PURCHASES/CONTRACTS

<u>ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES</u>

FY26-Oklahoma State University - Agriculture Leadership Program- \$50,000

This purchase represents a significant investment in the future of the Oklahoma Agriculture Industry. It aims to educate and train young leaders and provide a better understanding of economic and governmental systems. The curriculum covers various topics, including leadership development, communication, economics, marketing, and major issues affecting Oklahoma and US agriculture. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY26-Oklahoma State University - \$1,300,000

To provide science-based research information developed with Oklahoma State University Agricultural Extension Service and Experiment Stations. The Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station researches to develop technology/practices to address the needs of Oklahomans. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY26-Oklahoma State University- \$5,200,000

To provide funding to Oklahoma State University (OSU-DASNR) for the delivery of Agriculture Research and Education Extension program support in all extension program offices. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY26- Oklahoma State University – Robert M. Kerr Food and Agricultural Products Center- \$1,000,000

To allocate funding to Oklahoma State University for various capital improvements, equipment requirements, and operational activities at the Food and Agricultural Products Center. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY26-Langston University-- \$5,500,000

To allocate funding to Langston University for the continued implementation of the Agriculture Research and Education Extension program and support of its Cooperative Extension and Outreach Programs. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY26-Oklahoma City National Memorial Foundation - \$1,500,000

To allocate funding for the continued education of Oklahoma school children about the importance of the Oklahoma City bombing. This appropriation would give every Oklahoma ninth grader an opportunity to learn this story in Oklahoma history. In 2010, the Oklahoma Legislature passed, and the Governor signed a bill requiring this story and the lessons learned to be taught to every Oklahoma school student. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY25 – AV Installation –\$9,000.00

Professional installation and electric services for wireless presentation and conferencing systems for the Oklahoma Dept of Agriculture, Food and Forestry. We will install these devices within the lab and 3rd floor Conference Room. These upgrades will allow for seamless conferencing and audio-visual

presentations within these areas, without this purchase we will continue to use outdated technology to conduct presentations within these venues.

FORESTRY SERVICES

FY26 - Firefighting Equipment (Pumps) - \$45,000.00

These additional funds are requested for the purchase of firefighting equipment, specifically pumps, which are intended for resale to Rural Fire Departments through our Revolving Equipment Fund. This crucial program enables rural fire departments to acquire essential equipment and personal protective equipment (PPE) at a significantly reduced cost, helping them manage their limited budgets more effectively. **Justification:** This additional purchase is vital as it directly allows rural fire departments to save their limited funds on operational costs, empowering them to better serve their communities. Without this approval for additional procurement, we will not be able to acquire as many pumps for resale, directly impacting the number of departments we can support and the availability of critical equipment. An initial allocation of \$155,000.00 for this program was approved on March 12, 2025. Total requested \$200,000.00.

FY26-Wildland Firefighter Boots and Gear-\$20,000

These funds are requested to purchase wildland firefighting boots and essential personal firefighting gear for Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) personnel. Specifically, wildland firefighting boots are provided to employees who have firefighting responsibilities and have successfully passed the annual work capacity test for three consecutive years. **Justification:** OFS is mandated to supply its firefighters with crucial Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and gear to ensure their safety and well-being while performing their duties. This purchase directly addresses that requirement, providing our dedicated wildland firefighters with the necessary protective equipment for their safety and care in the field.

FY26-Federal Pass-Through Funding for Urban Forestry-\$20,000

This funding will award federal pass-through grants to assist Oklahoma communities, non-profit organizations, educational institutions, civic groups, and neighborhood associations. These grants support essential urban forestry initiatives, including tree inventories, tree planting projects, staffing, and various educational projects. A key focus of these grants is to support projects specifically designed to benefit lower-income neighborhoods and non-profit organizations, fostering equitable access to urban forestry resources and education. **Justification:** Without these vital projects, Forestry Services would lose a significant avenue of community support and education, hindering our ability to expand urban forestry efforts across Oklahoma. The entire \$20,000 in federal funds for these awards will be reimbursed to the Agency, ensuring no net cost from state appropriations.

FY26- Federal Pass-Through Funding for Urban IRA Grantees- \$450,000

This funding aims to provide federal pass-through grants to financially disadvantaged cities, neighborhoods, and communities. These grants will support vital initiatives that include:

- Heat mitigation strategies
- Promotion of food forests
- Increased equitable access to urban/community tree canopy
- Promotion of other significant values and benefits of trees in communities

The primary focus of these grants is to fund projects that directly benefit lower-income neighborhoods and non-profit organizations. This ensures environmental equity and enhances the well-being of communities through targeted urban forestry efforts. **Justification:** Securing this funding is crucial for Forestry Services. Without these essential projects, we risk losing a

significant channel for community support and education, which would hinder our ability to address critical environmental and social needs in vulnerable communities. All expenditures related to this funding will be fully reimbursed to us through Federal funding, meaning there will be no net cost to the Agency from state appropriations.

FY26-Drug and Alcohol Testing Fees-\$5,000

This funding is requested to cover random and pre-hire drug and alcohol testing for all Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) employees who hold a Commercial Driver's License (CDL). This testing is essential for OFS to comply with the federal Department of Transportation (DOT) requirements. **Justification:** If OFS does not perform these mandated drug screenings and continues testing throughout the fiscal year, we will not be following DOT regulations for our CDL drivers. The \$5,000 requested represents the estimated cost for a one-time test of all current OFS employees holding a CDL, ensuring adherence to established policy and procedures for ongoing compliance.

FY26-Aerial Detection Contract Forestry Services' Protection Area- \$49,000

This funding is for a contract with a private vendor to provide fixed-wing aircraft for wildfire detection within the Forestry Services' Protection Area. This service is crucial for our Fire Readiness and Wildland Response Resources. The contract will ensure detection on high-fire danger days in the East Central and Southeast Areas, with an additional option for call-when-needed detection services in the Northeast Area. **Justification:** Without this aerial detection contract, new wildfires would go undetected for a longer period. This delay would inevitably result in larger fire sizes, requiring an increased number of response personnel to control them, and potentially leading to greater loss of life, residences, and natural resources. The entire purchase will be funded through our Fire Readiness funds.

FY26 - Rural Fire Coordinator Contracts-\$1,100,000

Contract with Oklahoma Association of Regional Councils for Rural Fire Coordinators to provide technical assistance and equipment placement services to new or established Rural Fire Departments within their districts to assure the capability of meeting local fire protection needs. **Justification:** Without this contract fire departments would lose technical support to acquire much needed funding, equipment, and operational assistance.

FY26-Fire Department 80/20 Grant Program- \$2,000,000

Rural Fire 80/20 Reimbursement Pass-through Grants awarded to certified rural fire departments serving communities under 10,000 in population. Funding limits per application are \$30,000 of state appropriated funds for construction and \$20,000 for fire equipment. **Justification:** Fire departments awarded these grants can fulfill a critical public safety function by purchasing firefighting equipment and/or build, remodel, or expand fire stations.

FY 26 - Fire Department Operational Grants-\$8,414,550.00

These dollars are divided equally among the certified fire departments (Rural Fire Defense) for Operational Assistance Grants. Fire Departments receiving the Operational Grant can only use the funds for items authorized in Oklahoma State Statutes, Title 19, Chapter 21, and Section 901.56. **Justification:** Fire departments awarded these grants can fulfill a critical public safety function by purchasing firefighting equipment, purchase Worker Compensation Insurance, Vehicle Insurance, etc. as outlined in the above-mentioned statute.

FY26 - Oklahoma Gardening Grant- \$10,000

This new grant agreement will support the longstanding education and outreach efforts through the popular Oklahoma Gardening program, which is produced by Oklahoma State University (OSU). This

grant specifically funds tree-related educational programming, which is crucial for our outreach initiatives. **Justification:** Establishing this grant agreement is vital for our operations. Without this funding, we would lose a significant avenue of support and education for our community and programs. The funding for this specific grant was identified and federally approved, and all expenditures will be fully reimbursed to us through Federal funding.

FY26 – Oklahoma Urban and Community Forestry Council Contract- \$15,000

This contract aims to establish services that will assist in the implementation of the continuing education component of Oklahoma's Urban & Community Forestry program. This initiative will utilize federal pass-through dollars specifically identified for the Council. **Justification:** Through his program's outreach and educational initiatives pertaining to urban forest management and individual tree care, Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) is greatly assisted in ensuring the long-term health of the urban community. Federal funds for this will be reimbursed to the Agency, ensuring no net cost from state appropriations.

FY26- Loading Dock Expansion- \$22,000

This project aims to expand the current loading dock at the Forest Tree Improvement Center. The expansion is critical to mitigate a major safety concern associated with loading and unloading approximately 2 million pine seedlings, which are allocated to non-industrial, private forest landowners in Oklahoma. The existing loading dock is extremely narrow, posing a significant risk during heavy forklift operations required during peak seedling distribution periods. The proposed dock expansion would involve a concrete pour, framed off the existing dock, with dimensions of 40' Length x 15' Width x 4.5' Height. This will substantially improve the ease of forklift operation and establish a safe perimeter during the loading and unloading of seedlings for customers. **Justification:** Without this essential purchase and expansion, the safety of both FTIC staff and landowners picking up seedlings is at considerable risk. Furthermore, the current limitations may negatively impact the efficient delivery of vital conservation seedlings to landowners across the state. Funding for this purchase is from FY25 one-time appropriations from the Oklahoma Legislature. **This money will be carried forward into the FY26 year.**

FY26 – Southern Pine Beetle Federal Grant, -\$7,000 Federal Funds

This funding is for aerial detection of the Southern Pine Beetle (SPB). The primary purpose is to ensure early detection and prompt treatment, which is crucial for limiting the insect's spread and preventing widespread timber stand infestation. **Justification:** The Southern Pine Beetle is a highly destructive insect that poses a significant threat to Oklahoma's valuable pine forest resource. This essential prevention program directly protects overall forest health, safeguards investments made by the forest industry and landowners, and helps to secure future timber revenue. Federal funds for this will be reimbursed to the Agency, ensuring no net cost from state appropriations.

FY26- FirstNet Phones and Tablets- \$75,000.00

These funds are critical to support our essential telecommunication services, specifically for FirstNet phone and iPad bills. These devices provide reliable and secure communication capabilities crucial for our field operations, emergency response coordination, and remote work accessibility. They enable our personnel to maintain continuous connectivity, access vital information, and communicate effectively with each other and the public, especially in areas with limited traditional network access.

Justification: Establishing consistent funding for these FirstNet services is vital for maintaining operational efficiency and safety across our teams. Without this dedicated funding, we would severely impact our ability to deploy personnel effectively, respond to incidents in a timely manner, and ensure secure data exchange in the field. The FirstNet platform provides a dedicated and prioritized network

for public safety and government operations, which is indispensable for our mission-critical communications. This expenditure ensures our teams are equipped with the necessary tools to perform their duties efficiently and safely.

FY26 - Septic System Installation - Southeast Area- \$6,000

Approval is requested to hire a licensed plumbing contractor for the installation of a new septic system at the Forest Fire Control Officer residence in the Southeast Area. The existing septic system is currently malfunctioning, which poses a potential environmental hazard and requires immediate attention. All necessary components for this installation have already been procured, including a septic tank with risers, approximately 660 feet of sewer line, and the associated fittings. **Justification:** Due to the critical nature of the existing system's malfunction and the imperative need to maintain health and safety standards for our personnel, it is essential to proceed with this installation as soon as possible. Your prompt consideration and approval of this request would be greatly appreciated to mitigate the environmental risk and ensure the well-being of our staff.

FY25- Wildland Fire Resource Deployment Capabilities-\$1,752,353.95

Approval to cover the costs associated with receiving wildland firefighting resources (personal, equipment, and aircraft) from other states when Oklahoma faces significant wildfire events. These resources are crucial for bolstering our response capabilities during severe fire seasons and are typically provided under interstate mutual aid agreements, such as the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC). Funds will enable OFS to efficiently cover the costs incurred by other states providing assistance to Oklahoma, based on the agreed-upon rates and mission parameters.

- Deployments from the State of Montana for \$23,244.00
- Deployments from the State of Kentucky for \$20,935.00
- Deployments from the State of Arkansas for \$152,558.00
- Deployments from the State of Florida for \$258,062.00
- Deployments from the State of Texas for \$15,517.00
- Deployments from USFS for \$1,162,504.40

Justification: Accessing out-of-state resources through mutual aid is vital for ensuring effective wildfire suppression when in-state resources are stretched thin or overwhelmed. These critical deployments help to contain and control wildfires more rapidly, thereby minimizing potential loss of life, residences, and natural resources within Oklahoma. Ensuring funds are available to compensate assisting states promptly fosters strong interstate relationships and guarantees continued support when Oklahoma is in need. This expenditure will be covered by the FY25 special appropriation for wildland firefighting expenses. The cost of these deployed resources will be reimbursed, with assistance from FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) from up to 75% of eligible costs incurred by the state for fire suppression activities, including costs reimbursed to assisting states. Our documentation processes will ensure that these expenditures meet FEMA's criteria for potential federal reimbursement.

FY26 - Project Learning Tree Books- \$20,000

This purchase is for Project Learning Tree (PLT) books, which will directly support forestry education efforts in schools across Oklahoma. These valuable educational materials will be distributed to classrooms statewide as an integral part of comprehensive community forestry and conservation education programming. **Justification:** Investing in Project Learning Tree books is vital for fostering environmental literacy and stewardship among Oklahoma's youth. PLT is a nationally recognized,

award-winning program that provides hands-on, interdisciplinary activities designed to help students understand complex environmental issues, develop critical thinking skills, and make informed decisions about natural resources. By providing these books to schools statewide, we can cultivate a deeper appreciation for our natural environment, promote sustainable practices from a young age, and help ensure a future generation committed to forest health and conservation across Oklahoma.

FY26- Acclaim Systems, Inc. - \$14,010.00

Acclaims will provide 3 months of Software Maintenance, Support and Problem Resolution, of the USAHERDS solution for Oklahoma. AgEnterprise, which is an updated version of USAHERDS, will provide maintenance for the VET-CVI application for 1 year (7/1/25-6/30/26). Without USAHerds and AgEnterprise maintenance, we will not be able to monitor animal health within specific jurisdictions or report test results to USDA's Veterinary Services.

MARKET DEVELOPMENT

FY2026 Oklahoma Youth Expo Junior Livestock Show & Educational Scholarship Program-Legislative Direct Spending-\$85.00.00 \$85,000.00

Justification: This amount of \$85,000.00 will directly support the 2026 state-wide spring junior livestock show. For 107 years, the youth of the state of Oklahoma have exhibited some of the finest livestock in the country at OYE, which carries the title of "The World's Largest Junior Livestock Show" with participants from all 77 Oklahoma counties. OYE also provides agricultural scholarships and leadership-training programs for Oklahoma students. The 10-day OYE generates an economic impact of \$24.5 million to the OKC economy and provides hundreds of youth with scholarships to continue their education at a collegiate level. If this purchase is not approved, there is negative impact on conducting the 2026 Oklahoma Youth Expo (OYE) as well as a reduction of show ring achievement and academic scholarships to the youth of Oklahoma.

FY2026 – Tulsa County Public Facilities Authority 2025 Junior Livestock Show – Legislative Directed Spending - \$50,000.00

Justification: The amount of \$50,000.00 goes directly for the purpose of promoting the Oklahoma agriculture industry through national agriculture events, Tulsa State Fair Junior Livestock Auction, and the Tulsa State Fair Livestock Scholarship Program. If this purchase is not approved, there will be a negative economic impact to Tulsa and surrounding communities with the loss of national ag events hosted at Expo Square. In addition, there would be a negative impact on conducting the 2025 Tulsa livestock show and a reduction of scholarships to the youth of Oklahoma.

FY2026 - Made in Oklahoma Coalition - Legislative Directed Spending - \$513,325.00

Justification: The amount of \$513,325.00 goes directly to support a unique public/private partnership that establishes a marketing program for the purpose of promoting food brand awareness, trade and consumer loyalty for Oklahoma food products through a variety of cooperative marketing activities. In addition, MIO promotes business retention, increase of sales to retail and foodservice outlets and business expansion. If this support is not provided, there is a negative impact on the seventy MIO members who employ over 26,000 Oklahomans who have reported increased sales directly related to

the MIO marketing campaigns. In addition, the momentum of new, small businesses benefiting from MIO resources and connections will be impaired.

FY 2026 – Board of Regents of the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center on behalf of Oklahoma Nutrition Information & Education Project (ONIE) – contractual services – Oklahoma Local Ag Summit – Funded entirely by Specialty Crop Block Grant - \$18,151.00

FY2026 – Oklahoma Local Ag Summit – facility rental – funded entirely by Specialty Crop Block Grant - \$35,000.00

Justification: This project is entirely funded by the USDA Specialty Crop Block Grant Program. The purpose of this grant is to enhance the competiveness of specialty crops in the state. If this proposed expense is not approved and therefore the project is not completed, the State not only loses money immediately that is important to the specialty crop industry through the economic impact, but also runs the risk of not being awarded money from the USDA Specialty Crop Block Grant Program in the future.

FY2026 – Oklahoma Grape Growers and Winemakers Conference – facility rental – funded entirely by the viticulture and enology revolving grant fund - \$6,500

FY2026 — Local Food for Schools (LFS) Grants with the objective of providing food assistance purchases of domestic local foods for distribution to schools. - Legislative Directed Spending - \$3,200,000.00

Justification: With funding made available through the Oklahoma State Legislature, ODAFF will help school districts maintain and improve food and agricultural supply chain resiliency through reimbursable grants. This program will strengthen the food system for schools by helping to build a fair, competitive, and resilient local food chain, and expand local and regional markets with an emphasis on purchasing from historically underserved producers and processors.

If this proposed expense is not approved and therefore the project is not completed, the State loses money immediately that is important to the school districts and agricultural producers throughout the state.





Revenue By Division July 2025












Total Expenses by Month July 2022 – July 2025



Employee FTE Totals Fiscal Year FY 2006 – FY 2026




Total Revenues, Appropriations and Expenses July 2025







Appropriations FY 2018 thru FY 2026









The Quality Manager has finished the Inorganic Section Internal Audit. The Section has completed over 50% of the findings made by the Quality Manager to date.


The Bureau of Standards 2025 audit has been initiated.

All internal and external equipment checks for the laboratory have been completed for the year, this includes: balance calibrations, UV meter, fume hoods and temperature verifications.




In July the QA Manager has assisted the Laboratory Director with researching alternative platforms for screening samples for Shiga Toxin *E. coli* (STEC) and automated sample preparation systems. These platforms include: BioMérieux: Gene-Up, BioMérieux: Vidas Mini and the Thermo Fisher: CyBio FeliX Instrument for SureTect PCR.

The QA Manager is also assisting the Food and Dairy Section with SOP and testing method updates. The Section plans to make changes to the sample enrichment step for *Listeria* testing. Planned changes would reduce the amount of media and reagents the Section uses to test for *Listeria*, saving time. The Section is in the process of preparing to add *Campylobacter* to its' testing scope. This pathogen is very sensitive to environments that contain large concentrations of oxygen (like our normal atmosphere) and therefore requires additional/specialized media, reagents, and equipment for testing. The Section has seen an increase in Campylobacter cases over the past two years. Campylobacter is commonly found in raw milk and raw poultry products.




June was a typical month for the Section. One dairy is currently suspended, and all dairies were tested for the month. The Section received passing results from a water proficiency test from May.


Eighteen meat samples were tested in June. Four meat samples were not tested due to the sample being received out of temperature or received after one week from when it was shipped.

The Section received six samples from a wheat harvest. The samples were tested for fecal coliforms, E. coli, Salmonella and Listeria. All six samples were positive for fecal coliforms. Two samples were presumptive positive for E. coli and one sample was positive for Listeria welshimeri.

Total Determinations










It was a typical testing month in July for the Section. One dairy is currently suspended and one dairy ceased operation. All other dairies were tested for the month.

Only two meat samples were tested for the month. This was due to a miscommunication with the inspectors. All samples will be tested for the quarter.









SEED SECTION: (Tori Gillispie, Agriculture Services Administrator I)

The Section received a total of 100 samples for the month of June. Crops being analyzed are still consisting primarily of summer crops including; sorghum, soybean, corn, cowpeas, sesame, and summer grasses. No quality issues have been discovered pertaining to the summer crops seed being tested. There was one label violation discovered this month. The label violation has since been remedied.

The Section is currently working to complete a hands-on proficiency test through The Association of Official Seed Analysts (AOSA). The test consists of a flax seed sample to be tested for germination test only.

The Seed Program is currently moving to a new licensing and poundage reporting portal for the seed dealer program. This move will ensure a better experience for current and new seed dealer license holders.

In July activity in the Section remained steady during the month, with a total of 160 samples received for testing. Wheat, rye, oats, and other small grains were the main crops tested while mostly turf and native grasses made up the remainder. Up to now there have been no quality issues discovered pertaining to small grain crops. Testing of certified wheat seed is showing great quality. There were no Seed Law violations discovered during the month.

Oklahoma Crop Improvement (OCIA) held their quarterly board meeting on July 24th, at the Oklahoma Wheat Commission in Oklahoma City. Members reported crop updates from across the state. Despite recent heavy rainfall, wheat crops were reported to be in excellent condition, with the primary concern being weed control. Corn crops are also progressing well. However, members are reporting cotton growth has been slower than expected, likely due to weather-related delays.

GENERAL CHEMISTRY SECTION: (Johnathan White, Environmental/Chemical Laboratory Scientist IV)

June continues the trend of a slow month with few samples coming in from CPS. We only received 106 total samples this month, with around 100 from CPS. This is the least amount of samples we have received in over two years. The Section was able to hit their target goal of 2500 samples and received 2538 total samples for the year. The Section also hit their target for overall determinations completing 12,156 determinations in fiscal year 2025. Sample inflow did pick up later in the month.

The Section received 106 samples, completed 104 samples consisting of 413 determinations. There were 30 violations found, giving a 7.26% fail rate. Some testing was held up due to equipment issues.

Turn-around time for the month was 17.21 days, this is exceeding expectation. It will likely increase slightly as the sample load goes up.

July was a good month for the Section and had a significant increase with incoming samples. All FY2025 were completed before the end of the month. The Section received some help from William Krivanek in Metrology and Bryan Fritz in Dairy with riffling samples, and Ebby Eubanks in Dairy on non-Riffling/Grinding Work. As sample inflow continues to increase we will need to rely on continued help to keep up.

The Section received 236 samples, completed 169 samples consisting of 698 determinations and, found 66 violations, giving a 9.46% fail rate. The Section had a slightly elevated fail rate due to some testing being held up by equipment issues in June but has been cleared up.

Our turn-around time for the month was 18.32 days, slightly over our target but good considering equipment issues. It will likely increase slightly as sample load goes up.

PESTICIDE SECTION: (David Smith, Environmental/Chemical Laboratory Scientist IV)

For June, new samples continue at seasonal average level. Preparations including stocking supplies and replacement components have been procured and should be sufficient for the expected season.

Training for the new HPLC-MS/MS systems has been completed, with two of our most common analytical methods being built and applied to either system. These two herbicide scans have been common to almost all Residue samples incoming this season and should speed up expected completion of testing.

In the month of June, the Section completed 37 samples. Below is the table showing the number of samples, tests per sample, and determinations (Det.) per sample with turnaround times (TAT). The average TAT for samples completed this month is 29 days.



The Section received 72 samples this month, comprising 171 tests. New samples received were mostly vegetation residue samples. (see Fig A).






Fig A. Pie charts representing the number of samples received by type (left) and matrix (right).




Fig B. Graph showing the number of samples received by the section each month.

For the month of July new sample arrivals have been average, with the exception of hemp compliance samples. The hemp harvest has increased noticeably and has tested below legal limits allowing for harvest and sale.

In residue testing the new sample concentrator is being used regularly to reduce sample volume lowering detection limits to parts per billion range in soil and vegetation samples. The apparatus is simple and convenient to use, and so far has not had any detrimental effect on sample analysis.

Turnaround Time for residue analysis will continue to be high due to the number of tests requested for each sample, and the complicated nature of the analysis itself.

Pesticide Section samples completed:

In the month of July, the Section completed 73 samples. Below is the table showing the number of samples, tests per sample, and determinations (Det.) per sample with turnaround times (TAT). The average TAT for samples completed this month is 43 days.








Pictured above: This is one of the 50-gallon provers that the Bureau calibrated for OCC, as well as multiple 5-gallon test measures.



Forestry Services' board report is formatted to reflect the priorities of the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy, which includes Resilient Landscapes, Fire Adapted communities, and Wildfire Response.

FIRE MANAGEMENT

Executive Summary – Drew Daily

Wildland Fire Management Executive Summary

Growing season rainfall totals (March 1-August 6) continue to register more than 100% normal rainfall given the very wet May and June while the 30-Day Percent reveals pockets of building dryness heading into late summer. That early growing season rainfall prompted vigorous herbaceous growth that will translate to areas of well-above normal fuel loading for areas where grazing and haying do not occur contributing the increased likelihood for problematic to extreme fire behavior as the transition to seasonal dormancy begins.

Live fuel moisture moderates both fuel receptiveness and fire behavior during the growing season. Provided that the frequency of wetting rainfall supports maintaining live fuel moisture, both wildfire occurrence and resistance to control are held in check. Conversely, prolonged absence of wetting rainfall drives the inverse resulting in both an increase in wildfires and enhanced suppression difficulty. It is worthwhile noting that a combination of environmental factors contributes to fire behavior. Alignment and significance of alignment in these factors guide wildfire danger and can be loosely gauged monitoring the following environmental trigger points:

- Greater than 10 days separated from wetting rainfall.
- Consecutive days with temperature +10° above normal.
- Overnight relative humidity recovery less than 60%.
- Afternoon relative humidity values less than 25% east, 20% central/western and 15% Panhandle/northwest.
- KBDI values greater than 400 (Keetch-Byram Drought Index measuring reflecting upper-level soil moisture).
- Rapidly decreasing Live Herbaceous Fuel Moisture.
- Sustained wind speed greater than 20 mph.

During July, OFS responded and/or supported 49 wildfires that burned 598 acres. Additionally, OFS responded to and supported Caddo County fire departments and the Bureau of Indian Affairs with a wildfire south of Fort Cobb in late July. One week into August, OFS responded to 10 wildfires burning 52.4 acres and fire departments have reported 5 wildfires burning 107.7 Acres. Overall, there was a slight uptick in wildfire activity with probability of successful initial attack remaining very good.

At the time of the writing of this report, OFS had the following resources mobilized supporting incidents outside of Oklahoma:

- Montana: 1 Incident Commander Type 3 and 1 Safety Officer-Complex
- Washington: 1 Dozer Operator, 1 Initial Attack Dozer Operator, 2 Task Force Leaders and 1 Ground Support Unit Leader
- Arizona: 1 Safety Officer Complex
- Louisiana: 1 Type 6 Engine w/3 personnel

Fire Environment Outlook

Ample rainfall in May and June, coupled with many locations receiving recurrent rainfall through July, encouraged vigorous herbaceous growth across most of Oklahoma. Entering August, those previous rains were followed up


with another round of solidly wetting rainfall, boosting live fuel moisture and reducing overall fire danger to some extent. There are a handful of pockets in Oklahoma where dry conditions are beginning to emerge and are easily identified with Mesonet's Days Since 0.25" Rainfall map (right).


Fire danger is currently expected to remain moderate, bumping the high category occasionally when alignment in the environmental triggers identified in the Executive Summary occur. Expect to observe daily variation in fire danger coupled with increasing concern if the above normal temperatures continue in the absence of wetting rainfall.


The Seasonal Temperature and Precipitation Outlooks (right) continue to lean toward above normal temperatures on average while the rainfall guidance remains a bit more challenging to decipher.

The statewide average rainfall for the month of August is 2.90". Many locations in the south-central and western regions have received 0.5"-1+" so far this month while amounts vary widely in the north-central and eastern half of the state ranging from nil to an area of 4.23" in LeFlore County. Again, separation from wetting rainfall coupled with above normal temperature supporting enhanced rates of evapotranspiration will lead to increasing fuels availability.

If you have noticed the red sunrises and sunsets lately, those are largely attributed to smoke from wildfires occurring to the west and northwest of Oklahoma as the smoke circulates around the high-pressure system ('heat dome') that is centered in New Mexico currently. As the smoke circulates around the high pressure it is depositing in Oklahoma increasing particulate matter in the air yielding red sunrises and sunsets.







OFS Wildland Fire Research

While OFS does not specifically have either a predictive services or research arm within the agency, we do make considerable investment in these areas to inform incident responders and public situation awareness, to leverage science and technology within our capacity to advance cutting edge predictive services and to effectively warn incident responders and the public when a wildfire occurs that presents a Particularly Dangerous Situation. In fact, the Integrated Warning Team / Fire Warnings that were innovated here in Oklahoma in a partnership between OFS and the National Weather Service are being evaluated for potential implementation nationwide.

The most recent peer-reviewed publication titled "Dry Return Flow: A Critical Fire Weather Pattern on the Southern

Great Plains" (July 2025; Lindley, Daily, et. al.) identifies the weather factors, fuel conditions and ambient fire environment contributors that have led to some of the most impactful wildfire events on the southern Plains, specifically Oklahoma. This work, published in the Journal of Operational Meteorology, equips meteorologists and agency fire planners with the knowledge to recognize those fire environment contributors that result in a high volume of wildfires occurring that strain response efforts. Somewhat unique to this partnered approach is the focus on research that directly correlates to

operations that builds preparedness guiding more efficient response when wildfires do occur and enhanced prevention messaging in advance of the threat. One of the proposed, partnered communication graphics that is being considered is below.



<u>Hazardous Fuels Mitigation Program – Aaron Williams</u>

- State Fire Capacity Mitigation Grant FY23, the Tinker Project, has been completed and closed out with the USFS.
- Mitigation crews will begin moving equipment to the Tulsa area for work at the Gilcrease Museum project in early September. Mechanical treatments on the project will begin the first week of October.

Community Fire Assistance Program – Tammy Carter

- FFP Update: One structural fire truck was placed with a certified fire department in Oklahoma.
- FEPP Update: 4 pieces of equipment were returned to the Community Fire Assistance Yard in Goldsby to be processed for online GSA sales. 15 trucks are currently in the on-line sales cycle process.
- Operational Grants (FY26 \$8,414,550.00): There was a total of 827 certified Fire Departments to receive the operational grant. The first installment of the Operational Grants has been processed and the individual payment of \$10,174.78 is to be deposited in August via EFT. Qualifying fire departments can use these funds for things such as equipment maintenance, insurance premiums and training.
- 80/20 Grants (FY26 \$2,000,000.00): The application process opened in March and ran through May 1st.
 Those departments awarded grants can use the funding for fire station construction and fire equipment
 purchase. FY26 grant caps for building purposes has been raised to \$75,000.00 and \$30,000.00 on purchasing
 equipment.
- Equipment Replacement Grant: The first installment of this grant that was awarded to 127 departments has been processed and the first payment was deposited in August via EFT.
- Training: None from the Community Fire Standpoint.

<u>Community Wildfire Defense Grant (CWDG) Program – Eric Ashlock/Erin Brazel</u>

- Progress across multiple regions continues under the CWDG program, with new hires, contractor engagements, and ongoing coordination taking place throughout Oklahoma.
- We are currently awaiting the preliminary results of Round 3 applications expected mid-August, and new outreach efforts are underway in additional communities. The application period closed on March 12, 2025, and Oklahoma submitted seven grants for Round 3.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Health Program - Dieter Rudolph

- Oklahoma hosted the 64th Annual Southern Forest Health Work Conference (SFHWC), July 15th through the 17th, in Tulsa. In the long history of SFHWC, this is the first time it has ever been in Oklahoma.
 - Dieter nominated Oklahoma as the host state for 2025 at the 62nd Annual meeting and acted as the Local Arrangements and Logistics contact for the meeting.
 - This conference focused on forest health issues across the southern region, welcoming around 80 professionals and grad students in the fields of forestry, forest entomology, and forest pathology.
 - Additionally, Dieter presented on Oklahoma Forestry Services focus on increasing outreach in rural areas, organized and presented at the field trip at Turkey Mountain Urban Wilderness Area, and gave the SGSF Forest Health Committee State Update.
- Since early June Dieter has worked with Chloe-Bennett-Steele, an Environment and Science Reporter with StateImpact Oklahoma, on the topic of emerald ash borer and the release of parasitic wasps as a biocontrol for the invasive pest. The final product, an article and radio segment, was released in July. (QR code to the article to the right)



- Oklahoma Forestry Services is developing new invasive species programs utilizing Bipartisan Infrastructure Legislation funding. These new projects will be developed and implemented over the next five years. They include:
 - Increasing capacity for remote sensing by collecting imagery over Musket Mountain to track changes in forest health over time to better create active management plans.
 - Increasing OFS capacity to increase outreach in rural Oklahoma, focusing on building partnerships with smaller communities across the state.
 - Creating a "toolshed" at each office, supplying invasive species and forest management tools to be checked out by landowners to implement the practices prescribed in their forest management plans.
- Oklahoma Forestry Services is now accepting applications for landowners to participate in the Oklahoma
 Forest Landowner Financial Assistance Program, a cost-share program focused on funding forest
 management practices to improve forest resiliency, increase timber production, increase acres of forest, and
 decrease the risk of catastrophic wildfires. This funding totals \$3 million and is provided through the US Forest
 Service and the Inflation Reduction Act.

- July 3rd Urban Forestry Coordinator Riley Coy pruned the Survivor Tree at the Oklahoma City National Memorial to remove lower limbs from visitor's reach.
- July 8th Urban and Community Partnership Coordinator Elizabeth Bland-Corbishley attended the "Bug-Out" Training put on by Forest Health Specialist Dieter Rudolph at Lake Murray. This training is to get foresters familiar with what Emerald Ash Borer damage looks like in person.




• July 9th - Riley and Elizabeth met with the Black Heritage Tree Project folks in Tulsa to scout for historic witness trees in the Greenwood District.





• July 21st - Riley met with arborists at the Oklahoma City National Memorial and Museum to spray a yellow loblolly pine with Iron to see if it greens up. (Purely experimental)



- July 21st The Urban and Community Forestry team opened the Urban and Community Forestry Match-Waived Grant for the second round of applications. Communities and non-profits can apply for up to \$50,000 to help communities that suffer from low tree canopy benefits. The grant application window closes on August 29th at 5:00pm.
- July 23rd Urban Forestry Coordinator Riley Coy met with the Oklahoma City planners to help rewrite the parking lot codes which will dramatically decrease concrete coverage throughout the city and add low maintenance, native trees and green spaces to help absorb storm water and decrease summer heat radiation. With more people commuting and teleworking, the mandated parking spaces for new commercial construction requirements are antiquated and harmful to bigger cities.
- July 28th Elizabeth visited NSU in Tahlequah to check the status of trees planted on campus through the U&CF grant. The trees all look healthy and have grown quite a bit due to the spring rainfall.





 July 31st - Riley met with arborists at the Oklahoma City National Memorial and Museum to treat trees slated for transplanting with Paclobutrazol. This treatment prepares the roots for the stresses of transplanting prior to the construction project that will ultimately require removal/transplanting.



Forest Inventory and Analysis (FIA) Program – Josh Bradley

- FIA continued to collect forest health, timber volume, and wildfire fuel data across the state. Plots were
 remeasured in Pawnee, Payne, Creek, Osage, Seminole, Pottawatomie, Love, Carter, Mayes and other
 counties. Remeasurement of these plots, in partnership with the US Forest Service, provides highly accurate
 estimates of fuel types, biomass, seedling components, and woody encroachment area on a regional level.
- FIA took a break from field work the first week of July to assist the Forest Regeneration Center in planting ~300,000 containerized loblolly seedlings to support commercial forests in McCurtain County, Pushmataha County, Leflore County, and beyond.

Forest Heritage Center (FHC) - Shalee Buzan

- The monthly board meeting was held on July 4th for the FHC Advisory Board where we discussed the group camp two roof project for forestry camp and changing our bimonthly meetings to September.
- We also received additional grants this year. We will now have playground equipment that is forestry themed
 at the Forest Heritage Center to encourage play for our young visitors that will hopefully keep them grounded
 and in the museum longer.
- The FHC Board of Directors added Adentro Services to our Wi-Fi here in the museum. We are now collecting data on our customers that visit the FHC. Early data shows that our attendees stay anywhere from 1 to 2 hours but most stay for two hours on average. Our repeat attendees over a three-day period attended more than once.

Forestry Education Program - Tony Pascall

- July 7th Education Coordinator Tony Pascall taught at the First Americans Museum Summer Camp. 30 students learned about forestry and did close analysis of the trees outside the museum to start to identify them.
- July 10th Tony held a booth at the Ag in the Classroom summer conference in Oklahoma City. 200 educators learned about PLT and forestry education resources, and 20 also attended a workshop on PLT's "Trees & Me" curriculum on incorporating forestry into early childhood education.
- July 15th Tony led two PLT workshops for Edmond Public Schools. 25 K-8 teachers now have access to hands-on forestry lessons that they can use in their own classrooms.
- July 22nd Tony taught 20 students from the OKC YMCA during their "outdoor day" at Scissortail park. These 3-6 year olds learned about finding shapes in nature, and why plants are important as pollinators and as habitats.



• July 23rd - Tony taught 20 kids aged 2-9 about how trees grow at the First Luther daycare in Ponca City. These students

went on a nature walk and learned about the importance of forests.

- July 23rd Tony taught 10 high schoolers about careers in forestry at the 104th 4H-roundup in Stillwater. These students learned about careers at OFS, as well as industry and research careers in the forest sector.
- July 29th and 30th Tony co-hosted the Project Learning Tree facilitator retreat. This was a celebration for the volunteers who help run PLT workshops all over the state, as well as ongoing training on best practices in facilitating workshops for adult learners. 13 volunteers joined us for the two-day retreat at Lake Murray State Park in Ardmore.
- We also awarded our first "Facilitator of the Year" award to Tammy Coffee at this event. Tammy has led multiple workshops over the past couple years, and is committed to helping teachers get students outdoors more!






Forest Regeneration Center (FRC) and Forest Tree Improvement Center (FTIC) - Justin Jones

- Justin Jones, Forest Regeneration Programs Manager, could hardly wait to be the first one to pull a newly
 acquired 15-foot Land Pride bat-wing mower through the loblolly pinecone production orchards located at
 the Forest Tree Improvement Center in Idabel.
 - With the help of Ol' faithful, a well-maintained 1976 John Deere 4230 tractor, consistent mowing and orchard floor preparation will not only support effective cone collection, but also promote a cleaner, safer, and more accessible orchard environment for all fall cultural practices.
 - By integrating equipment upkeep with timely field operations, this approach strengthens the foundation for successful seed harvest and long-term productivity of the orchard.



- Sand plum (Prunus angustifolia) fruit was harvested for the purpose of seed production, with the goal of continual growing of future 1-0 bareroot seedlings.
 - Due to limited staffing availability, a flailing collection method was employed to maximize fruit recovery across the 5-acre orchard site located at the FRC.
 - This method, while somewhat coarse and abusive to orchard trees, allowed for rapid collection over large areas with highly intensified manual labor within a short duration.
 - Amazing work for such a small staff; we collected >5,000 lbs. in 3-4 days while multi-tasking and completing other day-to-day tasks.
 - After harvest, the fruit will be processed to extract and clean the seeds, followed by drying and proper cold storage to maintain viability until sowing.



- Field preparations are currently underway in anticipation of next year's seedling planting.
 - The process begins with primary tillage using a turning plow, effectively turning over the soil to incorporate surface residue and disrupt weed growth.
 - This is immediately followed by chiseling to break up the subsurface hard pan, enhancing root penetration depth and improving the soil's moisture-holding capacity, both critical factors for successful establishment of bareroot seedlings.
 - As part of the preparation, soil samples will be collected to assess organic matter content and overall soil health. These results will inform a long-term soil amendment strategy, particularly with the planned application of wood mulch.





 Justin Jones and Randy Holeman recently conducted site survivability inspections with Dan Lewia, Forestry Consultant from Antlers, across several tracts that were planted during the past year.

 The inspected tracts, located north of Antlers and back towards Pine Creek Lake, lie on the edge of the

The mulch, sourced from donated material generated through local utility right-of-way mulching, offers a sustainable, locally available option to increase organic content, suppress weeds, and moderate soil

native loblolly pine range and are known for their difficult soils and drought-prone conditions.

• Despite the challenging site conditions, the group observed exceptionally high seedling survival and vigorous growth thanks to high-quality seedling genetics, favorable weather conditions, and sound planting practices.

- These early results validate the strategic investment in improved loblolly pine genetics with superior grown seedlings from our Regeneration program.
- It also lays the foundation for landowners in this region to be positioned to benefit from successful reforestation and future timber production thanks to the efforts of the OFS's Forest Regeneration Program.

Water Quality - Aaron Black

Best Management Practices (BPMs)

- A total of six completed logging tracts and one ongoing tract have been surveyed for BMP implementation, all on industry lands. A combined total of over 1800 acres has been inspected with an average score above 90% implementation.
- Inspections were conducted in Pushmataha County.
- Stream Side Management Zones have been at 100% implementation and no risk to water quality has been identified at this time.
- Drier conditions have resulted in more tract access and high scores in all areas.

Education and Training

- One individual private landowner site visit in Oklahoma County was consulted on severe erosion issues and options for mature tree protection and stream bank armoring.
- Efforts are currently underway to try and obtain funds and responsibilities for potential repairs and mitigation.
- A commissioner's office site visit was made to inspect streamside erosion issues and help develop mitigation efforts through tree planting and riparian exclusionary fencing on an adjoining school and private tract.



- A total of one BMP/ Erosion complaint was addressed and confirmed to be outside the scope of forestry BMPs and was directed to the appropriate agency.
- The OFS Water Quality program was presented to the OSU Agricultural Extension "Morning Coffee" discussion where BMPs and erosion mitigation tactics were covered as well as all service that could be provided to the public and private sectors.



EC Area Highlights – Eve Hawkins/Caleb Fields

Forest Protection

- EC has suppressed one fire within the EC protection area on a total of 0.1 acres.
- EC responded to one false alarm.
- As temperatures rise and rainfall amounts decrease, EC rangers prepare for an uptick in wildfire response.
- Many of the late summer wildfires that rangers respond to can be ignited by heavy equipment operations from hay baling, brush-hogging, land clearing, and logging activities.
- During the month of July, two EC rangers restaffed the T6 engine in Gasquet, California on a federal fire assignment for an additional two weeks.





Four EC rangers also staffed an OFS dozer for a total of 35 days near Luna, NM. The first two weeks
consisted of initial attack response, and the remaining days were spent on the Goose Fire near Silver City,
NM.





 East Central currently has two rangers in Washington state on a 2-week fire assignment with one serving as a Task Force Leader near Forks, WA and the other ranger serving as a Initial Attack Dozer Operator near Clarkston, WA.





Hazardous Fuels Mitigation

- District Forester Eddie Woods completed two prescribed burn plans covering 1,252 acres.
- EC Area is waiting to hear from ODOT and Kiamichi Electric regarding a right-of-way clearing project on the powerline that feeds service to the Sycamore Tower on top of Winding Stair Mountain where one of OFS' radio repeaters is located.

Forest Management

- District Forester Eddie Woods prepared one Forest Stewardship plan on a property totaling 45 acres and visited two separate properties for sick tree assessments.
- EC Rangers traveled to Goldsby on two separate days to assist Forest Regeneration Center personnel with potting containerized tree seedlings.
- Forester Brandon Faulkenberry conducted site visits to inspect site prep work for tree planting on one tract totaling 42 acres and coordinated with aerial spraying contractor to conduct site prep spraying.
- He also visited with the US Fish and Wildlife partner's representative concerning cost-share assistance for private landowners.

Information / Education

- EC Foresters Eddie Woods and Caleb Fields attended the Survivor Tree Seedling planting at McAlester High School. The Survivor Tree seedling was planted by McAlester FFA students and attended by McAlester city officials and local news outlets.





Feed Program

Program Performance

During this reporting period there were a total of 81 official feed samples analyzed, with 402 feed determinations made from these samples. These determinations resulted in the issuance of 15 violations for feeds or feed ingredients that did not meet established tolerances based on their guaranteed analysis. Most of these violations were issued for products deficient in Crude Protein. Other violations include Potassium. Calcium, Vitamin A, Zinc, and Salt.

Ten stop sales orders were issued for feed products with severe deviations from their guaranteed analysis. Four stop sales were issued for products deficient in Vitamin A. Two stop sales were issued for products deficient in Crude Fat. Two stop sales were issued for products deficient in Calcium. One stop sale was issued for a product deficient in Salt. One stop sale was issued for a product that exceeded the max allowable for Crude Fiber.

The following tables show a two-month comparison of label violations and stop sale orders issued by the Department for feed products that did not meet their guaranteed analysis.

Weights & Measures Program

The large capacity scale technicians tested 129 Vehicle scales and 18 of the scales were rejected.

CPS Field Agents checked a total of 827 small scales and 25 platform scales, 11 of the scales were rejected. There were 18 random pack inspections and 45 standard pack inspections conducted. Additionally, 52 price verification inspections were conducted at various retailers that resulted in 4 companies receiving a letter of warning.

Four scale companies received a letter of warning for not properly servicing scales.

During FY25 our four COOL Inspectors conducted 45 Country of Origin Labeling inspections for the USDA.

Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry Animal Industry Services Board Report August 27, 2025 Activities July 1, 2025 – July 31, 2025

Animal Disease Traceability:

During this time, we distributed 5,300 orange calfhood vaccination EID tags to veterinarians, and 10,400 official EID tags to veterinarians, livestock markets, and producers. We also distributed a laptop with market software to a livestock market veterinarian. They are using the software and appreciate the built-in features to assist with billing and CVI creation.

15 new accounts were opened for the no-cost electronic CVI we offer to Oklahoma veterinarians. Since we stopped distributing paper CVIs at the end of December, we are seeing a decrease in the number of paper CVIs being returned, and an increase in the number of electronic CVIs. For the most part, the transition has gone smoothly and there have been very few major complaints.

AIS continues to work with Acclaim services through the transition planning for moving the information from USA Herds to the new Ag Enterprise platform. We are currently in the UAT phase after receiving training within the Staging site the week of July 21-25.

We continue to assist Investigative Services with cattle theft investigations by reviewing official identification records in USAHerds to determine if movement has occurred.

Aquaculture:

Marissa finalized one late renewal license and had two new inquiries. July is the timeframe that we initiate aquaculture facility inspections. Inspections completed thus far indicate no issues.

Biologics:

During this time, six new products were registered.

Cattle Programs:

We are participating in USDA's National Milk Testing Strategy. As part of that program, we will test every licensed dairy in Oklahoma monthly. Testing for the first seven months of 2025 has all been negative. Once all states have achieved negative status for several months, the US will be declared free of HPAI in the dairy herd.

Brucellosis:

The only remaining reservoir of *B abortus* in the U.S. is in elk and bison in the Greater Yellowstone Park area.


While there is very little need to test for *B abortus* any longer, this means we have very little or no surveillance for *Brucella suis* (Swine Brucellosis) in cattle, which currently infects approximately 20% of the feral swine that our Wildlife Services personnel test. *B suis* can, and does, infect cattle occasionally.

Tuberculosis:

We were notified of a feedyard in Cimarron County that received a cull dairy cow that originated from a 25,000 head infected dairy in Texas. I followed up with feedyard management and will monitor the pen of cull cows until they are slaughtered at an inspected processing plant.

Trichomoniasis:

During this period there were 360 Oklahoma bulls tested for Trichomoniasis with no positive confirmations.



10,640 bulls tested / 9 positive = 0.085% positive

Our current statistics compare to 2.1% positive bulls in 2011, 1.4% in 2012, 1.3% in 2013, 1.4% in 2014, 1.1% in 2015, 1.1% in 2016, 0.5% in 2017, 0.32% in 2018, 0.42% in 2019, 0.35% in 2020, 0.28% in 2021, 0.3% in 2022, 0.22% in 2023, and 0.13% in 2024.

Johne's Disease:

We received five Johne's Disease positive reports for the month of July, all representing new premises identifications. Our 11-year average for the same period is 10 positive reports identifying six new premises. Our current year-to-date positive reports are 42 for 31 new premises. This disease continues to move mainly with the purchase of infected but unaffected animals.

Unfortunately, many producers are not interested in the disease until they buy it.

We continue to help veterinarians and producers understand the disease risk, ways to manage the disease and work out testing strategies to identify infected animals for culling while meeting the producer's goals.

Emergency Management:

On July 16, Dana Call attended the Inter-Tribal Emergency Management Coalition (ITEMC) meeting, hosted by the Chickasaw Nation Emergency Operations Center in Ada. AIS continues to foster a collaborative relationship with this group to develop contacts, provide resources and education regarding livestock disease and protection to the tribes across the state.

AIS will be participating in their Annual ITEMC Summit in August of this year. Dana Call will be attending, and Dr. Gorczyca-Southerland and Austyn Fuss will be speaking at the Summit. We will have an information table as well.

Equine Programs:

The Piroplasmosis-positive horse identified in Haskell County, Oklahoma, continues to undergo post-treatment testing and remains under quarantine to mitigate the risk of further transmission.

A quarantine remains in place related to one of our positive EIA cases involving a foal in Kay County. This foal is the result of an embryo transfer from a mare that later tested positive for EIA. It is believed that the embryo transfer occurred prior to the donor mare's exposure to or infection with EIA. The recipient mare has tested negative for EIA. The foal will undergo EIA testing two to three months post-weaning. Weaning is expected to occur in early August 2025.

On July 30, Dr. Gorczyca and I met with Oklahoma State Fair Park officials and officials with American Quarter Horse Association to discuss biosecurity plans and response plans for upcoming horse shows at the Fairgrounds.

Farmed Cervidae Programs:

AIS completed the 2025 Annual CWD-Herd Certification Program (HCP) annual report detailing the activities of Oklahoma Cervidae Producers. There are 16 CWD certified herds in Oklahoma with a combined total of 2,104 animals in the program. These producers submitted a total of 74 CWD test samples for this reporting period. There have been no reports of CWD positive cases in the wild or in the captive cervid herds to date. There is a total of 2,721 animals in the remaining 92 non-HCP herds in Oklahoma.

We continue to receive genetic testing results from the whitetail deer producers participating in the 2024 CWD cooperative agreement.

AIS received notification of approval for additional funding for the 2025 CWD cooperative agreement. The \$50,000.00 award will fund genetic testing for elk producers who participate in the CWD- HCP to gather data for identifying genetic markers for CWD resistance in elk.

On July 11 Dr. Stone held a wet lab training for CWD sampling of Cervidae.

On July 15, Dana Call participated in a webinar discussing CWD management in native populations.

Feral Swine:

We continue to work with Acclaim and OMES for data migration from Kelly Registration Solutions to Ag Enterprise. OMES has collected historical information for the feral swine licenses from Kelly for the transition to Ag Enterprise.

Foreign Animal Disease:

During this time we had two FAD investigations. The first was a horse from Harper County with oral lesions compatible with Vesicular Stomatitis. The second was a litter of pigs with oral and skin lesions compatible with FMD, ASF, or CSF. Our field veterinarians performed investigations and submitted appropriate samples. Thankfully, both cases were confirmed to not be FADs.

Our Oklahoma New World Screwworm Working Group met July 15 and July 29. I gave updates on the most current information from USDA, we had discussion on outreach material, Dr. Gorczyca demonstrated the information and mapping tool we developed with the assistance of Oklahoma Forestry Services GIS specialist to transmit the location of cases and other pertinent information. We also briefly discussed Oklahoma's response plan and ongoing efforts by USDA and the State Veterinarians Working Group to develop plans that all states can use as a guide.

USDA is hosting a series of listening sessions focused on different aspects of the NWS response. I attended virtual sessions on July 2, 7, and 11.

I am part of a working group from the National Assembly of State Animal Health Officials that is working to develop protocols to manage infestations that will satisfy states that are receiving animals from states that are affected with infestations. We met July 2, 9, 16, 23, and 30.

On July 23, Dr. Gorczyca and I met with representatives from Oklahoma Cattlemen's Association, the OK Beef Council, and the Livestock Marketing Association to discuss the ODAFF NWS response plan specific to the cattle industry.

Dr. Gorczyca has been working with OFS and Chris Mask to utilize ArcGIS to develop reporting and mapping tools for the NWS response. A QR code has been developed that will be included on outreach materials for self-reporting of suspicious larvae or flies from the public.

On July 28, AIS staff participated in the first of several webinars addressing New World Screwworm (NWS) management using the Emergency Management Response System. AIS staff are preparing for Oklahoma's NWS response plan by coordinating supplies and finalizing instructions for sample submissions.

Livestock Market Audits:

During this period, staff conducted an audit of 4S Livestock Auction. A routine audit of the company's custodial account indicated a shortage in the account and subsequent audits discovered violations of the market's handling of custodial account funds. After a formal letter of warning, a follow-up audit will be conducted in the following month to confirm that the market has corrected the problems found.

Also, during the month of July, two of the states licensed markets ceased operations. Clinton Livestock Auction owner Sandy Berry sold her property and the new owners do not plan to reopen as a livestock auction. Additionally, G & C Feathers and Furs located outside of Blanchard has suspended operations of their goat and sheep auction.

In addition to this market activity, this division sent packets to a few individuals interested in the sheep and goat marketing business. This period also allowed for a few additional custodial account audits.

Outreach:

On July 9, Dr. Gorczyca was interviewed by Jaxxon Staggs of Purcell FFA about NWS

On July 22, I met with a working group that is suggesting updated statutory and administrative rule language that apply to newer technologies, telemedicine, etc.

On July 25, I gave a presentation on NWS at Oklahoma Cattlemen's Association Convention. I thought it was well received and had very good questions and input from the cattlemen present.

On July 27, I attended Oklahoma Livestock Marketing Association's Summer Meeting. We discussed the NWS issue and discussed our plan in broad terms, especially how it affects livestock auction markets.

Poultry Programs

There have been eight sick or dead birds submitted for our sick bird/dead bird program since last report and a total of 116 since January 1st, 2025.

We have had no new HPAI (High Pathogenicity Avian Influenza) positive detections in Oklahoma since the last report. Our two HPAI positive WOAH Non-poultry flocks from Grady County and Woodward County have been released from quarantine.

We continue to respond to sick bird calls with testing of suspect birds. Furthermore, we are actively engaged in HPAI surveillance, which includes testing of avian populations at live bird markets, auctions, and feed stores.

The last detection of HPAI in poultry in the U.S. was 7/2/2025. This continues to be the largest foreign animal disease incursion in U.S. history, with over 136 million birds affected. The virus has impacted domestic flocks in all 50 states and one U.S. territory, with 1,709 confirmed premises and 444 active Control Areas and Surveillance Zones still in effect.

Even though we are observing a downward trend in HPAI poultry cases across the United States, we must remain vigilant. Therefore, we continue to emphasize the importance of biosecurity for both commercial and backyard flocks through outreach efforts, including emails, social media, and county extension offices.

Dr. Parrott and our NPIP (National Poultry Improvement Plan) Coordinator, Sherrie Davis, attended the OSA (Official State Agency) and GCC (General Conference Committee) meeting on July 14th- July 17th. This meeting allows representatives from each state's OSA and USDA to gather and discuss poultry health issues, review NPIP program operations, share updates on disease surveillance, and coordinate implementation of NPIP standards in their respective states. It serves as a forum for collaboration between states and federal officials to maintain and improve poultry health certification programs nationwide.

Public Health

There were no significant public health activities during this time.

Rabies in Livestock:

On July 10, a positive rabies case was confirmed in a pregnant heifer in Mayes County, Oklahoma. The heifer was part of a herd of 32 heifers, two bulls, and six horses. The heifer also had contact with six bottle calves and three butcher calves. To mitigate the risk of further spread, a four-month quarantine was implemented for all the livestock on the premises.

On July 18, a case of rabies was confirmed in a dog in Custer County, Oklahoma. The dog resided on a property with multiple livestock, including 13 goats that the owner observed the dog attempting to attack the day prior to its euthanasia. The evening before euthanasia, the dog was also confined in a pen with two calves and routinely lived outdoors with one milk cow. To mitigate the risk of disease transmission, all livestock on the premises have been placed under a six-month quarantine.

Sheep and Goat Programs:

There were no significant activity in the Sheep and Goat Programs.

Swine Programs:

The third herd of show pigs that had a seropositive sow had its last whole herd test. Thankfully all sows were negative, and the herd was released from quarantine.

AIS has established a commuter herd agreement for The Hanor Company between Oklahoma and Illinois for commercial swine movement.

There are two approved swine production health plans and swine movement data for Seaboard's pilot program in Ag View. We are looking forward to expanding this platform for Seaboard and other commercial swine producers.

The US SHIP House of Delegates meeting is in September. Oklahoma received 10 voting delegates this year based on the number of certified sites in the state. Delegates will be chosen with collaboration from the US SHIP OSA and the OK Pork Council. Each delegate will represent a sector of the swine industry within the state. Dr. Gorczyca will be a panel member for the US SHIP Traceability Working Group and the Biosecurity Working Group breakout sessions at the HOD meeting.

On July 16th, Dr. Gorczyca attended the monthly US SHIP OSA call.

On July 29, we received a trace back from some show pigs that were tested positive for brucellosis in Arkansas. The information we received was that two show pig producers in Oklahoma sold pigs to exhibitors in Arkansas with no testing or CVIs. We quarantined the Oklahoma herds and will be testing them.

Miscellaneous:

Dr. Stone was to testify on July 10 in Payne County Court, for the Payne County Sherriff's Office, following an investigation of animal abuse or neglect from March 18, 2024. The owner faced 26 felony abuse charges. Fortunately, the defendant and their attorney agreed to a plea deal that included education for rescue shelters, animal nutrition, pasture management and animal health

On July 31, I submitted our USDA Cooperative Agreement reports for the quarter from April 1 – June 30.

Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry Wildlife Services Division Board Report for July 2025 Activities

Introduction

Wildlife Services (WS) responds to damage complaints caused by wildlife to resources or property throughout Oklahoma. WS Specialists conduct operational damage management programs for many of the complaints they receive to resolve these wildlife damage problems. During this period, these projects were conducted on 381 properties with an estimated 678,838 acres of land under agreement. Additionally, WS helped 180 people and entities with technical assistance which involved providing information to cooperators so they can resolve problems themselves. Cooperators reported and WS Specialists verified wildlife damage of \$532,495 during this period. Beaver damages accounted for losses totaling \$330,500. Predation, primarily coyotes and black vultures were responsible for a number of damage requests, largely to livestock, with losses totaling \$15,624. Feral swine damages accounted for losses totaling \$184,871, while other species of wildlife were responsible for \$1,500 in damages to property, agriculture, and livestock.




Figure 1: Species Removed in West District by percentage during July 2025




Figure 2: Species Removed in the East District by percentage during July 2025




Figure 3: Species Removed in the Central District by percentage during July 2025




Figure 4: Species Removed in the State by percentage during July 2025

Predator Damage Management

Love County landowner called WS, reporting coyotes on the camera on their property. Two fawns were found predated on near their pens with estimated losses at \$2000. A WS Specialist met with the landowner and verified the loss. WS scouted the area and found where coyotes were digging under the fence. Devices were set and one coyote has been removed from the property.

Logan County landowner called WS with a report of coyotes killing sheep. WS met with the landowner and verified coyotes were responsible for the losses at \$1000 for five sheep. Devices were set on the property, and two coyotes have been removed at this time with work ongoing currently.

Garfield County cooperator called WS with reports of losing two lambs valued at \$400 from coyote predation. After scouting the area, equipment was set and three coyotes were removed with no further losses.

Ellis County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes predating on his lambs. The producer reported coyotes killed three lambs valued at \$700. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Ellis County responded to the request and examined one carcass and confirmed coyotes were responsible for the loss. The Specialist recommended non-lethal methods of carcass removal, night penning, shed lambing, and guarding animals to reduce future lamb losses from coyotes. Control efforts have removed four coyotes and are continuing currently.

Greer County landowner requested assistance with coyotes predating on one of his calves valued at \$881. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Greer County examined the carcasses and verified that coyotes were responsible for the loss. Damage management efforts were successful in removing

six coyotes from the property. Control efforts continue to help further reduce the threat to the cooperator's calves.

Stephens County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes predating on his calves valued at \$881. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Stephens County conducted a site visit and determined coyotes were responsible for the loss. Damage management efforts were successful in removing four coyotes from the property. No further losses have occurred, and work is ongoing currently.

Feral Swine Damage Management

Pawnee County landowner called WS about feral swine destroying a barn pad foundation that was damaged and rooted through the dirt. WS responded and verified the damage estimated at \$2000. Prebait was applied to the property and a trap was set up when the feral swine were identified. Eighteen feral swine were removed from the property by WS, and no more activity has been identified.

Pottawatomie County landowner called WS with reports of feral swine tearing up hayfields, with damages estimated at \$5000. WS responded to the call and determined the damage was caused by feral swine. Prebait was started with corn and a corral trap was placed on the property. Twenty-seven feral swine have been removed from the property and there is no more sign of feral swine on his property.

Custer County landowner contacted WS needing assistance with feral swine damaging his pastures estimated at \$2,000. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Custer County responded to the request and verified the damage. Control efforts resulted in the removal of eighty-seven feral swine from the property. No additional damage has occurred, and the population in the area is being monitored to determine if additional management is needed.

Harmon County farmer requested assistance with feral swine causing damage on thirty acres of pasture valued at \$1,500. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Harmon County responded to the request and his field inspection verified the damage to his pasture. The Specialist utilized a live trap to remove sixty-one feral swine. The area continues to be monitored for activity to determine if additional management efforts are needed to further reduce damage.

Roger Mills County landowner contacted WS needing assistance with feral swine damaging forty acres of wheat fields valued at \$5,000. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to the county responded to the request and verified the damage. A live trap was used to remove twenty-five feral swine from two locations on the property. No additional damage has occurred, and the feral swine population in the area is being monitored to determine if additional management is needed.

Osage County producer called WS reporting rooting damage to his Bermuda grass hay fields. The damage was verified and estimated at \$3,200. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed out. The remote camera trap along with thermal hunting was effective in removing forty-four feral swine, with this project still being monitored.

Nowata County rancher called WS reporting rooting damage to his cattle pastures. The damage was verified and estimated at \$12,000. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed out. Nine feral swine have been removed with this project still being monitored. The owner was advised of environmental changes that he could make that could deter future feral swine damage.

Hughes County producer called WS reporting feral swine rooting damage to his hayfields. The damage was verified and estimated at \$10,600. After pre-baiting, a remote camera trap was placed. Fifty-two feral swine have been removed with this project still being monitored.

Aerial Operations

Aerial operations were conducted in *Tillman County* in response to nine landowners experiencing feral swine damage on multiple corn fields in the county. Landowners reported to the Wildlife Specialist that feral swine damaged one hundred-eighty acres of corn valued at \$80,000. The helicopter was utilized for 11.8 flying hours for two days and resulted in the removal of four hundred and ninety-two feral swine from area. Feral swine activity in and around the cornfields is being closely monitored and additional aerial operations will be conducted to further reduce damage.

Aerial operations were conducted in *Greer County* on roughly 5,000 acres in response to multiple requests from landowners with feral swine damaging corn and milo fields. The helicopter was utilized for 4.5 flying hours with the removal of eighty-one feral swine. Additional flight operations are planned in this area to further reduce populations and damage associated with feral swine.

Beaver Damage Management

Noble County landowner contacted WS with reports of having damage from beavers flooding a field and access point. The damage was previously verified, and beavers were removed. The project was finished by WS draining the area and destroying dams with explosives. There was no sign of beavers when on site and the project was completed.

Cleveland County VA center in Norman called WS for assistance with beaver damage. WS met with them, giving technical assistance. WS coordinated with Cleveland County personnel to remove the beaver dam, to lower the pond level, which will decrease the chances of losing the dam. Work is ongoing currently.

Kingfisher County Commissioner called WS with reports of beavers damming up a culvert and flooding a county road. WS Specialist met with them and verified beavers were the cause. Devices were set on the property. Seven beavers have been removed at this time, with work ongoing currently. Estimated loss is \$1000 for cleaning out culvert.

Custer County landowner contacted WS for assistance with beavers that were responsible for burrowing into his pond dam on his property. The landowner estimated the damage to the dam to be valued at \$2,000. The Specialist for Custer County responded and verified beavers were

responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing five beavers from the pond to help reduce any additional damage to the pond dam structure.

Woodward County rancher contacted WS and reported that beavers were cutting down trees on his pond. WS responded to the call and verified beavers were responsible for the damage estimated at \$1000. Devices were deployed and six beavers were removed with no further damage being reported.

Comanche County landowner contacted WS for assistance with beavers that were responsible for damming up the creek on his property and flooding his pasture. The landowner estimated the damage to the pasture to be valued at \$500. The Specialist for Comanche County responded and verified beavers were responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing the beavers from the creek to reduce any additional damage to pasture.

Blaine County property owner called WS for assistance with beavers, reporting a flooding issue from a recently constructed beaver dam. The beaver activity was verified, and the damage was estimated at \$1,500. Conibear traps were placed, and three beavers were removed. The owner was advised of environmental changes that could deter future beaver damage, and this project has concluded.

Cherokee County Commissioner called WS reporting beavers were causing flooding damage to a county road. The damage was confirmed and estimated at \$700. The beaver dams were removed by hand to alleviate the flooding issue. Conibear traps were set, and five beavers were removed.

Le Flore County property owner called for WS assistance with beavers, reporting that his driveway and yard were being flooded by beaver activity near his house. The beaver activity was verified, and damage was minimal. Conibear traps were placed to remove two beavers, with this project still being monitored.

Pushmataha County cooperator called WS reporting flooding damage to his property. The damage was verified and estimated at \$2,500. The dam was removed by hand to alleviate the flooding and conibear traps were placed out. Two beavers were removed to conclude this project.

Special Projects - Disease Sampling

Wildlife Services is involved in disease management, research, disease surveillance, emergency response, education and outreach for diseases of feral swine. There are around 1.6 million feral swine in the United States today. Feral swine can be reservoirs of disease and may act as a host to a number of parasites, leaving the Oklahoma domestic swine industry vulnerable to disease.

The Oklahoma Wildlife Disease Biologist sampled twenty-three feral swine at the request of the Muskogee Creek Nation during July. The swine were sampled during wildlife damage control operations. The collected samples were submitted for African Swine Fever (ASF), Classical Swine Fever (CSF), Pseudorabies (PRV) and Swine Brucellosis (SB).

Statistics:

On August 12, 2025, the Crop Production Report was released. Highlights include:

Corn production increased by 44% from 40.2 million to 57.9 million bushels, thanks to expanded acreage and improved yields.

Sorghum production increased by 55% to nearly 20 million bushels.

Winter wheat production decreased by 3.5%, from 108.3 million to 104.5 million bushels.

Soybean production saw a 1.9% increase, reaching 8.25 million bushels.

Cotton production increased 74%, from 270,000 to 470,000 bales, reflecting both increased harvested area and better yields.

Peanut production forecast increased by 8% to 81.7 million pounds over the 2024 crop year.

All Hay production is forecasted at 5.7 million pounds, down 4% from 2024.



POULTRY & EGG GRADING, PRODUCE AND ORGANIC SECTION

POULTRY AND EGG SECTION

In Broken Bow at Tyson Foods, USDA poultry grading was performed by ODAFF inspectors on 1,860,220 pounds of poultry – boneless/skinless leg meat & bone in/skin on parts and ground meat. ODAFF inspectors provided USDA Shell Egg grading on 42,530 dozen eggs at Cal-Maine Foods Inc. at Sulphur. ODAFF inspectors provided USDA poultry grading services on poultry products being shipped from National Steak & Poultry Quality Meats in Owasso. Also, routine egg quality inspections under the Oklahoma egg law were conducted.

ORGANIC FOODS SECTION

Organic inspectors completed compliance and certification inspections at:

- Eight organic crop producers
- Three organic processors
- Collected one organic sample
- Fourteen retail organic inspections
- The organic section had requests for 3,000 certified organic stickers from Oklahoma Certified Organic producers and processors, which display the stickers on all products sold, labeled, or represented as Organic across the United States.
- The organic section had 4 requests for organic crop applications, 2 requests for organic processing applications and 1 request for an organic livestock application.

DAIRY SECTION

Dairy staff conducted routine inspections at dairy farms, dairy plants, performed equipment checks and collected farm and plant dairy samples throughout the state.

Additionally, Dairy Services conducted the following dairy farm and plant surveys:

- CEC 69 (BTU 40-069) located in Northeastern Oklahoma
- BLUE BELL CRYS (REC 40-009) located in Broken Arrow

These state surveys received passing scores and information regarding these surveys are available on FDA's Interstate Milk Shippers List website.

In June FDA Milk Specialist, Samuel Carter and 'Grade "A" National Dairy Standard', Curtis Griner, conducted FDA Check ratings for the following facilities:

- Hiland Dairy (PMO 40-025) located in Norman
- DFA SE Council 100 (BTU 40-100) in Mayes County

Both Check Ratings received passing scores.

Under the direction of the State Veterinarian, Dairy staff has implemented additional bio-security protocols when visiting dairy farms throughout the state. This information is being shared with our producers, and they are encouraged to contact the State Veterinarian if their herd shows symptoms related to HPAI.

Also, under the direction of the State Veterinarian and USDA, Dairy services expanded HPAI sampling to all dairy farms beginning January 6, 2025. Farm samples are tested at the Oklahoma Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory in Stillwater. To date, all Oklahoma permitted dairy farms have tested negative seven months in a row.

FDA Milk Specialist, Clinton George, is currently preparing the Oklahoma Dairy State Program Evaluation. This evaluation occurs every 3 years.

Oklahoma Dairy Services has agreed to participate in Year 3 of a Multi-Drug Residue Raw Milk Monitoring Project. Dairy services will collect raw bulk milk samples from milk tankers and submit blind samples for drug residue analysis to help determine if current residue screenings are sufficient.

Oklahoma dairy services is working with FDA and ORAU to create a dairy plant training video at one of our Oklahoma Dairy Plants in September. This will be a teaching aid for dairy inspectors throughout the country.

Dairy inspector Jayson Jones is currently out on maternity leave and will be out until mid-October.

Dairy Director, Pete Echelle, is scheduled to retire at the end of the month after giving 38+ years of service to the dairy program! We wish him the best and he will be deeply missed!

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

FY26- Laserfiche - \$40,500 -

The agency currently employs Laserfiche software as an automated digital repository with workflow capabilities; however, the system requires an upgrade. Presently, we are utilizing Laserfiche version 10.4, and maintenance and support for this version will soon be discontinued. Additionally, Laserfiche is installed on Windows Server 2008 R2, for which support ended in January 2020. In the absence of this upgrade, the agency will no longer have access to essential support services. Transitioning to Laserfiche version 12 will facilitate migration to an upgraded OMES-hosted platform. Furthermore, the upgrade will enable the installation of two new local Quick Fields workstations, thus eliminating ODAFF of two leased OMES servers, saving the agency \$7,968/year.

LABORATORY SERVICES

FY26 – Hazardous Waste Disposal-\$5,672.05

Purchase to remove and dispose of hazardous waste material from laboratory.

FORESTRY SERVICES

FY26 -Southern Pine Beetle Federal Grant- PC 87 Federal Funding -\$20,000

To prevent the spread of the invasive Southern Pine Beetle (SPB) and mitigate the severe economic threat it poses to landowner revenue. This project will also provide financial assistance to landowners for the removal of non-native invasive plant species. **Justification:** Proactive management of SPB and invasive plants will maintain healthy and resilient forests across Oklahoma, safeguarding landowner revenue and enhancing the landscape's ability to withstand current and future forest health threats, including pests, diseases, and wildfire. All funds spent on this program will be federally reimbursed.

FY26 –Oklahoma Forest Landowner Assistance Program- PC 76 Federal Funding - \$250,000

The Oklahoma Forest Landowner Assistance Program is a new grant designed to provide financial assistance to private landowners. The primary goal is to help them implement critical forest management activities that they may not be able to afford otherwise. The program targets Non-Industrial Private Forest (NIPF) landowners, which includes private individuals, groups, trusts, associations, federally recognized tribes, and corporations without publicly tradable stocks (e.g., boy/girl scouts). This grant will be administered to eligible landowners through a cost-share model. **Justification:** All funds spent on this program will be federally reimbursed.

The approval of this program is crucial to advance several key forestry initiatives across the state. This grant will fund practices that:

- **Promote Forest Health:** The program will support management activities that mimic historic disturbance regimes, reducing competition for resources and enhancing the forests' ability to resist pests and pathogens.
- **Restore Native Ecosystems:** It will provide funds to combat non-native invasive species, which out-compete native plants, threaten species diversity, and increase competition for limited resources.
- Enhance Reforestation Efforts: The grant will help landowners restore woody cover in areas that have experienced reduced stocking levels due to natural causes or management practices. Prompt reforestation is vital to prevent erosion and invasive species establishment while increasing landscape-scale forest resiliency.
- Mitigate Wildfire Risk: Funding will support the promotion of fire-adapted ecosystems through prescribed burning, which reduces fuel loads and decreases the risk of catastrophic wildfires. It will also fund the creation and maintenance of fuel breaks, which are essential for slowing the spread of fire and enhancing suppression efforts.
- Increase Landscape Diversity: The program will allow for the conversion of land to native woody species through afforestation and agroforestry practices, increasing the diversity of species and land use across the landscape.

CONSUMER PROTECTION SERVICES

FY2025 - Large Vehicle Scale Truck Bed Repair - \$5,500.00

Large vehicle scale truck bed needed a repair to the hydraulic pump which had stopped working. The pump had stripped gears and needed to be replaced.

WILDLIFE SERVICES

FY26- OKC SE Landfill- \$29,040

Cooperative Agreement, spanning October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2026, regarding the control and removal of nuisance birds defecating on and damaging property. Furthermore, this will help reduce the threat of bird/aircraft interaction at Tinker AFB close by.

MARKET DEVELOPMENT

FY2026 – Tulsa County Public Facilities Authority – 2025 Tulsa State Fair – Made in Oklahoma booths - \$25,616.00

Justification: ODAFF contracts with the Tulsa County Public Facilities Authority for the purpose of providing a Made in Oklahoma Exhibit in the Exchange Center during the Tulsa State Fair. ODAFF sublets booth spaces within this exhibit area to MIO companies. The MIO Exhibit at the Tulsa State Fair is a rare opportunity for new MIO companies to introduce their products to an average of over 1 million potential customers. The average number of companies impacted each year is around 48 companies. The event falls within the

purpose of the MIO Program which is to assist local agricultural companies in collectively promoting brand awareness and consumer loyalty for Oklahoma products through cooperative marketing activities. If this proposed expense is not approved, there will not be a labeled MIO exhibit at the Tulsa State Fair. The economic impact to the MIO companies intending to participate in this Exhibit will potentially lose thousands of dollars in sales during the 11-day event held each year.

FY2026 – Tulsa Home and Garden Show – booth rental – cost share basis for 10 Made in Oklahoma companies - \$12,000.00

FY2026 - Value-Added Agriculture Grant - viticulture - Daniel Montreuil - \$10,000.00

FY2026 – Farm to School – printing – educational resources – funded entirely by the Farm to School State Formula Grant - \$50,000.00

Justification: It is the goal of the Farm to School Program to offer students hands on learning experiences that foster an understanding of where their food comes from, promote healthy eating habits and strengthen local food systems along with educating school food service staff and teachers through printed educational materials. Some of these printed materials include posters, cookbooks, recipe card sets, school garden quick start guide and signage. If this expense is not approved, it will hinder the education of children and school staff on local food along with running the risk of not being awarded USDA FNS Farm to School State Formula grants in the future.

FY2026 – NASDA – National Restaurant Association Show – booth space - \$18,525.00

FY2026 – Whova – conference event management tool – Oklahoma Local Ag Summit – funded entirely by Specialty Crop Block Grant - \$10,000.00

The Respondent has 2,304 animal units, therefore the total amount due for a license renewal is One Thousand Nine Hundred Eighteen Dollars and Twenty Cents (\$1,918.20).
- 24. To date, the Respondent has not paid for their license.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 3. Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.

- 17. Under the provisions of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(2), it is unlawful for a store to charge a retail price for any consumer item which exceeds the lowest then price in that store, whether a shelf, sale, advertised, or otherwise publicly communicated price, of the consumer item.
- 18. Under the provisions of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J), failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of an inspection shall be a failed inspection subject to penalty. For violations discovered upon the second inspection following any twelve-month period in which no violation of this section has been found, the store shall pay a penalty of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00) for each consumer item which results in an overcharge or potential overcharge.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

19. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent:

- 20. On or about November 4, 2024, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at 81 Express in Dover, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that five (5) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price.
- 21. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J). A letter of warning was sent.
- 22. On or about January 24, 2025, a price verification inspection was performed by an Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry inspector at 81 Express in Dover, Oklahoma. The inspection revealed that six (6) of the fifty (50) products inspected were offered at a price which exceeded the publicly communicated price.
- 23. Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of this inspection, is a second violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(J). A letter of warning was sent.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

24. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent's failure to accurately price ninety-five percent (95%) of all consumer items sampled as part of the aforementioned inspections is a violation of 2 O.S. § 14-38(B)(2) and is subject to the penalty provided in 2 O.S. § 14-38(J)(2).

- 19. Our inspector observed your company making an ornamental and turf application at this residence.
- 20. Your application records indicate that Trimec 992 and Specticle Flo Herbicide were the products being applied.
- 21. Our inspector documented that the employee in training that was making the application was not wearing a long sleeve shirt. The product's labels require applicators to wear a long sleeve shirt when applying Trimec 992 and Specticle Flo Herbicide.

- Additionally, the application records you supplied our office were missing the following required records: the complete trade name for the 2,4-D and Glyphosate that you have listed, the EPA registration number for all the products listed, the total gallons of tank mix applied, the size of the area treated, and the dilution rate for mixing. Your records indicated that you mixed the product with 80 gallons of water, but you did not record how much product is mixed with the 80 gallons of water.
- 23. Applying a pesticide product in a manner inconsistent with the product label and not keeping accurate application records are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(4), O.A.C. 35:30-17-21(a)(9), O.A.C. 35:30-17-21(a)(10), O.A.C. 35:30-17-21(a)(11), and O.A.C. 35:30-17-21(a)(12).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

During this investigation, the Department found that Respondent was processing non-compliant hemp, without an Industrial Hemp Processing License, as well as processed and/or handled hemp that were not approved in the state of origin. The Respondents provided records to the Department of unapproved varieties and unofficial Certificates of Analysis to secure their license. The Respondent failed to provide accurate and complete records in response to a request for information. Specifically, not all licenses were provided for hemp processed/handled and Certificates of Analysis were not approved by state of origin. The Respondent failed to retain records required by the Industrial Hemp Program Rules. Based on the investigation Respondent handled, processed, and/or sold non-compliant hemp which entered the stream of commerce. Specifically, Respondent was in possession and processing hemp that had a total THC above the allowable threshold of 0.3%. The Respondent failed to follow transportation rules.

Statute or Rule Violation: Respondent violated O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(1), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(2), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(3), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(10), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(12), and O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(13) by providing false information or otherwise engaging in deception to secure or retain a license, failing to provide accurate and complete records in response to a request for information from the Department, failing to retain records required by this subchapter or produce such records at the request of the Department, handling, processing, or selling non-compliant hemp which enters the stream of commerce, failing to follow transportation rules, and processing or handling hemp grown without a license.

- 7. Respondent and the Department recognize there is risk and expense inherent in any litigation. Thus, the parties agree to enter into this compromise and settlement to avoid incurring any further cost and expense arising as a result of this dispute. Respondent and the Department each do not waive and each expressly reserves all of its rights in any future proceeding against it.
- 8. The Department does not by entering into this Agreement concede that its factual basis for initiating this Action, and violations found based upon those facts, are not true and accurate. Respondent, without admitting the truth of said factual averments and having previously contested the alleged violations in informal discussions with representatives of the Department, voluntarily waives its right to a formal evidentiary hearing to contest such factual averments. By entering into this agreement, Respondent does not admit or consent to the truth of the factual averments set forth in the Notice. The Department and Respondent are avoiding further contention, including litigation of this matter, through settlement of this Action by this Agreement.

NO ADMISSION

9. This Agreement and any proceedings taken hereunder are not intended and shall not in any event be construed as, or deemed to be, an admission or concession or evidence of any liability or any wrongdoing whatsoever on the part of any party. The parties hereto specifically disclaim and deny any liability or wrongdoing whatsoever with respect to the allegations and claims asserted against them in this action and enter into this Agreement solely to avoid the further expense, inconvenience, burden and uncertainty of litigation.

NON-ADMISSIBILITY

10. These settlement negotiations have been undertaken by the parties in good faith and for settlement purposes only, and neither this Agreement nor any evidence of negotiations hereunder, shall be offered or received in evidence in this Action, or any other action or proceeding, for any purpose other than in an action or proceeding to enforce the terms of this Agreement.

HEARING WAIVER

11. Respondent hereby agrees to waive its right to a hearing and its opportunity to appeal or contest this Agreement. Respondent enters into this Agreement freely and voluntarily.

MISCELLANEOUS

- 13. This Agreement may be amended only by mutual agreement of the Department and Respondent. Such amendments shall be in writing, shall have as their effective date the date on which they are signed by both parties, and shall be incorporated into this agreement.
- 14. The undersigned representative of the Office of General Counsel, Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry agrees to propose and recommend this Agreement to the State Board of Agriculture (the "Board"). Furthermore, Respondent understands that the Office of General Counsel Representative neither possesses the legal power to bind the Board nor can the Office of General Counsel Representative promise acceptance of this Agreement by the Board. Respondent understands that it may attend the meeting of the Board but is not required to do so.
- 15. In the event the Board accepts this Agreement, Respondent shall receive a copy of the Approval. Compliance with this Agreement shall constitute full and complete settlement.
- 16. In the event the Board does not approve this Agreement, then Respondent or the Department is free to make a counterproposal for the Board's consideration, or the Parties may choose to go through a formal administrative hearing on the above charges, and the recitations herein will be held for naught and are inadmissible in any future proceedings.

- 17. No breach of any provision of this Agreement can be waived by any undersigned party unless in writing. Waiver of any one breach by an undersigned party shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 18. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Oklahoma.

NOTICE OF VIOLATION

1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel ("OGC") of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

- 2. Respondents are hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on the 8th day of May 2025 in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
- 3. <u>Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.</u>

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) Amendments to the pleadings; c.) the plan, schedule, and limitations of discovery; d.) Identification of admissions of fact to avoid unnecessary proof and cumulative evidence; e.) The identification of witnesses and substance of testimony, exhibits, and documents; f.) The use of prehearing briefs and pre-filed testimony in the form of sworn affidavits; g.) Settlement of all or some of the issues prior to the hearing; h.) Adoption of special procedures for managing difficult or protracted actions that may involve complex issues, multiple parties, novel or difficult legal questions, or evidence problems; i.) Scheduling; and j.) Any other matters as may aid in disposition of the case.

- 4. The Prehearing Conference may be held by telephone; arrangements to do so should be made at least one full week in advance of the Prehearing Conference.
- 5. Upon request of either party, Prehearing Conferences shall be on the record.
- 6. A Prehearing Conference may result in a scheduling or other prehearing order and subsequent changes to any prehearing or scheduling order may be made by the ALJ by modifying the order for good cause.
- 7. Please note that failure to appear at the Prehearing Conference may result in a default judgment being entered against you.

HEARING AND RIGHT TO COUNSEL

- 8. Respondent may choose to proceed to a full evidentiary hearing on the merits, at which Respondent will be given the opportunity to cross-examine the Complainant's witnesses, present Respondent's witnesses, and present relevant evidence on Respondent's behalf.
- 9. The hearing date will be determined at the Prehearing Conference.
- 10. The hearing will be conducted in accordance with the Oklahoma Administrative Procedures Act and the Department's Rules of Practice and Procedure, which may be found in the OAC at Title 35.
- 11. Respondents have the right to be represented by counsel in this matter.

DEFAULT

12. Any Respondent who fails to appear after receipt of notice may be determined to have waived the right to appear and present a defense and a default may be presented by the Department to the Board at a regularly scheduled meeting proposing the relief requested by the Notice of Violation, or other relief if justice so requires.

JURISDICTION, VENUE, AND APPLICABLE LAW

- 13. Subject matter jurisdiction and venue are vested in the State Board of Agriculture in its quasi-judicial capacity, pursuant to Okla. Const. Art. VI, Section 31 and 2 O. S. § 2-4(16); accordingly, this is the proper forum to hear this matter.
- 14. Respondent has substantial business operations and assets within the State of Oklahoma.
- 15. Based upon current information and belief, at all relevant times hereto, Respondent has, among other things, engaged in the business of processing and handling commercial hemp.
- 16. Pursuant to Okla. Sta. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

- 17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondents.
- 18. In January of 2025, the Consumer Protective Services Division of the Department received information from the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics that Respondents were processing and selling THC products in Oklahoma
- 19. The Department conducted an investigation into the Respondents. Upon reviewing Respondent's website and Certificates of Analysis, the Department found that Respondents were processing non-compliant hemp at 6855 NW 178th St, Edmond, OK without an Industrial Hemp Processing License.
- 20. Respondent provided false information or otherwise engaged in deception to secure or retain their license. Specifically, Respondent listed unapproved varieties and unofficial Certificates of Analysis within records provided to the Department.

- 21. Respondent failed to provide accurate and complete records in response to a request for information from the Department. Specifically, not all licenses were provided for hemp processed/handled and Certificates of Analysis were not approved by state of origin.
- 22. Respondent failed to retain records required by the Industrial Hemp Program Rules.
- 23. Respondent handled, processed, and/or sold non-compliant hemp which entered the stream of commerce. Specifically, Respondent handled, processed, and/or sold hemp products that were above the 0.3% Total THC allowed by the Industrial Hemp Program Rules.
- 24. Respondent failed to follow the transportation rules found in the Industrial Hemp Program Rules.
- 25. Respondent processed and/or handled hemp that was grown without a license. Specifically, Respondent processed and/or handled unapproved varieties of hemp and processed and/or handled varieties of hemp that were not approved in the state of origin.
- 26. Based on the allegations above, the Respondent has violated the Oklahoma Industrial Hemp Program Laws & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-404(A), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(1), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(2), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(3), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(10), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(13).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 27. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-404(A), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(1), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(2), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(3), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(10), O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(12), and O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(13) which are stated below:
 - 2 O.S. § 3-404(A): "(A) A person intending to engage in industrial hemp growth, cultivation, handling, or processing authorized under the

- Oklahoma Industrial Hemp Program shall apply to the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry for a license prior to planting, handling, or processing the industrial hemp."
- O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(1): "(h) Violations of the Oklahoma Industrial
 Hemp Program and the rules of this subchapter shall include, but not be
 limited to, the following conduct: (1) Providing false, misleading, or
 incorrect information or otherwise engaging in fraud or deception to
 secure or retain a license."
- O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(2): "(h) Violations of the Oklahoma Industrial
 Hemp Program and the rules of this subchapter shall include, but not be
 limited to, the following conduct: (2) Failure to timely, accurately, and
 truthfully complete and submit any application, report, or request for
 information from the Department."
- O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(3): "(h) Violations of the Oklahoma Industrial
 Hemp Program and the rules of this subchapter shall include, but not be
 limited to, the following conduct: (3) Failure to retain records required by
 this subchapter or produce such records at the request of the Department."
- O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(10): "(h) Violations of the Oklahoma Industrial
 Hemp Program and the rules of this subchapter shall include, but not be
 limited to, the following conduct: (10) Handling, processing, or selling
 non-compliant hemp which enters the stream of commerce."
- O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(12): "(h) Violations of the Oklahoma Industrial Hemp Program and the rules of this subchapter shall include, but not be

- limited to, the following conduct: (12) Failure to follow transportation rules as provided within this subchapter."
- O.A.C. 35:30-24-12(h)(13): "(h) Violations of the Oklahoma Industrial Hemp Program and the rules of this subchapter shall include, but not be limited to, the following conduct: (13) Processing or handling hemp grown without a license."

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

28. The Department is seeking an administrative penalty in the amount of **Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00)**.

- 30. Additionally, OGC attorneys will be available for consultation on a first-come, first-served basis from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. on the date of the Prehearing Conference.
- 31. Arrangements to discuss the matter before the Prehearing Conference are encouraged.

ENFORCEMENT PROCEEDINGS

- 32. Enforcement proceedings may include but are not limited to:
 - a.) Administrative fines or penalties;
 - b.) Revocation, suspension, or denial for up to one (1) year of any license, permit, or charter issued by ODAFF or the Board;
 - c.) Criminal actions, which could involve fines, imprisonment, or both; and
 - d.) Civil actions.

- 33. Pursuant to 2 Okla. Stat. § 2-18(A), after notice and opportunity for a hearing in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act, if the State Board of Agriculture finds any person in violation of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code or any rule promulgated or order issued pursuant thereto, unless otherwise specifically provided by statute or rule, the Board shall have the authority to assess an administrative penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for each violation.
- Any person, holder or non-holder of a valid license violating any of the provisions of 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(1)-(22) shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00), imprisonment in the county jail for not less than thirty (30) days and not more than one (1) year, or both.
- 35. Each animal, each action, or each day a violation continues may constitute a separate and distinct violation.

OKLAHOMA SMALL BUSINESS REGULATORY FLEXIBILITY ACT

36. The Oklahoma Small Business Regulatory Flexibility Act, 75 O.S. Supp. 2002, § 506, may apply to this action; please review the full act to determine if it applies to you.

ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS

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38. Informal disposition of an Individual Proceeding may be made by Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default.

- 39. Resolution by Stipulation, Agreed Settlement, Consent Order, or Default shall be approved by the State Board of Agriculture.
- 40. Proposed Final Administrative Orders shall be prepared and issued in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act and presented to the Board of Agriculture for review and approval.

STIPULATION

- 41. If Respondent desires to resolve this matter without a hearing or further action, Complainant proposes an administrative penalty of **Ten Thousand Dollars** (\$10,000.00).
- 42. If you wish to waive your right to hearing and stipulate to the above alleged findings of fact and conclusions of law, you may pay the full amount of the recommended penalty by check or money order and sign and return the attached Resolution by Stipulation along with your full payment of this penalty prior to the stated hearing date.
