice for the termite job dated February 23, 2023, from Respondent. Respondent does not have a commercial license to perform termite treatment services.

Statute or Rule Violation: Respondent violated 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(9), and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15) by performing commercial pesticide applications without a license and doing work in a category in which no license.

Proposed Administrative Penalty: The proposed penalty for this case was Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00). Respondent failed to appear at the Pre-hearing and a Proposed Default Order was entered.

Other Actions Required: None.

OGC Attorney: Kiersten Hamill

2. The Notice of Violation (Exhibit 1) was delivered by certified mail on March 22, 2024. *See* certified mail receipt (Exhibit 2).

3. Hearing was set for 9th day of May 2024 at 1:30 p.m. and Respondent did not appear.



1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel (“OGC”) of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at **1:30 p.m. on 9th day of May 2024** in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

3. **Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.**

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

18. On May 25, 2023, a complaint investigation was performed by ODAFF at Okemah Public School.

19. During this investigation, our inspector met with the school administration who informed ODAFF that your company was hired for pest control and performed a termite treatment to the school gymnasium.

20. The school provided our inspector with copies of invoices for the termite job dated February 23, 2023. One of the invoices was in your name and the other invoice was in Jay's Lawn B Green and Pest Control LLC's name.

21. At the time of this treatment, you were a certified applicator in the structural pest category, but you did not have a company license.

22. You were listed as a service technician for Jay's Lawn B Green and Pest Control LLC.

23. As of today, our records show that you are listed as an expired service technician for Jay's Lawn B Green and Pest Control LLC, and your structural pest certified applicators identification is also expired.

24. Performing commercial pesticide applications without a license and doing work in a category in which no license is held are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(9), and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

25. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(9), and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15) which are all stated below:

- 2 O.S. §3-82(A)(1): "A. LICENSE REQUIRED - 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to act, operate, or do business or advertise as a commercial, noncommercial, certified applicator, temporary certified applicator, service technician, or private applicator unless the person has obtained a valid applicator's license issued by the State Board of Agriculture for the category of pesticide application in which the person is engaged."
- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(9): "A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or

refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (9) Advertising or offering to perform in a category of pesticide application for which no license is held or under a name for which no license is held.”

- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (15) Any person to act, operate, do business, or advertise as an applicator unless the person has obtained a valid license issued by the Board for the category in which the person is engaged.”

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

26. The Department is seeking an administrative penalty in the amount of **Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00)**.

Stat. § 2-18(A), after notice and opportunity for a hearing in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act, if the State Board of Agriculture finds any person in violation of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code or any rule promulgated or order issued pursuant thereto, unless otherwise specifically provided by statute or rule, the Board shall have the authority to assess an administrative penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for each violation.

32. Each animal, each action, or each day a violation continues may constitute a separate and distinct violation.



1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel ("OGC") of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at **1:30 p.m. on 9th day of May 2024** in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

3. **Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.**

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) 20. During this inspection, our inspector found that you were hired to perform a termite treatment on this home. The realtor provided our inspector with copies of the treatment invoices. There were two Lusk's Pest Control invoices and one that had Mike's Pest Control's name on it. Every invoice had your signature on them.

21. While checking to see if the termite treatment was properly done our inspector noted that there was no sign of trenching around the home, there were no drill holes in the front porch or

back patio concrete slabs, and the drill holes in the hollow block foundation were improperly spaced.

22. Your treatment did not meet the label or ODAFF's requirements.

23. Performing commercial pesticide applications without a license and certification, falsely using another company's name to perform work, using a pesticide in a manner inconsonant with the product label, and failing to meet the minimum standards for termite treatments to existing structures are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Laws & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(4), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(9), 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(12), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(13), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15) and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(16).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

24. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-82(A)(1), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(4), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(9), 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(12), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(13), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15) and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(16) which are all stated below:

- 2 O.S. §3-82(A)(1): "A. LICENSE REQUIRED - 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to act, operate, or do business or advertise as a commercial, noncommercial, certified applicator, temporary certified applicator, service technician, or private applicator unless the person has obtained a valid applicator's license issued by the State Board of Agriculture for the category of pesticide application in which the person is engaged."
- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(4): "A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. 13. Subject matter jurisdiction and venue are vested in the State Board of Agriculture in its quasi-judicial capacity, pursuant to Okla. Const. Art. VI, Section 31 and 2 O. S. § 2-4(16); accordingly, this is the proper forum to hear this matter.

14. Respondent has substantial business operations and assets within the State of Oklahoma.

15. Based upon current information and belief, at all relevant times hereto, Respondent has, among other things, engaged in the business of commercial pesticide applications, located in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

16. Pursuant to Okla. Sta. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

18. On or about the 1st day of November 2023, the Consumer Protection Services Division of the Department conducted a pretreat inspection at a house located in Tulsa, OK.

19. During this inspection, our inspectors sampled a residential termite pre-treat at 12676 S. Darlington Ave. E. in Tulsa, OK.

20. The two vertical barrier samples had sufficient residue levels.

21. The two horizontal barrier samples are below ODAFF's acceptable Imidacloprid residue threshold level of 5 ppm for horizontal barriers.

22. According to our inspection your treatment did not meet the minimum standards of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Laws & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(2) and O.A.C. 35:30-17-28(C)(7)(A).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

23. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(2) and O.A.C. 35:30-17-28(C)(7)(A) which are all stated below:

- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(2): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (2) A person has negligently used methods or pesticides that are ineffective or improper for the purpose for which they have been employed.”
- 35:30-17-28(C)(7)(A): “(c) Pre-construction termiticide treatments (pre-treats) with sampling performed within 30 days or 180 days of treatment shall disclose residue threshold levels established in the horizontal barriers for termiticides based on values obtained from research conducted at the U.S. Forest Research Center, Gulfport, Mississippi; Kard et al. 1989; Kard 1991, 1992, 1994, The Bayer Company, Agricultural Division, and the Board may establish interim residue levels for termiticide products for which no lowest expected threshold

value exists utilizing input from Oklahoma State University, manufacturers, or industry until a value has been established. (7) Premise: (A) Shall have a residue threshold level within 30 days of treatment of 5 ppm.”

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

24. The Department is seeking an administrative penalty in the amount of **Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00)**.





12. Any Respondent who fails to appear after receipt of notice may be determined to have waived the right to appear and present a defense and a default may be presented by the

Department to the Board at a regularly scheduled meeting proposing the relief requested by the Notice of Violation, or other relief if justice so requires.

JURISDICTION, VENUE, AND APPLICABLE LAW

13. Subject matter jurisdiction and venue are vested in the State Board of Agriculture in its quasi-judicial capacity, pursuant to Okla. Const. Art. VI, Section 31 and 2 O. S. § 2-4(7); accordingly, this is the proper forum to hear this matter.

14. Respondent has substantial business operations and assets within the State of Oklahoma.

15. Based upon current information and belief, at all relevant times hereto, Respondent has, among other things, engaged in the business of selling uninspected, adulterated meat and poultry, located at 406 Winona Blvd. in Lindsay, Oklahoma.

16. Pursuant to 2 O. S. § 2-4, ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who sell meat or poultry products in Oklahoma.

17. 2 O. S. § 6-190 says in part, "No person...shall, with respect to any cattle...sell in intrastate commerce...any such articles which are capable of use as human food, and are adulterated or misbranded at the time of sale...or any articles required to be inspected...unless they have been so inspected and passed..."

18. 2 O. S. § 6-259 says in part, "No person shall...sell...in intrastate commerce any poultry products which are capable of use as human food and are adulterated or misbranded at the time of sale...or any poultry products required to be inspected under this act unless they have been so inspected and passed..."

19. 2 O. S. § 5-4.3(A)(8) says, "Homemade food products shall not contain seafood or meat, meat by-products or meat food products as defined by Section 301.2 of Title 9 of the Code of

Federal Regulations or poultry, poultry products or poultry food products as defined for purposes of the federal Poultry Products Inspection Act.”

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

20. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

21. On or about September 7, 2023, the Food Safety Division of the Department received a complaint from an inspector with the Oklahoma State Department of Health regarding The Forum Group, LLC in Lindsay, Oklahoma selling meat from a residence.

22. On or about September 8, 2023, the Food Safety Division of the Department received an anonymous complaint regarding Skip Mitchell who was at the same address given for The Forum Group.

23. On September 25, 2023, compliance officers with the Food Safety Division went to investigate the received complaints.

24. Upon arrival at the residence, compliance officers knocked on the door of the residence with no response. Compliance officers left business cards on the door requesting a phone call.

25. Upon receiving the business card, Respondent called compliance officer Ron Hall. Mr. Hall informed the Respondent that selling meat that had not been inspected or had been adulterated was in violation of State rules and regulations.

26. On or about November 29, the Food Safety Division of the Department sent Respondent a Letter of Warning.

27. Prior to notification from the Department and after notification from the Department, Respondent made, and continues to make, posts on social media for the sale of meat he has prepared that has not been inspected by the Department and has been adulterated.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

28. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent violated 2 O. S. § 6-190, 2 O. S. § 6-259 and 2 O. S. § 5-4.3 by selling meat and poultry products that have not been inspected or have been adulterated.

ATTORNEY CONFERENCES

30. Additionally, OGC attorneys will be available for consultation on a first-come, first-served basis from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. on the date of the Prehearing Conference.

31. Arrangements to discuss the matter before the Prehearing Conference are encouraged.

ENFORCEMENT PROCEEDINGS

32. Enforcement proceedings may include but are not limited to:

- a.) Administrative fines or penalties;
- b.) Revocation, suspension, or denial for up to one (1) year of any license, permit, or charter issued by ODAFF or the Board;
- c.) Criminal actions, which could involve fines, imprisonment, or both; and
- d.) Civil actions.

33. Pursuant to 2 Okla. Stat. § 2-18(A), after notice and opportunity for a hearing in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act, if the State Board of Agriculture finds any person in violation of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code or any rule promulgated or order issued pursuant thereto, unless otherwise specifically provided by statute or rule, the Board shall have

the authority to assess an administrative penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for each violation.

34. Each animal, each action, or each day a violation continues may constitute a separate and distinct violation.

OKLAHOMA SMALL BUSINESS REGULATORY FLEXIBILITY ACT

35. The Oklahoma Small Business Regulatory Flexibility Act, 75 O.S. Supp. 2002, § 506, may apply to this action; please review the full act to determine if it applies to you.

ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS

36. Administrative penalties, civil penalties, and other fines imposed by the Board shall be enforced pursuant to the procedure outlined in 2 O.S. § 2-7(B) and the Uniform Enforcement of Foreign Judgments Act, 12 O.S. § 719 *et seq.*

INFORMAL DISPOSITION OF AN INDIVIDUAL PROCEEDING

37. Informal disposition of an Individual Proceeding may be made by Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default.

38. Resolution by Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default shall be approved by the State Board of Agriculture.

39. Proposed Final Administrative Orders shall be prepared and issued in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act and presented to the Board of Agriculture for review and approval.

STIPULATION

40. If Respondent desires to resolve this matter without a hearing or further action, Complainant proposes an administrative penalty of **Fourteen Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$14,100.00)**.

41. If you wish to waive your right to hearing and stipulate to the above alleged findings of fact and conclusions of law, you may pay the full amount of the recommended penalty by check or money order and sign and return the attached Resolution by Stipulation along with your full payment of this penalty prior to the stated hearing date.


