PURCHASES/CONTRACTS

Administrative Services

FY24 – OMES Central Printing - \$7,000

FY24- Presort Mail Services - \$7,000

FY24- Backpacks Embroidered with ODAFF Logo - \$8,970.00

Purchasing 345 Port Authority backpacks embroidered with the department logo as Employee Appreciation Day gifts for full-time ODAFF employees. This item has been selected by a department-wide vote by the employees and is a one-time purchase.

FY24- ImageNet Consulting – \$13,000

Annual Laserfiche software maintenance (LSAP) renewal for the agency document scanning software.

FY24 - Compsource - Rural Firefighters Workers Compensation - \$171,300

Premiums for insurance to cover the claims of injured rural firefighters. ODAFF would be in violation of state law. This would increase the state's liability in the event of the injury of uninsured rural firefighter. Legislative directed spending.

FY24 - Rural Fire Pension Fund - \$92,000

The Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System shall determine the number of persons who are eligible members of the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System. Upon adequate documentation of membership in the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System pursuant to the provisions of subsection D of Section 351 of Title 19 of the Oklahoma Statutes, the State Department of Agriculture shall make a transfer payment from the Volunteer Firefighter Employer Contribution Payment Revolving Fund to the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System. The amount transferred shall equal the sum of Sixty Dollars (\$60.00) multiplied by the number of members as certified by the System to the Department. Legislative directed spending.

FY24 AT&T Wireless - \$120,000.00

This purchase is for the agency pooled plan cellular service. This purchase allows agency employees to conduct state official abroad which increases efficiency and productivity. This allows for internet connectivity to cell phones, hotspots and IPads. If not approved, the agency will become less efficient and greatly reduce agency response times and agency deliverables. This expense is vital to agency operations.

FY24 Comdata Inc. - \$1,500,000

This purchase is for agency fuel and maintenance of the fleet. Each agency vehicle is issued a credit card for fuel and maintenance purposes which are tracked on a monthly basis. If not approved, the agency will become less efficient and greatly reduce agency response times and agency deliverables. This expense is vital to ensure agency operations

FY24 Agency Workers Comp Insurance premium - \$340,000

Premiums for insurance to cover the claims of injured workers. ODAFF would be in violation of state law. If not approved, this would increase the State's liability in the event of the injury of

uninsured state employees.

FY24 Onsite Security Guard Services (Prosegur Security) - \$70,000

The agency has onsite security services for building and personnel safety. Without this service agency property and employee safety would be placed at a greater risk daily.

FY24 Bank of America - Credit Card charges - \$30,000

The State contracts with Bank of America to process credit card payments. If not approve, ODAFF will not be able to accept credit card payments in person, mail order or for the online store operated by Forestry.

FY24 Federal Express - \$65,000

This purchase is a release against the mandatory statewide contract for small package delivery. This allows for the agency to conduct daily mail services. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to send packages, thus resulting in potential work stoppage of agency activities.

FY24 Petroleum Traders (Bulk Fuel) - \$75,000

Forestry Services has several remote office locations with heavy firefighting equipment. Providing bulk fuel allows for these locations to fuel it firefighting equipment and remain in a ready status when dispatched. Without this purchase this could greatly reduce agency response times, thus putting the public and property at greater risk.

FY24 National Association of State Departments of Agriculture (NASDA) - \$17,000

NASDA grows and enhances agriculture by forging partnerships and creating consensus to achieve sound policy outcomes between state departments of agriculture, the federal government, and stakeholders. Without this membership the agency would no longer be allowed to vote/approve NASDA policy priorities. This would weaken agency partnerships and discontinue agency resources; such as member leadership, regulatory expertise, political connections, white papers and subject matter experts. NASDA's tactics support the strategic initiatives, which carry out the business objectives of our mission statement and strategic intent statement.

FY24 Oklahoma Capital Improvement Authority – Bond Payments - \$1,704.768

Payments on the bond that financed the construction of the Agriculture Lab building. These payments are required by state law.

FY24 Oklahoma Employment Security Commission – Unemployment benefits - \$32,000 This is an estimate of the claims that ODAFF would have to pay former employees who file for unemployment and are approved. These payments are required by state law.

FY24 Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System – Retirees unused sick leave \$100,000

When an employee retires, they can use the balance of their accrued sick leave to "purchase" time to count for retirement eligibility. These payments are to transfer the value of the leave to the OPERS system. These payments are required by state law.

FY24 Oklahoma Management Enterprise Services (OMES) – Risk Management- \$120,000 Purchase of insurance for liability, vehicle, equipment, agency contents, tort and Directors & Officers. The agency would be uninsured and unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY24 Oklahoma Management Enterprises Services (OMES) FICA Savings \$25,000

When an employee selects 'Premium Conversion' they can see a lowering of their tax base for tax

purposes and for the withholding of FICA. Since the State matches FICA withholding, this results in a savings for the state as well. These payments transfer that savings to EBC to administer the program. These payments are required by state law.

FY24 Oklahoma Management Enterprises Services (OMES) - Facility Services - \$365,505.72

Service Management Agreement with OMES, OMES agrees to furnish janitorial services, maintenance services, and all utilities. OMES maintains the building's existing heating, ventilating and air-conditioning (HVAC) system, water system, electrical system, and plumbing system. If not approved, laboratory operations would cease, and the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY24 Oklahoma Management Enterprises Services (OMES) – Information Technology - \$650,000

Pursuant to the Information Technology Consolidation and Coordination Act codified at 62 O.S.§35.1 et seq., as amended (the "Act"), OMES -ISD shall provide information technology shared services to each State Agency. The agency will have no computer operations and would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY24 Oklahoma Management Enterprises Services (OMES) – OPM - \$26,000

Payment of ODAFF's portion towards mandated Merit Protection Act. These payments are required by state law.

FY24 Pitney Bowes – Mail Machine Lease - \$20,000

Statewide mandatory contract for leased mailroom postage equipment. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY24 Oklahoma Turnpike Authority – Pikepass - \$21,000

Agency payment of toll expenses for agency vehicles which use toll roads. Without this contract, the agency would be unable to use toll roads.

FY24 United State Postal Services (Postage) - \$90,000

Purchase of postage for the agency mail machine. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY24 (Walnut Storage Building) - \$18,300

Storage building for agency supplies. Without this contract, the agency would be required to store supplies in the headquarter building, which currently is very limited with regards to storage capacity.

FY24 Xerox - \$78,500

Lease of multifunction devices for agency operations, these devices are used as printers, copiers, scanners, faxes. Also, maintenance and supply services for agency laser printers. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY24 Galt Temporary Services - \$150,000

Purchase from the mandatory statewide contract for temporary services. These individuals provide a variety of agency mission critical functions which allow the agency to operate in an efficient as possible manner. Without this purchase the agency would be unable to fulfill its statutory mission.

FY24 BancFirst - \$17,900

ODAFF lockbox services. This service allows for agency deposits to be received directly by BankFirst staff and deposited directly into agency accounts.

FY24 Oklahoma Governor's Office - \$37,500

This MOU will provide shared office space, furniture, and salaries for OG staff for its office in Washington D.C. with the support of funds provided by ODAFF. ODAFF will receive access and use of the facilities, subject to availability, and support from the staff in Washington D.C.

FY24 Oklahoma Management Enterprise Services (OMES) Fleet Management (AVL services) \$114,558

This purchase is required per Governor Stitt's executive order 2020-04, that all state agencies are mandated to install "Automatic Vehicle Locator (AVL)" equipment in all state-owned vehicles. This directive will be achieved through a "shared services agreement" with OMES Fleet Management.

FY24 SHI – Adobe Subscription Services - \$11,000

Purchase of the Adobe subscription services. The agency will purchase (5) Creative Cloud licenses for Enterprise All Apps. We also purchased (68) licenses of Acrobat Pro DC for enterprise for agency staff and one Adobe Captivate license for ODAFF staff for a 12-month period.

FY24 \$6,000 – **Asset Panda** – Renewal of subscription agency inventory software system. This system will allow for easy asset tracking. It is a cloud-based technology that offers complete flexibility to manage assets for our agency. The software offers a mobile application for users and customizable content creation. This system will replace an outdated Microsoft Database, the system will allow for the migration of those assets into this new cloud-based program.

FY23 \$500,000 – Purchase of new cubicles for Administration, Market Development, and the Office of General Counsel. The existing cubicles are outdated and no longer manufactured, and parts are no longer available when a repair need arises. This purchase is needed to modernize the modular furniture within each area and to project a professional image when entering these workspaces. Without this purchase we will continue to use our outdated, irreparable, and potentially hazardous modular furniture.

Agricultural Environmental Management Services

A request for \$45,000.00

Professional Services: The AEMS Division needs to continue our contract with our consultant to review Nutrient Management Plans (NMP); perform duties in the areas of poultry, swine, cattle, Best Management Practices in compliance areas and AgPDES. The Consultant will provide technical assistance and reviews of other related actions as requested by the Director of the AEMS Division failure to hire a consultant to perform these activities will result in noncompliance with the laws that regulate poultry, swine and cattle industry. This is the third year of current contract.

A request of \$48,276

Professional Services: Request approval to renewal, not to exceed \$48,276.00 for the OSU Poultry Education program. The funds are appropriated dollars. The funding is for Poultry Waste Management training, as needed, for operators of poultry feeding operations and land applicators of poultry waste, to attend educational training on poultry waste management which is provided by Oklahoma State University through the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service. Failure to renew will result in noncompliance with the law that regulates poultry feeding operations operators and land applicators of poultry waste.

A request of \$130,900

The AEMS Division has obtained a grant of \$185,614 from the Exchange Network (EN) to expand

our e-Reporting for our programs. The Grant will allow AEMS to contract with an approved contractor company to develop a program to assist in the modernize our operations. AEMS seeks to contract with Ideagen to begin the development process. Ideagen is part of the Statewide contractors and can provide a cost-effective rate to assist the division to accomplishment the grant goals. Our inability to complete this project in the timeframe established with the grant funds available will cause the division to operate less effectively and efficiently and fill the grant requirements.

A request to continue agreement with Tulsa Metropolitan Utility Authority (TUMA) \$180,200 To employ two (2) Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry (ODAFF) Environmental Program Specialists with the experience, training, and qualifications prescribed by State or federal law or rules and regulations to prepare NMPs designed to properly manage poultry waste at agricultural operations and to protect water quality in the Eucha-Spavinaw Watershed. Failure to continue the agreement will prevent Tulsa and ODAFF to fulfill the courts mandate on lawsuit.

CONSUMER PROTECTION SERVICES

FY2024 South Dakota Agricultural Laboratories testing fees for pesticide samples and feed samples - \$9,800.00

FY2024 OSU laboratory testing fees for soil and water samples related to environmental pollution investigations - \$9,800.00

FY2024 Oklahoma State University Soil Fertility Research --\$450,000.00

Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 8-77.7 (A), ODAFF is required to collect an inspection fee of \$1.00 per ton of which \$0.50 per ton shall be forwarded directly to a special Soil Fertility Research Account in the Department of Plant and Soil Sciences of the Division of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at Oklahoma State University (OSU) for the purpose of conducting soil fertility research and extension involving efficient fertilizer use for agronomic crops and forages and groundwater and surface water protection from plant food nutrients. Though tonnage amounts vary each year due to when a crop is planted, commodity prices, fertilizer prices and the weather we use the upper range of inspection fees paid annually to determine the amount of \$450,000.00 that could potentially be paid out to OSU. However, the actual amount paid to OSU will be based on the amount of inspection fees paid to ODAFF.

This is a statutory requirement of the Oklahoma Fertilizer Act and needs to be done to further research to prevent the pollution of lands and waters of Oklahoma from fertilizers.

FY2024 Unwanted Pesticide Disposal Program --\$350,000.00

Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 3-82(J) (3), ODAFF is required to collect a registration fee of \$210.00 for each pesticide or device label registered. A portion of these fees, in the amount of \$300,000.00 annually, shall be dedicated for conducting programs for unwanted pesticide disposal. This amount shall be deposited into the State Department of Agriculture Unwanted Pesticide Disposal Fund and shall be dedicated for this use only. Since not all the \$300,000.00 in the funds is utilized each year they are then carried forward into the next fiscal year and the amount available for unwanted pesticide disposal in fiscal year 2024 is \$350,000.00.

This is a statutory requirement of the Combined Pesticide Law and needs to be done to prevent the pollution of lands and waters of Oklahoma from unwanted pesticides.

FY2024 Oklahoma State University Pesticide Program Contract Approval --\$130,000.00

Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 3-82 (B), applicators are required to be certified in a category or categories in which they make pesticide applications. ODAFF administers these exams under state law and delegated federal authority from EPA. Additionally, the law also requires a practical training exam after the written exams have been passed for certain categories such as fumigation, structural and general pest. To support the certification and training program the EPA grant includes monies for development of study manuals specific for each exam and for a practical exam when necessary. Other uses of the EPA grant monies include assisting applicators, owners and farmers with compliance for the federal worker protection standards. In order to comply with these requirements assistance was requested from Oklahoma State University (OSU) for the purpose of study manuals, WPS compliance support and providing a venue for the practical examination school.

OSU as a land grant university has proven expertise in each of the pesticide categories and education that lends itself well into writing study material for the written examinations. They also have a state-of-the-art training facility for practical exams that allows each applicator to experience many different application sites during an exam. This has resulted in two positive outcomes for ODAFF. The first is a large decrease in the number of complaints which frees up agency time and resources. The second is the ability to do these exams as a group instead of individually for each applicator which requires fewer personnel to complete the task. Finally, since education is one of the universities main purposes, they are an excellent source to provide training for the federal worker protection standard.

Currently, ODAFF does not have the resources to develop, print and distribute study material for the certification and training program. The agency also does not have enough staff to monitor all practical exams individually so additional staff would be necessary without OSU. The federal WPS program would also be problematic without the assistance of OSU. OSU provides a neutral party to review a facilities compliance with WPS and provide assistance and education to show them how to comply with federal law.

OSU provides critical support in the pesticide program through training material and assistance that would be difficult for the agency to provide without additional personnel. The loss of OSU's assistance would place a great strain on ODAFF's limited resources.

FY2024 Kelly Registration System (KRS)—maintenance, ACH reimbursement and inspection program fees--\$88,000.00

KRS paid ODAFF for licenses, tonnage and registrations that were initially completed in the online system using an ACH transaction. The persons/companies later canceled the payments, so Kelly did not receive payment for what they had already paid to ODAFF. ODAFF has since collected the money from these entities and needs to repay KRS for the overpayment. Also, pays the fees for a subcontracted online inspection program for MI Corporation and the Kelly yearly maintenance fee.

This money is for overpayments by KRS and needs to be returned. We do not have an inspection program for field staff to use when conducting their inspections and it is the maintenance fee for our online program.

FY2024 OSU Plant Disease and Insect Diagnostic Lab (PDIDL) --\$ 25,000.00

This is for payment to the PDIDL lab for processing of plant pest and disease samples. This can include reoccurring pests such as red imported fire ant or new pests such as vascular streak dieback in redbud. Sampling events may be funded by an USDA APHIS cooperative agreement but not all samples are funded.

Nurseries will be unable to ship plants. Plant diseases and pest introduced into Oklahoma may spread throughout the state affecting crops and native plants.

FY2024 GIS Programing with Oklahoma University --\$43,000.00

GIS programing would provide ODAFF with the ability to GPS hemp grower fields to provide required data to USDA. It also will allow us to do a better job of collecting and reporting our USDA CAPS survey information under our grant programs. Finally, it will assist us in collecting information on sensitive crops, complaints, inspections, and licensees.

Without the GIS programming we will have more difficulty meeting USDA hemp reporting requirements and CAPS reporting requirements. This will also limit our efficiency in sampling, trapping and inspections.

FY2024 Verizon Wireless -- \$25,000.00

Verizon is used as the main form of communication for field staff and office staff. Additionally, with the Agency moving forward with online services having access to a mobile wireless for field staff is essential to their job duties.

Without wireless there would be no way to communicate or move forward with our online system for inspections. Additionally, it will slow response times to complaints including those that are time sensitive like human health related and environmental.

FY2023 OSU Plant Disease and Insect Diagnostic Lab (PDIDL) --\$20,000.00

A plant pest emergency occurred in December with the first detection of Vascular Streak Dieback in Redbud trees. ODAFF spent January and February testing trees in the positive nurseries and then in the remaining nurseries for the disease to prevent the further spread of infected plant material. This request is to cover the sampling that has already occurred and any additional sampling through the year end.

This will prevent infected trees from being sold to the public all of which die and also may spread to our native redbud trees.

Computers --\$37,800.00

Updated computers are needed to replace existing computers for CPS field staff. CPS field staff's computers need replaced often due to the rugged environment that they are used in by staff. When their computers fail it causes inspector down time while they get repaired or replaced.

Computers are essential for us to be able to complete our work. without them inspection, licensing, registrations, tonnage and complaint response time will be slowed. Additionally, communication with field staff and the public will be affected causing undo frustrations.

Food Safety Services

Contract employee for Dairy Services - \$40,000.00

Perform various duties at dairy plants in Oklahoma, collect milk and milk products for sampling. Conduct Oklahoma Dairy plant and farm state surveys for sanitation compliance and enforcement. If this position is not filled, then a contractor from out-of-state would have to be brought in and paid to do this job for the facilities to remain in compliance.

Forestry Services

FY24 - \$250,000

For use of Purchase Orders to repair firefighting equipment including but not limited to dozers, Bambi buckets, UTVs and slip-on firefighting units. These purchases will be for repairs more than \$5,000 when a piece of equipment has significant issues and requires Board approval. Justification: This will allow the equipment to be repaired quickly after completion of the bidding process and back in service for fire management activities.

FY23 - \$100,000

For use of PCards & Purchase Orders to repair firefighting equipment including but not limited to dozers, Bambi buckets, UTVs and slip-on firefighting units. These purchases will be for repairs more than \$5,000 when a piece of equipment has significant issues and requires Board approval. Justification: This will allow the equipment to be repaired quickly after completion of the bidding process and back in service for fire management activities.

FY23 – Transport Trucks, \$832,526 (Federal Funding–SFA Response, 245 Fund)

Purchase of five (5) Class 8 Truck Tractors that will be used to carry Type 3 firefighting bulldozers. These are mission critical pieces of equipment that will respond to wildfires and all-hazard situations throughout the entire state. With new transports in service, OFS will be able to provide timely and reliable responses, limiting the threat to life and property. The transports will be replacing trucks that are undersized, has excessive mileage and require frequent, costly repairs. Funding for this purchase will come the US Forest Service – FY20 SFA Response Grant (\$460,000), FY21 SFA Response Grant (\$197,526) and the OFS Fund 245 (\$175,000) as part of an approved budget revision.

FY22 – Firefighting bulldozer, \$574,121 (Federal Funding–SFA Response)

Purchase two (2) Type 3, John Deere 650P bulldozers that will be used for state-wide wildfire response, suppression and mitigation activities. The horsepower and hydrostatic transmission of this type is well suited to the diverse wildland fuels and terrain present across all of Oklahoma. The size allows for easy transport on a truck with a dovetail bed enabling access to remote locations where fires occur. These dozers will be replacing a 2001 JD 650H (1649 hrs.) needing \$15,000 in repairs and a 2001 JD 450H (1400 hrs.) needing \$10,000 in repairs. Funding for this entire purchase will come the US Forest Service – FY21 SFA Response Grant (\$266,000) and FY22 SFA Response Grant (\$308,121) as part of an approved budget revision.

FY23 – UTVs w/ slip-on firefighting units, \$64,929 (Federal Funding–SICF SFA Response) Purchase three (3) Polaris Ranger UTVs. These UTVs will be replacing units that were acquired through the Firefighter Property Program (FFP) but are no longer in service due to age and mechanical issues. Each UTV will be equipped with a slip-on skid unit that can handle spot fires and support mop-up throughout the duration of a wildfire. In addition, these UTVS configured with windshields, canopies and seatbelts can safely and efficiently transport fire line personnel to areas where pickups/engines are unable to access. Funding for this entire purchase will come the US Forest Service – FY22 SICF SFA Response Grant (\$64,929) as part of an approved budget revision.

FY23 – Wildfire detection cameras, \$107,800 (Federal Funding-SICF SFA Response)

Purchase eleven (11) PTZ IP Detection Cameras. The cameras will re-establish wildfire detection in eastern Oklahoma providing coverage of the 6.2-million-acre protection areas. An early warning detection system is necessary for keeping fire sizes manageable and ensuring a prompt response. With this system in place, OFS will have the ability to detect fires 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Funding for this entire purchase will come the US Forest Service – FY22 SICF SFA Response Grant (\$107,800) as part of an approved budget revision.

FY23 - \$15,000

Aerial pesticide spray application to the seed production pine tree orchards at FTIC in Idabel. Aerial pesticide spray will be applied to the cone crop in our genetically improved pine tree orchards. This will maximize the embryotic material filled seed in the cones collected at the orchards by controlling cone worms and other seed insects. Aerial application of pesticide spray to the orchards will control these pests. Justification: Without this purchase, there will be a continued decline in the production of genetically improved seed.

FY 23- \$20,000

Purchase the pouring of a concrete pad in an existing pole barn. This purchase will be reimbursed by the Revegetation/National Seed Strategy Funding Grant. Justification: Numerous landowners are requesting seedlings grown in containers for their harsher sites and we are unable to meet the demand now due to the lack of infrastructure for the equipment. We have the container filling equipment; we simply don't have a structure solid location to set it up. This concrete pad will allow us to set up and use the container filling equipment, which in return will meet landowner needs and save resources and time from having to do it all by hand.

FY23-\$50,000

Purchase a forklift for the Forest Regeneration Center. A forklift is required to set up equipment, move racks and boxes of seedlings, unload bulk soil media and fertilizers and containers from delivery trucks on a regular basis at the Forest Regeneration Center. The nursery currently does not have a forklift to manage these tasks and one must be borrowed. This purchase will be reimbursed by the Revegetation/National Seed Strategy Funding Grant. Justification: Without this purchase, staff will need to move these items by hand which would be time consuming and potentially unsafe.

FY 23-\$15,000

Purchase strapping machines at the Forest Regeneration center. Strapping machines are required to bundle bareroot conservation seedlings at the Forest Regeneration Center. It is essential for the seedlings to be bundled properly and accurately for landowners and delivery procedures. The current strapping machine is obsolete, and the parts are no longer available. This purchase will be reimbursed by the Revegetation/National Seed Strategy Funding Grant. Justification: Without a strapping machine, the seedlings will not be bundled properly and accurately for landowners.

FY 23-\$10,000

Purchase metal siding, purlin, posts and equipment door for existing three-sided pole barn at the Forest Regeneration Center. This will secure the building and the container filling equipment that will be housed inside. This purchase will be reimbursed by the Revegetation/National Seed Strategy Funding Grant. Justification: Numerous landowners are requesting seedlings grown in containers for their harsher sites and we are unable to meet the demand now due to the lack of infrastructure for the equipment. Once the container filling equipment is assembled, it must be housed in a secure building, away from weather that would affect its operation of filling containers for landowners.

FY 23 - \$25,000

Upfit of two new 1/2 -ton pickups to include installation of emergency warning system, communication hardware, off-road capability and conspicuity striping. Specifically, the following will be included: Emergency warning system – Warning lights/siren meeting NFPA standards, Communication hardware – Radio console and associated wiring and cabling, Off-road capability –

grille guard and leveling kit, and Conspicuity striping to provide for visibility while working incidents in hazardous/low light conditions (i.e. smoke, nighttime, roadside). Justification: Warning lighting, siren and conspicuity striping to meet NFPA standards and enhance visibility during incident response. Radio console installation to provide secured housing for high-value communications equipment. Off-road capability equipment to facilitate efficient operation in routine off-road environments where brush, boulders and other obstacles are present.

FY23-\$30,000

Additional contract harvesting services is needed by qualified, trained workers to lift seedlings at the Forest Regeneration Center (FRC). Each year, the FRC delivers millions of seedlings to Oklahomans for conservation planting. To meet the planting demands of landowners throughout the state, a steady supply of seedlings is required. To make sure our customers have quality, healthy seedlings, delivered on schedule, a trained harvesting crew is required to lift these seedlings. Some of the harvesting will be completed by FRC staff. However, we no longer have the inmate crews that we used in the past. Justification: without this purchase, we will not be able to lift the seedlings in a timely manner and we will fail to meet the delivery requirements for Oklahoma customers.

FY 23 - \$55,000

Purchase ESRI ArcGIS Online Licenses (Federal Grant) – Justification: This allows the OFS Incident Management Team and fire personnel to utilize Collector, giving our firefighters real-time wildland fire data exchange. Data collected from the Collector application gives firefighters an advantage on fighting fires and increases overall firefighter and public safety.

FY23 - \$13,200

Random and pre-hire Drug and Alcohol testing for all CDL drives OFS employees to comply with DOT Requirements. If we do not perform drug screening, we will not be up to DOT regulations with CDL drivers and keep testing throughout the fiscal year. The amount asked for will is the estimated cost for one-time testing of all Forestry Services employees currently holding a CDL. This purchase is needed for policy and procedures.

Laboratory Services

FY23 - \$31,318.56 Service Contract

Purchase of a one-year Preventative Maintenance Agreement for the HPLC-MSMS Triple quad 6470 in the Pesticide Section to ensure continuous and consistent operation of the instrument and improves overall quality of the data being reported.

Justification: Without a maintenance agreement the laboratory would not be able to verify the accuracy of the test results and the equipment could possibly fail rendering it unusable. (To be purchased by Consumer Protection Services). (Pre-approval letter sent to Secretary Arthur).

FY23 - \$10,685.00 Preventive Maintenance

Purchase of a one-year Preventative Maintenance Agreement for the ICP (Inductively Coupled Plasma-Optical Emission Spectrometry Unit), in the General Chemistry Section to ensure continuous and consistent operation of the instrument and ensures the overall quality of the data being reported. (To be purchased by Consumer Protection Services).

FY23 - \$6500.00 Service Contract

Purchase of a one-year Service Contract for the Skalar San (Flow Analyzer) with Autosampler, UV Vis and Flame Photometers for the General Chemistry Section. (To be purchased by Consumer Protection Services).

FY23 - \$7100.00 Service Contract

Purchase of a Service Contract for the LECO Sulphur and Nitrogen Analyzer for the General Chemistry Section. (To be purchased by Consumer Protection Services).

Market Development Services

FY2023 – Made in Oklahoma Showcase – facility rental - \$5,000.00.

FY2023 – Farm to School Formula Grant – Date of Award through September 30, 2026 - \$964,406.00

Justification: This project is entirely funded by the Farm to School State Formula Grant. This funding will support program efforts in the state with activities including development and expansion of educational resources for school cafeteria personnel and students, training and networking opportunities for food producers and direct consultation services for schools interested in initiation or expansion of procurement. In addition, the funding will support a full-time employee dedicated to the Farm to School program and a part-time intern as well as several contactors including nutritionists, chefs and former school staff with documented success with Farm to School programs. If this proposed expense is not approved and therefore the project is not completed, the State not only loses money immediately that is important to the school districts throughout the state, but also runs the risk of not being awarded money in the future.

FY2023 – Agritourism categorical brochures – printing - \$48,000.00

Justification: It is the goal of the Agritourism Program to utilize all marketing channels to create a consistent brand awareness campaign and utilize these channels for seasonal promotions within the many categories of Agritourism. The brochure distribution program is one of the top marketing channels for Oklahoma Agritourism as we are able to reach hundreds of thousands of consumers each year. Not only are individual consumers requesting these brochures through TravelOK.com, but they are also distributed at festivals, tradeshows, and other events throughout the year. If this expense is not approved, there will be a negative impact on the ability of the Agritourism Program to promote and advertise the 400+ Agritourism venues in the state, resulting in an economic loss of those businesses and the local economy in those areas.

FY2024 – Made in Oklahoma & Made in Oklahoma State Fair Store bags – cost share basis - \$15,000.00

FY2024 – Agreement with Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department to promote the Agritourism industry through the development of consumer marketing campaigns. - \$35,000.00 Justification: The Agritourism program is entering a partnership with Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department (OTRD) as part of our marketing plan for FY2024. As a part of this partnership, Agritourism gets to use their existing marketing channels including free ads in their guides, website presence, travel show co-ops and brochure inventory, warehousing, and distribution. If this proposed expense is not approved, we will lose an opportunity to share in a campaign that gains exponentially more reach than we could obtain on our own. OTRD already has the channels set up and by not partnering we would be looking at well over \$100,000 to replace what they can give us in ad placement, website presence and Search Engine Optimization. We have evaluated the warehousing and postage costs; this alone would be over \$50,000 in hard costs and does not include the advertising and marketing part of our agreement.

FY2024 – Agreement with Discover Oklahoma, Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department, for the promotion of Agritourism venues through the development and production of an advertising campaign on Discover Oklahoma television shows. - \$15,000.00

FY2024 – Renewal of contract with Freestyle, graphic design firm, for Year 4 of 4 to work with the Agritourism program in creating promotional and print items to further promote the program and help establish continuity with advertising and marketing pieces. - \$30,000.00

Justification: This is Year 4 of 4 for the graphic design firm that maintains the Agritourism brand while developing new print materials, refreshing website content, strategically updating social media channels and assisting with social and website analytics. It is the goal of the Agritourism Program to utilize all marketing channels to create a consistent brand awareness campaign and utilize social channels for seasonal promotions within the many categories of Agritourism. If this expense is not approved, there will be a negative impact on the ability of the Agritourism Program to promote and advertise the 350+ Agritourism venues in the state, resulting in an economic loss of those businesses and the local economy in those areas.

FY2024 – Agreement with Food Export Association of the Midwest USA (Food Export – Midwest) for membership to provide small and medium size food and agricultural companies' access to international markets through a variety of exporter programs and to increase volume and value of agricultural exports from the region in represents. - \$7,000.00

FY2024 – Addendum with Oklahoma State University for Year 4 of 4 - Viticulture and Enologist Extension Specialist – Project funded entirely by the Viticulture and Enology Center Development Revolving Fund Grant - \$70,000.00

Justification: This project is entirely funded by the Oklahoma Viticulture and Enology Center Development Revolving Fund. This employee will coordinate an annual grape management course, create online grape management and wine making classes, write grant applications and research vineyard and viticulture projects as needed. The employee will also assist grape growers and wine makers through field days, correspondence, and site visits. If this proposed expense is not approved and therefore the project is not completed, the State not only loses money immediately that is important to the grape and wine industry through the economic impact, but also runs the risk of not being awarded money from the Oklahoma Viticulture and Enology Center Development Revolving Fund in the future.




Available Cash at Month End per Allotment Budget & Available Cash Report Fiscal Year 2020-2023

Months Ending: July 2019 – April 2023







Revenue By Division July 2022 – April 2023





Appropriations FY 2018 - thru April 2023






QUALITY MANAGEMENT SECTION: (Daniel Tripp, QA Manager)


The month of March was a typical testing month and three dairies were not tested.

The isolated colonies from the Campylobacter investigation have been sent to the Nebraska Health Department for whole genome sequencing and we are waiting on those results.


The Section tested twenty-six meat samples and four meat plant water samples this month.







The month of April was a typical testing month. Five dairies were not tested for the month and an additional one is dry. There are a total of 67 dairies that the Section tests and six have closed this year.

Sharon Swyear attended the National Conference of Milk Shippers Bi-annual Conference in Indianapolis, April 2nd-7th. At the conference, state regulatory agency delegates, the FDA and industry delegates work together to approve legislation regarding the milk program. New methods, language changes, and up-dates to current methods are introduced and voted on during the conference.

SEED SECTION: (Tori Gillispie, Agriculture Services Administrator I and Wade Krivanek, State Seed Program Administrator)

Activity in the Seed Section remained normal for the month of March. Records indicate a total of 164 samples were received for testing. Crop types continue to consist mainly of corn, sorghum, soybean, peanuts and spring grasses. Most samples were taken by CPS inspectors following up on carry over seed needing updated germination tests. There were no Seed Law violations discovered.

The Section successfully completed proficiency testing for Non-mechanical Seed Count on Foxtail Millet through the Association of Official Seed Analysts.

The Oklahoma Crop Improvement Association (OCIA) held their quarterly Board of Directors Meeting at the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture. Crop updates from growers indicate that the states certified wheat crop remains in poor condition in nearly all areas of western and panhandle regions due to the drought. However, central and northern areas have seen great improvement and indicated they have cut more wheat this year than the previous years. It is still uncertain what to expect as far as quality for certified wheat seed production. Concerns remain that many certified fields in the state will not meet OCIA standards, primarily for purity content and test weight which can influence seed vigor.

In April the Section received a total of 119 samples. Seeds being analyzed consisted primarily of sorghum, soybean, corn, cowpeas, and summer grasses. Currently, there have been no quality issues discovered pertaining to summer crop seed. However, the Section received a certain variety of peanuts that failed to germinate. The analyst conducted different seed vigor testing, sand and soil, to determine the cause. The outcome of the tests determined most of the peanut seeds were weak and failed to germinate. Necessary action was taken to inform the grower. There were seed tag violations discovered on two different seed lots. A total of 15-30 pounds of bermudagrass seeds were placed under stop sale due to test date expiration. All of the infractions have since been remedied and released from stop sale.






GENERAL CHEMISTRY SECTION: (Johnathan White, Environmental/Chemical Laboratory Scientist IV)

March was a very productive month for the Section, with 1449 determinations, completing 333 samples and continued exceeding our goal of 1000 determinations per month.

We have re-incorporated most of the fertilizer testing to our work load. It was discovered that the muffle furnace used for total phosphate analysis had failed and are waiting on delivery of a new unit. All other analyses are being conducted; this will only impact a small number of samples.

The Section is currently analyzing a mixture of feed and fertilizer samples but are anticipating a slight decrease in overall sample numbers as the Section starts to see more fertilizers over the next few months. This is being coordinated with CPS staff.

Turn around time was 15.31 days and is staying under the Section's 18-day target. The Section continues to hit an internal target of samples being run within a week of receiving for most analyses.

In April the Section continued to maintain productivity, and was able to make 1210 determinations, completing 259 samples. The Section continues exceeding their goal of 1000 determinations per month. The ability of our staff to perform multiple roles and their willingness to step-up and do what is needed has allowed for the success of the Section. John Holden from the Inorganic Section provided some assistance with grinding samples which has allowed us to keep up with our other duties.

On May 8th a new lab tech will start and the Section will be back up to prior staffing numbers.

We have restarted all of our current fertilizer and lime analysis so we are providing all of the services we are set up for at this point. Hopefully we will be able to add back in some analysis that was cut due to staffing and prior equipment issues before the end of summer (heavy metals in fertilizers by ICP).

Our turnaround time was 16.43 days so we are staying under our 18 day target.






Fig A. Pie charts representing the number of samples received by type (left) and matrix (right)




Fig B. Graph showing the number of samples received by the section each month.




Fig C. Graph showing the number of determinations completed each month.






Fig A. Pie charts representing the number of samples received by type (left) and matrix (right).




Fig B. Graph showing the number of samples received by the Section each month.




Fig C. Graph showing the number of determinations completed each month.

OKLAHOMA BUREAU OF STANDARDS: (William Krivanek, Metrologist I)


The following is a workload summary for the Oklahoma Bureau of Standards from March 1st through 31st.

The Section had several personnel changes take place since late February. Amanda Kramer resigned her position and William Krivanek accepted the position as Metrologist I. William will attend training with National Institute of Standard and Technology (NIST) and Southwest Assurance Program (SWAP) Meet, which will take place during the fall months. William is currently being trained by Richard Gonzales. The Bureau has posted a new metrologist position for hire at this time.

The Section is currently in a state of suspended accreditation due to the changes in personnel. The Section has been reaching out to clients and informing them that for the time being, the Section will not be able to provide accredited calibration results or accredited certificates. In some instances, clients have been inclined to cancel their appointment with the Section due to accreditation purposes. Clients have inquired as to when the Bureau will be regaining its accreditation status, and can resume performing accredited calibrations. The Section is expected to regain accreditation as soon as possible after newly acquired personnel receive the required training from NIST.



Program Highlights

Oklahoma Garden Clubs

On April 5th Oklahoma State Garden Club Representatives brought the 2023 Smokey Bear-Woodsy Owl Poster Contest finalists from across the country to the Agriculture Building. The finalist's posters were ranked, and the Grade 1 – 5 National poster contest winner was selected. Urban Forestry Coordinator Mark Bays, Education Coordinator Tony Pascall, and Information Representative Keith Merckx helped with the judging and the winning posters were announced through the National Garden Clubs.

Master Naturalists

On April 8, the Oklahoma Master Naturalists Training Program was held in Oklahoma City at the OSU Extension office. Participants from across the state heard from Mark Bays on the benefits and services trees in our communities provide.

NSU

On April 18th Forester Riley Coy presented for Earth Day at Northeastern State University in Tahlequah about Urban Forestry and how faculty and students can get involved.

Oklahoma City National Memorial


In preparation of the 28th Anniversary and Remembrance Ceremony of the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, Mark coordinated the Survivor Tree seedling giveaway with Steve Bieberich of Sunshine Nursery, and staff and volunteers from the Oklahoma City National Memorial.

Riley, Mark, Forest Management Chief Craig Marquardt, and Keith Merckx helped sort and prepare seedlings from the Survivor Tree for the giveaway on April 19. Riley, Mark, and Keith were on hand to help volunteers and Memorial Foundation staff hand out over 325 seedlings following the Remembrance Ceremony. Individuals registered the planting location before receiving their seedling.



Tree Decay Workshop

OFS co-hosted a Tree Decay Workshop with the Oklahoma Community Forestry Council April $21^{st} - 22^{nd}$ at Tulsa Community College's downtown campus. Over 35 arborists from Oklahoma, Arkansas and Kansas were on hand to learn from experts on various decay fungi within trees, what causes them and how they impact structural integrity. Part of the workshop included an outdoor demonstration at Woodward Park of specialized equipment including a Resist-o-graph and Sonic Tomography that allows the operator to map exactly where internal decay is in trees.



Tree Risk Assessment Qualification (TRAQ) Training

On May 2nd - 5th OFS Foresters Connie Robinson and Evan Long attended Tree Risk Assessment Qualification training in Georgia. The session taught necessary skills and qualified the students to perform tree risk assessments on public lands.

Oklahoma Gardening

The Oklahoma Gardening film crew was on hand to film the TRAQ's outdoor demonstration. The segment aired the weekend of May $6^{th} - 7^{th}$. See the link to the segment here: Oklahoma Gardening Tree Decay

Outdoor Classroom

On May 3rd and 4th Riley Coy and Chris Mask presented forestry topics at the Piedmont Outdoor Classroom event which was attended by approximately 200 4th grade students. 

Project Learning Tree

On April 3rd, Education Coordinator Tony Pascall, Forest Management Chief Craig Marquardt, Urban Forestry Coordinator Mark Bays, Forest Management Coordinator Dieter Rudolph, and Service Forester Evan Long trained every Pre-K teacher and

Arrow Public Schools on Project Learning Tree. Now, over 100 teachers are trained and ready to teach





On April 8th, Tony trained twelve Early Childhood Educators on Project Learning Tree's Trees & Me curriculum.

On April 13th, Tony went to Duncan Elementary School for their Ag Day event and taught about the life of a tree and the importance of healthy forest management to over 180 students

On April 22nd, Tony staffed a booth at Scissortail Park's Earth Day event lead by OKC Beautiful. Over 300 people visited the booth receiving educational seedlings and information about tree care.





On April 27th, Tony taught several classes at Duncan Middle School about the value of forests and sustainable forest management. Approximately 150 students attended the classes.

On May 8th, Tony and GIS Specialist Chris Mask went to McAlester Early Childhood Center to teach approximately 200 Kindergartners about tree growth and the importance of trees as a part of their Native American Heritage Day. Smokey Bear was also present to assist with delivering a fire prevention message.

On May 10th, Tony had a booth at the 5th Green School Summit at Terra Verde Discovery School in Norman. Over 100 students and teachers from Green Schools around the state learned how they could bring resources from Project Learning Tree and OFS back to their home school.

COMMUNICATIONS

SafeStayOK.gov

Approval of the .gov domain is complete. The request for acquisition of that domain was made through the office of the state Chief Information Officer. The .com, .org., and .net domains have been acquired and will redirect to the .gov domain once that is in place. Further planning and implementation of the project is now moving forward.

Circle Mountain Fuels and Fire

Information Representative Keith Merckx is completing post-production of a video highlighting the effectiveness of hazardous fuels mitigation in Oklahoma. Just weeks after OFS mitigation efforts were completed on Circle Mountain south of Bartlesville, the area experienced a wildland fire which was successfully stopped when it hit the treated area. Interviews were conducted with emergency management officials, the fire chief, and residents whose property/homes were spared due to the OFS mitigation efforts.

Turkey Mountain Prescribed Burn

Keith and GIS Coordinator Chris Mask were on hand to document prescribed burning at the Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness Area in Tulsa. They shot video both on the ground inside the fire and from the air with a UAS. Clearance to shoot the video with the UAS was obtained from R.L. Jones municipal airport. This footage will be included in future videos as well as the Fuels Mitigation Story Map which is nearing completion.

COMMUNITY FIRE ASSISTANCE

The Community Fire Assistance Program assisted numerous fire departments with equipment issues during the reporting period. Two notable successes are shown below. Maramec Fire Department received title to the 2002 Stewart & Stevenson 2.5-ton 4x4 shown below after converting and placing it into service as a wildland firefighting engine. We passed title on the truck to the Fire Dept. this month. The green fire truck shown below is a 1993 Pierce fire engine that was acquired from the military this month. This engine will soon be placed with a rural fire department.





FOREST REGENERATION CENTER/FOREST TREE IMPROVEMENT CENTER

Before the Regeneration team wrapped up this year's seedling sales, the staff was able to partner with the Garfield County Conservation District and USDA—NRCS and Farm Service Agency in Enid, OK for a great community outreach event. The four-hour event help to promote over 2,000 seedlings being sold to local landowners to help meet conservation needs and provided information to numerous landowner participants' requesting information for future conservation projects. In all, it was a successful event that helped the Forest Regeneration Center push the total number of seedling orders to over 700 orders statewide this harvest season.

NORTHEAST AREA



Forest Protection Highlights

From April 1st through May 12th, the Northeast Area had 63 fires which burned 5,591.6 acres. NE Area Rangers also assisted with fires outside of the Protection Area during the reporting period. Matt Waldrop and Dakota Green completed *S-230 Single Resource Boss* training held in Broken Bow. Joe Leak and Dusty Ryals completed *S-215 Fire Operations in the Wildland Urban Interface* training in Broken Bow on April 15th – 16th. Cole Hix and Craig Longshore conducted interviews for the Park Hill Forest



Ranger I position on May 3rd. Billy Riggs and Cole Hix attended the *L-280 Followership to Leadership* training at the Arkansas River Valley Wildland Fire Academy.

Prescribed Burning

NE Area Rangers along with Rangers from East Central Area conducted the first prescribed fire within the City of Tulsa. They conducted the prescribed fire on April 12th and burned 12 acres on the property. Additionally, through April and May NE Area Rangers assisted with mechanical hazardous fuel reduction at Turkey Mountain.

Other prescribed fire activity in the Northeast Area included burning 138 acres in Adair County.



Forest Management/Program Highlights

Connie Robinson and Evan Long organized and assisted with several forest educational programs during the reporting period. They conducted the NE Area FFA regional forestry competition at Flint Ridge on April 4th. Connie hosted two educational presentations, one each for Caney Valley Conservation District and Jay Elementary School. These educational presentations covered topics for Earth Day and Fire Education for a combined total of 675 children in attendance. Evan assisted with a training that helped educators with Broken Arrow Public Schools System teach about forest ecology and conservation using the Project Learning Tree Book. Evan assisted with the Job Readiness Career Competition in Tulsa as a judge for the horticulture event. Evan and Connie also attended the ISA TRAQ Training in Georgia. Connie participated as member on 2023 SAF Certification Exam Committee for two days to set standard of performance for SAF Exam.

Connie assisted five landowners last month and Evan assisted seven landowners regarding tree health and management options.



EAST CENTRAL AREA

Forest Protection Highlights:

Since the last board report date of March 31, 2023, the East Central Area has extinguished 14 fires which burned 1,996 acres with an average fire size of 142 acres. Five (5) primary structures at a total value of \$500,000 were threatened by wildfire but protected by OFS during suppression activities.

Prescribed Fire:

- East Central Rangers completed prescribed fires for eight private landowners, treating a total of 1,141 acres. Four (4) prescribed burn plans were completed covering 694 acres.
- East Central Rangers also assisted with the prescribed burn on Units 1 and 2 at Turkey Mountain in Tulsa.



East Central Area Forest Management Highlights:

- East Central rangers assisted with the fuels mitigation project at Turkey Mountain in Tulsa.
- During the reporting period one new forest stewardship plan was completed on a total of 339 acres.



Information / Education Highlights:

East Central Area foresters and rangers participated in local events that included the Old Timer's Day in Monroe and Kid's Fishing Derby's in Pittsburg and Haskell County. This is a community event that helps get school-age children outdoors and highlights recreational opportunities available to them.

Foresters Eddie Woods and Tommy Frampton assisted with the SE District FFA forestry judging contest at Beaver's Bend. They, along w/ East Central Area Rangers also set up and ran the Kiamichi Tech FFA forestry judging contest at Talihina. Eddie also set up and ran the State FFA and 4-H forestry judging contests.

Eddie also participated in the Blue Thumb Q&A in McAlester and water quality monitoring and the SAF field day at Pushmataha WMA.

EC also set up an OFS booth at the Simply Ag event in McAlester which is an educational event for both adults and children that highlights agriculture and its' commodities in SE Oklahoma.





Personnel update:

The Quinton unit Ranger vacancy was filled by EC's newest ranger Brett Boland on April 10, 2023.

Since the last board report, EC has had another ranger position vacated. Drake Smith, who hired on in January in the Adamson unit, left OFS employment for a law enforcement position in Atoka county. This vacancy is currently posted and OFS is accepting applicants for the position.

OSU NREM Capstone update:

OSU students completed their senior capstone forest management plans and presented them to the landowners, OSU professors, and OFS foresters Caleb Fields and Riley Coy on May 3rd. The students gained valuable, real world experience through this project and received positive feedback from all involved. Discussion is in progress regarding OFS foresters helping to provide even more guidance to OSU capstone students in the future. Thank you to Dr. Ryan Desantis and the students for involving OFS and for all their hard work in putting together the plans for the landowners.

Safety / Training Highlights:

When not fighting fire or conducting prescribed burns, OFS employees also attend training to enhance their firefighting knowledge, skills, and abilities. New employee, Brett Boland, completed S-130/S-190/L-180 in order to provide a presence on the fireline in support of wildfires and prescribed fire activities. These courses train new firefighters in basic firefighting skills.

An assortment of OFS rangers are also currently attending *S-212 Wildland Fire Chainsaws*, *S-290 Intermediate Wildland Fire Behavior*, *S-390 Introduction to Wildland Fire Behavior Calculations*, and *L-280 Followership to Leadership* at the Arkansas River Valley Wildland Fire Academy in Russellville, AR to advance their roles in wildland fire and prescribed fire.

This year the academy offered courses for wildland firefighters from all wildland fire agencies ranging from 4 to 40 hours in length. Each course is taught by instructors from state and federal agencies, allowing the academy to provide unique experiences as well as a wealth of professional knowledge and abilities to each course. OFS has several rangers serving in instructor roles at the academy.



Ongoing Issues:

- Filling vacancies, retaining employees, new Class A CDL requirements, and new employee training will be our most pressing issues. A recurring theme within the past several years are employees leaving employment with OFS to seek higher paying jobs elsewhere.
- On a positive note, OFS has been in discussion with ODOT and other state forestry agencies regarding Entry Level Driver Training (ELDT) requirements. These federal requirements were implemented in February 2022 and require CDL applicants to take training that consists of theory and behind-the-wheel training. This is a 5-week course and costs ran from \$4,800-\$5,800 per employee. OFS will register to become a training provider for our employees and have designated Rangers to attend training to become federally-certified instructors.

PESTICIDE SECTION

Pesticide Registration Activity

Pesticide registrations for April 1st to May 11th, 2023 are presented in the following chart. A total of 2515 products were registered, of the products registered 2379 were renewals and 136 were new. There were 142 products cancelled.



Pesticide Samples

Pesticide samples taken March-April 2023 are presented in the following chart. A total of 36 Residue, 8 Concentrate, 4 Plant Food, and 4 Tank mix samples were taken.



Along with the above inspections CPS inspectors also took 25 nonagricultural use samples, 18 agricultural use samples, 4 nonagricultural follow up samples and 5 marketplace samples for a total of 52 samples.

Unwanted Pesticide Disposal

ODAFF held two unwanted pesticide disposals the first on April 25th in McAlester at the Southeast Expo Center, the second was held April 27th in Kingfisher at the Kingfisher County Fairgrounds. The collection was scheduled from 8:00am until 1:00pm. The McAlester event collected 2,472 pounds and the Kingfisher event collected over 38,000 pounds. ODAFF started the Unwanted Pesticide Disposal Program in 2006, since the start of the program ODAFF has collected almost 1.3 million pounds of unwanted pesticides. ODAFF works with our hazardous waste contractor, CleanEarth to dispose of these pesticides properly.

Pesticide Testing & Updates

<u>Licensing & Certification:</u>

There are currently 2,014 active pesticide applicator licenses. There are 93 licenses under stop work order for nonrenewal in 2023.

Categories expiring this year – 1a-Ag Plant, A-Aerial, 7b-Structural Pest, 10-Demonstration & Research, and Private Applicators. CEU renewal letters will be sent out in September and again in November.

Private Applicators will be allowed to start retesting July 1st. Letters will be sent out to all active private applicators before July with new testing procedures and renewal information for those receiving CEUs

Phytophthora ramorum Survey

Means Nursery, a *P. ramorum* positive nursery in Oregon, continues their Spring shipments to Lowe's stores in Oklahoma. Inspectors are checking these plants as they come in to make sure they're symptom-free when they reach the state.

We are also checking local nurseries and garden centers host-associated plants (HAP). HAP include Azalea, Rhododendron, Pieris, Camellia, Kalmia, Viburnum, and Lilac.

Chrysanthemum White Rust

An Oklahoma, Chrysanthemum grower has been subject to various trace-forward and track-back events over the last few years concerning Chrysanthemum White Rust, a federally regulated disease caused by the fungus *Puccinia horiana*. The disease has never been found at his operation, but we are collecting data, inspecting each variety, and taking samples each month. We concluded our sampling in April, having inspected over 160 varieties of mums and collected 81 samples since January. All samples have come back negative for CWR. We will keep the data on file.

Japanese Beetle Survey

CPS will have 5 inspectors that are trapping for the Japanese Beetle survey this year, which begins at the end of May. They will place 42 traps over 7 counties. The traps will be checked every 2 weeks in June & July, and once per month in August and September. The traps will be removed at the end of September. Data will be collected and kept on file for use with compliance agreements and shipping certificates regarding Japanese Beetle compliance in other states.

vegetables, and hanging baskets. They supply many Nursery operations in Oklahoma, including Atwoods, as well as nurseries in Kansas, Texas, Colorado, Arkansas, and Missouri. They have several compliance agreements with ODAFF.

<u>Hemp</u>

Currently receiving some grower applications for both indoor and outdoor. We are currently at 19 active growers, 10,389sqft, and 250 acres.

Apiary

The USDA/ODAFF 2023 National Honeybee Survey begins this month. We have received our supplies and will begin sampling various apiaries around the state for the remainder of the year. Our first sample will be conducted in Edmond. The samples we take including some live bees will be shipped to the University of Maryland for further assessment. Figure 5 is an example of what is contained within each sample box.

Environmental Resource Program

On March 3rd, 2023, ODAFF inspector, Keith Neugebauer investigated a complaint reporting a pesticide spill starting approximately 0.4 miles north of 67th Street and Tinney Road in Lawton, OK. Upon arrival, the inspector noticed the spill and followed the dye trail, which ended at the lawn company Rid a Weed/ Ultra Green in Walters, OK. The dye trail extended approximately 23 miles long. During the investigation, a water sample was collected at a puddled area at the intersection of 67th Street and Highway 36. Various pesticide residues, including 2,4-D, dicamba and MCPA, were detected in the sample. A letter of warning was issued to the Rid a Weed/ Ultra Green for label violations regarding the spill.

AGRICULTURE RESOURCE SECTION

Weights & Measures Program

During this period the large capacity scale technicians tested 4 vehicle scales and 45 ranch scales, 2 of the vehicle scales were rejected for repairs and 7 ranch scales were also rejected. The ranch scale testing program has been completed and we are concentrating on checking vehicle scales at Coops and grain elevators prior to the start of wheat harvest.

CPS inspectors checked a total of 1281 small scales and 24 platform scales, 21 of the scales were rejected. There were 20 random pack inspections and 71 standard pack inspections conducted that resulted in 3 companies receiving letters of warning. Additionally, 102 price verification inspections were conducted at various retailers that resulted in 2 companies receiving letters of warning.

One company received a Stop Work order for operating without a Service Agent license.

Feed Program

Program Performance

During this reporting period there were a total of 203 official feed samples analyzed, with 966 feed determinations made from these samples. These determinations resulted in the issuance of 42 violations for feeds or feed ingredients that did not meet established tolerances based on their guaranteed analysis. Most of these violations were issued for products deficient in Calcium. Other violation includes Crude Fat, Crude Fiber, Vitamin A, Phosphorus, Crude Protein, Salt, Copper, Manganese, and Zinc. Twenty-Eight stop sale orders were issued for feed products with severe deviations from their guaranteed analysis. Seven stop sales were issued for products deficient in Vitamin A. Six stop sales were issued for products deficient in Salt. Five stop sales were issued for products deficient in Crude Fat. Two stop sales were issued for products deficient in Zinc. One stop sale was issued for a product deficient in Phosphorus. One stop sale was issued for a product deficient in Crude Protein. One stop sale was issued for a product with excessive levels of Crude Fiber.

The following tables show a two-month comparison of label violations and stop sale orders issued by the Department for feed products that did not meet their guaranteed analysis.

Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry Animal Industry Services Board Report June 1, 2023 Activities April 1, 2023 – May 12, 2023

Animal Disease Traceability:

We continue to distribute the free RFID tags to interested veterinarians and producers. During this time, we shipped 3,820 tags to veterinarians and producers.

During this time, we selected wand recipients to receive the RFID wands purchased with ADT supplemental funding. 42 veterinary clinics were selected. Of these, 32 clinics received the Allflex AWR300 wand and 10 clinics received the Allflex LPR wand. We are currently working with the livestock market veterinarians to demonstrate the wands and provide an option for the wand of their choice in order to be prepared for the EID transition when the proposed rule is finalized. Any remaining wands after the markets are outfitted, will then be allocated to veterinarians and/or producers.

The comment period for the proposed changes to the ADT rule has closed. Comments are being reviewed. If adopted, we anticipate the rule will be published in late summer. The implementation date will be 180 days after the final rule is published.

Aquaculture:

We have finalized aquaculture renewals. We currently have 16 facilities that have renewed their licenses. A Letter of Warning was sent to three aquaculture producers who failed to renew their licenses. The letters resulted in the close out of 2 facilities.

Biologics:

During this time, biological product renewals were finalized. Stop Sales Notices were automatically generated for 4 companies that did not register products before the expiration date. 3 of the 4 companies renewed after receiving the notices. The last company does not have any biological products for distribution or sale in Oklahoma. This registration period resulted in 785 biological products being renewed, 11 products cancelled, and 21 new products registered. This resulted in \$161,200 in registration fees and \$2,000 in late fees.

Cattle Programs:

Brucellosis:

On May 8 I was notified of a positive Brucellosis test in a cow from McCurtain County. The group of cattle the cow is with are quarantined and we're waiting from confirmatory testing by National Veterinary Services Laboratory in Ames, IA.

The only remaining reservoir of *B abortus* in the U.S. is in elk and bison in the Greater Yellowstone Park area. Those states have Designated Surveillance Areas, where the disease in wildlife occasionally spills over into domestic cattle and bison.


While there is very little need to test for *B abortus* any longer, this means we have very little or no surveillance for *Brucella suis* (Swine Brucellosis) in cattle, which currently infects approximately 20% of the feral swine that our Wildlife Services personnel test. *B suis* can, and does, infect cattle occasionally.

Tuberculosis:

We currently have no TB affected herds in Oklahoma.

Trichomoniasis:

During this period there were 3,003 Oklahoma bulls tested for Trichomoniasis with five positive individuals found.



9,337 bulls tested / 11 positive = 0.12% positive

Our current statistics compare to 2.1% positive bulls in 2011, 1.4% in 2012, 1.3% in 2013, 1.4% in 2014, 1.1% in 2015, 1.1% in 2016, 0.5% in 2017, 0.32% in 2018, 0.42% in 2019, 0.35% in 2020, 0.28% in 2021, and 0.3% in 2022.

Johne's Disease:

During our reporting period we received seven new positive affected herds but a total of nine positive reports. Over the last eight years the number of new positive premises has remained basically the same, but the number of multiple positive reports is significantly less, average 1.5 the last two years verses 5.2 the previous six years. It is difficult to know if infected herd owners are simply recognizing the disease and culling animals rather than test or if management is improving.

Emergency Management:

During this timeframe, Dr. Gorczyca worked with OK Medical Reserve Corps to submit a state application for the MRC-STRRONG award. The application, if awarded, would provide necessary funding to host training opportunities for the State Animal Response Team volunteers.

On April 1, Dr. Gorczyca assisted the Payne County Animal Response Team and the OSU CVM to conduct an emergency animal sheltering exercise utilizing veterinary students.

On April 6, the National Pork Board depopulation and disposal exercise team held a planning call with the proposed host producer, Hanor, to introduce the concept of the exercise and to answer any questions. On April 12, a Foreign Animal Disease disposal option webinar was provided to the NPB depopulation and disposal exercise team along with the host producer, Hanor. On May 2, a depopulation webinar was conducted for the host producer to assist with selection of the method of depopulation for the exercise. We held the regular planning team meeting on April 27. The timeframe to conduct this exercise has moved up significantly due to concerns of endemic diseases commonly seen on hog farms in the fall. The exercise will now be held August 10-11 and then conclude on August 14-15.

On April 13 and May 11, Dr. Gorczyca hosted the Multistate Partnership (MSP) for Security in Agriculture monthly call.

On April 18-20, Dr. Gorczyca and Dr. Ruby attended the Regional State Agricultural Emergency Management meeting, "Regional Ruckus", in Charlotte, NC. This meeting brought together Ag emergency managers from 29 different states along with federal partners to discuss gaps in planning efforts and how to collaborate to assist planning efforts in all states.

On April 20 Dr. Gorczyca and I fielded several calls related to livestock injured in the tornado the night before at Cole, OK. We were able to connect the callers to the appropriate emergency responders.

Equine Programs:

There are no reported cases or quarantines for CEM in Oklahoma There is one known Piroplasmosis case in Oklahoma. There is one known Equine Infectious Anemia case in Oklahoma

On April 20 I was notified that a horse that became ill and died on April 17 at the National Reining Breeders Classic show at the Tulsa Expo Square was confirmed to have Equine Herpes Virus. Dr. Zeke Proctor with USDA Veterinary Services began an epidemiological investigation that night and removed the horses that were most likely exposed to an isolation area. Those horses were tested and thankfully all were negative. The horses at the event were quarantined until we could gather more information and contact State Veterinarians in the 22 states that sent horses to the event. A product that

has proven anecdotally to eliminate shedding of the virus by infected horses was offered, and almost 600 horses were treated with it. By mid afternoon May 22 we had no reports of other symptomatic horses and the State Veterinarians had the information on the trainers from their states who had horses there. They gave permission for the horses to come back to their states under quarantine to be isolated and monitored. Thankfully, no other horses became ill. The isolation period ended on May 8th and no additional cases of EHV-1 were reported.

Oklahoma has one horse that has been confirmed to be positive for both Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) and Equine Piroplasmosis (EP). The infected horse is a 3-year-old racing quarter horse. There is no history of this horse participating in sanctioned racing in the United States and is known to have originated from Mexico. It is likely she was illegally imported into the United States and transported to a farm in Oklahoma with the intent to participate in unsanctioned racing. Because EIA is not treatable, options for this horse are lifelong quarantine in an area with a minimum distance of 200 yards from any other equine or euthanasia. If the owner opts to quarantine, the dual infection with EP will require that the horse be treated with an acaricide (tick preventive) year round, the vegetation in the quarantine area must be kept less than 4 inches tall, and a 10 foot barrier with no vegetation must surround the area of quarantine. We are working with the owner to determine if the requirements for quarantine can be met. Animal Industry and USDA field staff are working closely with the owner and neighbors to determine additionally exposed equine and implement testing to look for additional cases.

Farmed Cervidae Programs:

AIS continues to process Farmed Cervidae license renewals and schedule premises inspections for our cervidae producers. Letters of Warning were mailed out on April 21, 2023 to producers who have not submitted their annual renewals.

In the course of renewals for our monitored herds, laboratory results for tuberculosis testing have revealed that two herds have animals that have non-negative test results. Those premises continue to be under quarantine at this time.

Dana Call and I met with Oklahoma Elk producer Jason Parrish, who brought guests from New Zealand to discuss the possibility of establishing a premier farmed cervidae facility in Oklahoma. Hamish Fraser, CEO of Venator and Dr. Jeff Ward, Geneticist for Venator, discussed their ideas for a second operational facility here.

We've been in communication with white tail deer producers that are interested in pursuing funding from the USDA for antemortem testing research for Chronic Wasting Disease. Dr. Gorczyca and Dana Call attended a virtual information session hosted by the USDA regarding the process for requesting grant funding for this project.

A bill signed by Governor Stitt has removed the import and export restrictions that were previously in place for Whitetail Deer. Oklahoma producers are now free to import whitetail deer from Texas, Florida, New York, Pennsylvania and Indiana, so long as all

other import requirements are satisfied. The Cervidae Entry Permit Application has been updated to reflect this change.

Feral Swine:

AIS continues to process feral swine sporting facility and handling facility license renewals. Letters of Warning were mailed out on April 26, 2023 to facilities who have not submitted their annual renewal applications. There continues to be a high volume of feral swine hunter license requests.

Foreign Animal Disease:

There were three FAD investigations during this time.

One was for a backyard flock of chickens that had a high death loss. One was a small rabbit breeding operation that had several rabbits die suddenly. Thankfully, neither of these were diagnosed as a FAD.

The third case was a horse that tested positive for Equine Infectious Anemia. This was a quarter horse recently imported from Mexico. Since we see a fairly high incidence of a FAD called Piroplasmosis in horses infected with EIA, we tested for Piroplasmosis and it was positive. There is no treatment for EIA. We are encouraging the owner to euthanize the horse, but so far he is attempting to find a place to quarantine the horses at least 200 yards from any other horses.

The 2022 incursion of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza is continuing in the United States but confirmed cases appear to be declining with no reported cases in commercial poultry in the last month. Oklahoma has not had a confirmed case since December of 2022. We continue to investigate sick bird calls to test for Avian Influenza and encourage flock owners to report any clinical symptoms consistent with AI infection.

We continue to be part of three separate working groups that are planning to respond to African Swine Fever in case the disease makes it to the USA. This has gained greater significance due to the finding of ASF in the Dominican Republic and Haiti.

Livestock Market Audits:

During this period, one new livestock market license was issued to Okmulgee Livestock Auction. Blaze Simonson has leased the facility with plans to have periodic horse sales and a goat/sheep sale twice monthly. Mr. Simonson has completed the registration process with ODAFF, as well as USDA Packers and Stockyards. Okmulgee Livestock Auction has a horse sale scheduled for May 14 and their first sheep and goat sale on May 23rd.

Jeff Scott has continued to work with Tara Sanders of JT Livestock. Ms. Sanders is currently registered as a livestock dealer with USDA and is operating as such at the Overbrook, Oklahoma facility, with plans to eventually host a monthly horse sale. At this point in time, JT Livestock has not submitted any paperwork to become a licensed livestock market.

Although only one market application was received this month, packets were requested by a of couple of others interested in sale barn ownership. This period also allowed for the completion of a new market orientation as well as a number of custodial account reviews.

Outreach:

On April 5 our Field Staff was in for our quarterly meeting. We discussed upcoming changes to over the counter antibiotics, new livestock markets, they got their laptop computers updated, and several other tasks.

On April 18 I attended a virtual meeting of the National Assembly of State Animal Health Officials. About 20 of the State Veterinarians were attending the National Institute of Animal Agriculture meeting and met to discuss some issues that we are all dealing with.

On April 24 I was interviewed by Tulsa News 6 about the case of Equine Herpes Virus at Tulsa Expo Square.

On May 1 Dr. Stone presented to the Perkins 4-H and FFA community meeting. He presented an overview of regulatory medicine, agricultural improvement in America, biosecurity and protecting our food supply using HPAI as an example. He illustrated how it gets to the US, how it spreads, and what we can do to reduce risk. The group of 30 consisted of about half high school students and half adults. The group remained engaged and had a number of good really questions were asked.

On May 4 I traveled to Stillwater to attend the Oklahoma Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory Board of Advisors Meeting.

On May 5 I was interviewed by Savannah Magoteaux from Oklahoma Farm and Ranch magazine.

On May 10 I traveled to Stillwater to assist USDA Veterinary Services personnel in teaching an orientation class to begin the accreditation process to perform regulatory work. After the accreditation orientation, students who are staying in Oklahoma and will be doing some bovine work stayed and I gave them a presentation about our Trichomoniasis program so they can be approved to perform regulatory Trichomoniasis testing.

Poultry Programs:

There have been 27 sick or dead birds submitted for our sick bird/dead bird program since the last board report, for a total of 51 cases this year.

We held six Poultry Tester Training classes at various locations around the state and certified 52 Poultry Testers.

Public Health

There is nothing to report during this time.

Rabies in Livestock:

There have been no new cases of rabies in livestock since the last report.

Sheep and Goat Programs:

There were no significant activities in this program.

Swine Programs:

On April 10 We hosted a virtual meeting of ODAFF personnel, OYE personnel, Oklahoma Pork Council personnel, and two private veterinarians to discuss the cases of Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea at OYE and how to minimize the potential for the disease to negatively impact the event in the future. The discussion was good and we have some plans as we move forward.

Veterinarians are beginning to use the online swine test charts OADDL has provided for swine testing. OADDL is sending electronic copies to the designated e-mail for AIS. There have been no issues with the initial transition. Letters of Warning were mailed out on April 27, 2023, to V/Q herd participants that have not updated their herd inventory for the program.

Miscellaneous:

On April 21 the Jackson County Sheriff's office contacted Dr. Stone for help in handling an exotic petting zoo monkey that bit a visitor. Dr. Stone and Oklahoma State Public Health Veterinarian Dr. LeMac' Morris worked together to get the animal quarantined and local health officials and veterinarians involved.

On April 27 I attended the ODAFF Directors Retreat at Hamm Institute for American Energy. We discussed how to communicate better with our stakeholders and received some good tips on conducting interviews.

On April 27 I was contacted by an employee of a bank in Pontotoc County. The bank is the trustee of land that was owned by a deceased client of theirs. They were getting complaints about cattle that were not authorized to be on the land being in poor condition. I assigned our Livestock Inspector, Robbie Sanders to meet with a representative of the bank and a deputy from Garvin County to assess the situation. Robbie and the others visited the premises on May 9. Robbie reported that some of the cows were thinner than they should be but most were in acceptable body condition. With grass coming he

believes the cattle have adequate feed. I reported back to the bank and told them there is currently no evidence of any reportable disease or mistreatment of the cattle and advised them to seek legal counsel for assistance with removing the cattle.

On May 5th the Texas County Sheriff requested help with an investigation of excessive animal deaths that involved cattle stolen by bogus check by a Texas county man. The cattle originated from an Okmulgee County producer. Neighbors reported the death and deteriorating condition.

On one premise of about Dr. Stone found 5 dead and 28 live cows: 7 dead young calves and 35 live young calves from a shipment of 139 cows and 46 calves. Multiple premises are involved but not all had been identified at the time of Dr. Stone's investigation. Cause of death could not be determined in most cases because of severe decomposition. However, it appears that the cattle were dropped into a pasture and were not able to find water for up to 10 days. Some of the cows were calving during this time. The lack of water created enough dehydration to severely limit milk supply. Calves were starving as well as not receiving adequate colostrum. Official identification on any of the animals was a complicating factor throughout the investigation. A report has been sent to Texas County for the district attorney's use.

The man has been arrested and multiple charges filed.

On May 9 Drs. Gorczyca-Southerland, Ruby, and I cooked a meal for our Administrative Professionals and served it for lunch. We had intended to do it the last week of April during Administrative Professionals Week, but there were too many other things going on to do it then. We had an enjoyable time celebrating the great team we have.

Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry Wildlife Services Division Board Report for April 2023 Activities

Introduction

Wildlife Services (WS) responds to damage complaints caused by wildlife to resources or property throughout Oklahoma. WS Specialists conduct operational damage management programs for many of the complaints they receive to resolve these wildlife damage problems. During this period, these projects were conducted on 548 properties with an estimated 2,332,143 acres of land under agreement. Additionally, WS helped 167 persons and entities with technical assistance which involved providing information to cooperators so they can resolve problems themselves. Cooperators reported and WS Specialists verified wildlife damage of \$420,597 during this period. Beaver damages accounted for losses totaling \$188,157. Coyotes were responsible for a number of damage requests, primarily to livestock, with losses totaling \$35,645. Feral swine damages accounted for losses totaling \$192,695, while other species of wildlife were responsible for \$4,100 in damages to property, agriculture, and livestock.




Figure 1: Species Removed in West District by percentage during April 2023




Figure 2: Species Removed in the East District by percentage during April 2023




Figure 3: Species Removed in the Central District by percentage during April 2023




Figure 4: Species Removed in the State by percentage during April 2023

Covote Damage Management

Comanche County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes depredating on his goats. The producer reported that coyotes had killed one goat valued at \$186. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Comanche County responded to the request and examined the carcasses and confirmed coyotes were responsible for the loss of the goat. The Specialist used leg hold traps and snares to remove six coyotes. Control efforts continue to prevent additional losses.

Woodward County landowner requested assistance with coyotes depredating on his calves. The landowner reported coyotes had killed two calves valued \$1,700. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Woodward County examined one of the carcasses and verified coyotes were responsible for the loss of the calf. Damage management efforts were successful in removing eleven coyotes from the property. Control efforts continue to help further reduce the threat to the cooperator's calves.

Texas County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes depredating on his calves. The producer reported coyotes killed one calf valued at \$900. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Texas County responded to the request and examined on of the carcass and confirmed coyotes were responsible for the loss of the calf. Control efforts have removed five coyotes and are continuing at this time to further reduce predation losses to coyotes for the producer.

Feral Swine Damage Management

Ellis County landowner requested assistance with feral swine that were destroying stored haybales. The landowner estimated that feral swine were responsible for \$900 in damage to his hay. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Ellis County responded to the request and verified feral swine were responsible for the damage. The Specialist utilized a live trap to remove thirty-one feral swine

from the area. Feral swine activity in this area is closely being monitored to determine if further management is needed.

Greer County landowner contacted WS needing assistance with feral swine rooting in his pastures. The landowner estimated that feral swine rooted up twenty acres valued at \$5,000 in damages. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Greer County responded to the request and verified feral swine were responsible for the damage. A live trap was used to remove twenty-seven feral swine from the property. No additional damage has occurred and feral swine population in the area is being monitored to determine if additional management is needed.

Blaine County farmer requested assistance with feral swine causing damage in his pastures. The farmer reported that feral swine are responsible for \$2,800 in damages to his pastures. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Blaine County responded to the request and his field inspection verified feral swine were responsible for the damages to the pastures. The Specialist used a live trap to remove twenty-three feral swine from the property. This area continues to be monitored for feral swine activity to determine if additional management efforts are needed to further reduce damage.

McCurtain County producer called WS for assistance with feral swine. He reported that the feral swine were consuming his corn as soon as he planted it in the field. The damage was verified and estimated at \$4,000 in crop and production loss. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed, and twenty-five feral swine have been removed to date. This project is still being monitored.

Washington County producer called WS for assistance with feral swine. The owner reported seeing several feral swine and had found significant damage to his pasture. The feral swine activity on the property was confirmed and rooting damage to the cattle pastures was estimated at \$3,200. After pre-baiting, a remote camera trap was placed and sixteen feral swine have been removed. This project is still being monitored.

Seminole County rancher called WS for feral swine damage to the owner's cattle pasture. The damage was verified and estimated at \$6,000. After pre-baiting, a remote camera trap was placed, and thirty-six feral swine were removed.

Noble County landowner contacted WS with concerns regarding feral swine damage. The landowner reported seeing signs of damage in a corn field that was just planted. A WS Specialist responded to the report and verified the damage. The damage is estimated to be 1 acre worth \$440. The Specialist used thermal hunting to remove seven feral swine. Work continues currently.

Pawnee County producer contacted WS because of feral swine consumighis wheat crop. WS set a feral swine trap in the area with the most recent damage. During the following week several feral swine were caught. Work will continue in this area and damage was estimated to 10 acres of wheat valued at \$1326.

Aerial Operations

Aerial operations were conducted in *Washita and Custer Counties* in response to multiple farmers and ranchers requesting feral swine damage management. The Specialist for the counties reported damage to wheat fields and pastures totaling \$5,000. To reduce damage in this area the

helicopter was utilized for 5.3 flying hours to remove one hundred and ninety-three feral swine. This area will be closely monitored to determine if additional aerial operations are needed.

Aerial operations were conducted in *Custer and Blaine Counties*. The area flown historically has high levels of feral swine damage to corn and milo production. To help reduce feral swine damage in these areas the helicopter was utilized to reduce feral swine populations prior to planting season. Aerial operations were conducted for six flight hours to remove one hundred and thirty-three feral swine. Feral swine activity will be closely monitored in the area to determine if additional operations are needed.

Beaver Damage Management

Blaine County Road Commissioner contacted WS for assistance with beaver that were responsible for damming a culvert on one of the roads in his district. The Commissioner estimated the damage to the road to be valued at \$2,000. The Specialist for Blaine County responded and verified beaver were responsible for damage. Control measures used by the Specialist were successful in removing eight beavers from the area to help reduce any additional damage to the road structure.

Custer County Road Commissioner contacted WS for assistance with beaver that were responsible for damming up a road culvert and causing damage to the road structure. The Commissioner estimated the damage to the road to be valued at \$3,000. The Specialist for Custer County responded and verified beavers were responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing four beavers from the creek to help reduce any additional damage to road structure.

Beckham County landowner contacted WS for assistance with beavers that were responsible for burrowing into his pond dam on his property. The landowner estimated the damage to the pasture to be valued at \$3,000. The Specialist for Beckham County responded and verified beaver were responsible for damage. Control measures used by the Specialist were successful in removing six beavers from the pond to help reduce any additional damage to the pond dam structure.

Rogers County producer called WS for assistance with beavers. He reported losing several trees and damming activity on his stock pond. The damage was verified and estimated at \$4,500. Neck snares and spotlight/shooting were used to remove several beavers form the pond. This project is still being monitored. The owner was advised on exclusion/barriers that may help protect his trees.

Ottawa County producer called WS for assistance with beavers when he found tree damage and other beaver sign on a drainage ditch. The flooding, tree damage, and burrowing into the dam was verified and estimated at \$15,000. Conibear traps were placed and two beavers were removed to date. The owner was advised to remove the beaver dam to deter future beaver issues.

Pittsburg County rancher called WS for assistance with beavers when he noticed flooding issues on his property. The beaver flooding damage was verified and burrowing into the stock pond was also found, combined with tree losses the damages totaled \$2,500. Conibear traps were placed, and three beavers were removed to alleviate the damages. This project concluded and the owner was advised to remove the beaver dam to deter future beaver activity.

Love County Commissioner called and requested assistance with beavers damming culverts. Beavers had water flooding the roadway causing and estimated \$1000 in damages. Body grip traps were used and five beavers have been removed.

Johnston County property owner contacted WS about beavers cutting down their trees and clogging up their drain pipes. Estimated damages were valued at \$2,500. Body grip traps were set and seven beavers have been caught to date.

Black Vulture Management

Hughes County rancher that had previously suffered calf losses from Black vultures called WS for assistance when he noticed large numbers of vultures around his cattle. The vulture threat was verified and a vulture trap was set on the property. To date, 157 black vultures have been removed from this property to reduce the risk of calf loss. This project is still being monitored and the preventative work has successfully kept calf losses down to nothing.

Delaware County rancher called WS for assistance with Black vultures. The owner reported losing six calves to the vultures and a large number of vultures was verified on the property. The owner purchased the supplies and WS assisted in constructing two vulture traps on the property. Two more calves were found and verified as losses to bring the total estimated losses to \$7,000. To date, 84 black vultures have been removed to alleviate the damage. This project is still being monitored.

April 2023 Activity Report for June 2023 Board Meeting

Agricultural Statistics Division

General

Rainfall totals the **first full week of April** in Oklahoma averaged 0.06 of an inch. According to the April 4th US Drought Monitor Report, drought conditions were rated 60 percent abnormally dry to exceptional drought, down 26 points from last year. Additionally, 54 percent of the state was in the moderate drought to exceptional drought categories, down 22 points from the previous year. Statewide, temperatures averaged in the 50's. Topsoil moisture conditions were rated very short to short and subsoil moisture conditions were rated very short to adequate.

Small grains continue to be stressed due to little rainfall and warm temperatures. Rainfall totals the **second week of April** in Oklahoma averaged 0.04 of an inch. According to the April 11th US Drought Monitor Report, drought conditions were rated 60 percent abnormally dry to exceptional drought, down 25 points from last year. Additionally, 54 percent of the state was in the moderate drought to exceptional drought categories, down 20 points from the previous year. Statewide, temperatures averaged in the low 60's. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated very short to short.

Most of the state experienced severe storms which brought some rain and cooler temperatures. Rainfall totals the **third week of April** in Oklahoma averaged 0.12 of an inch. According to the April 18th US Drought Monitor Report, drought conditions were rated 64 percent abnormally dry to exceptional drought, down 17 points from last year. Additionally, 54 percent of the state was in the moderate drought to exceptional drought categories, down 19 points from the previous year. Statewide, temperatures averaged in the low 60's. Topsoil and subsoil moisture conditions were rated very short to short.

The state welcomed much needed rainfall for a majority of last week. Rainfall totals the **fouth** week of April in Oklahoma averaged 1.89 of an inch. According to the April 25th US Drought Monitor Report, drought conditions were rated 65 percent abnormally dry to exceptional drought, down 12 points from last year. Additionally, 54 percent of the state was in the moderate drought to exceptional drought categories, down 11 points from the previous year. Statewide, temperatures averaged in the low to mid 50's. Topsoil moisture conditions were rated adequate to short. Subsoil moisture conditions were rated very short to adequate.

Small Grains: Wheat continued to be cut for hay due to little grain development. Winter wheat jointing reached 92 percent, up 8 points from the previous year. Winter wheat headed reached 43 percent, up 6 points from the previous year but down 5 points from normal. Canola blooming reached 55 percent, down 5 points from the previous year and down 19 points from normal. Rye jointing reached 88 percent, up 2 points from the previous year but down 2 points from normal. Rye headed reached 53 percent. Oats jointing reached 63 percent, up 9 points from the previous year and up 11 points from normal. Oats headed reached 25 percent.

Row Crops: While the rainfall received might be too late for small grains, it will help provide needed moisture for row crops being planted. Corn planted reached 37 percent, up 6 points from the previous year and up 3 points from normal. Corn emerged reached 21 percent, up 15 points from the previous year and up 10 points from normal. Sorghum planted reached 16 percent, up 13 points from the previous year and up 10 points from normal. Soybeans planted reached 5 percent, down 10 points from the previous year and down 4 points from normal.

Pasture and Livestock: Pasture and range condition was rated at 62 percent very poor to fair. Livestock condition was rated at 77 percent fair to good.



Statistics: On May 12, 2023, the first look at the 2023 Wheat crop was published in the May Crop Production Report. Highlights include:

Wheat production for Oklahoma is forecast at 49.5 million bushels, down 28 percent from last year. Yield per acre is expected to average 23.0 bushels, down 5.0 bushels from the previous year. Acres expected to be harvested for grain, at 2.15 million acres, are down 12 percent from 2022.





Still, no price trends are available at this time. The Oklahoma Mesonet Drought Monitor shows we are at 10.09 percent in exceptional drought, 33.10 percent in an extreme drought, 48.07 percent in severe drought, and 52.47 percent in moderate, 60.81 percent in abnormally dry conditions, 39.19 percent that has no drought conditions.



FOOD SAFETY REPORT MAY 2023

POULTRY& EGG GRADING, PRODUCE AND ORGANIC SECTION

Poultry and Egg Section

In Broken Bow at Tyson Foods, USDA poultry grading was performed by ODAFF inspectors on 264,796 pounds of poultry – boneless/skinless leg meat and ground meat. ODAFF inspectors provided USDA Shell Egg grading on 32,590 dozen eggs at Cal-Maine Foods Inc. at Sulphur. ODAFF inspectors provided USDA poultry grading services on poultry products being shipped from National Steak & Poultry Quality Meats in Owasso. ODAFF inspectors also provided USDA poultry grading services on poultry products being shipped from OK Foods in Muldrow & Heavener. Also, routine egg quality inspections under the Oklahoma egg law were conducted.

Organic Foods Section

Organic inspectors completed compliance and certification inspections at:

- Nine organic crop producers
- One organic livestock producer
- Three organic processors
- Fourteen retail organic inspections

DAIRY SECTION

Dairy staff conducted routine inspections at dairy farms, dairy plants, performed equipment checks and collected farm and plant dairy samples throughout the state.

In April, Dairy Services staff represented The State of Oklahoma at The National Conference on Interstate Milk Shipments (NCIMS) held in Indianapolis, Indiana. NCIMS is where FDA, State and Industry collaborate, discuss potential or on-going public health issues, and vote on national milk related laws. The goal of this conference is to have the safest possible milk supply for all people. Participation in NCIMS is essential for The State of Oklahoma to participate in Grade A interstate milk commerce.

All dairy farm and dairy plant surveys are up to date; therefore, no additional surveys were conducted during this board report period.

The Oklahoma Dairy program will be participating in a National Drug Residue Monitoring Project with the FDA. All samples will be collected at random from bulk milk tankers and shipped to a 3rd party laboratory for anonymous sample preparation. This national study will help FDA determine if the current drug residue screening methods are effective or need to be expanded.

AMES

A request of \$30,000

The AEMS Division has obtained permission to contract with Ideagen, April 2023, to develop a program that will assist in the modernize of our operations. The development will take several months from May 2023 – March 2024 after which there will be an annual maintenance fee of \$30,000.

AEMS seeks approval to continue the contract with Ideagen beyond the programming and development stage to the support and maintenance which will begin March 2024. Ideagen is part of the Statewide contract.

Animal Industry

Oklahoma Veterinary Medical Association (OVMA) - \$70,000.00 – This is pass through funds from Oklahoma Tax Commission to OVMA to help lower income Oklahomans get their pets spayed and neutered. OVMA is the only entity in the State of Oklahoma that has the ability and contracts statewide to enhance pet sterilization effort is the OVMA. No other entity has access to veterinarians and humane organizations on a statewide basis.

USAHerds - \$29,000.00 – USAHerds maintenance contract allows us to receive yearly enhancements that make the USAHerds program more efficient, user friendly and to offer maintenance hours that we use to correct errors and problems and to personalize the program for us.

Acclaim Systems, Inc. - \$12,000.00 - This agreement provides use access for the State of Oklahoma to utilize the VET-CVI application for the duration of time listed in this maintenance agreement. Oklahoma must follow the intended use for this application and only approve accredited veterinarians within their state that meet the USDA requirements.

Consumer Protection Services

FY2024 Oklahoma Boll Weevil Eradication Organization - \$6,000.00

Food Services

Oklahoma State University Produce Safety Training Contract Approval --\$74,000

Outreach and education activities including teaching Produce Safety Alliance classes across the state, developing educational materials and videos, assisting farms with the On-Farm Readiness Review, measuring the effectiveness of these trainings to determine what topics need further training, and assisting ODAFF in identifying and outreach to farms that may need to comply with the law.

The Produce Safety Alliance class is the only class currently recognized by the FDA to satisfy the produce farm manager training portion of the produce safety rule. To teach this class, a team of certified trainers and a certified lead trainer is required, and OSU has several personnel certified to teach this class including the only lead trainer in the state. OSU currently assists us with teaching farms through the On-Farm Readiness Review. This program will provide an educational tool that can be taken to the individual farms and help them identify what areas they need to improve on to comply with the new law.

Win Wam computer software up keep for produce safety inspections \$5,400.00.

This computer program is used for completing FDA produce safety compliance inspections. This would be for updates and for software update fees. This would be paid for by the FDA Produce Grant.

Forestry Services

FY24 - \$10,000 Federal Funds

This request when approved will renew the Oklahoma Gardening Grant. This is a longstanding education and outreach grant sponsoring the popular Oklahoma Gardening program produced by OSU. This grant supports tree related educational programming. Without this purchase, we would lose an avenue of support and education. This purchase will be reimbursed through Federal funding.

FY24 - \$15,000 Federal Funds

Renew nonbinding contract with the Oklahoma Urban and Community Forestry Council to perform services to assist in implementation of the continuing education component of Oklahoma's Urban & Community Forestry program in accordance with federal grant program

intent. Without this program outreach and education related to urban forest management and individual tree care would be limited. This purchase will be reimbursed through Federal funding.

FY24 - \$60,000 Federal Funds

Award Federal pass-through funding to communities for the Urban and Community Forestry Grants – Up to \$60,000. These grants support projects related to advancing local community forestry programs. Without these projects, we would lose an avenue of community support and education. This purchase will be reimbursed through Federal funding.

FY24 - \$230,000 Federal Funds

Award Federal pass-through funding up to \$230,000 to assist financially-challenged cities, neighborhoods, and communities for recovery of winter ice storm and cold damage. These grants support projects related to helping lower income neighborhoods and non-profit entities recover from the damage, mitigate existing risks and replace lost tree cover from recent winter storms. Without these projects, we would lose an avenue of community support and education. This purchase will be reimbursed through Federal funding.

FY24 - \$100,000 Federal Funds

Award Federal pass-through funding up to \$100,000 to assist financially-challenged cities, neighborhoods, and communities with heat mitigation, promotion of food forests, increase equitable access to urban/community tree canopy and to promote other value and benefits of trees in communities. These grants support projects related to helping lower income neighborhoods and, non-profits. Without these projects, we would lose an avenue of community support and education. This purchase will be reimbursed through Federal funding.

FY24 - \$101,760 Federal Funds

Award Federal pass-through funding up to \$101,760 for tree canopy assessment and inventory project in Oklahoma City metropolitan area to determine canopy loss from 2020 ice storm, develop a plan to assist with storm water management, flooding and other safety issues. This project will assist in identifying forest health and other safety concerns. Without this project, an opportunity to improve the overall condition of forest cover in central Oklahoma and to improve safety of Oklahoma citizens will be lost. This purchase will be reimbursed through Federal funding.

FY24- \$8,000 Wildland Firefighting Helmets

OFS is in need of purchasing new wildland firefighting helmets for our firefighters. One hundred fifteen (115) helmets will be purchased through FedMall. New helmets are essential PPE for our

firefighters to ensure they are safe as they protect life and property while fighting wildfires across Oklahoma. The funds will be reimbursed through a federal grant.

FY24 - \$15,000

Aerial pesticide spray application to the seed production pine tree orchards at the Forest Tree Improvement Center at Idabel. Aerial pesticide spray will be applied to the cone crop in our genetically improved pine tree orchards. This will maximize the embryotic-material filled seed in the cones collected at the orchards by controlling cone worms and other seed insects. Aerial application of pesticide spray to the orchards will control these pests. Justification: Without this purchase, there will be a continued decline in the production of genetically-improved seed.

FY 24 Temporary Bridge Grant \$175,000 (purchase, cost-share, and pass-through)

Justification: Encourage the use of temporary bridges for stream crossings on timber harvesting and related forestry operations. This will help mitigate water quality impact by reducing erosion, sediment delivery, and stream bed disturbance. The use of temporary bridges will be encouraged by reducing the financial burden of purchasing temporary bridges by timber producing and harvesting entities through establishment of a bridge loaner program as well as a cost-share/pass-through program. Funding: All costs associated with the purchase and maintenance of the loaner bridges as well as the establishment of the cost-share/pass-through program will be reimbursed by the federal grant.

FY 24 - \$55,000

Purchase ESRI ArcGIS Online Licenses (Federal Grant) – Justification: This allows the OFS Incident Management Team and fire personnel to utilize Collector, giving our firefighters real-time wildland fire data exchange. Data collected from the Collector application gives firefighters an advantage on fighting fires, increases overall firefighter and public safety. This purchase also improves the State's wildland fire data which is necessary to receive federal National Fire Plan funding.

FY23 – Firefighting bulldozer, \$574,121 (Federal Funding–SFA Response)

Purchase two (2) Type 3, John Deere 650P bulldozers that will be used for state-wide wildfire response, suppression and mitigation activities. The horsepower and hydrostatic transmission of this type is well suited to the diverse wildland fuels and terrain present across all of Oklahoma. The size allows for easy transport on a truck with a dovetail bed enabling access to remote locations where fires occur. These dozers will be replacing a 2001 JD 650H (1649 hrs.) needing \$15,000 in repairs and a 2001 JD 450H (1400 hrs.) needing \$10,000 in repairs. Funding for this entire purchase will come the US Forest Service – FY21 SFA Response Grant (\$266,000) and FY22 SFA Response Grant (\$308,121) as part of an approved budget revision. (NOTE: This was

submitted for approval at the April Board of Agriculture Meeting. There was an error on the Fiscal Year funding information which required the resubmission for approval)

Brief description of the proposed expense, cost, its necessity, and any deadlines for approval. GovQA is a new product that will allow OGC and the rest of the agency to more easily and efficiently fill open records requests. It will allow all records requests to be filled electronically and will allow large files to easily be transferred electronically. It is an online product. In addition, it will allow ODAFF to invoice the requester for very large requests and allow the agency to recoup some funds for filling the requests.

Contract renewal for OGC Westlaw and Clear online legal research system FY 2024 effective 7/1/2023-6/30/2024. Contract not to exceed \$30,000.

- 1. Brief description of the proposed expense, cost, its necessity, and any deadlines for approval. Westlaw is a necessary legal research tool for the agency attorneys. It allows them to easily and quickly review federal, Oklahoma, and other states' case law and statutes to better serve the agency. CLEAR allows the Office of General Counsel and Investigative Services to search for addresses and other information regarding individuals for which we do not have good contact information.
- 2. Consequence(s) and cost (if any) if the proposed expense is not approved.

Without Westlaw, agency attorneys would be unable to efficiently research federal and state law, resulting in more time looking for information and less time actually completing projects and assisting the agency. Without CLEAR, Investigative Services would have a more difficult time investigating cases because of the time that would be spent searching for individuals. The Office of General Counsel would have a more difficult time finding individuals on enforcement matters.

Wildlife Services

\$ 20,000.00 - ODAFF Wildlife Services is requesting approval for the City of Norman Cooperative Agreement regarding the control of wildlife for the City.

\$106,500.00 - ODAFF Wildlife Services is requesting approval for fuel, maintenance and hangar rent for the two (2) Federal helicopters for FY24 that is used in the state's aerial control of wildlife. The breakdown is as follows:

- \$55,000 for fuel;
- \$4,800 hangar rent
- \$11,700 hangar rent
- \$35,000 maintenance

\$769,000.00 -ODAFF Wildlife Services is requesting approval for the cooperative agreement with USDA APHIS Wildlife Services which will provide damage management activities to farmers and ranchers in Oklahoma. Activities are related to damages incurred from feral swine, beavers, coyotes and avian predators. Not approving this agreement would mean significant financial loss to Oklahoma Agriculture due to wildlife damage.

\$68,000 - ODAFF Wildlife Services is requesting approval to purchase ten camera/panel trap systems to be utilized at feral swine trap locations, placed strategically across the state. These systems will allow for remote viewing of swine traps from any distance away. This will allow the wildlife specialist to also maintain bait levels at the traps without having to physically go and "check" the traps. The savings here in gas and mileage is significant. These systems will also allow the specialist to "drop" the door on swine traps when the trap has a significant number of pigs inside. A simple command to release the gate is functioned through an app or website. The specialist is alerted by text message that there are pigs in the trap, the live feed is turned on and if deemed necessary the door is remotely dropped.

Not approving of this purchase will mean we continue operating in a less efficient way. Currently, traps must be visited on a daily basis to see if pigs are caught or if more bait is required. This way of conducting trapping operations is a lot less efficient and costs the agency more dollars due to increased visits and mileage.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

- 2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on 9th day of March 2023 in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
- 3. Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) - 20. On the above mentioned date our inspector observed your application vehicle parked at 407 Janeway Ave. in Moore, OK.
- 21. The license listed on the vehicle belonged to a different commercial applicator company.
- 22. In addition, your company website lists on its website it lists weed control.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 23. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules 2 O.S. §3-82(A)(1) and 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15).
- 24. Title 2 O.S. §3-82(A)(1) states that "It shall be unlawful for any person to act, operate, or do business or advertise as a commercial, noncommercial, certified applicator, temporary certified applicator, service technician, or private applicator unless the person has obtained a valid applicator's license issued by the State Board of Agriculture for the category of pesticide application in which the person is engaged." You are in violation of this statute by not having the required license to apply commercial pesticide.
- 25. Title 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(15) state that (A)"It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture...(15) "Any person to act, operate, do business, or advertise as an applicator unless the person has obtained a valid license issued by the Board for the category in which the person is engaged." You may not act, operate, or advertise that you are a licensed applicator unless such license has been issued by ODAFF. On October 21, 2021 you were found to have been performing and advertising as a licensed applicator without having been licensed.

The inspection revealed that six (6) of the one hundred (100) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price.
- 23. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a second violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J). A letter of warning was sent.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

24. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of the aforementioned inspections is a violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(2) and is subject to the penalty provided in 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).

Additionally, there was not a closed transfer system, and the restricted use pesticide was unsecured, both a violation. Label requires transportation of the product by non-certified applicators to be secured from shifting and if less than 120 gallons the product must only be removed using a closed transfer system. Finally, this company is not licensed or certified and the applicator was not licensed and certified.

- 18. On or about the 7th day of September 2022, the Consumer Protection Services Division of the Department conducted a use inspection of your employee Jacob Crites in Lindsay, OK, who was driving an application vehicle with a spray tank full of mix.
- 19. Your company license expired on December 31, 2018.
- 20. During this inspection your employee informed our inspector that he was enroute to perform an application to an oilfield right-of-way.
- 21. The products in the tank mix were Gramoxone SL 3.0, Krovar IVM Herbicide, and Polaris Herbicide. Gramoxone SL 3.0 is a restricted use pesticide due to the acute toxicity of its active ingredient Paraquat. Gramoxone SL 3.0 can only be sold to and applied by certified

applicators, and the certified applicator must take Paraquat training prior to applying the product per its labeled use directions.

- 22. A sample of the tank mix was taken, and Imazapyr, Bromacil, Diuron, and Paraquat were detected.
- 23. Additionally, there was no closed transfer system on the truck and the 2.5-gallon container of Gramoxone SL 3.0 was unsecure on the flat bed of the truck.
- 24. The product's labeled directions for use requires that transportation of the product by non-certified applicators can only be done if the product is secure from shifting, and that if the container is less than 120 gallons the product must only be removed from the original container using a closed transfer system.
- 25. Operating commercially without a license and certification, an uncertified applicator applying a restricted use pesticide when the label requires that a certified applicator make the application, and the improper transportation and transfer of a restricted use pesticide as required by the label are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules: 2 O.S. § 3-82 (A)1; 2 O.S. § 3-86 (A)15; 2 O.S. § 3-86 (A)16; 2 O.S. § 3-86 (A)4; O.A.C. 35:30-17-25(a).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel ("OGC") of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

- 2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on 11th day of May 2023 in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
- 3. <u>Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.</u>

Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) Amendments to the pleadings; c.) the plan, schedule, and limitations of discovery; d.) Identification of admissions of fact to avoid unnecessary proof and cumulative evidence; e.) ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

- 17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.
- 18. On or about the 3rd day of January 2023, the Consumer Protective Services Division of the Department investigated after failure of the proper reports to be filed with the Department.
- 19. You have failed to provide current information to the Department.
- 20. Failed to provide a harvest report for each harvest.
- 21. Failed to allow inspection and testing by the Department.
- 22. Interfered with the inspection process, including, but not limited to, refusal to grant unrestricted access to a cultivation site, impeding the sampling of plants, or refusal or failure to fully cooperate with the Department's inspections.
- 23. Handled, processed, or sold non-compliant hemp which enters the stream of commerce.

24. Failed to disclose different varieties of Cannabis sativa L. (hemp) plants in a single growing area.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 25. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of multiple Oklahoma State Statutes and Rules of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture.
 - By failing to provide current information to the Department you are in violation of **O.A.C.** 35:30-24-6(a) which states: "Every licensee shall have a continuing obligation to provide current information to the Department. The licensee shall provide updated information if there is any material change to the information provided in the application within ten (10) days of the material change unless otherwise specified herein, including but not limited to, changes in personnel or contact information."
 - Failing to provide a harvest report for each harvest is a violation of O.A.C. 35:30-24-9, O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(2), 2 O.S. §3-406 which state:
 - i. O.A.C. 35:30-24-9: "(a) Not less than thirty (30) days prior to harvest, the licensee shall file a harvest report on a form provided by the Department and shall, at a minimum, contain the following information: (1) The name of the licensee and any associated subcontractors; (2) The location of the cultivation site or parts thereof wherever situated; (3) A description of each variety of industrial hemp growing at the cultivation site; (4) The expected date or dates of harvest for each variety of industrial hemp growing at the cultivation site; (5) The expected yield for each variety of industrial hemp planted at the cultivation site along with a description of the growing area in which each variety was planted sufficient to calculate the growing area in acres for outdoor cultivation or square feet for indoor cultivation; (6) A description of the intended use and disposition of the industrial hemp product, including but not limited to: (A) Whether the whole plant will be sold or otherwise transferred to a third party with sufficient

additional information for the Department to identify the price for a specific quantity of industrial hemp; (B) Whether individual plant parts rather than the whole plant will be sold or otherwise transferred to a third party with sufficient additional information for the Department to identify the price for a specific quantity of plant parts along with a description of the plant parts sold or transferred; (C) A general description of any mechanical, chemical, or other processing techniques applied to the whole plant before sale or transfer to a third party; (D) The name and contact information of the person or business entity to which the whole plant or plant parts will be sold or transferred; and (E) Whether the whole plant or any part thereof will be destroyed after harvest; (7) A description of fertilizers, pesticides, or other chemicals applied to each variety of industrial hemp planted at the cultivation site; (8) A description of irrigation or water management practices applied to each variety of industrial hemp planted at the cultivation site; (9) A description of tillage or ground preparation practices applied to each variety of industrial hemp planted at the cultivation site; and (10) A description of the environmental impacts and viability of each variety of industrial hemp planted along with any supporting documentation.

- i. O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(2): "(h) Violations of the Oklahoma Industrial Hemp Program and the rules of this subchapter shall include, but not be limited to, the following conduct: (2) Failure to timely, accurately, and truthfully complete and submit any application, report, or request for information from the Department."
- ii. 2 O.S. §3-406: "A. At least thirty (30) days prior to harvest, each licensee shall file a harvest report on a form approved by the Department that includes: 1. A statement of intended disposition of its industrial hemp crop; and 2. The harvest date or dates, location and yield of each variety cultivated within a registered land area. B. A licensee shall notify the Department immediately of any changes in a reported harvest date by more than five (5) days."
- Failing to allow inspection and testing by the Department is a violation of O.A.C. 35:30-24-11 and 2 O.S. §3-407(A) which state:

- 24. On or about March 25, 2022, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Dollar General in Ft. Cobb, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that eight (8) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price. A letter of warning was sent.
- 25. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a third violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).

- 26. On or about May 25, 2022, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Dollar General in Ft. Cobb, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that six (6) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price. A letter of warning was sent.
- 27. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a fourth violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).
- 28. On or about July 26, 2022, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Dollar General in Ft. Cobb, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that thirteen (13) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price. A letter of warning was sent.
- 29. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a fifth violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).
- 30. On or about November 29, 2022, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Dollar General in Ft. Cobb, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that nine (9) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price. A letter of warning was sent.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 17. Under the provisions of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(2), it is unlawful for a store to charge a retail price for any consumer item which exceeds the lowest then price in that store, whether a shelf, sale, advertised, or otherwise publicly communicated price, of the consumer item.
- 18. Under the provisions of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J), failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of an inspection shall be a failed inspection subject to penalty. A third violation discovered within any twelve-month period will be assessed a penalty of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) per consumer item which results in an overcharge or potential overcharge.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

- 19. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent:
- 20. On or about September 22, 2021, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Dollar General in Mangum, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that eleven (11) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price. A letter of warning was sent.
- 21. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).
- 22. On or about March 24, 2022, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Dollar General in Mangum, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that eight (8) of the one hundred (100) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price. A letter of warning was sent.
- 23. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a second violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).
- On or about July 25, 2022, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Dollar General in Mangum, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that six (6) of the one hundred (100) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price. A letter of warning was sent.
- 25. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a third violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

26. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of the aforementioned inspections is a violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(2) and is subject to the penalty provided in 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).

- 22. On or about December 29, 2022, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Dollar General in Bristow, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that three (3) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price.
- 23. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a second violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J). A letter of warning was sent.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

24. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of the aforementioned inspections is a violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(2) and is subject to the penalty provided in 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).

- 22. A vegetative sample was taken from your application area, and 2,4-D, Triclopyr, and Aminopyralid were detected in the analysis.
- 23. According to our investigation your application resulted in a drift-off target movement onto the complainant's property.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: 3. A person has operated in a negligent manner, thereby causing a pesticide to drift off-target."

- 24. On or about December 13, 2022, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Family Dollar in Woodward, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that eight (8) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price. A letter of warning was sent.

25. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a third violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

26. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of the aforementioned inspections is a violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(2) and is subject to the penalty provided in 2 O.S. § 14-38(J).

This inspection is after the Department received a report from the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Association that one of your batch samples submitted for testing failed for the presence of pesticides.
- 19. The pesticide detected in the batch samples was Bifenazate.
- 20. During the inspection our inspector observed numerous containers of pesticides being stored in your facility, including Floramite SC/LS Miticide. Bifenazate is the active ingredient in Floramite SC/LS Miticide.

- 21. Additionally, many of the pesticide products that you have at your facility are not labeled to be used in medical marijuana production
- 22. Currently the only pesticide products that can be applied to medical marijuana are those products that are registered with ODAFF and are approved to be applied to hemp.
- 23. According to our investigation you have been misusing pesticide products by applying them to a crop that is not approved by the product label.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

You informed our inspector that one of your employees drove a tractor down the road and made an application to the weeds growing along your pasture roadside fence line. Your property is across the road east of the complainant's property.
- 20. According to your application records on the morning of June 28, 2022, Alan Streater made an application of 2,4-D using a mist sprayer during a north wind.

- 21. The Holdenville Mesonet Weather Station recorded the winds being variable out of the north on the morning of June 28, 2022.
- 22. Our inspector also noted an application to the property south of the complaint's property. The owner of this property informed our inspector that he applied 2,4-D and Dicamba to his pasture. A vegetative sample was taken from the sprayed pasture south of the complainant's property, and 79.5 ppm of 2,4-D, 25.6 ppm of Dicamba, and a trace amount of Triclopyr were detected
- 23. A vegetative sample was taken from the complainant's property, and trace amounts of 2,4-D and Triclopyr were detected. A vegetative sample was taken from the application area on your property, and 49.6 ppm of 2,4-D, 8.88 ppm of Picloram, and 157 ppm of Triclopyr were detected.
- 24. Additionally, hormone type herbicides such as 2,4-D, Triclopyr, and Picloram cannot be applied through mist type sprayers unless a terrain feature such as a gully precludes the use of any other types of ground application equipment. Furthermore, Picloram is an ingredient in restricted use pesticides, and you do not have a private applicator certification, and Alan Streater's private applicator certification expired December 31, 2018.
- 25. According to our investigation your application is the source of the Triclopyr found on the complainant's property.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

26. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you applied pesticides in a manner that allowed off-target drift, used unapproved equipment and applied restricted use pesticides without certification. All are in violation of Oklahoma Statutes and Rules 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(4), 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(17) and O.A.C. 35:30-17-24(E)(2).

- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(4) states: "A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: . A person has used a pesticide in a manner inconsistent with its labeling unless prior written approval has been obtained from the Board."
- 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(17) states: "17. Any person to act or operate as a private applicator unless the person has obtained a valid private applicator license issued by the Board"
- O.A.C. 35:30-17-24(e)(2) states: "(e) No person shall use a mist blower or other type of air blasting or misting equipment for the application of hormone type herbicides within the State except where the following specific conditions exist:

 (2) Range, pasture, and crop areas where control of undesirable vegetation with a hormone type herbicide is necessary and a specific type of terrain feature such as a gully precludes the use of any other type of ground application equipment."

 - hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: Any person to act, operate, do

business, or advertise as an applicator unless the person has obtained a valid license issued by the Board for the category in which the person is engaged."

O.A.C. 35:30-17-93: "The following procedure governs handling of pesticide containers other than bulk pesticide containers by commercial applicators: (2) Empty containers. Empty containers shall be stored in a secured area and kept for no more than ninety (90) days following use. (3) Metal, glass, and plastic containers: (A) All metal, glass, and plastic containers shall be triple-rinsed or pressure rinsed immediately after the pesticide is removed by the following or equivalent procedures: (i) Using water or a detergent as a rinse capable of removing the pesticide, each container shall be filled with rinse equal to approximately ten percent (10%) of the volume of pesticides originally in the container. (ii) The rinse shall be agitated thoroughly on all interior surfaces of the container. Agitation shall be accomplished by use of agitation equipment approved by the Department or by manual agitation of the rinse. (iii) The rinsing procedure shall be repeated three times. (iv) If the rinsate containing the rinse can be used in subsequent applications of the pesticide without reducing the effectiveness of the pesticide, the rinsate may be placed in the containment tank specified for that pesticide. If the rinsate is not classified as a controlled industrial waste upon disposal, it shall be placed in an approved surface impoundment. (B) Upon completion of the triple-rinsing or pressure rinsing procedures, containers shall be disposed of as follows: (i) Disposal in any permitted solid waste facility or sanitary landfill so long as all metal and plastic containers are pierced in each end; (ii) Return, if possible, to the pesticide sales agent or the pesticide

manufacturer pursuant to prior agreement; or (iii) Resale to a third party for recycling or reconditioning."

- 17. Under the provisions of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(1)(a), it is unlawful for any person to sell, offer, or expose for sale a quantity less than the quantity represented.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

- 18. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.
- 19. On or about June 14, 2022, a standard package inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture. Food, and Forestry inspector at Tractor Supply Co. in Atoka, OK. The inspection revealed the average was .661 lb. less than the marked net weight. On this date, there were 10 Maximum Allowed Variations. A letter of warning was sent.
- 20. On or about September 15, 2022, a standard package inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Tractor Supply Co. in Atoka, OK. The inspection revealed the average was 528 lb. less than the marked net weight.

On this date, there were 5 Maximum Allowed Variations. This was the second violation and a letter of warning was sent.

21. On or about October 27, 2022, a standard package inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at Tractor Supply Co. in Sulphur, OK. This inspection revealed the average was .74 lb. less than the marked net weight. On this date, there were 9 Maximum Allowed Variations. This was the third violation and a letter of warning was sent.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

22. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts. Respondent has violated 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(1)(a) by selling, offering, or exposing for sale a quantity less than the quantity represented. A third violation following any twelve-month period in which no violation has been found will be assessed a penalty of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) per consumer item which results in an overcharge or potential overcharge.

RON STOCK AND TRI-STATE FEEDERS, L.L.C. #18 SANDY RIDGE ROAD COLUMBUS, NE 68601

Summary of Facts: In 2016, Respondent purchased a working feedlot in Beaver County, Oklahoma. The feedlot was a Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation licensed pursuant to the Oklahoma CAFO Act. Under the CAFO Act and its rules, the feedlot was required to maintain a current Pollution Prevention Plan ("PPP"), keep and maintain required records, and maintain the feedlot in good working order. The PPP contained a carcass disposal plan developed by the feedlot and approved by the Department.

Beginning in 2016 and continuing through 2021, the Department found deficiencies during inspections and advised the feedlot thereof through compliance letters and letters of warning. During this period the feedlot failed to address most of the deficient items. Specifically, the feedlot failed to maintain required records, perform required maintenance, or have a current PPP. In fact, the feedlot did not have a current PPP until 2023 during the pendency of this action.

During an annual inspection, Department inspector, David Jett, discovered a pile of forty to fifty decomposing/deteriorating beef carcasses within the northeast area of the feedlot and other carcasses scattered within the pens. The feedlot was advised of the improper carcass disposal. Within a reasonable period, the feedlot properly disposed of the carcasses.

During the 2020 and 2021 annual inspection, Department inspector, David Jett, observed bones and skeletal remains in pens and in and around the disposal pit area. Mr. Jett advised that he observed at least five severely decomposing carcass at these inspections. To the best of the Department's knowledge and believe, the feedlot did not properly dispose of the carcasses and bones until we after this action was initiated.

During 2020 the feedlot ceased operating. Henceforth, the feedlot has not been occupied by any cattle (other than decaying carcasses).

Statute or Rule Violation: 2 O.S. 20-47, & 48(F)(1) and OAC 35:17-4-9 and 17-4-13.

Proposed Administrative Penalty: The monetary penalty was assessed at \$88,500.00 in the Notice of Violation "NOV"). Additionally, the Department sought to revoke the CAFO license and close the feedlot in conformity with the Closure Plan.

Subsequent Remediation: After service of the NOV, Mr. Stock retained counsel. In an effort to resolve this administrative matter, the feedlot has addressed and remediated most of the out of compliance items. Counsel advised the feedlot has incurred over \$100,000 of expense to resolve the compliance issue. These expenses do not include attorney fees. Additionally, Mr. Stock has placed the feedlot on the auction block. It is scheduled to be sold on July 20, 2023. Because the

feedlot has come into substantial compliance and will be sold, the Department agreed to a reduced penalty of \$44,250.00.

Deviations: Reduction of fifty percent (50%).

- 1. This Settlement Agreement and Consent Order (the "Agreement") is between the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, And Forestry (the "Department") and Ron Stock and Tri-State Feeders II, L.L.C (the "Respondents").
- 2. The facility which is the subject of this Agreement is owned and operated by Tri-State Feeders II, L.L.C. and located at 3 U.S. 83, Turpin, OK (the "Facility").

AUTHORITY

3. The Department has authority over this matter pursuant to Okla. Const. Art. VI, Section 31 and 2 O.S. § 2-4(7).

DEPARTMENT'S NOTICE

4. On March 4, 2022, the Department issued a Notice of Violation in Case No. OGC-21-292, ("Notice") to the Facility, which is attached hereto as Exhibit A. The Allegations of Fact and Summary of Applicable Law of that Notice are incorporated herein by reference.

ORDER AND AGREEMENT

5. As part of the Settlement of this matter, Respondents have performed certain Corrective Actions noted by the Corrective Action Plan, which is attached hereto as Exhibit "B". Upon approval of this Settlement Agreement and Consent Order the Department shall advise the public the administrative matter with Respondent has been concluded and Department looks forward to working with a purchaser of the Facility in the permit transfer process.

6. In compromise and full settlement of this matter, Respondents shall pay to the Department an administrative penalty of Forty-Four Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$44,250.00). Respondent shall remain responsible for completing the compliance requirement set forth in the Corrective Action Plan. This release shall not prevent the Department from enforcing the terms of this Agreement and does not release Respondents from liability for other unknown or undiscovered past violations or potential future violations of state or federal law. This Agreement relates only to claims within the jurisdiction of the Department and specifically does not release Respondents from actions initiated by other state or federal agencies having jurisdiction over related matters.
- 8. Respondents and the Department recognize there is risk and expense inherent in any litigation. Thus, the parties agree to enter into this compromise and settlement to avoid incurring any further cost and expense arising as a result of this dispute. Respondents and the Department each do not waive and each expressly reserves all of its rights in any future proceeding against it.
- 9. By entering into this Agreement, the Department does not by entering into this Agreement concede that its factual basis for initiating this Action, and violations found based upon those facts, are not true and accurate. Respondents, without admitting the truth of said factual averments and having previously contested the alleged violations in informal discussions with representatives of the Department, voluntarily waives its right to a formal evidentiary hearing to contest such factual averments. By entering into this Agreement, Respondents do not admit or consent to the truth of the factual averments set forth in the Notice. 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NOTICE OF VIOLATION

1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel ("OGC") of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

- 2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on April 14, 2022 in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
- 3. Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) Amendments to the pleadings; c.) the plan, schedule, and limitations of discovery; d.) Identification of admissions of fact to avoid unnecessary proof and cumulative evidence, c.) The identification of witnesses and substance of testimony, exhibits, and documents; f.) The use of prehearing briefs and pre-filed testimony in the form of sworn affidavits, g.) Settlement of all or some of the issues prior to the hearing, h.) Adoption of special procedures for managing difficult or protracted actions that may involve complex issues, multiple parties, novel or difficult legal questions, or evidence problems; i.) Scheduling; and j.) Any other matters as may aid in disposition of the case.

- 10. The hearing will be conducted in accordance with the Oklahoma Administrative Procedures Act and the Department's Rules of Practice and Procedure, which may be found in the OAC at Title 35.
- 11. Respondent has the right to be represented by counsel in this matter.

DEFAULT

12. Any Respondent who fails to appear after receipt of notice may be determined to have waived the right to appear and present a defense and a default may be presented by the Department to the Board at a regularly scheduled meeting proposing the relief requested by the Notice of Violation, or other relief if justice so requires.

JURISDICTION, VENUE, AND APPLICABLE LAW

- 13. Subject matter jurisdiction and venue are vested in the State Board of Agriculture in its quasi-judicial capacity, pursuant to Okla. Const. Art. VI, Section 31 and 2 O. S. § 2-4(7); accordingly, this is the proper forum to hear this matter.
- 14. Respondent has substantial business operations and assets within the State of Oklahoma.
- 15. Based upon current information and belief, at all relevant times hereto, Respondent has, among other things, engaged in the business of owning and operating a feedlot in Oklahoma.
- 16. Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 20-42, ODAFF has authority to regulate Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations.
- 17. Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 20-47(A), "[a]n animal feeding operation licensed pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations Act (the "CAFO Act") shall develop a Pollution Prevention Plan or may substitute equivalent measures contained in a site-specific Animal Waste Management Plan prepared pursuant to Section 36 of this act."
- 18. Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 20-47(B)(1), "[t]he Pollution Prevention Plan shall be signed by the owner or as otherwise authorized by the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry and a copy shall be retained on site."
- 19. Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 20-47(F) and Oklahoma Administrative Code 35:17-4-9, Respondent shall maintain certain records regarding the facility, such as the water level in the retention structure, rain fall, and other information critical to proper administer of the Pollution Prevention Plan. Such requirements include maintaining a permanent measuring device for the waste retention structure and a rain gauge.

20. Pursuant to 2 O.S. § 20-48(F) (1), and OAC 35:17-4-13, "dead animals shall be disposed of in accordance with a carcass disposal plan developed by the applicant or licensee and approved by the Department."

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

- 21. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.
- 22. Respondent is a Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation licensed pursuant to the CAFO Act and has been for all times relevant to the allegations set forth herein. Respondent currently holds Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation License Number 93-0000 issued July 1, 2021 and valid until June 30, 2022.
- 23. Complainant has annually inspected Respondent's feedlot since at least 2016.
- 24. Since 2016, Complainant has advised Respondent of the deficiencies found during inspections through compliance letters or letters of warning (hereinafter "Compliance Letters").
- 25. In 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021, Complainant requested Respondent provide an updated copy of the Pollution Prevention Plan specifically addressing the deficiency noted in the Compliance Letters.
- 26. During the 2018 annual inspection, the Complainant's inspector discovered a pile of forty to fifty decomposing/deteriorating cattle carcasses within the northeast area of the feedlot and other carcasses scattered within the pens. Respondent was advised of this improper carcass disposal. Respondent within a reasonable period properly disposed of the carcasses.
- 27. In 2020, Respondent was advised their mandatory records were deficient and needed to be corrected.

- 28. In 2020 and 2021, Respondent failed to provide any records to review that were required to be maintained under the Pollution Prevention Plan.
- 29. In 2020 and 2021, the inspections determined a staff gauge and a rain gauge needed to be replaced. Respondent failed to do so.
- 30. In 2020 and 2021, the inspections determined erosion areas within the pens needed to be repaired. Respondent failed to do so.
- 31. In 2020 and 2021, the contact person for Respondent failed to respond to Complainant hindering the inspections.
- 32. The 2020 inspection and subsequent Compliance Letter advise Respondent as follows:
 - a. Repair erosion on NE side of interior embankment of AWRS #3;
 - b. Bait, repair, and monitor rodent holes on the exterior embankment of AWRS #3;
 - c. Sample Records: Sample data of water, soil, & effluent needs to be updated reflect a current analysis;
 - d. Remove vegetation for interior embankment of all waste retention structures; and
 - e. Mow grass on exterior embankment of all waste retention structures.
- 33. In 2020 and 2021, Respondent was advised carcasses were not disposed of properly. There were bones and skeletal remains seen within the pens and several skeletal remains were seen within the pit located on the southeast section of the feedlot. Complainant believes there were at least five severely decomposing carcasses observed by the inspector. To the best of our knowledge and belief, Respondent never properly disposed of these carcasses.
- 34. Respondent has failed to respond to the Compliance Letters, take corrective action or otherwise resolve the issues set forth above except as specifically noted.

- 35. On or about January 1, 2020, Respondent ceased operating as a feedlot. Henceforth, the facility has not been occupied by any cattle (other than decaying carcasses). The feedlot has not operated with live cattle for more than twenty-four months.
- 36. Based on observation and inspection, since ceasing operations, the Respondent has not properly maintain the facility and it appears in serious disrepair.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

37. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent has violated 2 O.S. §§ 20-47, & 48(F)(1), and OAC 35:17-4-9 and 17-4-13 and other statutory provisions and rules by failing to address deficiencies in the application of the PPP, to recertify the retention structure, to follow the carcass disposal plan, to keep vital records, and to properly operate and maintain the facility. The CAFO License should be revoked, the facility closed in conformity with the Closure Plan and Respondent fined.

ENFORCEMENT PROCEEDINGS

- 41. Enforcement proceedings may include but are not limited to:
 - a.) Administrative fines or penalties;

- b.) Revocation, suspension, or denial for up to one (1) year of any license, permit, or charter issued by ODAFF or the Board;
- c.) Criminal actions, which could involve fines, imprisonment, or both; and
- d.) Civil actions.
- 42. Pursuant to 2 Okla. Stat. § 2-18(A), after notice and opportunity for a hearing in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act, if the State Board of Agriculture finds any person in violation of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code or any rule promulgated or order issued pursuant thereto, unless otherwise specifically provided by statute or rule, the Board shall have the authority to assess an administrative penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for each violation.
- 43. Each animal, each action, or each day a violation continues may constitute a separate and distinct violation.

OKLAHOMA SMALL BUSINESS REGULATORY FLEXIBILITY ACT

44. The Oklahoma Small Business Regulatory Flexibility Act, 75 O.S. Supp. 2002, § 506, may apply to this action; please review the full act to determine if it applies to you.

ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS

45. Administrative penalties, civil penalties, and other fines imposed by the Board shall be enforced pursuant to the procedure outlined in 2 O.S. § 2-7(B) and the Uniform Enforcement of Foreign Judgments Act, 12 O.S. § 719 et seq.

INFORMAL DISPOSITION OF AN INDIVIDUAL PROCEEDING

46. Informal disposition of an Individual Proceeding may be made by Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default.

47. Resolution by Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default shall be approved by the State Board of Agriculture.

48. Proposed Final Administrative Orders shall be prepared and issued in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act and presented to the Board of Agriculture for review and approval.

STIPULATION

PARTIES

- 1. This Settlement Agreement and Consent Order (the "Agreement") is between the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, And Forestry (the "Department") and AA Pest LLC (the "Respondent").

Respondent waives their right to a full administrative and/or evidentiary hearing and enters this Resolution by Stipulation evidencing Respondent's consent to the proposed penalty and Respondent's stipulation to the allegations of fact and alleged violations of law made in the Notice of Violation.

PROPOSED FINAL ORDER

On March 9, 10 and 13, 2023, this matter was presented for hearing before the undersigned Administrative Law Judge. The Complainant appears through the Department's Assistant General Counsel, Brady Robison and Richard Herren. Respondent appears by legal counsel Daniel J. Gamino.

The Complainant ("Department") made a motion to sequester witnesses which was granted, except for expert witnesses who were permitted to stay in the courtroom and hear testimony. The parties made an opening statement. The Department presented the following witnesses:

- 1. Mr. Damardray Williams, Department Pesticide Complaint Program Manager;
- 2. Mr. Kenneth Newton, Department Pesticide Field Inspector;
- 3. Dr. Bradford M. Kard, Expert Witness;
- 4. Mr. Jim Voss, Department Chemist;
- 5. Mr. David Smith, Department Chemist;

- 6. Ms. Yvette Turner, Department Chemist; and,
- 7. Dr. Usha P. Kadel, Department Lab Supervisor.

The Respondent presented the following witnesses:

- 1. Mr. Jonovich, Expert Witness;
- 2. Mr. John Zetterberg, Spray Tech employed by Respondent;
- 3. Mr. Brian Baker, Manager for Respondent; and,
- 4. Mr. Carl Hushes, Representative and Employee of Respondent.

Each party provided a closing statement and argued the pertinent issues of their case. Upon conclusion of the hearing, this matter was taken under advisement.

Statement of the Case

On March 29, 2022, the Department's Consumer Protective Services Division conducted an inspection of a termite pretreatment performed by Respondent on a residence located in Bixby, Oklahoma. The Respondent had pretreated the area with the termiticide known as Imidacloprid. The soil samples collected from the Bixby site were tested in the Department's Laboratory ("Lab"). The tests results showed that two (2) vertical barrier samples had levels of 3.25 ppm and 4.25ppm. The minimum level permitted is 10ppm for vertical barriers. On September 9, 2022, the Department filed an Amended Notice of Violation alleging that Respondent was negligent in the application of the termiticide which resulted in the pesticide being ineffective for the purposes for which it had been employed, in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(2).

Burden of Proof

The Respondent alleged in a Motion for Directed Verdict, in its Trial Brief and at the administrative hearing, that the Department could not meet its burden of proof by clear and convincing evidence. Respondent pointed to the fact that the Department had sought written

discovery in order to obtain evidence prior to the hearing. Respondent argued that the need for discovery showed the Department lacked the evidence to meet the burden of proof at the time the Notice of Violation was filed. Respondent asserted that when a professional license is involved, the proper burden of proof is by clear and convincing evidence. In response, the Department argued that because it was not seeking to revoke, suspend or terminate Respondent's license, the lower standard of proof should be applied which is substantial evidence.

The Department's Amended Notice of Violation stated that:

Enforcement proceedings may include but are not limited to:

- a.) Administrative fines or penalties;
- b.) Revocation, suspension, or denial for up to one (1) year of any license, permit, or charter issued by ODAFF or the Board;
- c.) Criminal actions, which could involve fines, imprisonment, or both; and
- d.) Civil actions.

Pursuant to 2 Okla. Stat. § 2-18(A), after notice and opportunity for a hearing in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act, the Board shall have the authority to assess an administrative penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for each violation. (Notice at pp. 4 and 5)

In its trial brief, the Department presented OAC 35:1-9-7(d) which states "the standard of proof in all individual proceedings affecting or prejudicing an individual's license, registration, permit, certification or other authorization to engage in a given livelihood or occupation shall be clear and convincing. In all other matters the standard of proof shall be a substantial evidence."

The language found in the Amended Notice of Violation, under the heading of a Stipulation, the Department proposed that the Respondent waive its right to hearing and stipulate to the allegations of fact. The Notice states that "If Respondent desires to resolve the matter without a hearing or further action, Complainant proposes an administrative fine of Five Thousand Dollars

(5,000)." The Respondent declined to stipulate to the alleged facts and chose to have the matter heard by an ALJ in an administrative hearing.

Because the Notice of Violation contains the language that the Department has the power to revoke, suspend or deny a license, and no stipulation or payment of a fine occurred, this matter proceeded to hearing under the Oklahoma Administrative Procedures Act, and the burden of proof is by clear and convincing evidence. *Johnson v. Board of Governors of Registered Dentists*, 1996 OK 41.

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Department's Witness Testimony and Evidence

- Respondent, Security Pest Control, is a licensed commercial pesticide applicator in
 Oklahoma and conducts termite pretreatments as a normal course of its business.
- 2. On or about March 10, 2022, Respondent applied Dominion PT, which contains the active chemical Imidacloprid to a pre-construction house in Bixby, OK.
- 3. On March 29, 2022, Department's Inspector Kenneth Newton performed an inspection and collected samples at the Bixby location.
- 4. The homebuilder had placed an address sign on the property which gave the address as 13207 S. 72nd E. Ave., Bixby, OK. The address listed by the homebuilder was incorrect. The actual address was is 13207 S. 72nd E. Place and not Avenue.
- There was no evidence presented that the Department's Inspector collected samples from the wrong location.
- 6. Inspector Newton testified that he collected samples following Department protocol and submitted them to the Lab for analysis. Inspector Newton placed flags at the site to designate the area of sampling and took pictures of the slab area before the samples were taken.

- 7. Inspector Newton testified that he took two (2) representative samples for a horizontal baseline, which consists of twenty-four (24) randomly selected cored samples throughout the slab at a depth of 0-2 inches for a total of forty-eight (48) randomly selected samples.
- 8. Inspector Newton testified that he took two (2) samples for a vertical baseline, which consisted of ten (10) cored samples taken near the vertical protrusions at a depth of 0-6 inches for a total of twenty (20) samples.
- On March 29, 2022, Inspector Newton completed the Pesticide Sample Form and emailed it to the Department's Lab and stated that the active ingredient to be searched for was Imidacloprid.
- All samples were packaged, sealed in foil bags and sent to the Department's Lab for analysis.
- 11. The product used by the Respondent was Dominion PT which contains Imidacloprid as the active ingredient.
 - 12. Dominion PT has an EPA Registration Number of 538837.

Laboratory Procedure and Testing

- 13. Department Chemist, Jim Voss, testified that on March 30, 2022, the samples were delivered to the Lab by FedEx and he signed for their receipt, inspected the packages and placed the samples in the termiticide refrigerator.
- 14. Department Chemist David Smith testified that on April 5, 2022, he retrieved the samples from the termiticide refrigerator and prepared them for analysis and then placed them back into the refrigerator where they were stored at 4 degrees Celsius.

- 15. Chemist Smith testified in detail regarding the process and procedure for testing the samples in the Lab. (Department's Ex. 18)
- 16. On May 2, 2022, Chemist Smith testified that he conducted an analysis of the samples and results were:
 - The horizontal sample results were 15.9 ppm and 6.17ppm (Department Exhibits 5D and 6D)
 - The vertical sample results were 4.25 ppm and 3.25ppm. (Department Exhibits 7D and 8D)
- 17. The Amended Notice of Violation stated that the vertical sample testing results were 6.17 and 4.25 but this was an error, the correct testing result was 4.25 ppm and 3.25ppm, which is well below the minimum level required.
- 18. The Lab results and analysis of Chemist Smith were peer reviewed by Chemist Yvette Turner.
- 19. The test results were then submitted to the Lab Supervisor Chemist Dr. Usha Kadel for review.
- 20. On May 6, 2022, Dr. Kadel reviewed the data sample from the analysis of Chemist David Smith and peer reviewed by Chemist Yvette Turner, and confirmed the data and approved the sampling.
 - 21. On May 6, 2022, a Letter of Warning was sent to the Respondent.
 - 22. On June 7, 2022, a Notice of Violation was sent to Respondent.
 - 23. On September 9, 2022, an Amended Notice of Violation was sent to Respondent.

Department's Expert Witness Dr. Bradford M. Kard

24. Dr. Bradford M. Kard is a professor at Oklahoma State University, who has a PhD in Entomology, has authored and published over 250 peer reviewed papers, worked for the United

States Forestry Service, conducted research and tested the efficacy of termiticides, including Imidacloprid, and the United States Environmental Protection Agency uses his research to determine the efficacy of termiticides.

- 25. In 1989, Dr. Kard was the lead scientist for the field tests on Imidacloprid and testified that the minimum required threshold for vertical application of Imidacloprid is 10ppm.
- 26. He testified that the Dominion PT label required trenching or trenching and rodding for the vertical barriers.
- 27. The Department's Exhibit 3 at page 2, shows that Respondent stated the vertical barriers were rodded. There was no evidence that they were trenched.
- 28. Pursuant to requirements of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the labels are considered to be legal documents and the label states that the applicator must follow, federal, state and local rules and regulations in its application of pesticides.
 - 29. The Dominion label provides the details of the application requirements:

CONCRETE SLAB-ON-GROUND OR BASEMENTS: Apply on overall treatment to the entire surface of soil and other substrate to be covered by the slab including areas 10 to be under carports, porches, basement floors and entrance platforms. Apply at the rate of 1 gallon of solution to accurately and uniformly cover 10 square feet. If fill under slab is gravel or other coarse aggregate, apply at the rate of 1.5 gallons or sufficient volume of solution, to accurately and uniformly cover 10 square feet. In addition, apply 4 gallons of solution (see APPLICATION VOLUME) per 10 linear feet to provide a uniform treated zone in soil at critical areas such as along the inside of foundation walls, and around plumbing, bath traps, utility services, and other feathers that will penetrate the slab.

After completion of grading, make an application by trenching or trenching and rodding around the slab or foundation perimeter. Rodding may be done from the bottom of a shallow trench. When rodding, rod holes must be spaced in a manner that will allow for a continuous chemical treated zone, not to exceed 12 inches, to be deposited along the treated area. Rod holes must not extend below the footing. Apply 4 gallons of solution (see APPLICATION VOLUME) per 10 linear feet, per foot of depth to provide a uniform treated zone. When trenching, the trench along the outside foundation must be about 6 inches in width and 6 inches in depth. Use a low-pressure spray (not to exceed 25 PSI at the treatment tool when the valve

is open) to treat soil which will be placed in the trench after rodding. Mix the spray solution with soil as it is being placed in the trench. When treating voids in hollow masonry units, use 2 gallons of solution per 10 linear feet of wall. Apply solution so it will reach the footing by injecting into the lower areas of the wall just above the floor or footing.

When treating foundations deeper than 4 feet, apply the termiticide as the backfill is being replaced, or if the construction contractor fails to notify the applicator to permit this, treat the foundation to a minimum depth of 4 feet after the backfill has been installed. The applicator must trench and rod into the trench or trench along the foundation walls and around pillars and other foundation elements, at the rate prescribed from grade to a minimum depth of 4 feet. When the top of the footing is exposed, the applicator must treat the soil adjacent to the footing to a depth not to exceed the bottom of the footing. However, in no case treat a structure below the footing.

Rodding in trench followed by flooding of trench and treatment of backfill may provide a better opportunity to achieve a continuous chemical treated zone than using soil rodding along to establish a vertical termiticide treated zone. (Department's Ex. 19, p. 4);

- 30. Dr. Kard testified that if the application is done properly, Imidacloprid would remain effective for at least five (5) years and the correct application of the termiticide would achieve 20ppm or 30ppm.
- 31. Dr. Kard testified that his opinion it the application was not done in conformance with the label, or with federal and state statutes and rules.
- 32. Only professionals are authorized to apply this product and as such they are charged with the knowledge of how to conduct a vertical application properly to achieve at least the minimum level of 10ppm.
- 33. On cross-examination, Dr. Kard testified that rainwater, sunlight, acidity and alkalinity of the soil can alter the chemical but if the application is done correctly and a trench is dug properly, the chemical binds to the soil and is not diluted at the deeper level in the trench.
- 34. Dr. Kard's opinion is that two (2) inches of rainfall would result in only 1% decrease in chemical concentration.

35. The Lab tests of the vertical samples showed Imidacloprid levels of 4.25ppm and 3.25ppm, which did not meet the minimum requirements.

The Respondent's Witness Testimony

Respondent's Expert Witness Mr. Joe Jonovich

- 36. Mr. Jonovich testified that he has been a consultant for the pest control industry since 2015.
- 37. His testimony was that according to the Dominion label, if the slab is monolithic, vertical applications do not require trenching.
- 38. Mr. Jonovich's testimony was that Oklahoma's protocol for testing does not completely follow the guidelines of the Association of Structural Pest Control Regulatory Officials but did not identify the deficiency or its effect in the case.
- 39. The Department called Dr. Kard as a rebuttal witness and he testified that professional, certified applicators know that vertical application requires trenching.
- 40. Dr. Kard testified that the nineteen (19) days between the time the termiticide was applied and the day the samples were collected would not make a difference as to the quality of samples taken.
- 41. Dr. Kard testified that the location of the pretreatment application was on level ground and not on a slope and subject to run off.

Respondent's Witnesses

- 42. John Zetterberg, testified that he has been employed by the Respondent for a little over three (3) years.
 - 43. Mr. Zetterberg was the pesticide applicator for Respondent.
 - 44. Mr. Zetterberg received on the job training and has an Oklahoma Pesticide license.

- 45. Mr. Zetterberg testified that in the vertical areas he rodded the backfill six (6) inches down and that he used a shovel to scrape an area of dirt and sprayed the area with the chemical.
- 46. He testified that he was not given training in how much pesticide needs to be applied to achieve the minimum of 10ppm.
- 47. Mr. Brian Baker, is a manager for the Respondent and a certified pesticide applicator. He received on the job training and obtained his structural certification from the Department.
- 48. Mr. Baker testified that the Respondent's records indicated that the vertical area was rodded but not trenched and that the application should result in Imidacloprid level of 10ppm at a minimum.
- 49. Mr. Baker identified the pretreatment contract exhibit and the five (5) year guarantee issued by the Respondent.
 - 50. Mr. Baker testified that he believed Mr. Zetterberg applied the pesticide correctly.
 - 51. Mr. Carl Hughes appeared as the Representative for the Respondent.
- 52. Mr. Hughes' job duties includes handling insurance matters, ordering product for the company and combating the allegations brought by the Department.
- 53. Mr. Hughes testified that he believes that Inspector Newton broke the pesticide barrier and cut into the Visqueen barrier when he took the samples.
- 54. The ALJ inquired whether the Respondent had considered changing its pretreatment procedure after the Department's testing results showed below minimum levels. Mr. Hughes stated that he believed Respondent's application was appropriate and did not need to be changed.

- 55. Mr. Hughes testified that Respondent provides a five (5) year guarantee and has never been called back to provide another pretreatment.
- 56. The summary of findings from the facts are that the Department's Inspector took samples from the Bixby site in accordance with normal procedure; that the transfer of the samples and the testing of the samples were properly performed and peer reviewed; that the testing of the vertical samples showed Imidacloprid levels of 4.25ppm and 3.25ppm, which are under the minimum level of 10ppm required by the Dominion PT Label and the Oklahoma Agriculture Departments rules and regulations.
- 57. The application of Dominion PT was not performed according to the Dominion PT label requirements or the Departments, statutes, rules and regulations.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 58. Pursuant to Article VI, Section 31 of the Oklahoma Constitution and 2 O.S. § 2-4(A)(7), the State Board of Agriculture serves in a quasi-judicial capacity and has subject matter jurisdiction over this matter.
- 59. The Oklahoma Department of Agriculture has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code. (2 O.S. § 2-4(A)(3))
 - 60. According to Oklahoma Agriculture Code 35:30-17-73 Concrete Slabs:
 - (a) All pretreatment pesticide applications shall follow the pesticide label instructions including the application rates and methods.
 - (b) Pretreatment of main slab areas (including attached garages) is as follows:
 - (1) Termiticide shall be applied at the rate specified on the label and in accordance with label instructions to the entire area to be covered by concrete, for the establishment of horizontal and/or vertical barriers...

(3) Vertical barriers shall be established by trenching or trenching and rodding through the bottom of the trench and at the rate prescribed by the label....

(Emphasis added)

61. According to Oklahoma Agriculture Code 35-30-17-27(b):

Pre-construction termiticide treatments (pre-treats) with sampling performed within 30 days or 180 days of treatment shall disclose residue threshold levels established in the veritical barrier for termicides based on values obtained from research conducted at the U.S. Forest Research Center, Gulfport, Mississippi; Kard et al. 1989; Kard 1991, 1992, 1994, The Bayer Company, Agricultural Division, and the Board may establish interim residue levels for termiticide products for which no lowest expected threshold value exists utilizing input from Oklahoma State University, manufacturers, or industry until a value has been established. (7) Premise: (A) Shall have a residue threshold level with 30 days of treatment of 10 ppm. (B) Shall have a residue threshold level after 30 days and within 180 days of treatment of 10 ppm." (Emphasis added)

- 62. After notice and opportunity for a hearing, if the State Board of Agriculture finds any violation of the Oklahoma Agriculture Code or any rule or statute, the Board may assess an administrative penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for each violation. (2 O.S. § 2-18(A))
- 63. The Amended Notice of Violation alleged a violation under 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(2), which states that it is a violation of the rules and statutes if, "A person has negligently used methods or pesticides that are ineffective or improper for the purpose for which they have been employed."
- 64. Based upon the Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, the Respondent was negligent in its pretreatment application of Imidacloprid at 13207 S. 72nd E. Place, Bixby, Oklahoma.
- 65. The Department has proved by clear and convincing evidence that the Respondent improperly and negligently applied Imidacloprid and did not follow the requirements pursuant to

the Dominion PT label and is in violation of the rules, regulations and statutes of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture.

RECOMMENDED ORDER

The ALJ recommends an administrative penalty in the amount of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500).

IT IS THEREFORE RECOMMENDED that this Proposed Final Order be adopted as the Final Order and all penalties be imposed on Respondent, Security Pest Control, Inc.

NOTICE OF VIOLATION

1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel ("OGC") of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

- 2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on the 8th day of September, 2022 in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
- 3. Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.

Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) Amendments to the pleadings; c.) the plan, schedule, and limitations of discovery; d.) Identification of admissions of fact to avoid unnecessary proof and cumulative evidence; e.) The identification of witnesses and substance of testimony, exhibits, and documents; f.) The use of prehearing briefs and pre-filed testimony in the form of sworn affidavits; g.) Settlement of all or some of the issues prior to the hearing; h.) Adoption of special procedures for managing difficult or protracted actions that may involve complex issues, multiple parties, novel or difficult legal questions, or evidence problems; i.) Scheduling, and j.) Any other matters as may aid in disposition of the case.

- 4. The Prehearing Conference may be held by telephone; arrangements to do so should be made at least one full week in advance of the Prehearing Conference.
- 5. Upon request of either party, Prehearing Conferences shall be on the record.
- 6. A Prehearing Conference may result in a scheduling or other prehearing order and subsequent changes to any prehearing or scheduling order may be made by the ALJ by modifying the order for good cause.
- 7. Please note that failure to appear at the Prehearing Conference may result in a default judgment being entered against you.

HEARING AND RIGHT TO COUNSEL

- 8. Respondent may choose to proceed to a full evidentiary hearing on the merits, at which Respondent will be given the opportunity to cross-examine the Complainant's witnesses, present Respondent's witnesses, and present relevant evidence on Respondent's behalf.
- 9. The hearing date will be determined at the Prehearing Conference.
- 10. The hearing will be conducted in accordance with the Oklahoma Administrative Procedures Act and the Department's Rules of Practice and Procedure, which may be found in the OAC at Title 35.
- 11. Respondent has the right to be represented by counsel in this matter.

<u>DEFAULT</u>

12. Any Respondent who fails to appear after receipt of notice may be determined to have waived the right to appear and present a defense and a default may be presented by the Department to the Board at a regularly scheduled meeting proposing the relief requested by the Notice of Violation, or other relief if justice so requires.

JURISDICTION, VENUE, AND APPLICABLE LAW

- 13. Subject matter jurisdiction and venue are vested in the State Board of Agriculture in its quasi-judicial capacity, pursuant to Okla. Const. Art. VI, Section 31 and 2 O. S. § 2-4(7); accordingly, this is the proper forum to hear this matter.
- 14. Respondent has substantial business operations and assets within the State of Oklahoma.
- 15. Based upon current information and belief, at all relevant times hereto, Respondent has, among other things, engaged in the business of commercial pesticides application, located at Tulsa, Oklahoma.
- 16. Pursuant to Okla. Sta. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

- 17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.
- 18. On or about the 29th day of March, 2022, the Consumer Protective Services Division of the Department conducted a pre-treat inspection on a residential dwelling located at 13207 S. 72nd E. Pl. in Bixby, OK.
- 19. Upon inspection, sampling, and testing, it was found that the two vertical barrier samples taken had residue levels of 6.17 ppm and 4.25 ppm respectively. These samples were below ODAFF's acceptable Imidacloprid residue threshold level of 10.0 ppm for vertical barriers.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW
