LABORATORY SERVICES

FY26– Service Contract- \$5,275.00

Purchase of a one-year Service Contract for the Skalar San (Flow Analyzer) with Autosample, UV Vis and flame Photometers for the General Chemistry Section. (To be purchased by Consumer Protection Services).

FY26– Service Contract- \$29,000.00

Purchase for a one-year preventative maintenance agreement for the HPLC-MSMS Triple Quad 6470 in the Pesticide Section to ensure continuous and consistent operation of the instrument and improves the overall quality of the data being reported.

Justification: Without a maintenance agreement the laboratory would not be able to verify the accuracy of the test results, and the equipment could possibly fail, rendering it unusable.

FY26 - Service Contract- \$17,686.80

Purchase of a one-year service maintenance contract renewal for a dual HPLC System LC 1260 Infinity II Dual System. (To be purchased by the Consumer Protection Services).

FY26 – Service Contract - \$18,380.00

Purchase of a Service Contract for the LECO Sulphur and Nitrogen Analyzer for the General Chemistry Section. (To be purchased by Consumer Protection Services).

FY27– Service Contract- \$12,100.00

Purchase of a one-year preventative maintenance agreement for the ICP (Inductively Coupled Plasma-Optical Emission Spectrometry Unit), in the General Chemistry Section to ensure continuous and consistent operation of the instrument and ensure the overall quality of the data being reported. Contract effective 07/01/26 – 06/30/27. (To be purchased by Consumer Protection Services).

FY27– SCC Standards- \$9,100.00

Contract to provide Somatic Cell Standards (SCC) for milk testing. Contract effective 07/01/26 – 06/30/27.

FY27– DI Water and Maintenance- \$5,700.00

Contract purchase of analytical grade water for laboratory testing and tank maintenance. Contract effective 07/01/26 – 06/30/27.

FORESTRY SERVICES

FY26-Chainsaws and Blowers - \$10,000.00

(Funding Source: US Forest Service Funds)

Purchase seven (7) chainsaws and six (6) leaf blowers and fourteen (14) replacement chains. This equipment will be used in support of fire management activities including suppression and fuel mitigation. This equipment will be replacing outdated and overused equipment on firefighting engines. **Consequences:** By not replacing aging apparatus it will force OFS to rely on aged equipment

that could break down during emergency calls, leading to delayed response times and a heightened risk of catastrophic failure.

FY 26 - Fire Department Operational Grants- \$20,349.56

(Funding Source: State Funds)

These dollars are divided equally among two certified fire departments (Rural Fire Defense) for Operational Assistance Grants. Fire Departments receiving the Operational Grant can only use the funds for items authorized in Oklahoma State Statutes, Title 19, Chapter 21, and Section 901.56.

Consequences: Fire departments awarded these grants can fulfill a critical public safety function by purchasing firefighting equipment, purchasing Worker Compensation Insurance, Vehicle Insurance, etc. as outlined in the above-mentioned statute.

FY 26 – FMAG Infrastructure Preparation - \$70,000.00

(Funding Source: State Funds)

Requesting Board approval to procure professional services to prepare the agency’s accounting, financial management, and recordkeeping infrastructure to ensure the agency is fully prepared to seek, document, and obtain Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) reimbursement assistance from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). These services are needed to establish and strengthen financial tracking, cost documentation, compliance practices, and recordkeeping processes that meet FEMA and federal grant requirements, support audit readiness, and improve the agency’s ability to successfully recover eligible expenditures. ***Consequences:*** Failure to approve this purchase may result in insufficient accounting and documentation systems necessary to pursue FMAG assistance, potentially leading to delayed, reduced, or denied FEMA reimbursement funding, increased financial burden on the agency to absorb eligible incident costs, and missed opportunities to recover available federal funding.

CONSUMER PROTECTION SERVICES

FY27-Label Database -\$21,000.00

The proposed Label Database would provide the public with a centralized, searchable platform for pesticide products registered for use in Oklahoma by ODAFF. Users would be able to search by product type, registered crop, registered pest, and active ingredient, giving them access to a broad range of product information in a single location. The database would also support CPS inspection staff by improving access to label information during complaint investigations, product reviews, and field inspections. Without a centralized label database, the public may inadvertently encounter, or purchase products not registered in Oklahoma, and information would remain scattered across multiple external sites rather than consolidated into one authoritative source.

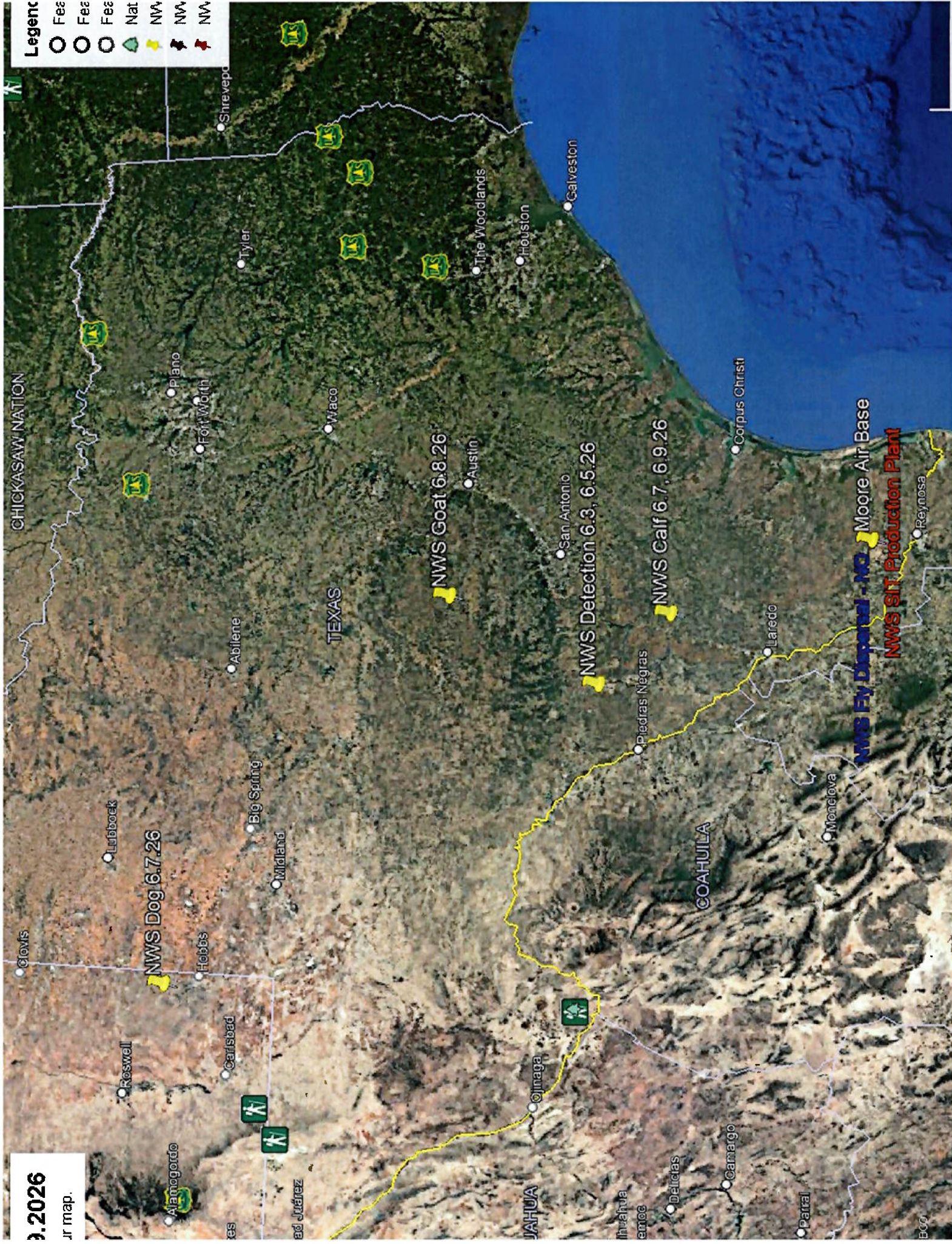

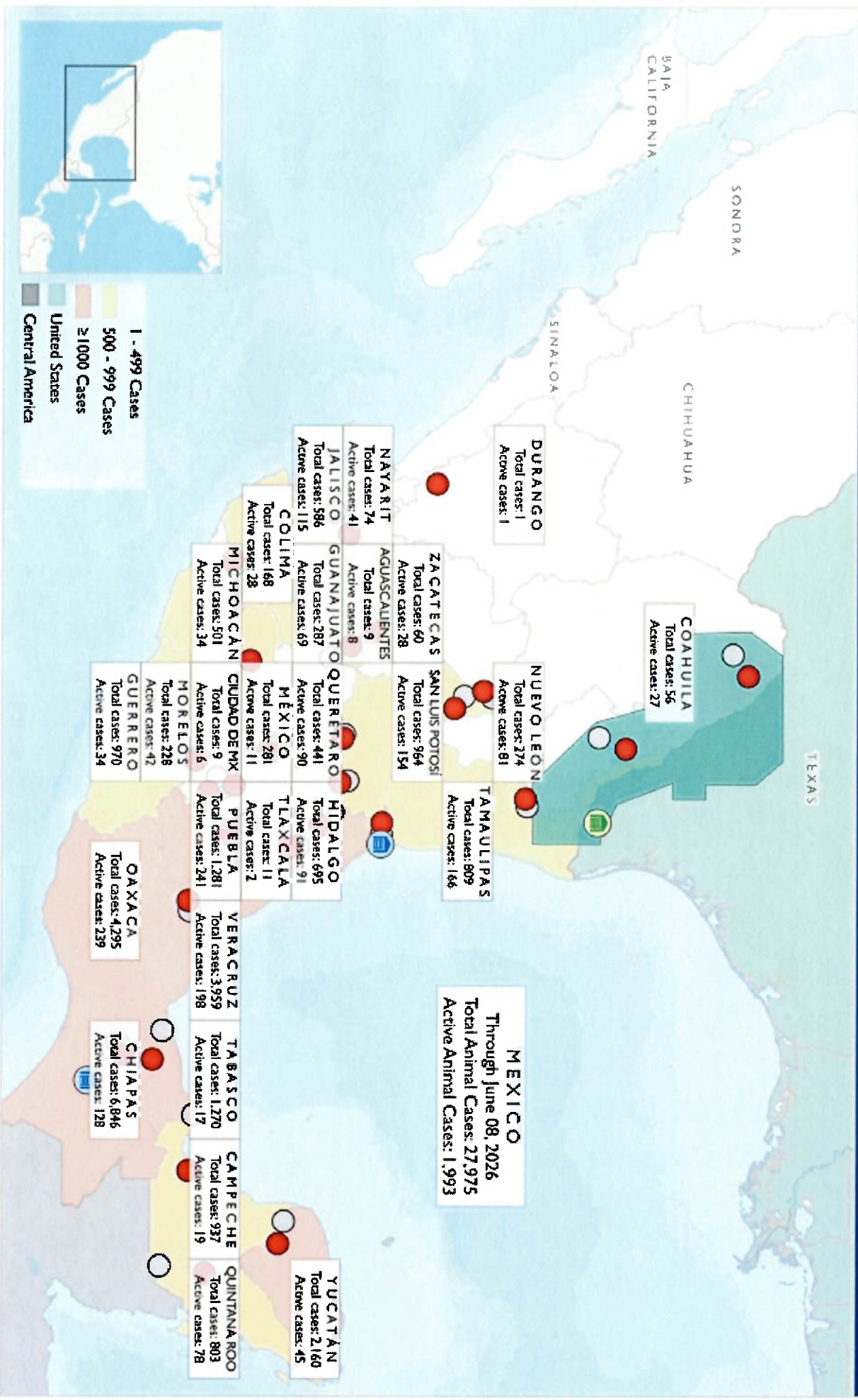
FOOD SAFETY

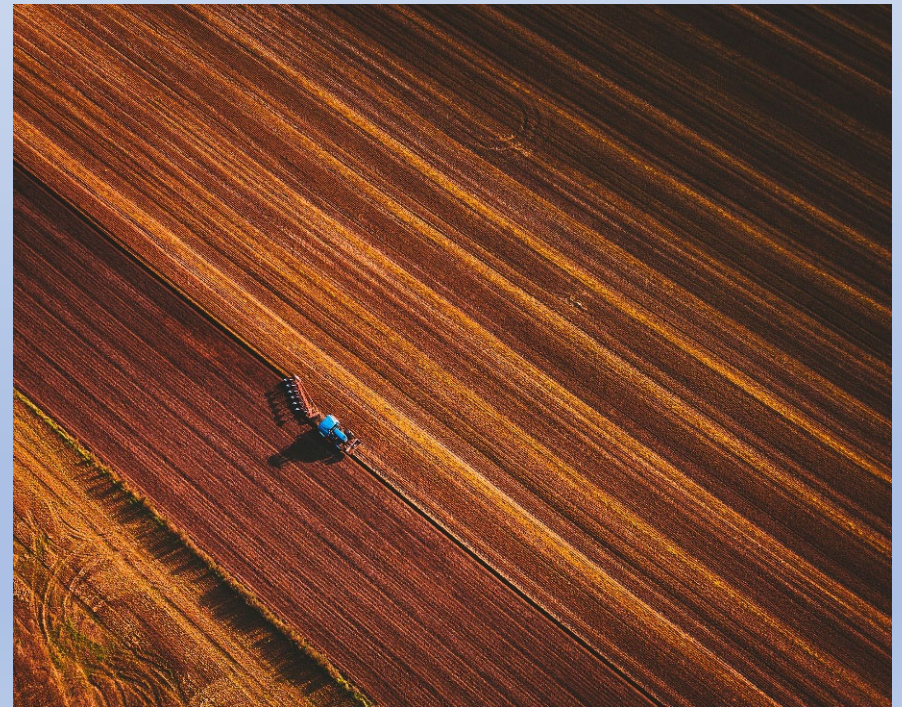

Available Cash at Month End

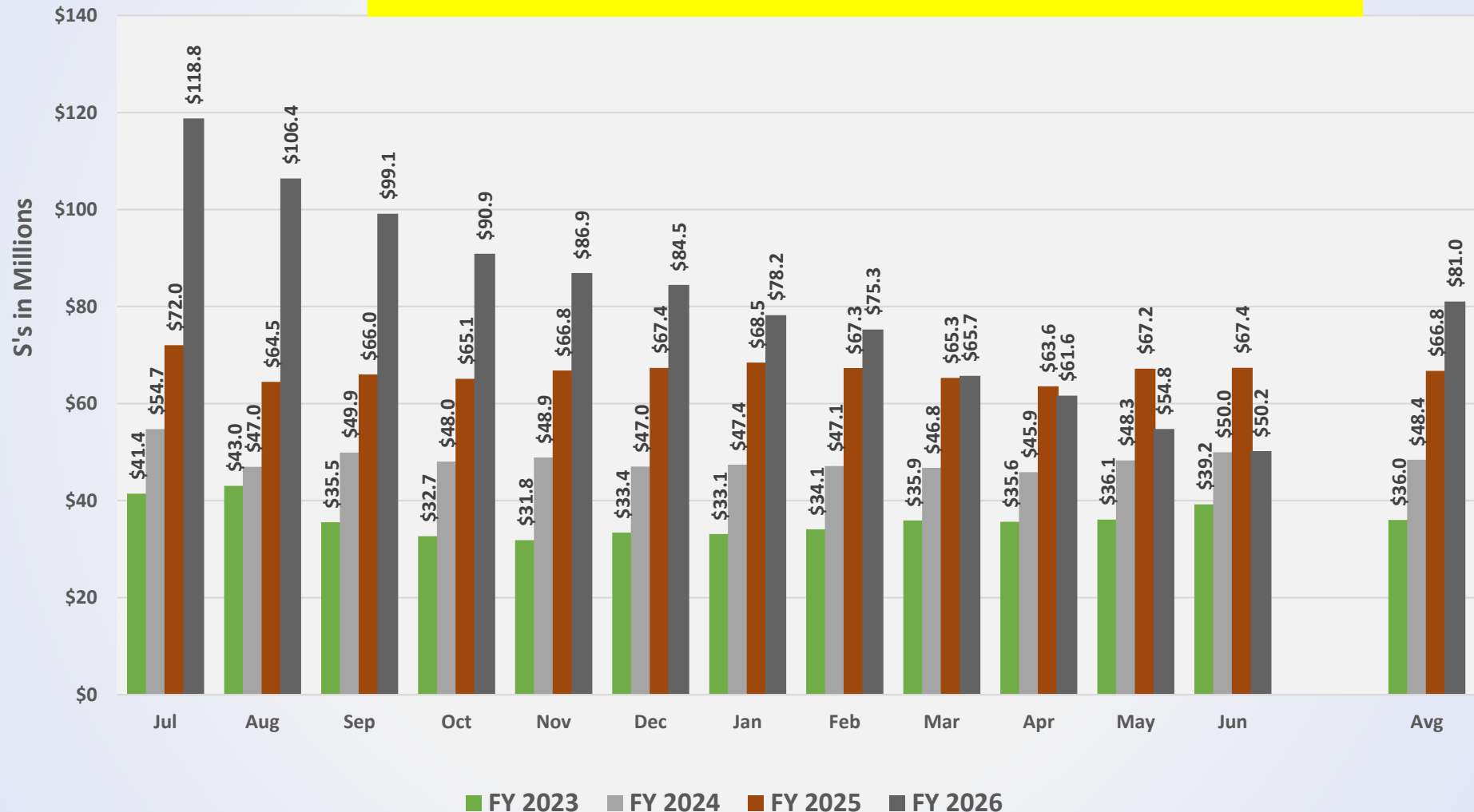

Commodity Storage Indemnity Investment Report

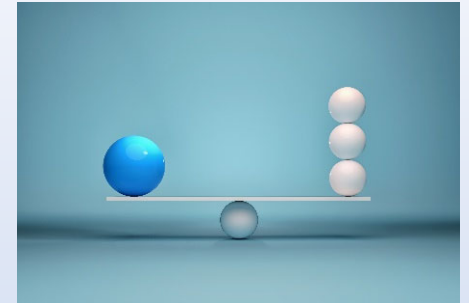

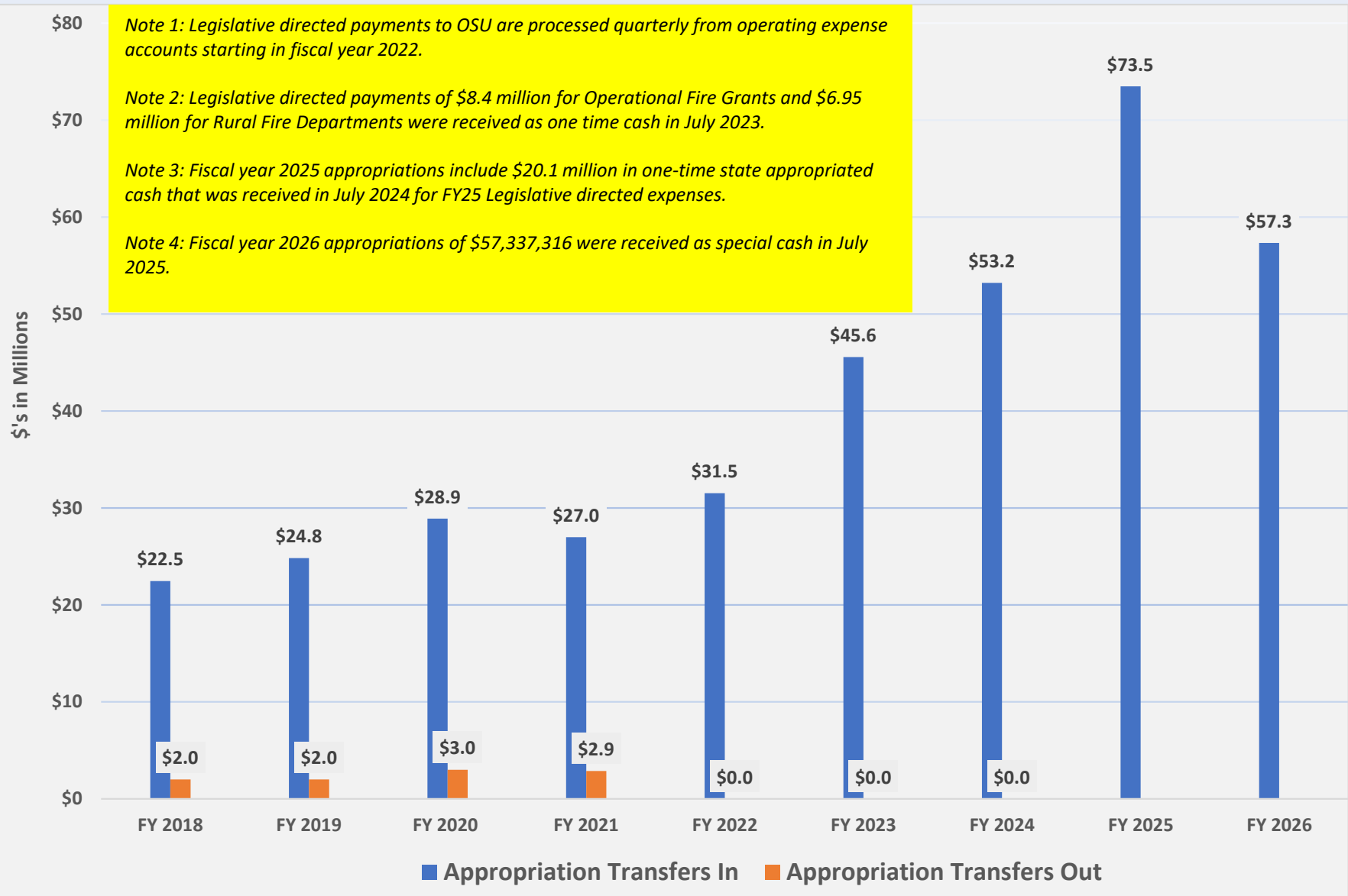

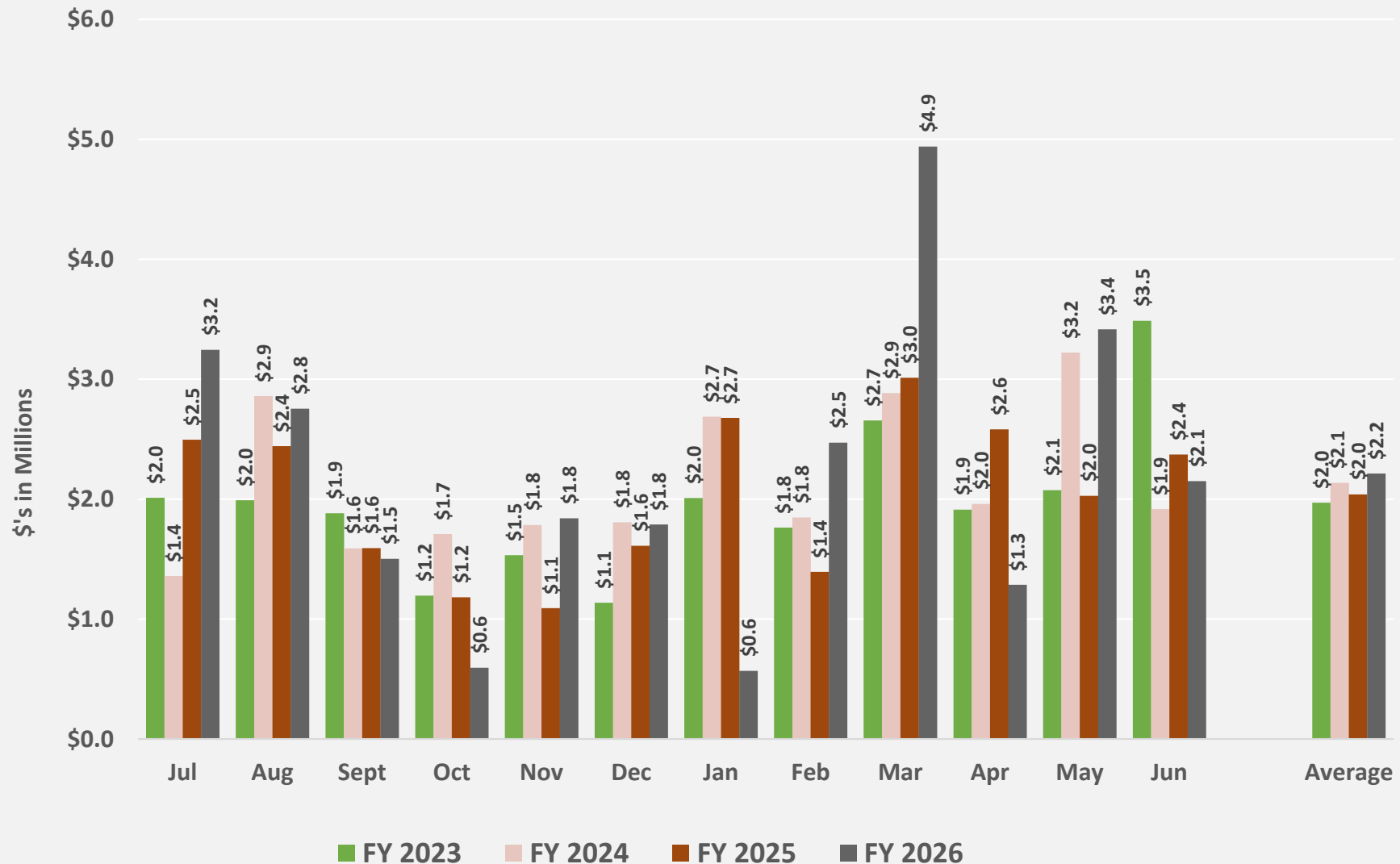

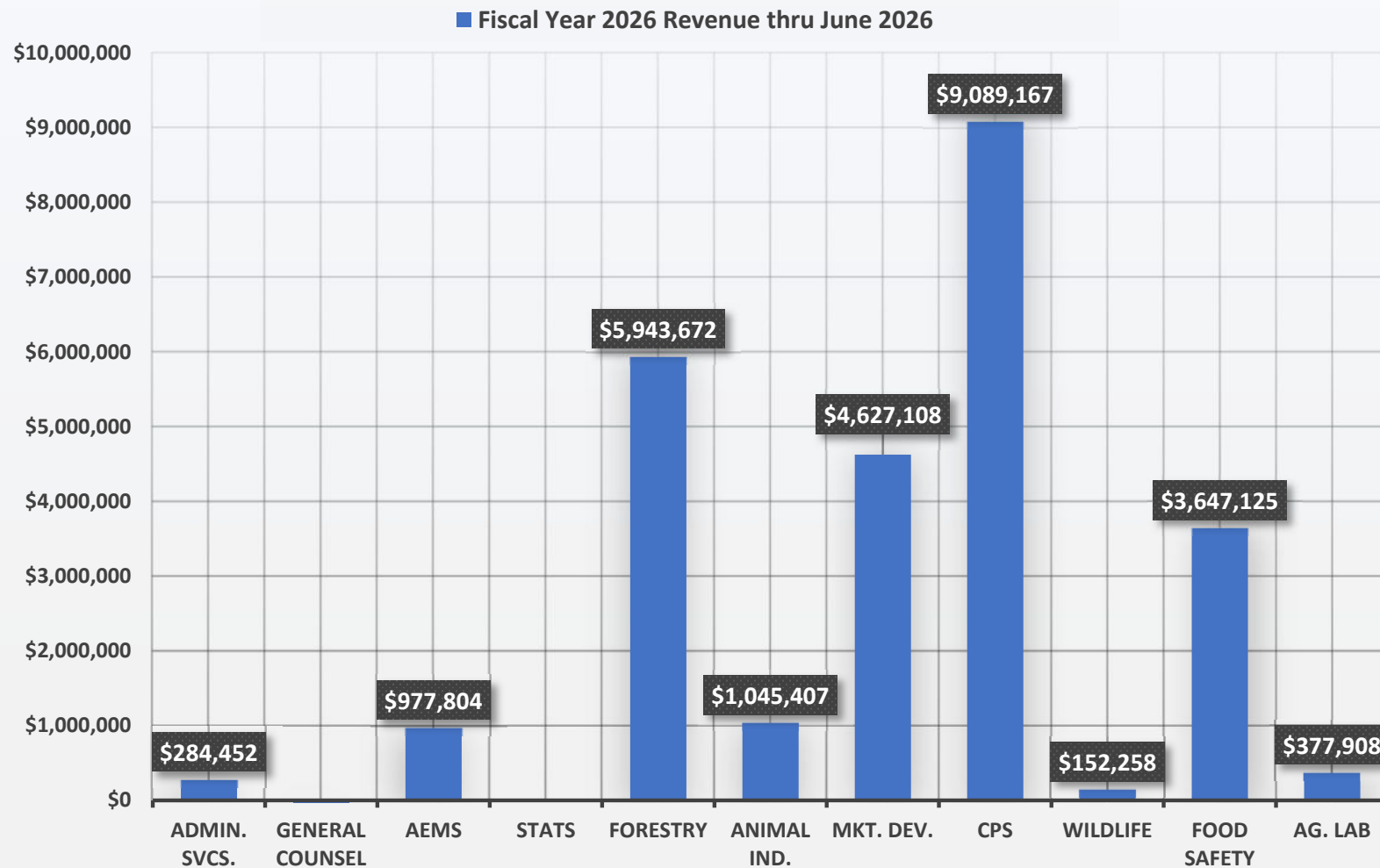

Revenue By Division Fiscal Year 26 thru June 2026



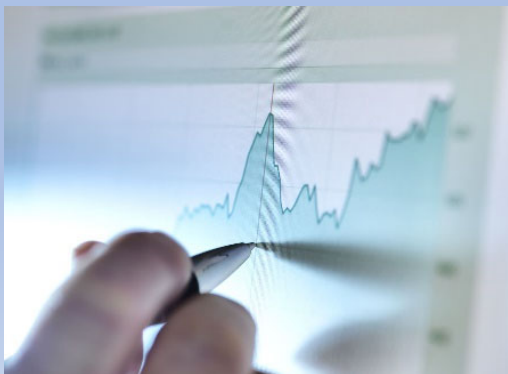

Total Revenues Fiscal Years 2018 - 2026

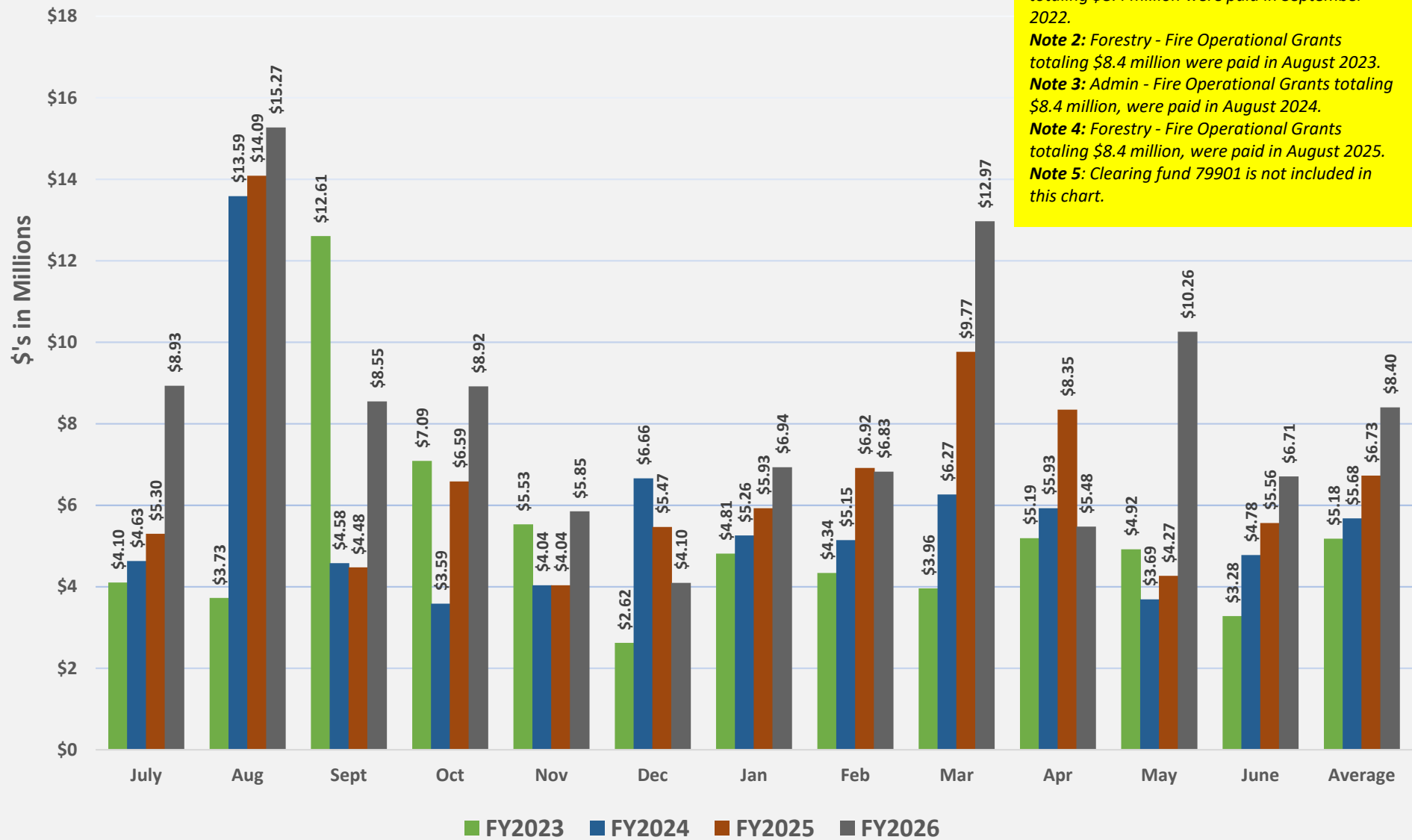

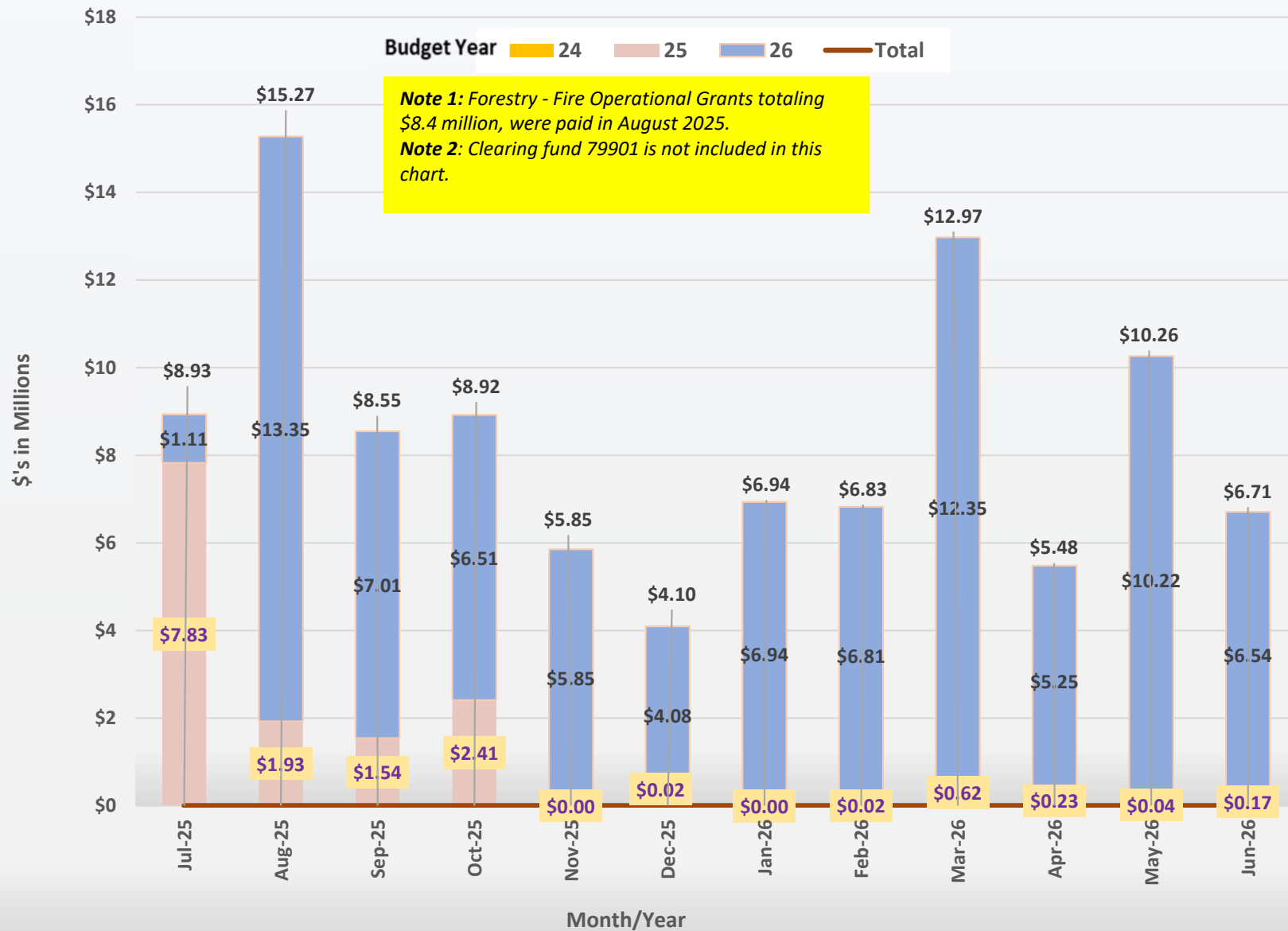

FY 2026 Total Expenses by Month with Budget Year



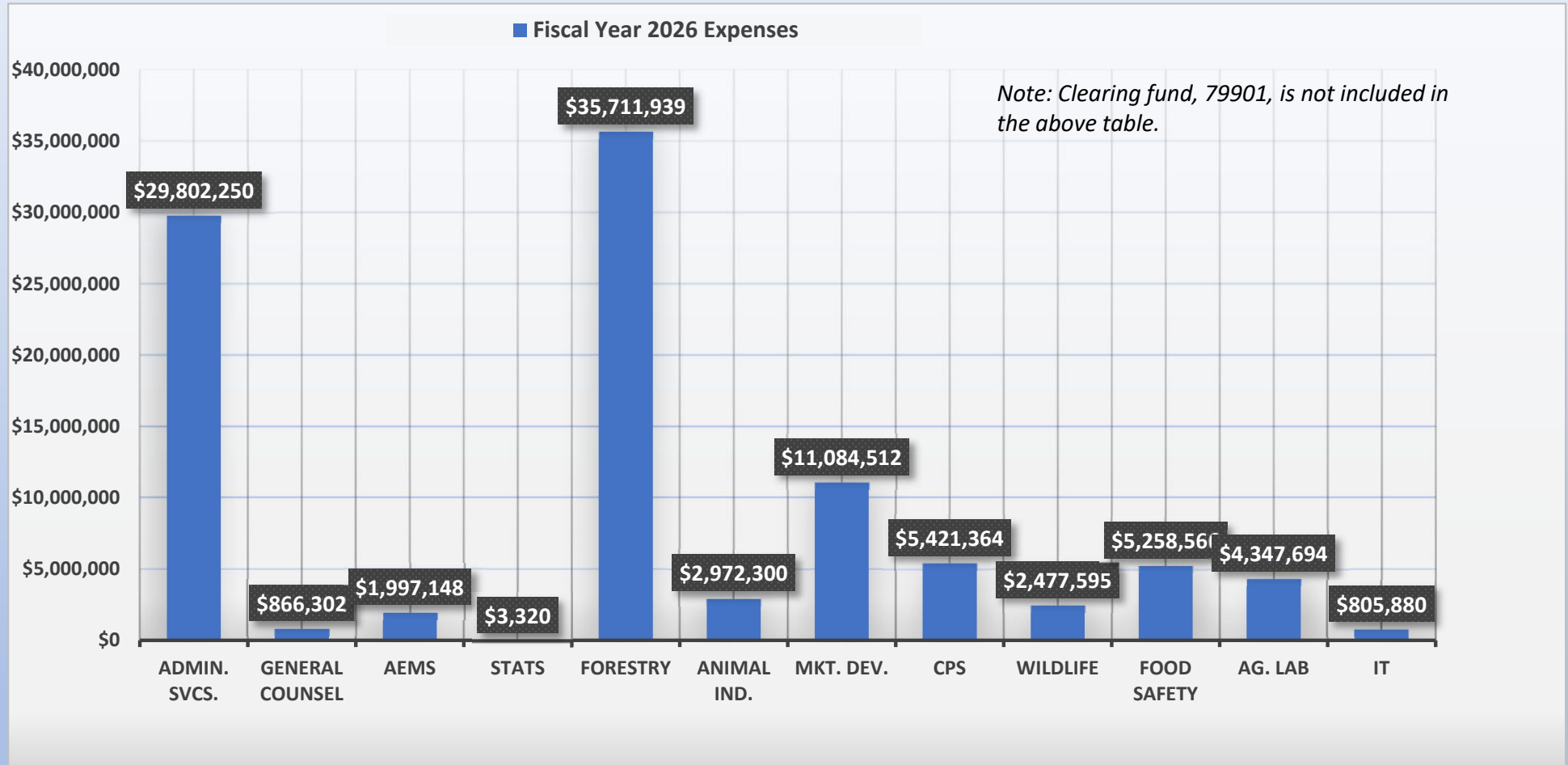

Total Expenses Fiscal Year 2018 - 2026

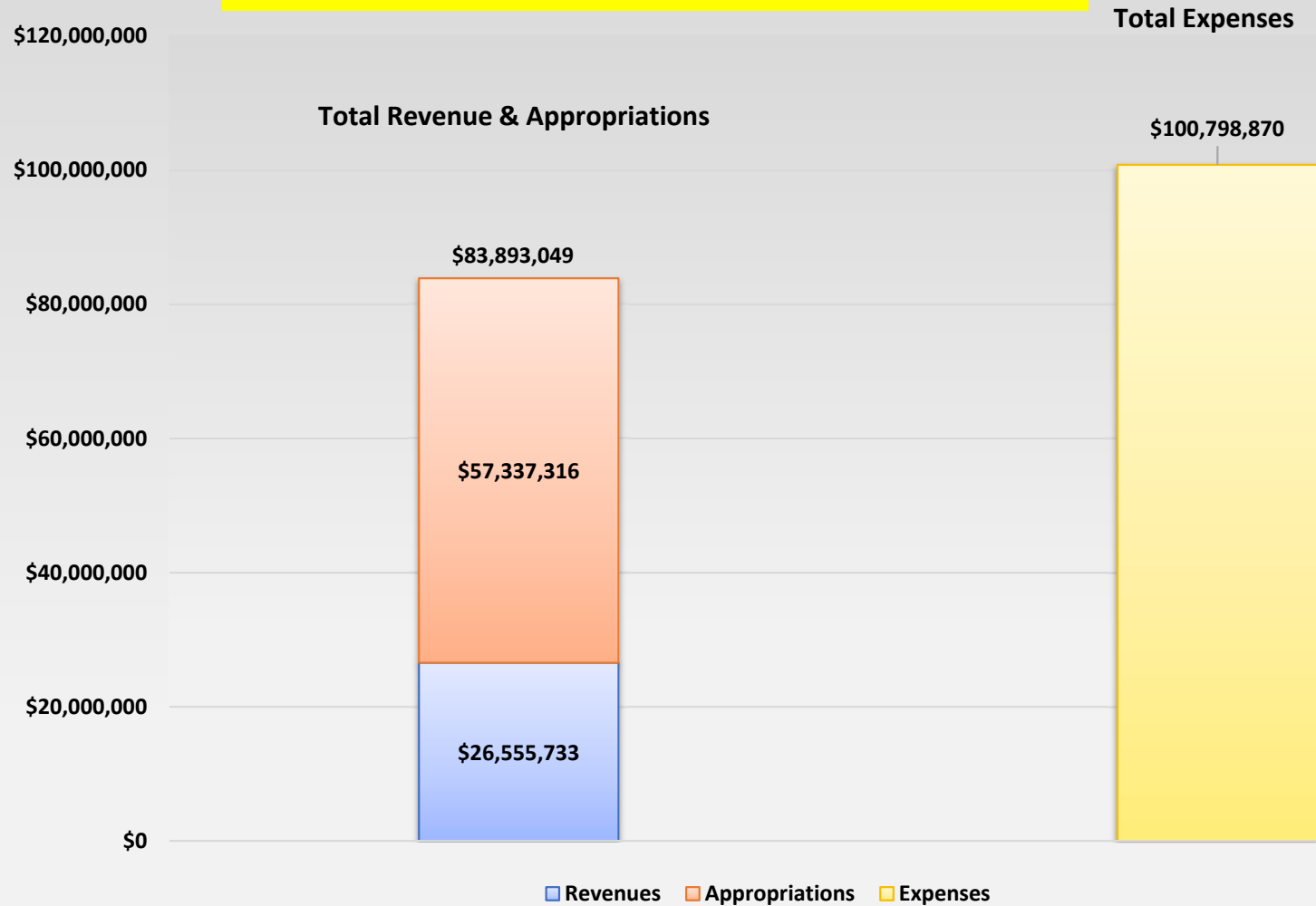

Expense Budget to Actuals Report – Budget Year 2026 as of June 30, 2026, by Account Prefix

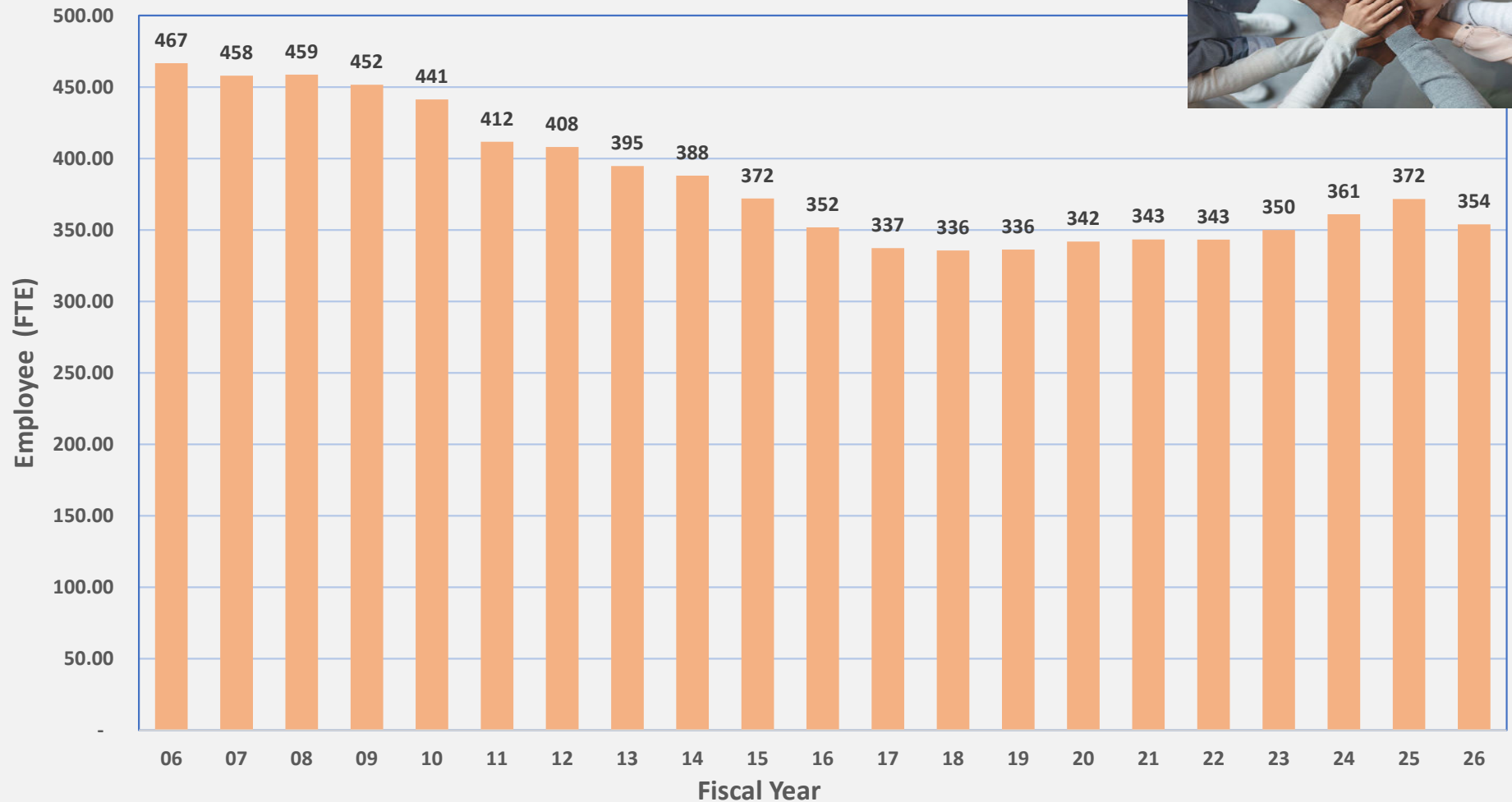

Employee FTE Totals Fiscal Year FY 2006 – FY 2026

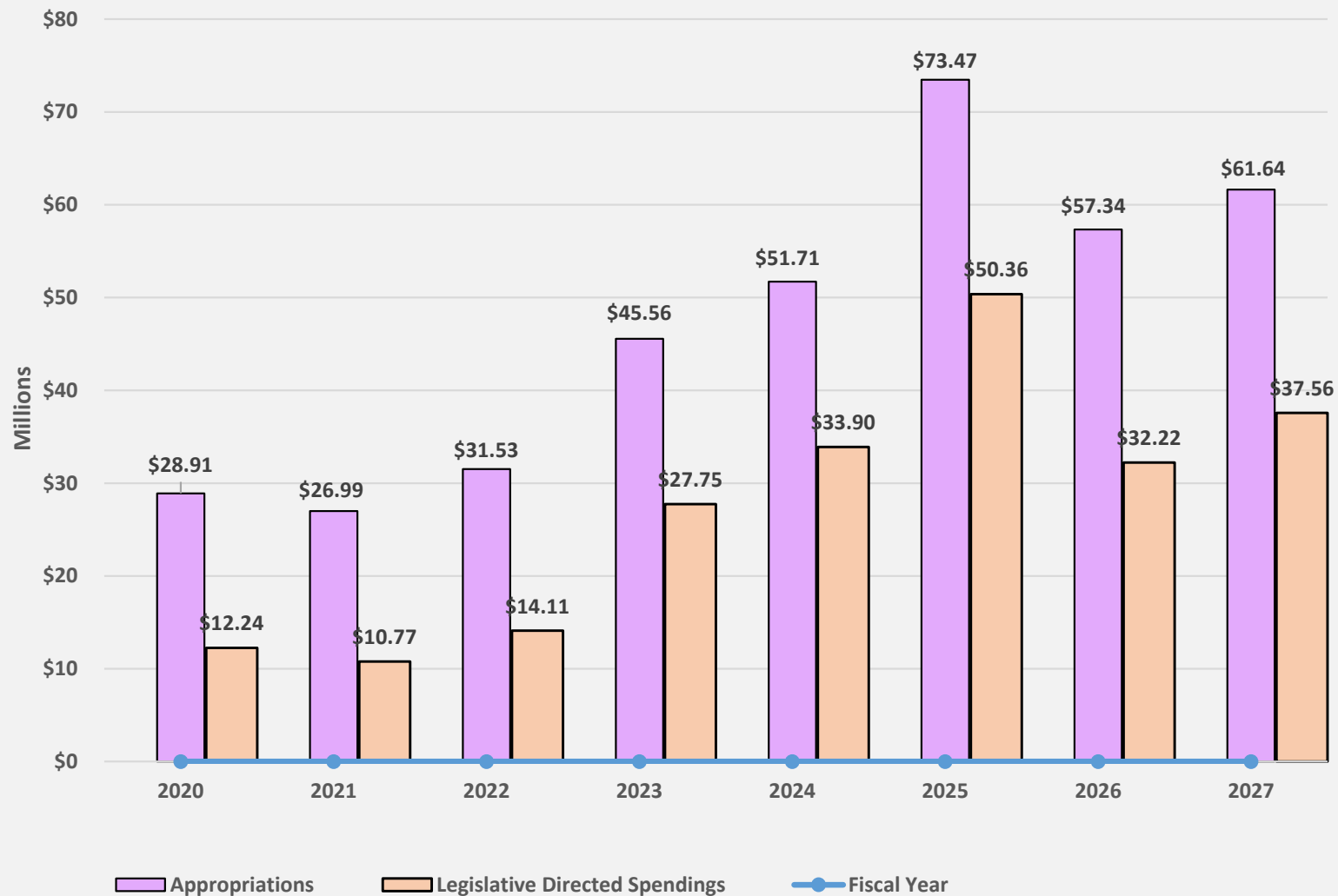

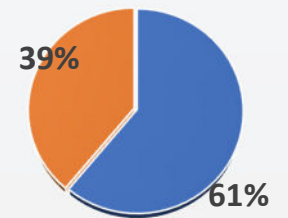

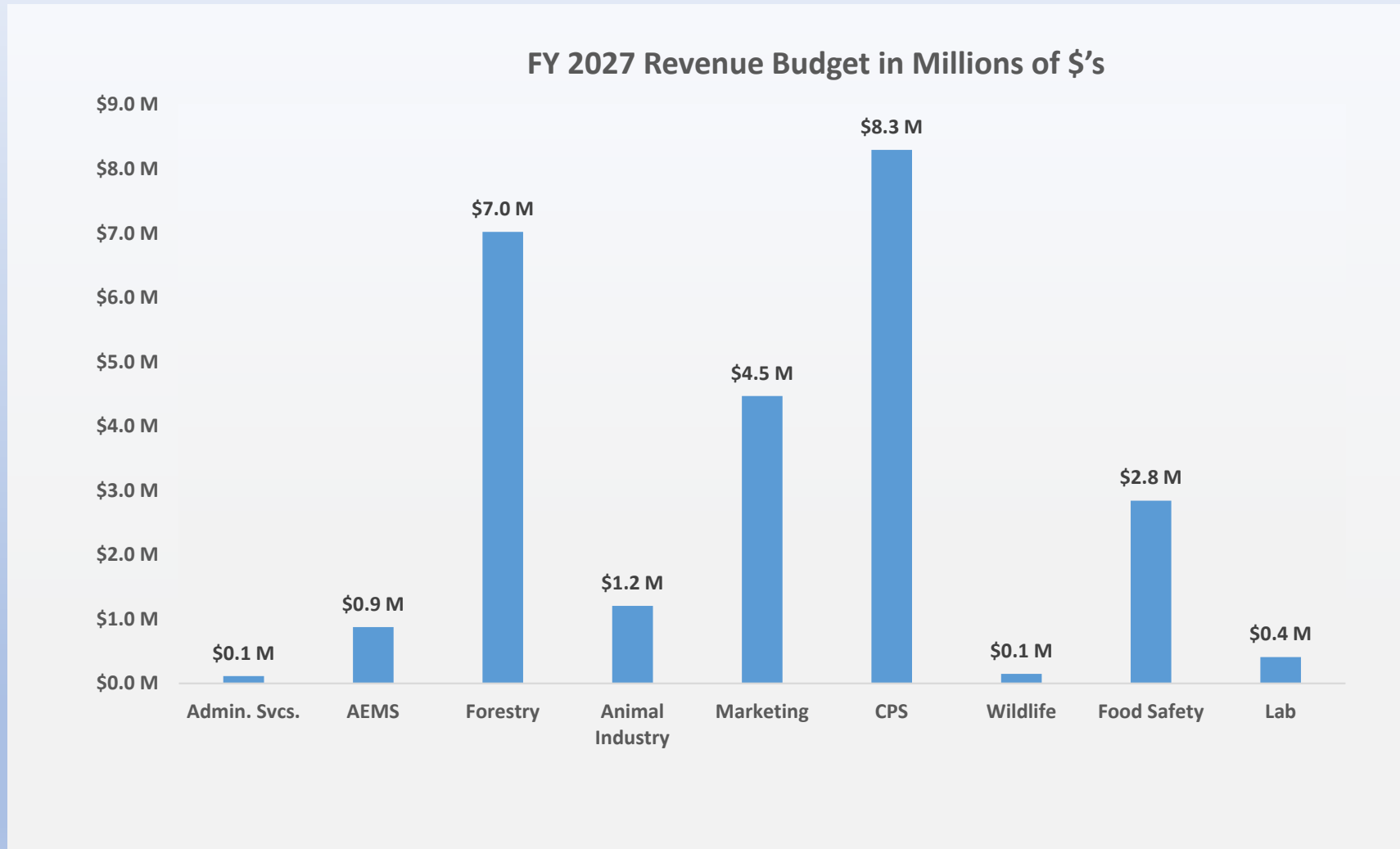

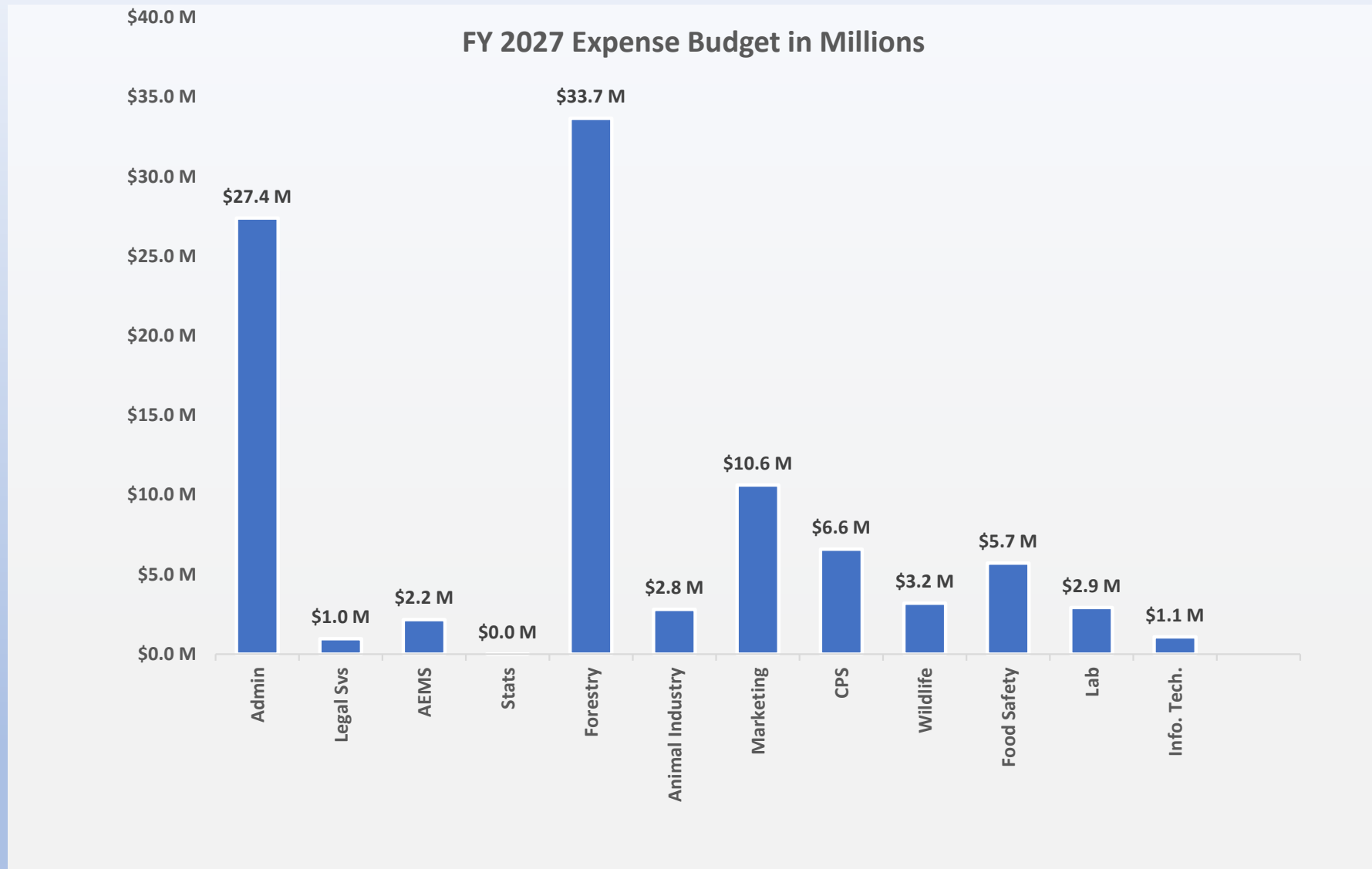
Fiscal Year 2027 Revenue Budget by Division

**JULY 2026 BOARD REPORT
AGRICULTURE LABORATORY SERVICES
(May and June 2026 Activities)**

Daniel Tripp, Quality Assurance Manager

In May the Food and Dairy Section and the Quality Manager continued to experiment with USMARC agar to determine if the formulation can be improved upon or easier for the laboratory staff to prepare. Different formulations of the agar were made to test its' efficacy. So far, the different formulations of the agar have given very similar results.

The Quality Manager is in the process of updating the Laboratory's Shiga Toxin E. coli (STEC) SOP. The updated revision of this SOP is expected to include the new agars the Quality Manager has been experimenting with for the past several months.

The General Chemistry staff have made progress updating SOPs and the QA Manager has been reviewing the updates to the SOPs.

The Laboratory is scheduled to have all balances Calibrated on Thursday, June 11th.

PT Results

The routine distribution of quality control samples to respective sections of the Laboratory continued. Collection and submission of data to the respective study groups for statistical analysis was conducted.

In June the Quality Manager updated and modified the Inorganic Section's MDL (Method Detection Limit) Form. The updated form includes a more user-friendly data display of important results and data entry layout than the previous version. This form will be implemented lab-wide for any other sections that require or perform MDLs as part of their Quality System.

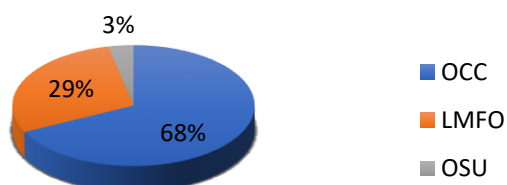
The QA Manager will begin the Internal Audit for the Oklahoma Bureau of Standards starting in July and has almost completed the method validation form for the Food and Dairy Lab Section. This form will be utilized in the event this Section needs to validate a new testing method.

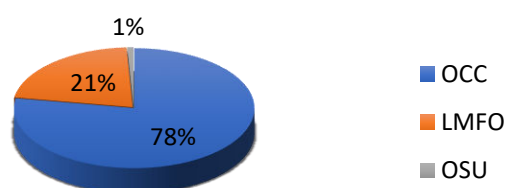

May 2026 Determinations Breakdown

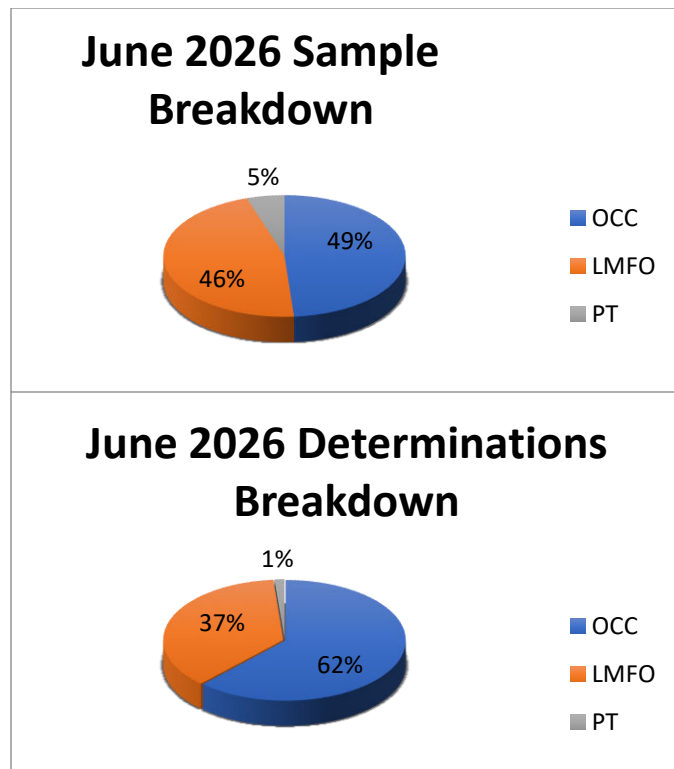


The slowing trend continued for much of May. The Oklahoma Conservation Commission (OCC) sample sites will be down from previous rotations of Basins 1 and Basin 5. We will have just two collectors bringing samples in for Basin 5. For Basin 1 there will be two collectors for one week and three collectors for another week. This is due to sites either not being viable anymore or permission is not granted for OCC to go onto the land to collect at certain sites.

LMFOs are still winding down for the end of this season. There will be a final push in June of about 60 or so well sites, resulting in around 80 samples including replicates and blanks. There is generally a break for the rest of the summer, but since LMFO sample collection started much later this year sampling will begin again much sooner.

In June of 2026 the Inorganic Chemistry Section completed 119 samples consisting of 901 determinations, with the following breakdown:

The final LMFO project at one farm ran for most of June, with a little over 100 samples. LMFO sampling is on break, with plans to start the next season in late August or September.

Ebby Eubanks, Dairy Food Safety Section Supervisor

All dairy farms were tested in the month of May. Two dairies have stopped production. This brings our total number of permitted farms to 51. All dairy plants were tested this month. There was one standard plate count violation, one coliform violation, and one somatic cell violation. One yogurt facility was put on warning for their strawberry yogurt, but that issue was resolved following their sanitizing processes testing. One dairy is on warning for their raw heavy cream, but there was not any available at the time inspectors went to collect samples. There are currently no farms on warning for any issues.

Twelve meat samples were tested for the month. This includes one sample from which we were able to isolate an O26 group of E. coli. After our isolation, the petri dishes containing colonies were sent to the health department for whole genome sequencing. We have not heard an update from them. This isolation was made easier by the new agar our QA Manager has been working on. He researched a new method and it proved to be very effective when we used it for this sample. Three water samples from meat plants and 177 from dairy plants were tested, with no positive E. coli results. There were 60 LMFO samples for fecal coliforms that we tested for the Inorganic Section. We are expecting those to continue throughout the summer, in addition to the OCC program that typically starts up around this time. This is going to increase our sample load drastically. For private samples, we received 17 bean wash samples, seven bottled water samples, 19 water container samples, and eight milk samples.

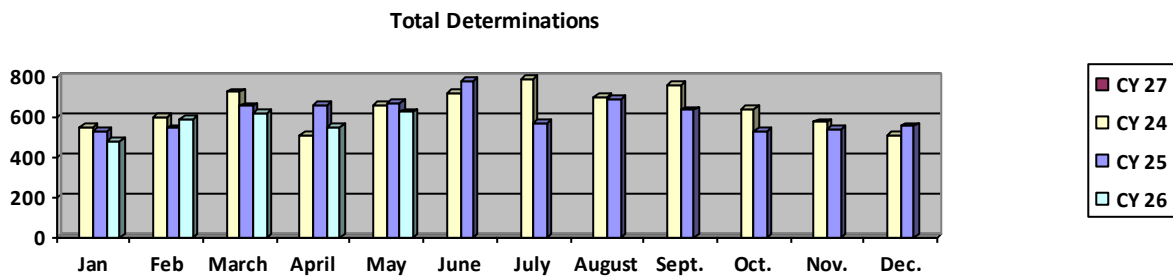
We have been trained on the new anaerobic chamber by a technician from the vendor. Due to an increased cost in gas usage for this unit, we are going to create a schedule for campylobacter testing that will be discussed with both the meat and dairy side of the Food Safety Division to identify the best time to test each month. The Section is still planning to send a chemist to the in-person training in California at some point this calendar year, pending funding and schedule availability. This training will provide better usage techniques and help us answer any questions we have.

We welcomed a new analyst this month. She has grasped on to the basic processes quickly and has become independent in some testing already. We still anticipate her being fully trained within six months to a year.

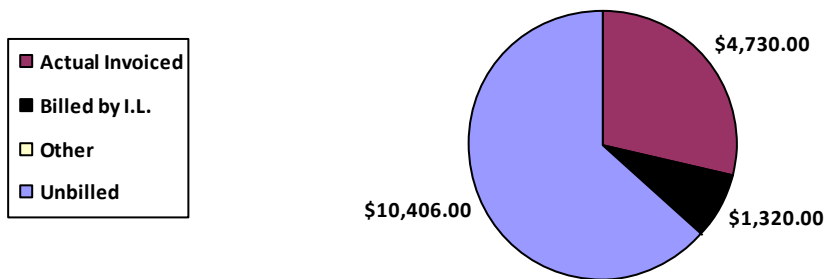
We will be hosting the FDA Milk Analyst Training Class in July. We hosted this class previously in 2024, and it was successful. The Laboratory will host 20 analysts from various states and three FDA members. The Section's new chemist will attend this course to help familiarize themselves with the milk program proceedings.

The Section supervisor is planning to attend the NADRO Convention in the middle of July. This is a meeting hosted by the National Association of Dairy Regulatory Officials. It will allow for a more casual atmosphere from the Western Milk Seminar to be able to discuss dairy policies within other states. The hope is to provide a network amongst states to discuss how to handle changing federal regulations and the introduction of new dairy products.

There are some future worries regarding the state of raw milk. There has been a new law that allows for incidental milk sales to rise from 200 gallons a month to 1,500 gallons. That is 1,500 gallons per farm/milk seller that can be sold without being regulated or tested for safety. Not only is it a bacterial issue, but it also becomes an antibiotic issue. This month, the Section had a private sample test positive for antibiotics. The customer was contacted and told not to consume the milk until the antibiotics have cleared the system of the cow. The sample was initially brought in for other testing, but antibiotics are typically checked in tandem with bacterial count and somatic cell count. If that sample had not been brought in, the customer would have no idea that antibiotics were present in the milk.



Revenue Breakdown

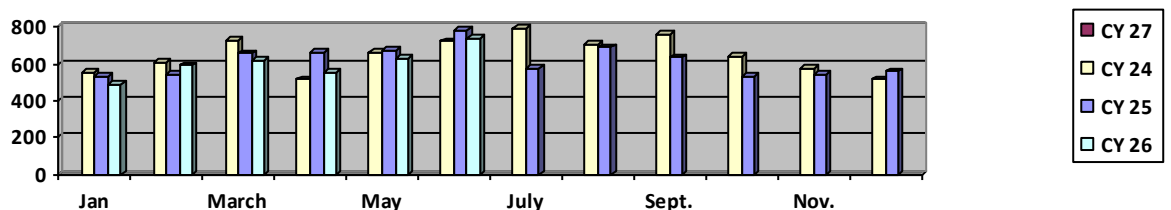


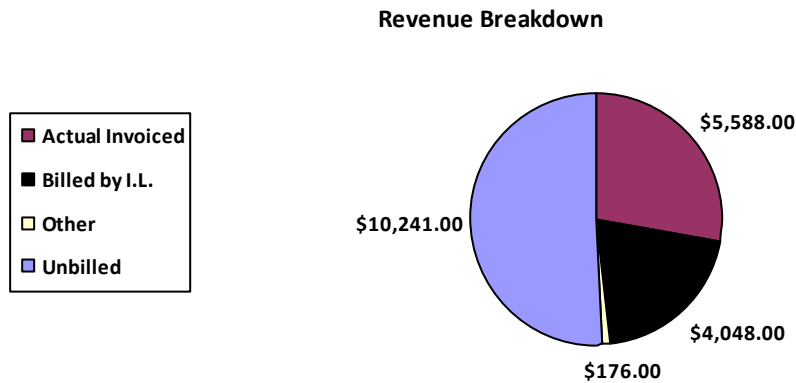
June was a normal month for dairy testing, but there was an increase in testing for the other areas under our program. All dairy farms and plants were tested in the month of June. There were two standard plate count violations, six coliform violations, and four somatic cell violations. One dairy is on warning for 2% cottage cheese. They stated they had cleaned their cottage cheese prep area, and we will test the product again shortly to verify that they have fixed the issue. There are currently no farms on warning for any issues.

Twenty-five meat samples were tested for the month. This includes another sample that tested presumptive positive for the O26 group of E. coli. We are still working to isolate it and confirm it. This Section still has not received an update from the health department for the last sample that was sent to them. This is a much larger amount of samples than is typical for a month. Five water samples from meat plants and 14 from dairy plants were tested, with no positive E. coli results. There were 122 LMFO samples for fecal coliforms that we test for the Inorganic Section. We tested 62 E. coli samples for that program this month. For private samples we received 17 bean wash samples, six bottled water samples, two well water samples, and two milk samples.

The Section's new chemist has applied and has been accepted to attend a Microbiology Fundamentals for Food Testing Workshop being held by the Association of Public Health Laboratories. This workshop will take place in San Deigo, CA in October this year.

Tori Gillispie, Seed Section Supervisor

Activity in the Seed Section remained normal for the month of May. Records indicate a total of 131 samples received for testing. Crops being tested consisted primarily of summer crops consisting of wheat, cowpeas, cotton, soybeans, and summer grasses. Most samples were taken by CPS inspectors following up on carryover seed needing updated germination tests. There was one Seed Law violation discovered during the month. A lot of tall fescue was tested in the laboratory with a finding of noxious weeds in excess of limitations. The violation has since been remedied.

The Seed Laboratory received a total of 136 samples for the month of June. Testing currently focuses on summer crops, sorghum, soybean, cowpeas, sesame, and summer grasses. No quality issues were identified in any of the summer crop seeds tested. One label violation was discovered this month. The label violation has since been remedied.

John White, General Chemistry Section Supervisor

In May the Section interviewed and hired a new chemist who will start work on June 1st. We hired a contract grinder through Galt, who has been able to help us catch up on some of our backlog.

Sample inflow from CPS has slowed down. We have been informed that several inspectors have hit their annual targets so we should have a few months of manageable sample load to work on equipment and methods.

The Section received our new Fiber Analyzer at the end of the month. This is a newer model of an instrument we have been using so there should be minimal issues and the Section can start using it for testing. This unit is more automated than the one we are currently using. Additionally this unit will allow us to start running Neutral Detergent Fiber, we hope to be able to start offering that test in late fall or early winter.

We have received 134 samples, completed 226 samples consisting of 967 determinations. There were 73 violations, giving a 7.55% fail rate. We have exceeded our annual target and determinations.

The average turnaround time was 48.61 days. This is primarily due to the sample inflow we experienced in February, March and April. We still have some failing ICP results that are awaiting final confirmation, those turnaround times will drag the stats down for June but hopefully will be resolved by the end of the month so we can start FY2027 in a better position.

June was a productive month for the Section and we managed to work on some of our sample backlog. The Section will be restarting the process to find a contract grinder, as our current person is unable to commit the time we need for the position. This person has helped us catch up with some of our backlogged work but is unable to keep up with sample inflow with the time they are willing to commit to work.

Sample inflow from CPS was reasonable and will hopefully remain manageable for the next few months until their fiscal year resets in September. Fiscal Year 2026 the Section received 3,271 samples, completing 3,156 samples consisting of 15,424 determinations.

The new Fiber unit has been set up and is in the process of being validated. We plan to start using it by the end of July.



We received 206 samples, completed 255 samples consisting of 1168 determinations. We found 115 violations, giving a 9.85% fail rate. We averaged 45.86 days turnaround.

Heather Rhoads, Pesticide Section Supervisor

For the month of May, new samples received were above average and favor residue analysis. Turnaround time for residue vegetation analysis improved as older samples were completed. The remaining backlogged residue samples have been completed. The remaining samples have been in house for approximately 30 days or less. There are three samples that had additional tests added in the month, which increases the TAT. We sent 20 samples out to three different laboratories in late March and early April. The samples were received back in early May. The samples had to be divided between the three outside laboratories because none of the laboratories could handle all twenty samples individually and provide results within thirty days. In addition, the marketplace formulation samples and application tank mixes are being completed at an acceptable rate.

Pesticide Section samples completed:

In the month of May the Section completed 58 samples. Below is the table showing the number of samples, tests per sample, and determinations (Det.) per sample with turnaround times (TAT). The average TAT for samples completed this month is 47 days.

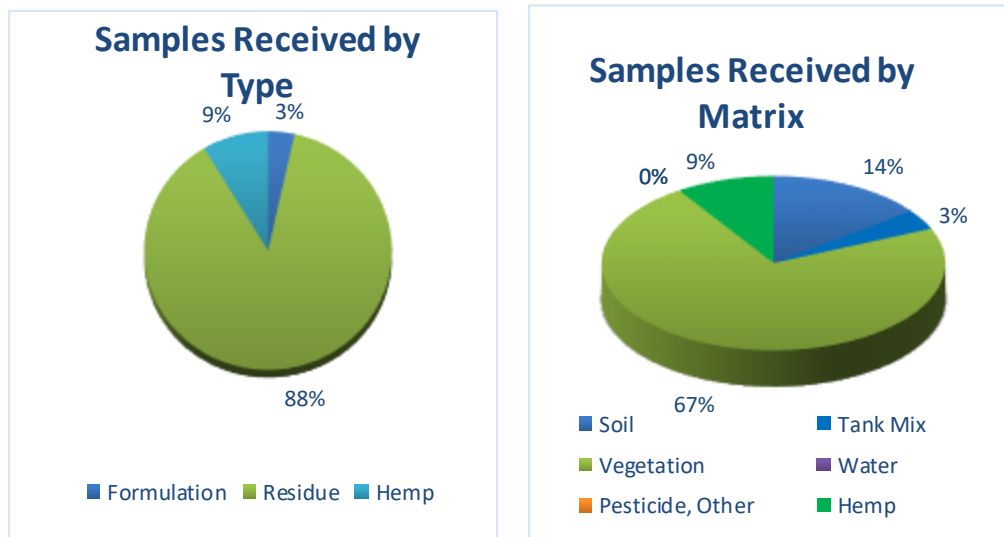


Fig A. Pie charts representing the number of samples received by type (left) and matrix (right).

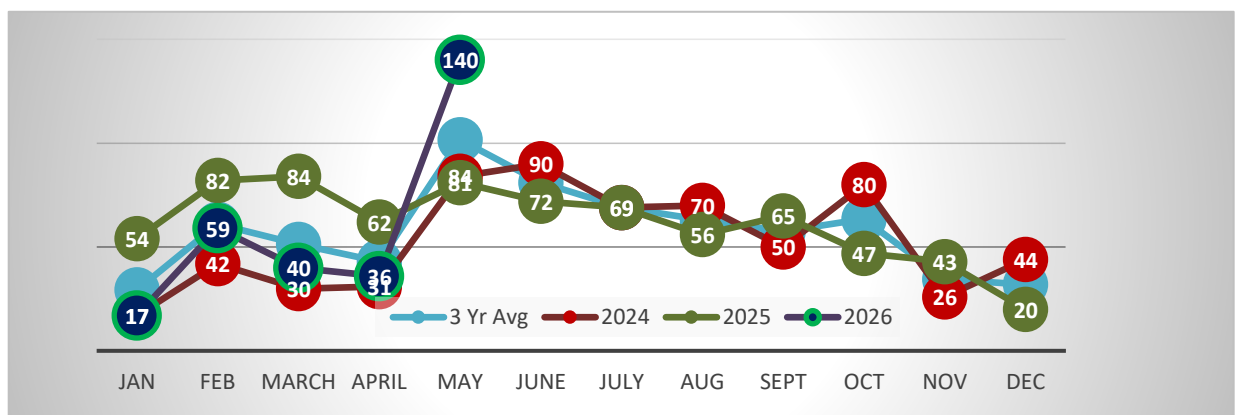
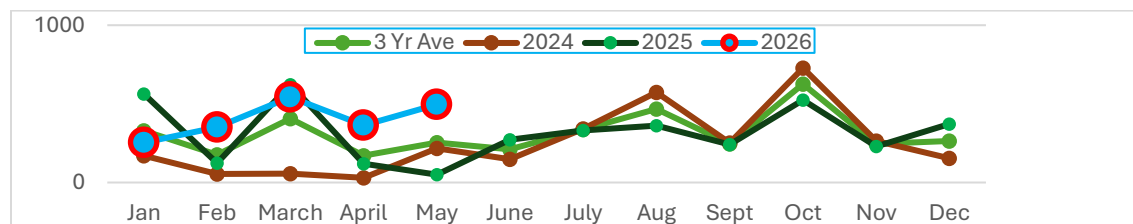


Fig B. Graph showing the number of samples received by the Section each month.

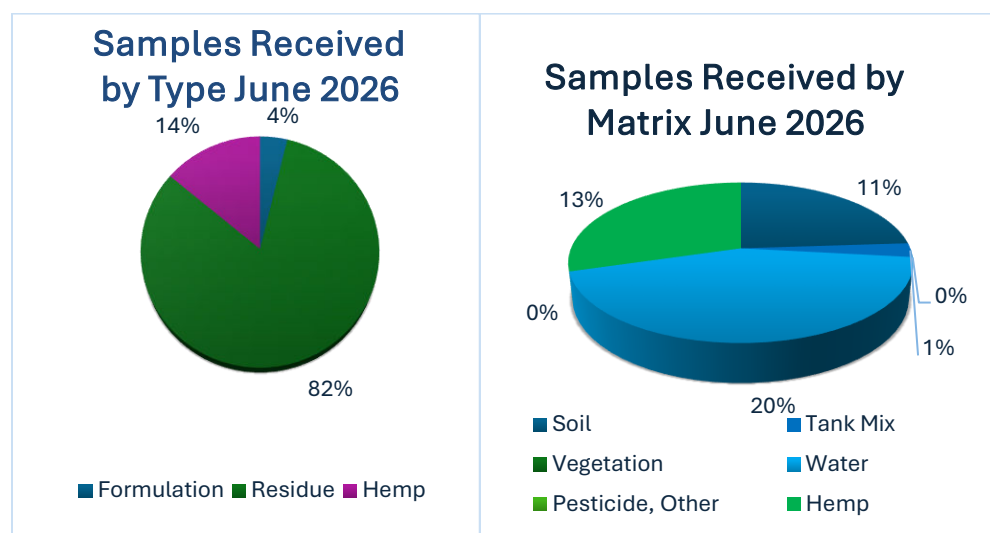

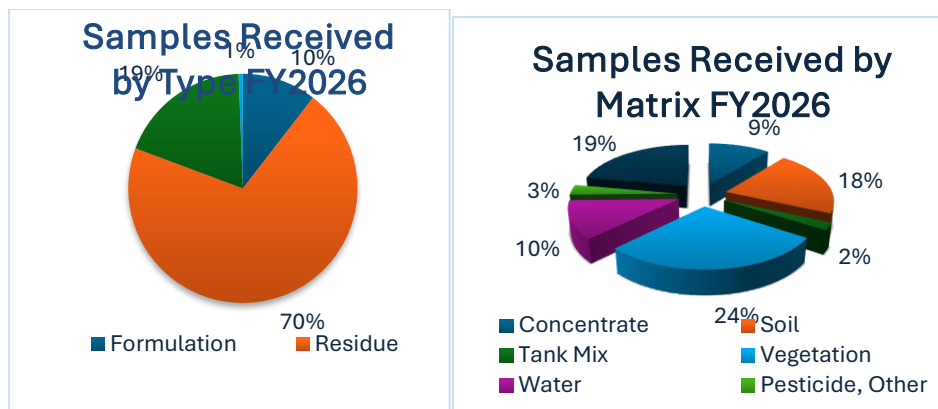


Fig A. Pie charts represent the number of samples received by type (left) and matrix (right) for June 2026 and FY2026.

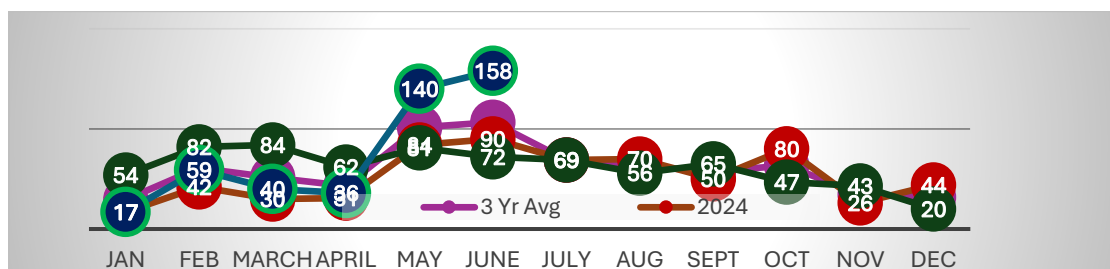
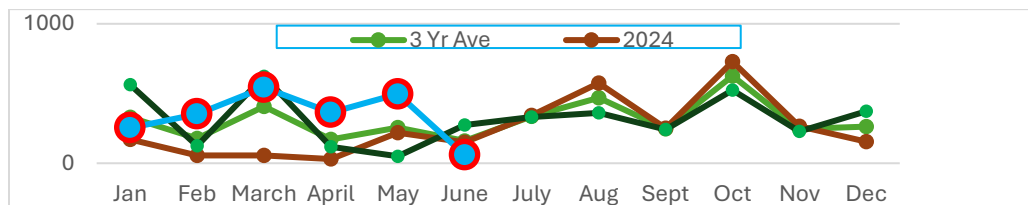


Fig B. Graph showing the number of samples received by the Section each month.

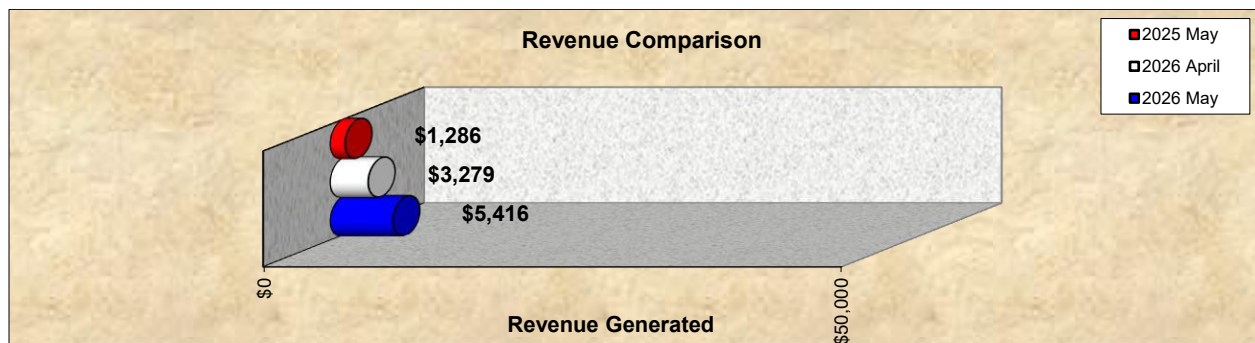
The following is a workload summary for the Oklahoma Bureau of Standards from May 1st through May 31st. During the month of May 2026, the Oklahoma Bureau of Standards generated a revenue of \$5,416.00. All customer appointments consisted of Mass Echelon III calibrations. The Bureau also received its volume standards back, after being calibrated in Minnesota. This ensures that the Bureau will be able to perform volumetric calibrations for the Oklahoma Corporation Commission the following month.

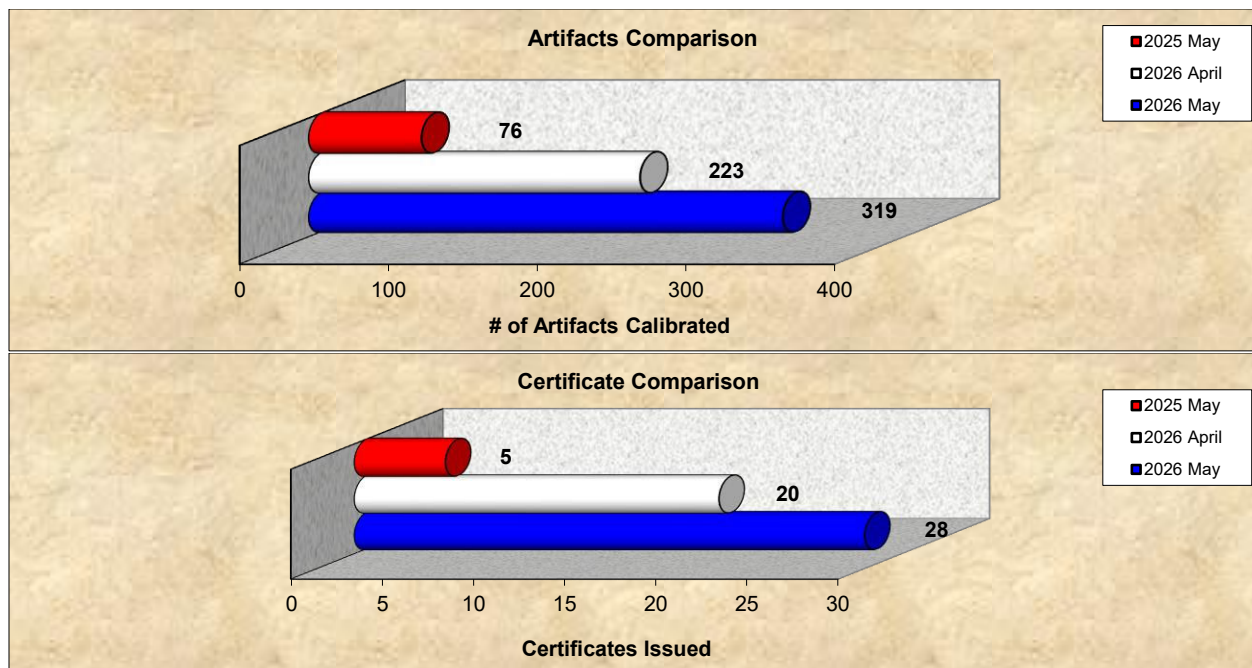


Pictured above: This is a set of 1000-pound and 500-pound customer weights that were calibrated by the Bureau.

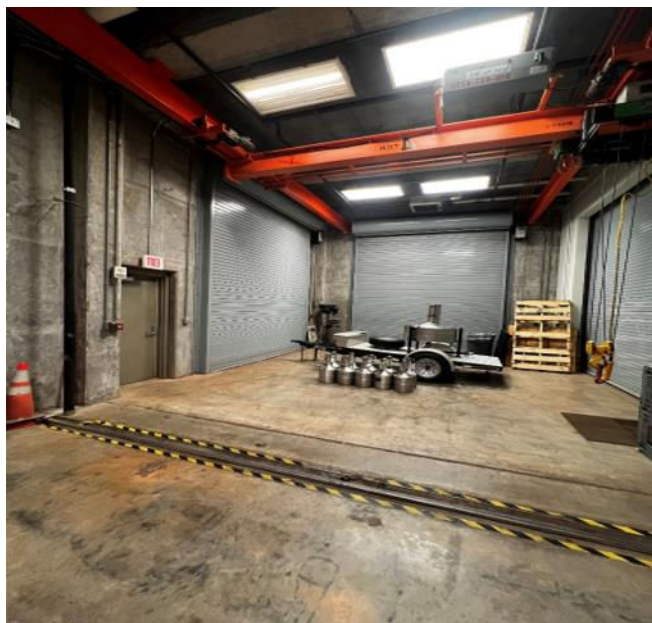

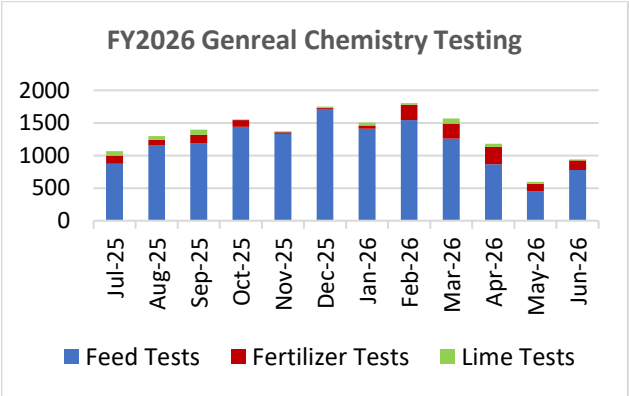
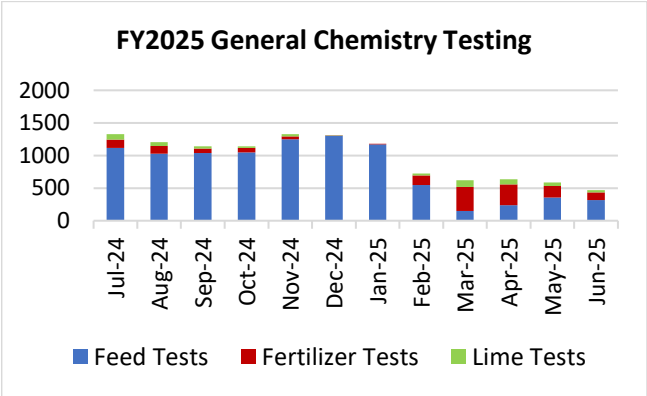


Laboratory Testing Summary for FY2026

General Chemistry Section:

Total Samples Received: 3,242 Total Determinations Requested: 16,024

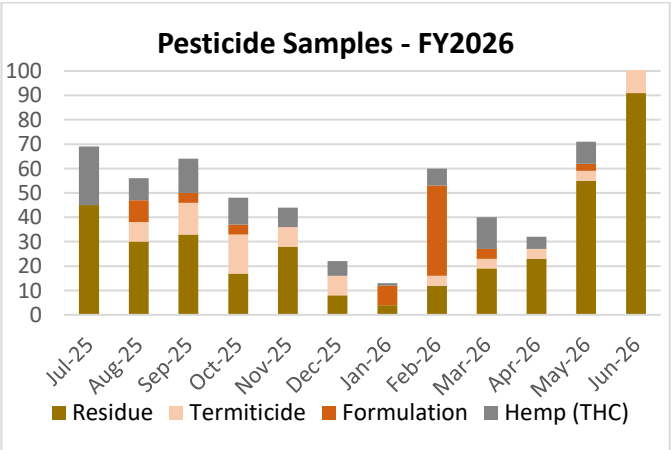
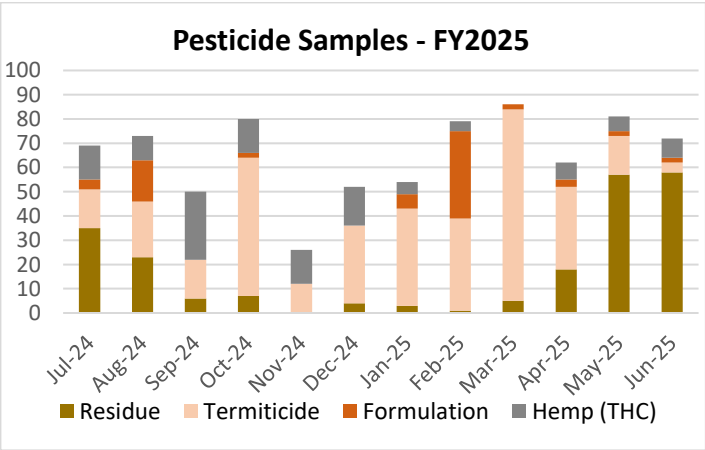
The General Chemistry Section received 33% more samples than FY2025, which is the highest FY total since FY2016. Turnaround times remained within set goals until December of 2025. The average sample turnaround exceeded the 18-day goal until the end of FY2026. This was due to several very busy months and being down a testing position and a sample prep position, which have been filled prior to the start of FY2027.



Pesticide Section:

Total Samples Received: 644 Total Tests Requested: 1,132

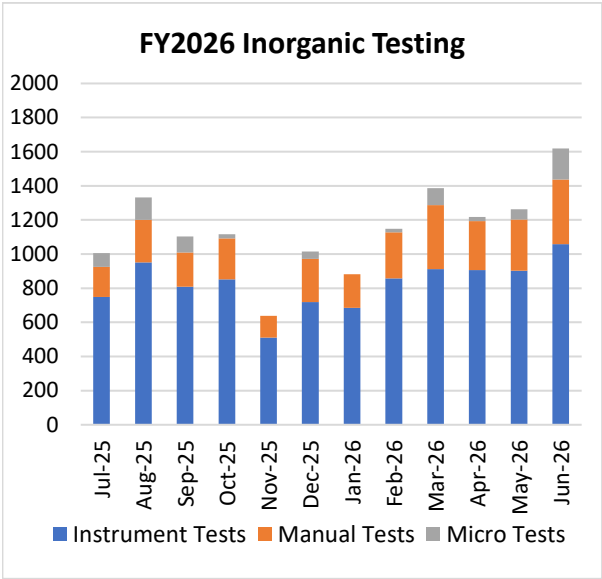
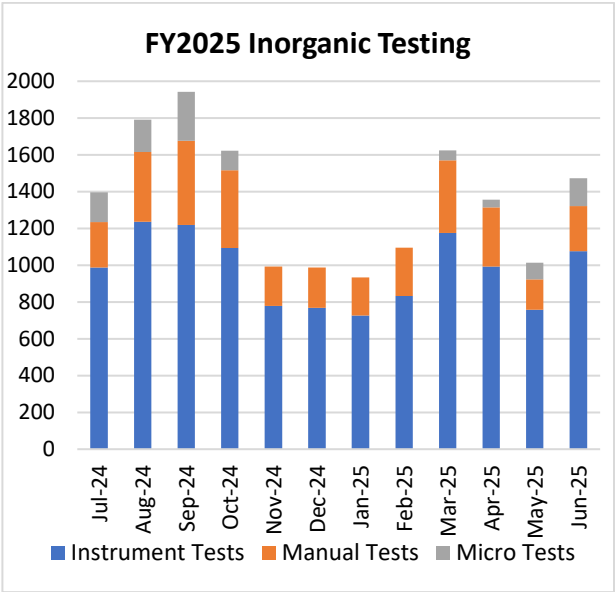
The Pesticide Section received 18% less samples overall, which was due to decreased Termiticide submissions (-78%), while Residue samples increased (+68%). Turnaround times again grew to problematic levels following the heavy spraying season (April to September) for residue testing. The goal for FY2027 is to have more testing methods available on the two new LC-MS instruments received in FY2026, which along with an additional analyst hired in April should help alleviate the bottle neck created by time consuming residue testing. Formulation, Termiticide and Hemp testing consistently remained within set goals for FY2026.



Inorganic Section:

Total Determinations Requested: **13,729**

The Inorganic Section received 15% less samples than FY2025, most of which were due to lower LMFO submissions resulting from a budgeting delay within the program and lower OCC submissions due to normal year to year rotation of sampling sites. Turnaround times have remained consistently within set goals for FY2026.

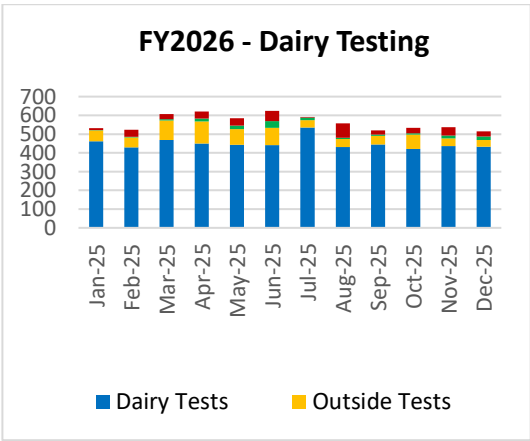
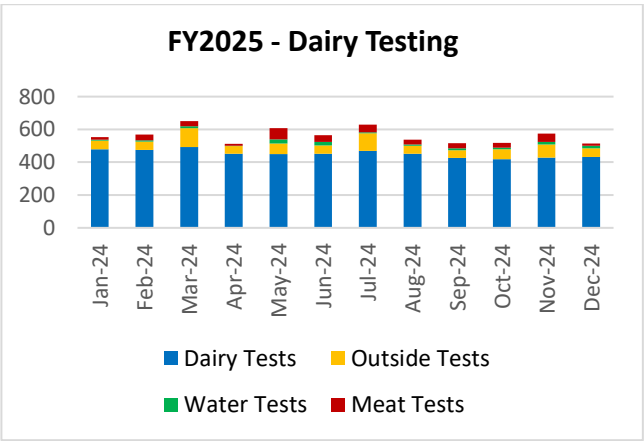


Dairy and Food Safety Section:

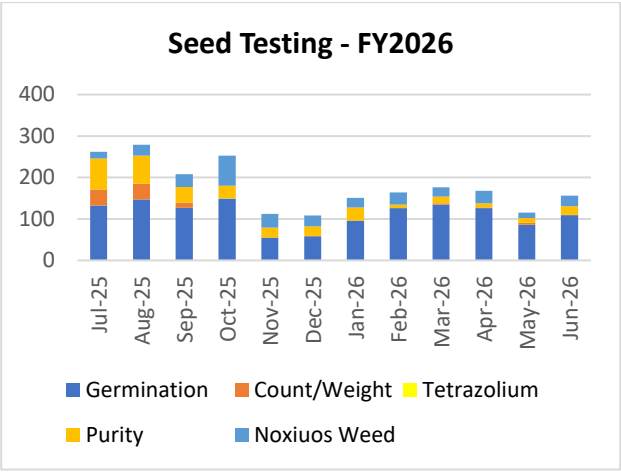
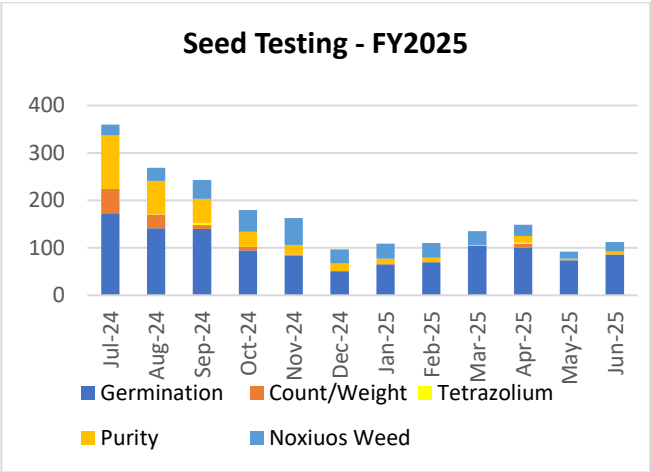

Total Samples Received: 1,667 Total Determinations Requested: 2,152

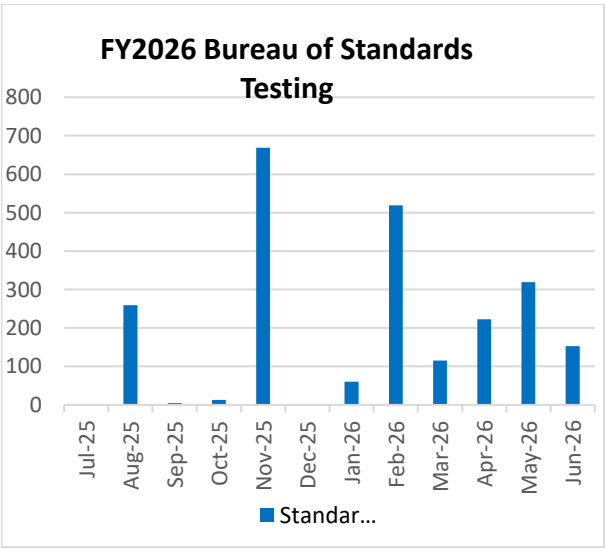
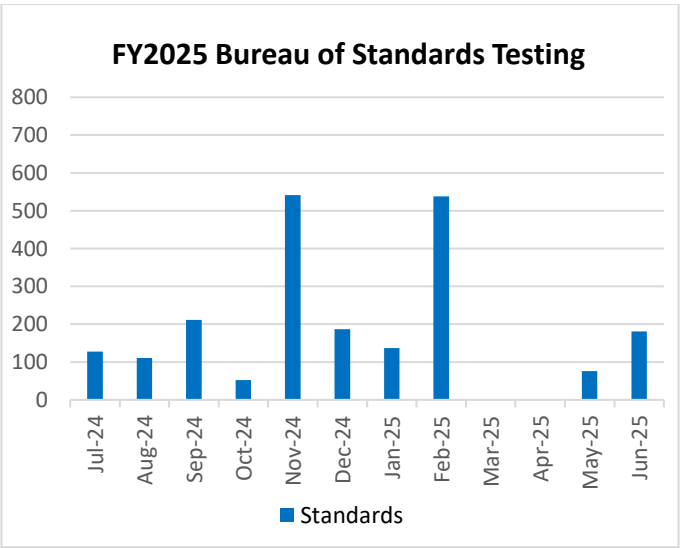
The Seed Section received 9% more samples than last year, mainly due to an increase in Germination testing. Turnaround times remained consistently within set goals for 2025.

FIRE MANAGEMENT

Fire Staff Board Report Input – 5-1-26 thru 6-30-26

Wildland Fire Management Executive Summary

Drought impacts continue to be a concern heading into the peak of summer. While recent rainfall has improved drought indicators in the eastern half of Oklahoma, overall dry conditions persist in the west. Testament to the overall dryness of fuels in the Panhandle counties, the area experienced two 'lightning busts that resulted in numerous lightning ignited wildfires across the region. The first lightning event occurred in mid-April concentrated in Texas County where over thirty (30) new wildfires occurred with several of them merging quickly following the dry thunderstorm passage.

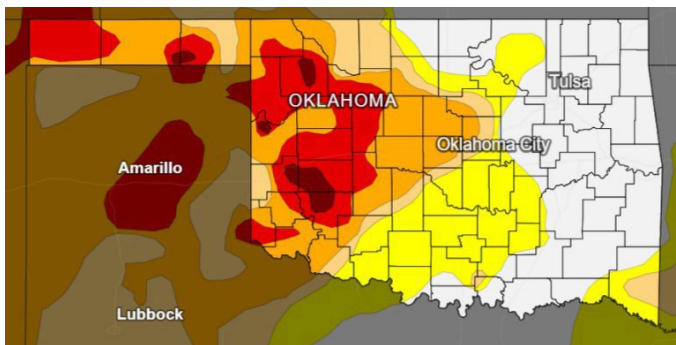
OFS responded working alongside local fire departments combatting nine (9) of the fires that escaped initial attack by local resources. A second lightning event in mid-May resulted in numerous wildfires starts across the Panhandle and areas of northwest Oklahoma. Again, OFS worked alongside local firefighting resources combatting fast-moving wildfires that proved resistant to control. Some of those fires were shared with New Mexico, Colorado and Kansas requiring strong coordination of effort. The largest of those wildfires was the Sharpe Fire in Cimarron County at 29,208 acres that straddled the OK/CO state line. Since that wildfire outbreak, periods of rainfall prompting live fuel moisture improvements, and reduced fire weather concern has resulted in reduced wildfire activity overall aligning with the seasonal expectation. Nonetheless, drought remains prominent in areas of western and central Oklahoma where the more decadent rangelands and high-severity fuels continue to merit attention as summer progresses.

Fire Environment Outlook

While drought does not equate to fire danger, it is strong factor regarding both anticipated fire behavior and overall resistance to control. Both of those attributes generally require additional resources for extended timeframes to contain wildfires. The current footprint of drought (Figure 1) is expected to remain in place throughout the summer season noting that some changes may occur dependent upon frequency, duration and amount of rainfall contrasted against evaporative demand during the hot, dry periods. As previously mentioned, drought correlates to potential for more intensely burning wildfires, increased fire severity and higher resistance to control as a general expectation. During the summer phase of the growing season, there are several factors that must be considered in the predicted environment ranging from live-fuel moisture, soil moisture, fuel type and the combination of inputs factored into the Hot/Dry/Windy

Index including vapor pressure deficit and wind speed. A more simplistic methodology for gauging wildfire potential is to evaluate the combination of fire environment triggers that overlap each other, including:

- Greater than 10 days separation from a wetting rain event – 0.25 inches is generally considered wetting.
- Keetch-Byram Drought Index (KBDI) values greater than 600 on a scale of 0 through 800.
- Energy Release Component eclipsing the 75th percentile.
- Afternoon relative humidity values less than 20% in the west or less than 25% in the east.
- Sustained winds greater than 25 mph west or greater than 20 mph east.
- Frequency of wildfire occurrence and probability of successful initial attack.

The remainder of the summer season will require continuous monitoring. While there are no overly concerning signals at the time of this report, underlying drought and climatological expectation will support continued wildfire occurrence that is primarily captured during initial attack on the local level provided quick response and access to the fireground is commensurate with engine and/or grader access in the west and central regions. The triggers identified above will be watched closely in addition to potential for dry lightning. El Nino conditions are expected to strengthen into the fall and winter providing a reasonable expectation for ‘wetter’ conditions later in the calendar year.

Community Fire Assistance Program – Tammy Carter Firefighting Property Program Update

- No new equipment has come into the yard.

- Total number of Certified Fire Departments is 833. Operational grant funds will be divided equally between 832 fire departments and one declining operation grant payment. Payment should be \$10,113.64 per fire department.

80/20 Grants (Fiscal Year 26 \$2,000,000.00)

- 48 out of the 73 Fire departments have received reimbursements for the 80/20 grants. 25 Fire Departments will have their funds carried forward into Fiscal Year 27. All 25 departments have been in communication with OFS concerning the remaining funds being carried forward.

Community Wildfire Defense Grant (CWDG)

Still waiting for notification of application announcement for Round four. We are leaning toward the application period being opened in the Fall of 2026.

- McAlester : McAlester is continuing to move forward with their project.
- Tulsa County: Tulsa County has hired a new employee to move forward with writing the County Wide Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP).
- Commanche County: Contractor is making major strides in community engagement for their CWPP.
- OFS: The Nature Conservancy of Oklahoma, Stillwater, Dewey County, Turner Falls/Davis, Mannford, and Edmond are continuing to work on their applications for Round four.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Health Program – Dieter Rudolph

- **5-1-26** : Forest Management Chief Dieter Rudolph and Urban Forestry Coordinator Riley Coy attended the Skyline Garden Social at the Skyline Food Resource Center. This gathering brought together groups that actively work with the community and the food pantry. Dieter and Riley spoke with several community members to begin planning a potential food forest on the property to include tree fruits and nuts in the garden which supplies fresh produce to the food bank.
- **5-7-26** : Dieter spoke at the Oklahoma Forestry Association (OFA) spring workshop on OFS landowner assistance programs and available cost-share. The workshop was attended by forest landowners, OFS foresters, private consultants,



and loggers. Between the topics of the workshop and the presence of natural resource professionals, landowners in attendance were left better equipped to introduce forest management practices on their lands.

- **6-1-26 through 6-30-26** : Throughout the month of June OFS has released several batches of parasitic wasps at the Broken Bow office. These two species of wasps parasitize the invasive emerald ash borer (EAB), and their introduction potentially reduces EAB population which mitigates the damage caused by the insect. In addition to the Broken Bow releases, OFS partners have also released wasps at Lake Murray State Park and the Chickasaw National Recreation Area. Work is underway to include the Tulsa area in 2027.

Urban & Community Forestry Program – Riley Coy/Elizabeth Bland-Corbishley

- **5-12-26** : Riley Coy attended the Groundbreaking Ceremony at the new Governor's Mansion where they held a Survivor Tree planting ceremony to replace the Survivor Tree that died from Dutch Elm Disease.
- **5-14-26** : Elizabeth Bland-Corbishley and Aaron Williams held a booth at the Enid Recovery Event following the tornado that hit a neighborhood in Enid in April. They spoke with tornado victims and city officials on how to mitigate fire risks, prevent erosion, and tree species selection for re-planting. There were 50 people in attendance.
- **5-20-26** : Elizabeth Bland-Corbishley led a tree walk with Chris Gabbard at The Gathering Place for the Creek County STEM Club. There were 15 people in attendance.
- **5-29-26** : Riley Coy and Dieter Rudolph performed a site visit in Shawnee at the Little White House to look at sick and dying blackjack and post oaks.
- **6-3-26** : Riley Coy and Elizabeth Bland-Corbishley Performed a site visit with The City of Ponca City to look at their IRA Grant Project Area and discuss tree species and logistics of the project. Riley Coy and Elizabeth Bland-Corbishley performed a site visit at Karsten Creek Golf Club in Stillwater to look at a large walnut experiencing construction damage stress.
- **6-10-26** : Riley Coy performed a site visit at Langston University to core and age potential witness trees for the Black Heritage Tree Project.



- **6-22-26** : Riley Coy responded to storm damage on the Shartell Survivor Tree Clone. The broken limbs were cleaned up and the wounds dressed.
- **6-29-26** : Riley Coy and Elizabeth Bland-Corbishley performed a site visit to the Town of Taft to look at the project area and discuss tree species and logistics for their IRA Grant.

Forest Heritage Center – Shalee Buzan

- Planning has officially begun for the annual Oklahoma Forestry Association (OFA) and Forest Heritage Center/Oklahoma Forestry Services Banquet.
- Hosted Oklahoma Forestry Camp participants for group educational activities, introducing a newly developed Forestry & History Sleuth Game, an interactive program designed to encourage teamwork, critical thinking, and exploration of forestry history.

- Continued enhancements to the Conservation Station interactive exhibits.
- Ongoing development of the Surrealism Exhibit.
- Continued improvements to Invasive Species educational displays and interactive learning stations.
- Staff continue evaluating opportunities to expand hands-on educational experiences throughout the museum.

Summary

The Forest Heritage Center experienced an exceptionally productive May and June, expanding educational outreach through school tours, statewide partnerships, community events, and hands-on programming. Continued exhibit enhancements, increased public engagement, and record participation in Camp Discover demonstrate the museum's growing impact as both an educational destination and a community resource. As the summer season continues, staff remain focused on delivering meaningful educational experiences while strengthening partnerships across Oklahoma.

Forestry Education Program – Tony Pascall

- **5-4-26:** Tony taught at Terra Verde Discovery School in Norman. 45 students participated in hands-on forestry education activities focused on the importance of trees, forests, and outdoor learning.
- **5-7-26 :** Tony taught at Skyline Elementary’s Outdoor Day in Stillwater. 120 students rotated through outdoor learning stations and participated in forestry education activities that helped connect classroom learning to the natural world.
- **5-12-26 :** Tony led a Project Learning Tree (PLT) workshop for Social Studies lead teachers for OKC Public Schools. 35 educators learned how to use PLT activities to incorporate forestry education, natural resources, and outdoor learning into their elementary social studies instruction.
- **5-13-26 :** Tony taught at Dewar Elementary’s Ag Day. 75 students learned about forestry, natural resources, and the role trees play in Oklahoma’s environment and communities.
- **6-2-26 through 6-3-26 :** Tony helped lead a new facilitator training for Project Learning Tree, Project WET, and Project WILD in Wilburton. 15 new facilitators were trained, including teachers, state park naturalists, and Oklahoma Water Resources Board employees. These new facilitators will be able to lead PLT workshops on their own as volunteers, helping expand the reach of forestry education and increasing the number of educators who can access high-quality, hands-on environmental education training across the state.
- **6-5-26 :** Tony was the keynote speaker for the Oklahoma Science Teachers Association’s awards dinner at their summer conference in Edmond. During the conference on June 6th, Tony also hosted an exhibitor booth and spoke with more than 120 educators about PLT and how to incorporate forestry education into their own teaching.
- **6-15-26 through 6-20-26 :** The 67th Oklahoma Forestry Youth Camp took place in Broken Bow. 59 campers spent the week learning about different aspects of forestry through hands-on sessions on forest management, fire ecology, Geographic Information System (GIS), invasive species, climate and forestry, and more. Campers learned new outdoor skills, built connections with forestry professionals, and several students left camp interested in future careers in forestry.



- **6-24-26** : Tony taught Project Learning Tree as part of the Tulsa Regional Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Alliance’s “Sense-sational Science” workshop for teachers in Lawton. 35 educators learned how to use PLT activities to bring forestry education, outdoor learning, and hands-on science into their classrooms.

Forest Inventory and Analysis (FIA) Program – Josh Bradley

- FIA Foresters completed research plots in Adair, Atoka, Bryan, Cherokee, Comanche, Creek, Dewey, Garvin, Grady, Haskell, Leflore, McCurtain, Mayes, Muskogee, Okmulgee, Pawnee, Pittsburg, Pottawatomie, Pushmataha, Seminole, Sequoyah, Woods, Woodward and other counties.
- Currently, during the growing season, FIA foresters measure additional metrics including forest fuel loads and fuel categories, vegetation stand dynamics, and advanced tree health markers.
- FIA foresters attended an Oklahoma Forestry Association landowner workshop designed to help landowners keep and manage private forests.
- Joshua Bradley attended the Southern Group of State Foresters annual meeting. Sitting on both the inventory and utilization committees, Joshua shared Oklahoma's priorities and objectives in the current slowing timber market. Some novel ideas around small-diameter timber utilization may create new markets and economies in Oklahoma.
- Gary Seaton and James Brown served as instructors at the Youth Forestry Camp.
- FIA research takes reliable and repeatable measurements of forest area, forest volume, and forest health across the state. These measurements give private industry precise estimates of merchantable wood available for harvest and demonstrate the sustainable industry practices in place in southeast Oklahoma. Nearly six million acres of forest grow within the productive range of timberland and power a \$6.9 billion industry impact.
- When working in counties outside the "timber basket" of eastern Oklahoma the data is used to model fuel dynamics for fire risk estimate, observe forest health changes across another approximately six million acres of forests, and monitor the spread of invasive exotic species.
- The FIA program hired and is training a new forester to bring the program up to full strength for accurate and timely measurement of Oklahoma's 44 million acres.

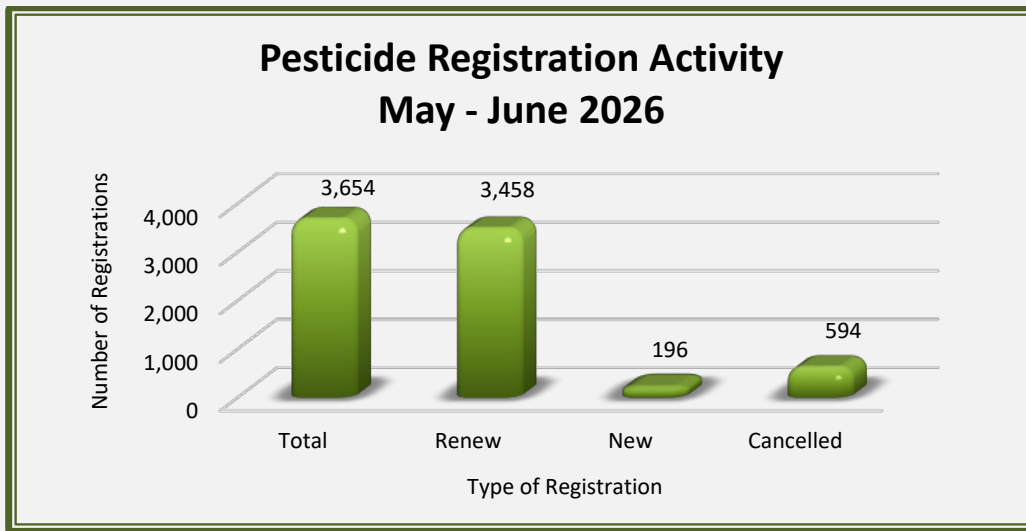

PESTICIDE SECTION

Pesticide Registration Activity

During this reporting period a total of **3,654 pesticide products** were registered statewide. Of these, **3,458 were renewals**, **196 were new registrations**, and **594 were cancelled**.



Pesticide Regulatory Education Program (PREP)

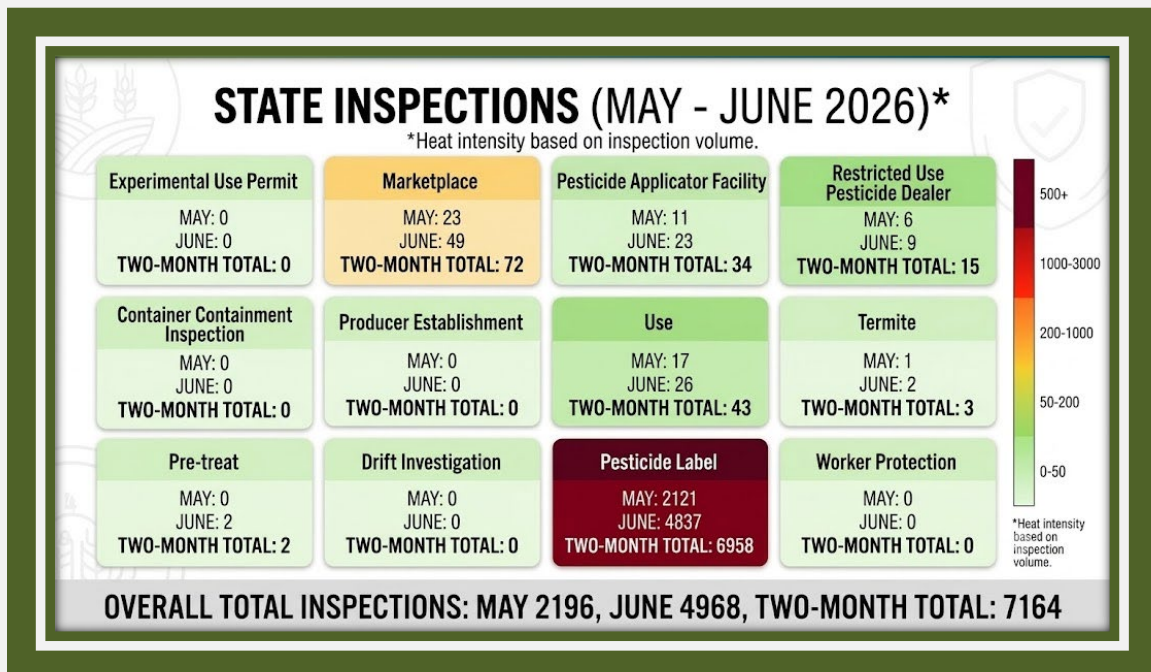
Ryan Williams, Assistant Director for Consumer Protection Services, attended the Pesticide Regulatory Education Program (PREP) course titled *New & Emerging Technology* held June 22 through 26, 2026, in Fort Collins, Colorado. The training brought together approximately 30 pesticide regulatory professionals from all EPA regions.

The course focused on emerging technologies influencing the future of pesticide regulation and enforcement. Instruction covered advancements in drone technology; Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) requirements for unmanned aircraft systems; pesticide labeling considerations associated with new technologies; regulatory requirements for drone-based pesticide applications; drone data management and recordkeeping; and the evolving landscape of digital pesticide labeling.

Participation in this course provided valuable insight into rapidly developing application technologies and regulatory frameworks, supporting CPS efforts to ensure inspectors and regulatory officials remain prepared to oversee these innovations while maintaining compliance and protecting human health and the environment.

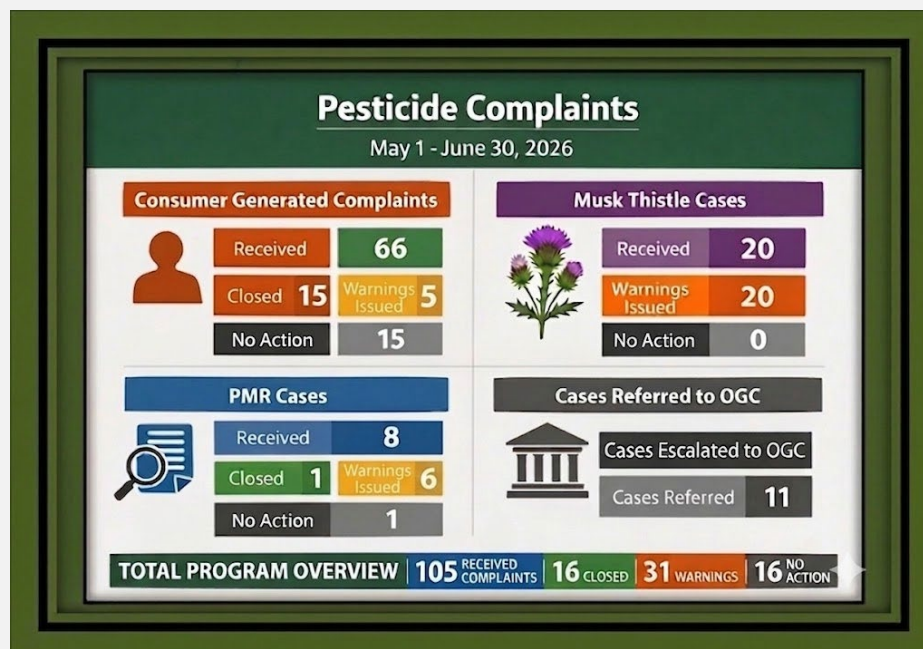
Inspection Activity

A combined **7,164 inspections** were completed across all categories with **2,196 inspections** in May and **4,968 inspections** in June. Inspections not yet submitted at the time of this report will be reflected in the next board report



In addition to the inspections conducted, CPS field agents collected a total of 268 samples, consisting of 124 agriculture-use samples, 94 agriculture-use follow-up samples, 28 non-agriculture-use samples, and 22 non-agriculture-use follow-up samples.

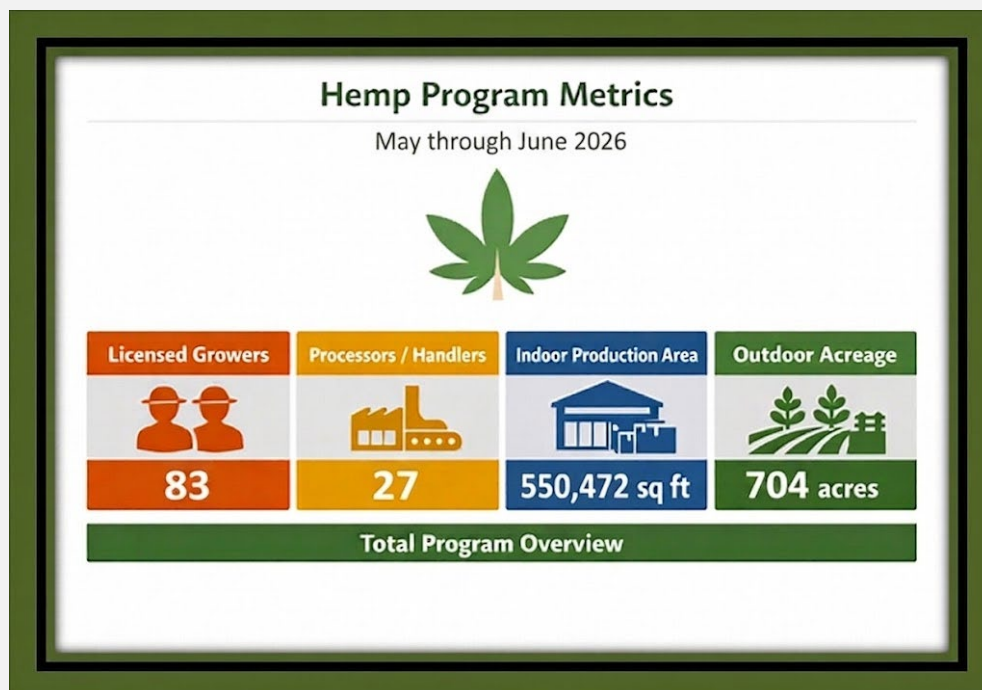
Cooperative Agriculture Pest Survey Update

CPS received continued USDA APHIS Cotton Pests survey funding, including an additional **\$31,000** awarded through **August 2027** to support surveillance for two priority cotton pests—the **Cotton Seed Bug (CSB)** and the **Two-Spotted Cotton Leafhopper (TSCL)**. TSCL expanded rapidly across the United States last year, placing southern cotton-producing states on heightened alert. Both pests present meaningful risks to cotton production and warrant ongoing monitoring.

During the previous fall, CPS field agents distributed pest alerts and outreach materials to cooperatives and gins across **southwestern Oklahoma**. In June, CPS field agents conducted surveys at production nurseries in **Cherokee County**, with all samples testing negative. Field agents continue statewide inspections of incoming **Malvaceous** plant material at retail and nursery locations. Additionally, one southwestern CPS field agent has begun surveys of **25 cotton fields** as part of the funded effort.

The State Survey Coordinator is revising the **Invasive Pests Activity Book** to include CSB and TSCL, supported by funding from the **2025 award**. To expand survey reach, CPS will collaborate with **Dr. Ashleigh Farris**, Assistant Professor and Integrated Pest Management Faculty at **Oklahoma State University**. As the **Field Crops Extension Entomologist**, Dr. Farris and her student team will deploy **yellow sticky traps** at multiple cotton trial sites to monitor for *Amrasca biguttula* (Two-Spotted Cotton Leafhopper). Throughout the growing season, they will analyze captured specimens, with data recorded and managed through the **Field Maps app**.

Compliance Agreements

At the close of 2025, **31 Oklahoma firms** held compliance agreements authorizing interstate plant shipments. These agreements are renewed annually at the beginning of each calendar year.

As of 2026, **eight additional nurseries** have begun shipping nationwide, bringing the total number of firms requiring compliance agreements to **39**.

Currently, **34 of the 39 compliance agreements** have been completed for renewal.

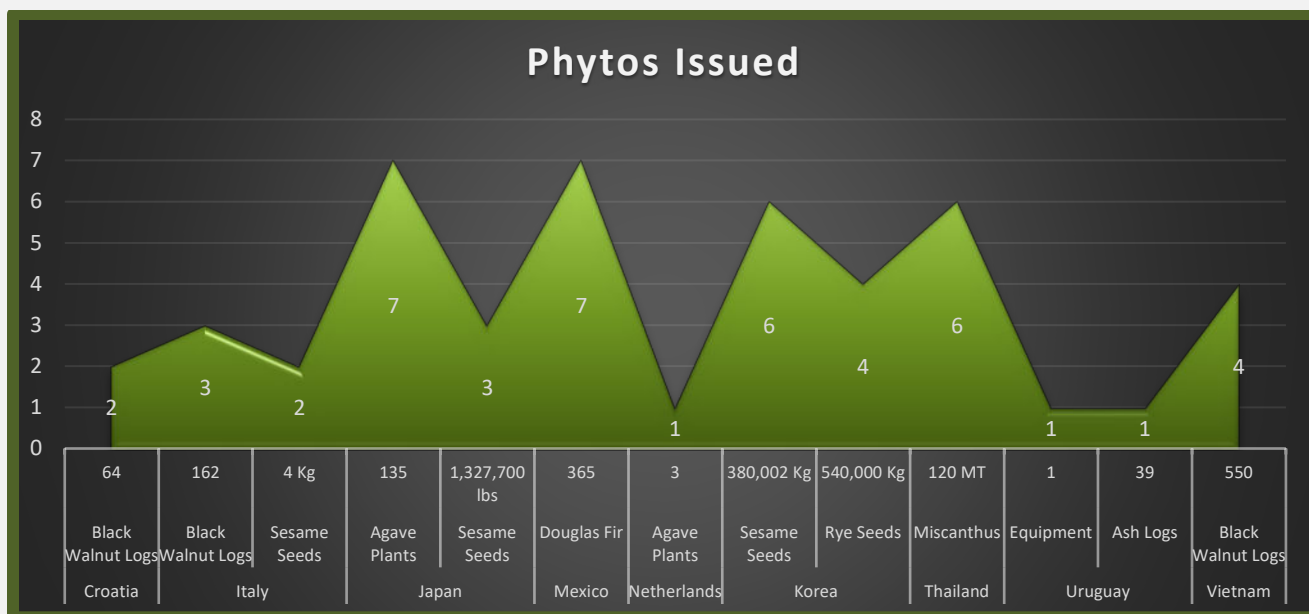

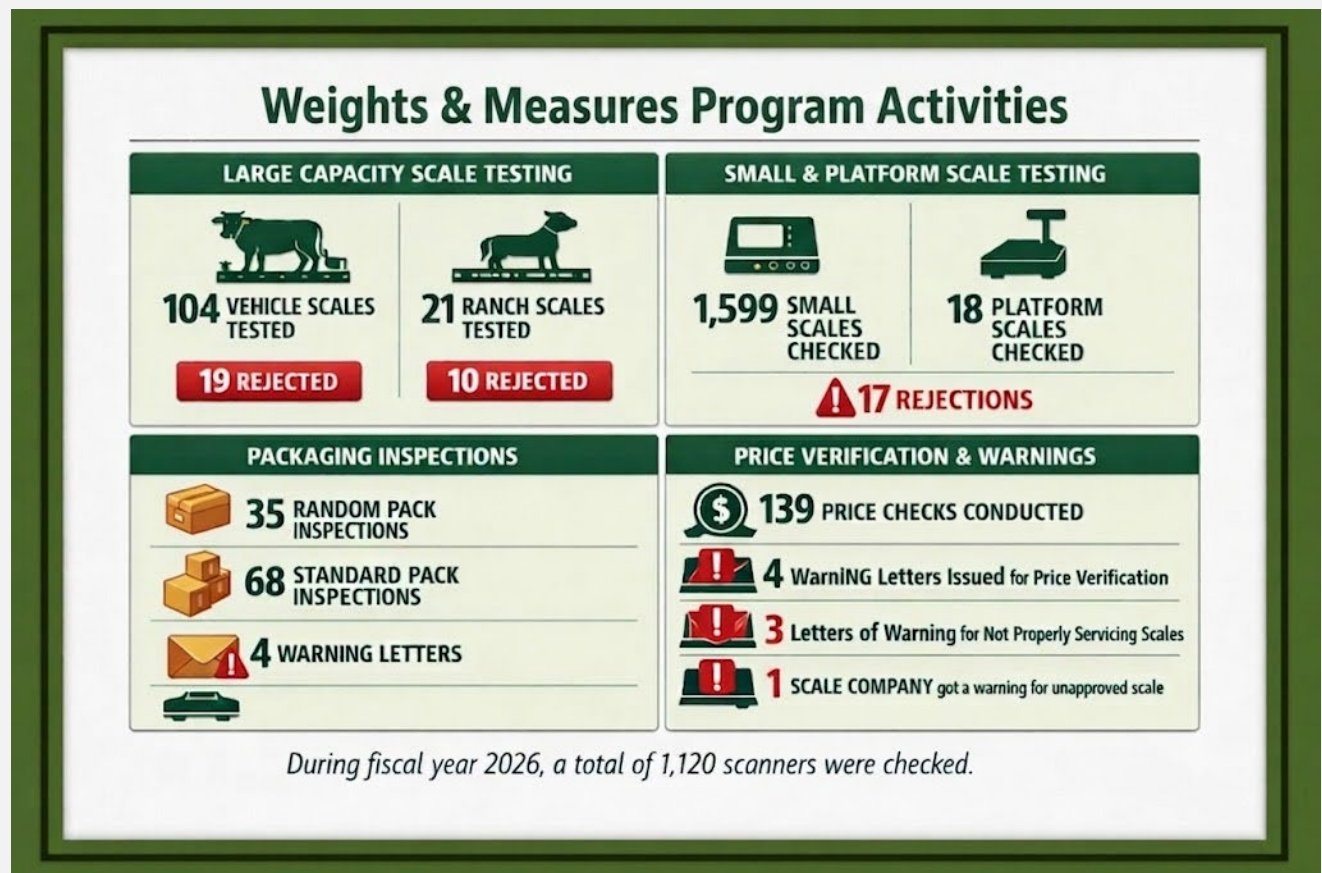
During this reporting period, tonnage notices were issued to **735 fertilizer companies** and **55 agricultural lime companies** for the semi-annual tonnage reporting cycle covering **January through July 2026**. In addition, the renewal period for **specialty fertilizer product registrations** opened for **Fiscal Year 2027**. Renewal notices were sent to **787 companies** for the renewal of **4,058 specialty fertilizer products** registered as of **June 30, 2026**.

Under the Oklahoma Fertilizer Act and Rules, fertilizer materials and products are classified into two categories: **Commercial** and **Specialty**. Commercial fertilizer products are defined as materials sold in bulk quantities or in packages of **30 pounds or greater**. Specialty fertilizer products are defined as materials sold in packages of **less than 30 pounds**.

Commercial fertilizer products require only a **one-time registration**, while specialty fertilizer products require **annual renewal** and a **\$100 registration fee per product formulation**. A late fee of **\$100 per product** applies to any specialty fertilizer registration not renewed by **July 31st**.

As of the close of **Fiscal Year 2026 (July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026)**, the state had **7,387 registered fertilizer products**, consisting of **5,329 commercial products** and **4,058 specialty products**.

Program Performance

During this reporting period, a total of **139 official feed samples** were analyzed, resulting in **792 feed determinations**. These determinations led to the issuance of **one violation** for a feed or feed ingredient that failed to meet established tolerances under its guaranteed analysis. The violation was issued for a product **deficient in Crude Fat**.

In addition, **four stop-sale orders** were issued for feed products exhibiting severe deviations from their guaranteed analysis.

- **Two** stop-sales were issued for products **deficient in Crude Protein**.
- **One** stop-sale was issued for a product **deficient in Crude Fat**.
- **One** stop-sale was issued for a product **deficient in Vitamin A**.

The following tables provide a two-month comparison of **label violations** and **stop-sale orders** issued by the Department for feed products that did not meet their guaranteed analysis.

Activities May 1, 2026, through June 30, 2026

Animal Disease Traceability:

We distributed 5,800 orange E.I.D. tags and 42,700 white E.I.D. tags to 12 veterinarians and four producers.

We have had seven new VET-CVI accounts set up.

We continue to assist Investigative Services with cattle theft investigations by reviewing official identification records in Agriculture Enterprise to determine if movement has occurred.

Based on feedback received from market veterinarians using the ODAFF Backtag program, we have created a version that will save the market data to OneDrive for the veterinarians to share with the market office staff. This provides as close to “real time” data for the office staff as we are able to do to meet the needs of the veterinarian and the markets.

We continue to provide the no cost E.I.D. readers and distributed two readers to veterinarians.

Aquaculture:

During this time, Scott Yates assisted Dr. Gorczyca and Marissa McLaughlin to set up a call with United States Department of Agriculture Food Safety Inspection Services to address catfish processing and the permitting that is required for it. Only catfish species fall under Food Safety Inspection Services inspection and permitting. All other aquatic species fall under Oklahoma State Department of Health.

Staff participated in aquaculture biosecurity training that was held by the USDA Veterinary Services National Training and Exercise Program.

A USDA special research grant opportunity specific to aquaculture was forwarded to aquaculture producers.

Biologics:

During this timeframe, a new biological company was registered.

We are continuing to transition biological product licenses from Kelly Registration Services to Agriculture Enterprises. We are hopeful of no longer needing Kelly Registration Services by the end of August and will transition to managing all biological license activities within Agriculture Enterprises.

We received and approved a field study to be conducted in the state to support licensure of a biological product with USDA Center for Veterinary Biologicals.

Cattle Programs:

We are participating in USDA's National Milk Testing Strategy. As part of that program, we will test every licensed dairy in Oklahoma monthly. Testing for the past 18 months has revealed no positive dairies. Once all states have achieved negative status for several months, the US will be declared free of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in the dairy herd.

Unfortunately, Idaho, Utah, and Texas have had many herds become infected again, which will slow down the United States' attempt to gain free status.

Brucellosis:

The only remaining reservoir of *B abortus* in the U.S. is in elk and bison in the Greater Yellowstone Park area.

While there is very little need to test for *B abortus* any longer, this means we have very little or no surveillance for *Brucella suis* (Swine Brucellosis) in cattle, which currently infects approximately 20% of the feral swine that our Wildlife Services personnel test. *B suis* can, and does, infect cattle occasionally.

Tuberculosis:

There was no significant activity in the Tuberculosis program during this time. Several times each month private veterinarians contact us when they have suspect results on the screening tests they perform for cattle movement. These are mostly in dairy and rodeo type cattle. Our Veterinary Medical Officers perform follow up confirmatory testing to hopefully prove the animal does not have TB.

Trichomoniasis:

During May and June, there were 2,302 Oklahoma bulls tested for Trichomoniasis with two confirmations. Bryan and Grady Counties had one positive bull each. Year to date 11,523 bulls have been tested with 16 positives for a 0.14% positive rate.

Our current statistics compare to 2.1% positive bulls in 2011, 1.4% in 2012, 1.3% in 2013, 1.4% in 2014, 1.1% in 2015, 1.1% in 2016, 0.5% in 2017, 0.32% in 2018, 0.42% in 2019, 0.35% in 2020, 0.28% in 2021, 0.3% in 2022, 0.22% in 2023, 0.13% in 2024, and 0.25% in 2025.

Johne's Disease:

In May and June, we received 35 positive reports, with seven newly infected premises. For the year, we have received 62 positive reports, with 27 new premises.

Dr. Stone continues to offer education about the disease and provides producers with testing strategies for disease elimination based on producers' goals.

***Theileria orientalis* – Asian Longhorned Tick**

We continue to receive reports of cattle infected with *Theileria orientalis* in Oklahoma. *T. orientalis* is a protozoal disease that causes symptoms similar to anaplasmosis. Its main mode of transmission is via ticks but any transfer of blood from one animal to another can transmit it as well. There has been no new information about treatments or vaccine to help combat the disease.

Emergency Management:

On May 13, Dr. Gorczyca participated in the State Hazard Mitigation Team and Flood and Drought Task Force meeting.

On May 19, A.I.S. held a New World Screwworm planning workshop. This concluded the workshop that was held on April 3 to review the draft response plan with stakeholders. It was well received. We will continue to conduct these exercises to go over specific response objectives as the need arises.

On May 20, we conducted a full-scale disease response exercise simulating an outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in a flock on a commercial poultry premises. The exercise provided participants with hands on learning in implementing critical biosecurity measures on a Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza positive premises to prevent disease spread. Participants operated the foaming equipment and observed the proper application of foam within a simulated poultry house. A total of 20 participants from USDA, ODAFF A.I.S., and ODAFF Agriculture Environmental Management Services divisions took part in the exercise.

On June 5, A.I.S. staff gathered for a briefing on the New World Screwworm response activities necessary for appropriate surveillance, permitting and sample identification.

On June 10, Dana Call and Dr. Gorczyca participated in an Inter-Tribal Emergency Management Coalition monthly meeting in McLoud. Dr. Gorczyca provided an overview of New World Screwworm and the current cases in Texas and New Mexico.

On June 12, A.I.S. participated in a New World Screwworm continuity of business tabletop exercise with the New Mexico Board of Livestock. Texas Animal Health Commission had intended to participate but due to the ongoing cases of New World Screwworm within their state, did not attend. The intention of this exercise was to ensure states were aligned in management and movement of domestic animals and wildlife within New World Screwworm Infested Zones.

On June 25, A.I.S. held training for field staff (ODAFF and USDA Veterinary Services) to go over the Texas Animal Health Commission New World Screwworm Certified Inspector Program. Texas Animal Health Commission is utilizing a training platform from Texas A&M AgriLife Extension to certify and enroll individuals into their New World Screwworm Certified Inspector Program. A.I.S. took advantage of this program to train staff in inspection techniques and to learn about New World Screwworm. After going through the program, it is evident that A.I.S. will need to develop an Oklahoma specific training platform for individuals to be certified to conduct the pre-movement

inspections. We are in the planning process with Oklahoma State University Entomology, OSU CVM, and our staff to develop a training program.

On June 26, 17 agency employees from A.I.S. and AEMS participated in a New World Screwworm inspection training thanks to OSU Entomology. Staff learned how to inspect livestock species to identify wounds for larvae. A thorough inspection of livestock moving out of a New World Screwworm Infested Zone will be just one of the requirements for a producer to receive an approved Movement/Treatment Certificate to move out of an Infested Zone. We are grateful to OSU for the opportunity to train with them.

On June 30, Dr. Gorczyca, along with Kendra Dougherty from Oklahoma State Department of Health and Dr. Justin Talley provided an overview of New World Screwworm to tribal health partners.

June 29 through July 2, Dr. Stone and Livestock Inspector Michael Jensen attended the Triannual International Symposium of Animal Mass Mortality in Steven's Point, Wisconsin. This symposium was packed with research presentations and demonstrations of management of mass mortality events. These include natural disasters such as floods, fire, tornadoes, hurricanes, supply chain disruptions, and disease outbreaks that require depopulation and disease elimination. This was wonderful opportunity to meet and learn from people that have actually had to manage these events.

Equine Programs:

On May 12, Equine Herpesvirus 1 was confirmed in a horse from Wagoner County that presented with neurological signs. The horse had attended multiple barrel racing events several weeks before the onset of clinical illness. A trace investigation determined that no other horses on the home premises ever traveled off the premises or attended events, and no additional Equine Herpesvirus 1 positive horses were identified through our tracing efforts.

On June 5, we were notified of a horse rescue in Okfuskee County where multiple horses were exhibiting clinical signs consistent with *Streptococcus equi* (Strangles). The rescue was preparing to transport horses to multiple states. Dr. Stone conducted an on-site assessment of the premises. During the inspection, the rescue was unable to provide Equine Infectious Anemia test documentation for the approximately 65 horses located on the premises. As a result, the premises was placed under quarantine. The quarantine will remain in effect until we receive proof of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia test on all horses. During our assessment it was discovered that six horses were transported by the rescue to Kentucky the week prior without an Equine Infectious Anemia test and Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. The state of Kentucky was notified, and we are in the process of sending a notice of violation to the rescue.

The case of Equine Infectious Anemia at Blue Ribbons Downs training facility that began in February has been closed after all potentially exposed horses received a negative test at least 60 days after the infected horse was removed from the premises.

Farmed Cervidae Programs:

Farmed cervidae license renewals are ongoing, and letters of warning were mailed to those producers who have not yet sent in their license renewals.

ODAFF continues to troubleshoot the license renewal processes and animal inventory data in Agriculture Enterprise. There is also ongoing work to improve documents, forms and correspondence generated in Agriculture Enterprises.

On June 4, we sent a message regarding the confirmation of New World Screwworm in Texas to all of the licensed farmed cervidae producers along with instructions for reporting and mitigation.

The CWD-genetic testing cooperative agreement continues to be hindered by a lack of testing supplies for Elk samples. Whitetail deer sample evaluation is underway.

Feral Swine:

Dr. Stone and Livestock Inspector Dustin Pettit inspected the Misfits of Oz sanctuary and found the facility to be in compliance with the Feral Swine Control Act.

On June 4, we sent message regarding the confirmation of New World Screwworm in Texas to all feral swine license holders to provide information and guidance for recognizing and reporting suspected cases.

ODAFF received a complaint against a feral swine license holder in Garvin County. The complaint reported improper carcass disposal. Livestock Inspector Robbie Sanders spoke with the person who generated the complaint and inspected the facility. At the time of inspection, no carcasses were present, and the facility owner was informed of the complaint and instructed to properly dispose of any carcasses.

Foreign Animal Disease:

During this time, we had 10 Foreign Animal Disease investigations. One was a potential Vesicular Stomatitis case in a horse from Oklahoma County. The other nine were New World Screwworm investigations that were submitted to National Veterinary Services Laboratory in Ames, Iowa. Thankfully, all results were negative.

On June 3, USDA and Texas Animal Health Commission confirmed the first case of New World Screwworm in the United States since an outbreak in the Florida Keys in 2016. Prior to that, the last significant cases were in the Southwestern USA in 1976. During June, 31 cases of New World Screwworm had been confirmed in 13 Counties in Texas and New Mexico.

We have increased our outreach to encourage producers and veterinarians to report cases of fly larvae. During May and June, there were 30 submissions to laboratories. Thankfully, all were identified as typical blowfly larvae or secondary screwworm larvae.

Dr. Gorczyca and I continue to participate in two New World Screwworm working groups. The groups are working with USDA to standardize response plans and movement restrictions if New World Screwworm is confirmed in the US.

Livestock Market Audits:

During this period, Beaver County Stockyards applied for an additional market license for their newest venture, BCS Online LLC. This sale will be a monthly video auction consisting of large groups of cattle and will be operated by the Slatten and Creason families.

Stateline Stockyards, the new market owned by Dustin Focht and located north of Burlington, Oklahoma, was presented with a new market orientation in May. Staff from ODAFF and USDA Packers and Stockyards sat down with the owner and employees and went over rules and operating procedures expected of our state's auction markets.

In addition to this market activity, this division met with a few individuals interested in market ownership, as well as a number of custodial account audits.

Outreach:

On May 1, I met virtually with the Oklahoma Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory Board of Advisors.

On May 6, I traveled to Stillwater to assist in providing Core Orientation Accreditation training for the fourth year veterinary students.

On May 11, we hosted a meeting with USDA Veterinary Services and ODAFF veterinarians to discuss current cases.

On May 15, Dr. Parrott traveled to Louisville Kentucky to attend the weeklong Southern Animal Health Association conference. Southern Animal Health Association represents the southern district of the United States Animal Health Association. This meeting brings state animal health officials, industry partners, and USDA together to discuss disease prevention, compliance, animal movement, and regulatory updates.

On May 26, Dr. Gorczyca and Austyn Fuss traveled to Lawton and Anadarko to give presentations to Oklahoma State University Extension personnel there. The presentations covered New World Screwworm and Secure Food Supply planning.

On June 8, Secretary Arthur, JanLee, and I participated in a virtual meeting with Oklahoma's national Congressional staff to answer questions and update them on our New World Screwworm planning.

On June 9, Doctor Gorczyca participated with Secretary Arthur and Kenny Naylor at a meeting set up by the Tulsa Global Alliance to address a Ukrainian contingent about disaster preparedness and emergency management.

On June 9, I was interviewed by Calvin Wright from Oklahoma News Network about New World Screwworm.

On June 11, I was interviewed by Emma McAndrews from Fox 25 News about New World Screwworm.

On June 11, I gave a New World Screwworm presentation virtually in the opening general session of the Oklahoma State University College of Veterinary Medicine Summer Seminar.

On June 15, I was interviewed by Steve Metzger of the Tulsa World about New World Screwworm.

On June 17, I was interviewed on OKC News 9 about New World Screwworm.

On June 23, we hosted a virtual meeting with USDA Veterinary Services and ODAFF veterinarians to discuss current cases.

On June 24, I was interviewed by Dale Denwalt of The Oklahoman about New World Screwworm and feral swine.

Poultry Programs

There have been 16 sick or dead birds submitted through the Sick Bird/Dead Bird program since the last report, and a total of 67 submissions since January 1.

Quarantines have been released for the three previously confirmed positive Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza backyard premises in Comanche, Kingfisher, and Texas Counties. We currently have no premises under quarantine in Oklahoma due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza.

The 2022 incursion of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza continues to represent the largest foreign animal disease event in U.S. history. To date, the virus has impacted domestic flocks in all 50 states and one U.S. territory, with 2,235 confirmed premises with a total of 1,599 Control Areas/Surveillance Zones that have been released. During the month of May and June, 31 premises across the U.S. (none in Oklahoma) were confirmed positive for Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, including 26 commercial poultry premises and 5 backyard poultry premises. Since the beginning of the outbreak in 2022, more than 207 million birds have been affected.

Although we are currently in the months that have historically seen lower numbers of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza infected flocks due to the absence of migratory bird movement, we remain vigilant and prepared to respond to any detections. We continue to respond to reports of sick birds through field investigations and diagnostic testing of suspect cases. Ongoing Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza surveillance also includes targeted testing of avian populations at swap meets, auctions, and feed stores. And we have continued our outreach efforts to emphasize the importance of strong biosecurity practices for both commercial and backyard poultry operations through email communications, social media messaging, and coordination with county extension officers.

Public Health

There were no significant activities regarding Public Health during this time.

Rabies in Livestock:

On June 3, Rabies was confirmed in a horse from McIntosh County. The horse had contact with seven other horses. To mitigate the risk of further disease transmission, a four-month quarantine was implemented for all livestock on the premises.

On June 12, Rabies was confirmed in a heifer in Beckham County. The heifer had contact with 16 heifers, 19 cows, and 15 calves. To mitigate the risk of further disease transmission, a four-month quarantine was implemented for all livestock on the premises.

Sheep and Goat Programs:

There was no significant activity in these programs during May and June.

Swine Programs:

During May and June, Dr. Gorczyca worked with commercial swine premises that are currently enrolled and certified in U.S. Swine Health Improvement Plan on recertification of premises.

Miscellaneous:

On June 17, we our Field Staff was in for the quarterly update meeting. We combined it with a retirement party for Livestock Inspector John Sartain. John was a loyal employee for 45 years.

Board Report for May/June 2026 Activities

Introduction

Wildlife Services (WS) responds to damage complaints caused by wildlife to resources or property throughout Oklahoma. WS Specialists conduct operational damage management programs for many of the complaints they receive to resolve these wildlife damage problems.

Predator Damage Management

Dewey County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes predating on his calves. The producer reported coyotes had killed two calves valued at \$3,200. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Dewey County conducted a site visit and determined coyotes were responsible for the losses. Damage management efforts were successful in removing eight coyotes from the property. No further losses have occurred, and work is ongoing to prevent additional losses.

Washita County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes predating on his lambs. The producer reported coyotes killed one lamb valued at \$2,500. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Washita County responded to the request and examined the carcass and confirmed coyotes were responsible for the losses. The Specialist recommended non-lethal methods of carcass removal, night penning, shed lambing, and guarding animals to help reduce future losses from coyotes. Control efforts have removed five coyotes and are continuing currently.

Beaver County landowner requested assistance with coyotes predating on his calves. The producer reported coyotes had killed one calf valued at \$2,500. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Beaver County examined the carcass and verified the loss. Damage management efforts were successful in removing four coyotes from the property with control efforts continuing to further reduce the threat to the cooperators' calves.

Cimarron County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes predating on his calves. The producer reported coyotes had killed two calves valued at \$3,200. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Cimarron County responded to the request and examined the carcass and confirmed coyotes were responsible for the loss. The Specialist used leg hold traps and calling/shooting to remove nine coyotes. Work is continuing to prevent additional losses.

Beckham County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes predating on his lambs. The producer reported coyotes killed two lambs valued at \$800. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Beckham County responded to the request and examined one of the carcasses, confirming coyotes were responsible for the losses. The Specialist recommended non-lethal methods of carcass removal, night penning, shed lambing, and guarding animals to reduce future losses from coyotes. Control efforts have removed ten coyotes and are continuing.

Custer County livestock producer requested assistance with coyotes predating on his goats. The producer reported coyotes had killed three kid goats valued at \$1,200. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Custer County responded to the request and examined the carcasses, confirming coyotes

were responsible. The Specialist used leg hold traps and snares to remove five coyotes. Control efforts continue to prevent additional losses.

Bryan County agency called WS for assistance with black vultures, reporting a large group of vultures in and around their facility. The presence of black vultures was verified, and a vulture trap was baited. This project continued with another 150 black vultures removed. This project is still under surveillance.

Logan County landowner called WS with a report of coyotes killing sheep. WS Specialist met with the landowner and verified coyotes were responsible for the losses valued at \$1200. Devices were set on the property and seven coyotes were removed. Work is ongoing currently.

Murray County farmer contacted WS regarding coyotes predating on chickens and geese. WS responded and verified coyotes were responsible for the loss valued at \$1500. Traps were set and two coyotes were removed with work concluded on this property.

Garfield County families, that raise chickens and ducks and sell free ranging eggs, requested assistance from WS regarding losses of over thirty laying hens and ducks estimated at \$4000. WS removed five foxes at this time and work continues.

Feral Swine Damage Management

Custer County landowner contacted WS needing assistance with feral swine damaging his hayfield. The landowner estimated the damage to the fields at \$1,600. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Custer County responded to the request and verified the damage. A live trap was used to remove twenty-three feral swine from the property. No additional damage has occurred, and the population in the area is being monitored to determine if further management is needed.

Tillman County landowner requested assistance with feral swine destroying a newly planted milo field. The landowner estimated feral swine were responsible for damaging ten acres valued at \$1,500. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Tillman County responded to the request and verified the damage. The Specialist used a live trap to remove twenty-four feral swine from the area. Activity in this area is closely monitored to determine if further management is needed.

Ellis County farmer requested assistance with feral swine causing damage in his pastures. The farmer reported feral swine were responsible for damaging ten acres of pasture valued at \$1,500. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Ellis County responded to the request and verified the damage to the pastures. The Specialist used a live trap to remove thirty-six feral swine and aerial operations to remove an additional twenty-one feral swine from the property. The area continues to be monitored for activity to determine if additional management efforts are needed.

Dewey County landowner contacted WS needing assistance with feral swine rooting in his pastures. The landowner estimated feral swine had rooted up ten acres valued at \$500 in damages. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Dewey County responded to the request and verified the damage. A live trap was used to remove forty-two feral swine from the property. No additional damage has occurred, and the population in the area is being monitored to determine if further management is needed.

Greer County farmer requested assistance with feral swine causing damage in his wheat fields. The farmer reported feral swine were responsible for damaging fifteen acres valued at \$2,400. The Wildlife Specialist assigned to Greer County responded to the request and verified the damage to the wheat fields. The Specialist used a live trap to remove thirty-five feral swine from the property. The area continues to be monitored for activity to determine if additional management efforts are needed.

Le Flore County producer called WS for assistance with feral swine, reporting damage to his corn crop. The damage was verified and estimated at \$1,000, with more damage occurring each day. After pre-baiting, a remote camera trap was placed on the property. Eighteen feral swine have been removed with this project is still being monitored.

Craig County property owner called WS for assistance with feral swine reporting rooting damage to his fescue cattle pastures. An estimated \$10,000 in rooting damage was verified. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed, and twenty-five feral swine were removed. This project is still being monitored, and the owner was advised of barrier fencing methods that could assist with future feral swine damage.

Delaware County producer called WS reporting feral swine damage to his cattle pastures. The rooting damage was verified and estimated at \$2,000. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed, and twenty-six feral swine were removed from this property. This project is still being monitored.

Osage County producer called WS reporting feral swine damage to his wheat fields. The damage was verified and estimated at \$2,000. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed, and forty-six feral swine were removed from this property. This project is still being monitored.

Hughes County producer called WS for assistance with feral swine, reporting rooting damage to his cattle pastures. The damage was verified and estimated at \$4,000. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed, and thirty-nine feral swine were removed to conclude this project. No further damage has been reported.

Muskogee County producer called WS for assistance with feral swine, reporting significant rooting damage to thirty acres of his hayfields. The damage was verified and estimated at \$30,000. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed, and twenty-four feral swine were removed. This project is still being monitored.

Okfuskee County rancher called WS for assistance with feral swine, reporting rooting damage to his cattle pastures. The damage was verified and estimated at \$2,000. After pre-baiting with corn, a remote camera trap was placed, and twenty-six feral swine were removed to conclude this project. No further damage has been reported.

Murray County farmer contacted WS about feral swine rooting up a wheat field with damages estimated at \$15,000. A live trap was set up, and eighty-eight feral swine were removed from the property.

Garvin County rancher contacted WS reporting damage to feeders and hay bales. A WS Specialist verified the damage from feral swine at \$2000. A live trap was set up, and twenty-three feral swine were removed.

Pottawatomie County landowner called WS with reports of feral swine damage to their hayfield. A WS Specialist met with the landowner and verified the feral swine damage estimated at \$32,799. WS removed eighteen feral swine from the property.

Coal County landowner contacted WS with reports of feral swine rooting his hayfields and pastures. A WS Specialist met with the landowner and confirmed the damage to be caused by feral swine, with damages estimated at \$3,500. A live trap was set, and fifty-four feral swine were removed. Work on the property is ongoing currently.

McClain County farmer contacted WS with reports of feral swine damage to their front yard and in hayfield beside the house. A WS Specialist verified the damage estimated at \$3,150. A live trap was set, and sixteen feral swine were removed.

Caddo County farmer contacted WS regarding feral swine rooting up a wheatfield and a hayfield. WS responded to the call and determined the damage was caused by feral swine valued at \$5000. A live trap was placed on the property, and one hundred twenty-five feral swine were removed with work ongoing.

Jefferson County landowner called WS regarding feral swine rooting up his pasture and eating his pecans. A Wildlife Specialist verified the damage, estimated damage of burrowing and digging at \$1000 and \$2500 in pecan loss. A live trap was set up, and fifty-nine feral swine were removed.

Aerial Operations

Aerial operations were conducted on May 11th, in **Blaine County** in response to several farmers requesting feral swine damage to wheat fields and pastures. Damage in the area flown was estimated at \$20,000. To reduce feral swine damage in this area, the helicopter was utilized for 5.9 flying hours to remove one hundred and forty-eight feral swine. This area will be closely monitored to determine if additional aerial operations are needed.

Aerial operations were conducted on May 14th, in ***Roger Mills and Ellis Counties*** in response to several farmers requesting feral swine damage to wheat fields and pastures. Aerial operations were conducted on approximately 10,000 acres where landowners reported \$15,000 in damage caused by feral swine. To reduce feral swine damage in this area, the helicopter was utilized for 5.8 flying hours to remove one hundred and twenty-eight feral swine. This area will be closely monitored, and additional aerial operations are planned to further reduce feral swine damage.

On May 28th, aerial operations were conducted in ***Tillman County***. Operations were conducted on roughly 8,000 acres in Tillman County in response to a request with feral swine damaging pastures, peanut fields, and corn fields. The helicopter was utilized for six hours with the removal of two hundred and thirty-six feral swine. Additional flight operations are planned in this area prior to corn and peanuts maturing to further reduce feral swine populations and damage associated with feral swine.

Aerial operations were conducted in ***Tillman County*** on June 11th. Aerial operations were conducted in response to landowners' request for feral swine damage to corn, milo, and pastures. The helicopter was utilized for six flying hours to remove one hundred and sixty-four feral swine from the areas. Additional aerial operations are planned in these areas to further reduce damage associated with feral swine.

Beaver Damage Management

Dewey County Road Commissioner contacted WS for assistance with beavers responsible for damming up the creek causing the water to go over the road. The Commissioner estimated the damage to the road and bridge structure to be \$1,500. The Specialist for Dewey County responded and verified beaver were responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing the beavers from the creek to help reduce any additional damage to road and bridge.

Custer County landowner contacted WS for assistance with beaver responsible for girdling and cutting down trees on his property. The landowner estimated the damage to the trees to be valued at \$1,200. The Specialist for Custer County responded and verified beavers were responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing the beavers from the pond to help reduce any additional damage to trees around his pond.

Beckham County landowner contacted WS for assistance with beavers responsible for damming up the creek on his property and flooding his pasture. The landowner estimated the damage to the pasture to be valued at \$2,000. The Specialist for Beckham County responded and verified beaver were responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing the beavers from the creek to help reduce any additional damage to pasture.

Ellis County landowner contacted WS for assistance with beaver responsible for burrowing into his pond dam on his property. The landowner estimated the damage to the pasture to be valued at \$1,000. The Specialist for Ellis County responded and verified beaver were responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing the beavers from the pond to help reduce any additional damage to the pond dam structure.

Major County Road Commissioner contacted WS for assistance with beaver responsible for damming up a road culvert and causing damage to the road structure. The Commissioner estimated the damage to the road to be valued at \$500. The Specialist for Major County responded and verified beaver were responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing the beavers from the creek to help reduce any additional damage to the road and bridge structure.

Custer County landowner contacted WS for assistance with beavers responsible for damming up the creek on his property and flooding his Bermuda pasture. The landowner estimated the damage to the pasture to be valued at \$500. The Specialist for Custer County responded and verified beavers were responsible for damage. Control measures employed by the Specialist were successful in removing the beavers from the creek to help reduce any additional damage to the pasture.

McCurtain County Commissioner called WS reporting beaver flooding damage along a county road. The damage was verified and estimated at \$2,500. Two beaver dams were removed to alleviate the flooding and conibear traps were placed. Twelve beavers have been removed, and this project is still being monitored.

Pittsburg County Commissioner called WS reporting beavers were causing flooding along a county road. The damage was verified and estimated at \$2,500. The dam was removed to alleviate the flooding and conibear traps were placed out. Five beavers have been removed, and this project is still being monitored.

Choctaw County Commissioner called WS for assistance reporting beaver flooding damage to a county road. The damage was verified and estimated at \$1,200. The dam was removed to alleviate the flooding and conibear traps were placed out. Two beavers were removed to conclude this project. No further damage has been reported.

Cherokee County Commissioner called WS reporting beaver caused flooding along a county road. The damage was verified and estimated at \$450. The dam was removed to alleviate the flooding, and one beaver was removed by spotlight and shooting. Due to the recent rain, the water levels are too high to set conibear traps. This project is being monitored and will be completed when the water level reaches a safe level.

Wagoner County farmer called WS for assistance with beavers, reporting flooding issues on his farm. The beaver dam activity was verified, but the flooding had not yet caused any monetary damage. The dam was removed by hand to alleviate the concerns. A night shoot was conducted and four beavers were removed. This project has concluded with no further damage reported.

Adair County property owner called WS reporting beaver damage to trees along a creek on his property. The tree damage was verified and estimated at \$450. Conibear traps were placed and three beavers were removed. This project is concluded with no further damage has been reported.

McIntosh County Commissioner called WS reporting beavers had begun to dam a drainage ditch along a county road. The beaver activity was verified, and no damage had yet occurred to the roadway. Night shooting was used to remove four beavers. This project is still being monitored.

Kingfisher County County District 3 Commissioner called WS with reports of beavers damming up a culvert and flooding a county road. A WS Specialist met with him and verified beavers

were the cause of the damage Estimated at \$1000 for heavy equipment to dig out beaver dam. Devices were set on the property and two beavers were removed. Work is ongoing currently.

Oklahoma County HOA called WS about beaver damage in a neighborhood taking down numerous trees and caused damage to large landscaping rocks by digging underneath them and causing them to begin falling towards the water. Estimated damage costs were \$10,000. WS utilized trapping and night shooting to remove one beaver, and operations continue to complete the job.

Carter County landowner contacted WS regarding beavers cutting down trees on their pond dam. WS responded to the call and verified beavers were the cause of the damage estimated at \$15,000. Devices were set and six beavers were removed from the property.

Payne County landowner contacted WS with concerns of beaver damage at a pond. A WS Specialist responded to the report and verified the damage estimated to be \$2,000. Six beavers were removed from the property with work continuing.

Kingfisher County District 3 Commissioner called WS with reports of beavers damming up a culvert and flooding a county road. A WS Specialist met with him and verified beavers were the cause of the damage. Estimated loss is \$1000 for heavy equipment to dig out beaver dam. Devices were set on the property and two beavers were removed. Work is ongoing currently.

Alfalfa County Commissioner requested WS assistance regarding beavers building a dam in front of a cement culvert with concerns that the water was up against the shoulder of the road. Damages were estimated to be \$5500. Technical assistance was given on habitat modification and trapping is ongoing.

Special Projects - Disease Sampling

Wildlife Services' is involved in disease management, research, disease surveillance, emergency response, education and outreach for diseases of feral swine. There are around 1.6 million feral swine in the United States today. Feral swine can be reservoirs of disease and may act as a host to a number of parasites, leaving the Oklahoma domestic swine industry vulnerable to disease.

Oklahoma Wildlife Disease Biologist collected twenty-one feral swine samples from four different counties during May and June. The samples are opportunistically collected during feral swine damage control projects. The samples are tested for African Swine Fever, Classical Swine Fever, Pseudorabies and Swine Brucellosis. Five samples were collected from Oklahoma County and were submitted as 'High Priority' CONUS ASF samples

Oklahoma Wildlife Disease Biologist was deployed to Texas to assist on the Texas New World Screw Worm Incident from 6/16/26 – 7/03/26, conducting drone and trail camera surveillance in Big Bend National Park. Primarily monitoring for early detection of New World Screw Worm in wildlife along the US/Mexico border. He has also assisted with outreach to park staff and visitors to the area.

Special Projects – Bird Damage Management

City of Coweta called WS for assistance with pigeon damage, reporting a large number of pigeons had moved into an area where the amount of droppings was not only an issue, but was genuine health concern. The issue was verified and a plan of action was developed. After a contract with the city was signed, pre-baiting with corn started in a pre-selected area. A pigeon trap was set, and sixty pigeons have been removed with this project still being monitored.

Agricultural Statistics Division

Statistics:

On July 10th, the Crop Production Report was released. Highlights include:

Oklahoma **wheat** harvest acres are forecast at 2.1 million acres, down 25% from previous year. Yield is forecast at 28 bushels per acre, down 10 bushel per acre from 2025. The result forecast production at 58.8 million bushels, down 45% from the previous year.

On June 30th, the Crop Acreage Report was released. Highlights include:

-**Corn** plantings declined to 500,000 acres, down 7.4% from last year's 540,000 acres. Corn harvested acres for grain are forecast to 455,000 acres, down 8.1% from 495,000 acres for grain harvested in 2025.

-**Sorghum** planted acres rose to 490,000 acres, an 11.4% increase. Sorghum harvested acres for grain are forecast to 430,000 acres, an 6.2% increase from the 405,000 acres for grain harvested.

-**All Hay** harvested acres are forecast at 3.23 million acres, down 3.2%, from 2025.

-**Soybean** plantings climbed to 500,000 acres, up 37.0%. Soybean harvest acres are forecast to 480,000 acres, up 37%, from the 350,000 acres in 2025.

-**Peanut** plantings stayed unchanged at 19,000 acres and peanut harvested acres are forecast to be unchanged at 18,000 acres.

-**Cotton** planted acreage increased to 450,000 acres, up 15.4%, from 390,000 acres in 2025.

Parts of Oklahoma have received just enough moisture to have their first cutting. Other parts are still too wet to drive in their fields. Others are still waiting to see what hay crop they might have for this hay season. Still trying to navigate what this hay season holds for Oklahoma. Drought in Oklahoma has decreased to 81.66 percent of the state having some form of drought.

The Oklahoma Mesonet Drought Monitor indicates that 7.13 percent of the state is experiencing exceptional drought, 30.18 percent is in extreme drought, 43.37 percent is in severe drought, 62.28 percent is in moderate drought, 81.66 percent is in abnormally dry conditions, and 18.34 percent has no drought conditions.

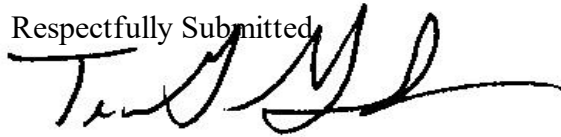

FOOD SAFETY BOARD REPORT JULY 2026

MAY 1-JUNE 30, 2026

POULTRY & EGG GRADING, PRODUCE AND ORGANIC SECTION

Poultry and Egg Section

In Broken Bow at Tyson Foods, USDA poultry grading was performed by ODAFF inspectors on 3,997,198 pounds of poultry – boneless/skinless leg meat & bone in/skin on parts and ground meat. ODAFF inspectors provided USDA shell egg grading on 82,330 dozen eggs at Cal-Maine Foods Inc. at Sulphur. Also, routine egg quality inspections under the Oklahoma egg law were conducted.

Organic Foods Section

Organic inspectors completed compliance and certification inspections at:

- Eleven organic crop producers
- Two organic processors
- Six retail organic inspections
- The organic section had requests for 3,000 certified organic stickers from Oklahoma Certified Organic producers and processors, which display the stickers on all products sold, labeled, or represented as Organic across the United States.
- The organic section had 5 requests for organic crop applications and 1 request for an organic processing application.

Produce Safety Section

- Set up an information table at the Oklahoma Local Agriculture Collaborative Workshop in Jones
- Taught a class on Soil Amendments and Produce Safety at the Oklahoma Local Agriculture Collaborative Workshop in Jones
- Educational presentation on produce safety and selling at farmers markets at the Guymon Farmers Market
- Searched for produce farms in the panhandle region
- Assisted ONIE Project by reviewing a Food Safety Guide for regenerative farms they are developing
- Visited 21 farmers markets providing outreach and education to producers and to collect farm inventory
- Visited 12 farms providing outreach and education to producers and to update farm inventory and to ensure they are in compliance with the law
- Completed Qualified Exemption records check on 7 farms
- Provided remote technical assistance for 5 farms
- Submitted the annual reports to FDA for the past fiscal year and requested a budget for FY27
- Preparing information to be ready to apply for the next FDA grant
- Sent e-mail newsletter to inform farms about the updated exemption limits and the annual farm registration
- Regular conference calls with TX, LA, AR, NM, MO, MS

Homemade Food Freedom Act

- Taught a class on selling at the farmers market for the Guymon Farmers Market.

- Taught a workshop about the law and common labeling mistakes at the Oklahoma Local Agriculture Collaborative Southeast workshop in Talahina.
- Received 34 complaints on Homemade Food Freedom Act businesses.
- Meat compliance assisted with 12 complaints.
- Verbal warnings were given to 6 producers, and warning letters were sent to 12 producers.
- We were not able to find evidence of a violation on 8 producers, and so no enforcement has been carried out on those complaints.
- We now have 988 registered homemade food freedom act businesses.

DAIRY SECTION

Dairy staff conducted routine inspections at dairy farms, dairy plants, performed equipment checks and collected farm and plant dairy samples throughout the state.

Dairy Services conducted farm and plant surveys for the following:

- Select 64 located in Fredrick, OK (BTU 40-064)
- Hiland Dairy – Chandler, OK (PMO 40-024)
- DFA Central Council 18 Near Stillwater, OK (BTU 40-018)
- DFA SE Council 16 in Stillwell, OK (BTU 40-016)
- DFA SE Council 85 in NE Oklahoma (BTU 40-085)

Each of these surveys received passing scores; additional information can be found on FDA's Interstate Milk Shipper Website.

Justin Quint Lockwood returned from Paternity leave where his family welcomed a new baby girl.

Scott Fisher attended FD372 Training in Grand Rapids, MI. This course included a plant inspection training video filmed in Oklahoma using Dairy Services and an Oklahoma Dairy plant. This training video will be used for many years to come.

FDA Milk Specialist, Samuel Carter, conducted a NCIMS Check Rating in June at Blue Bell Creameries. Blue Bell is listed as a Grade A Receiving Station and will receive a passing score. FDA Milk Specialist, Clinton George has completed the triennial Oklahoma Dairy Program evaluation and emailed a copy to Secretary Blayne Arthur.

Under the direction of the State Veterinarian, Dairy staff has implemented additional bio-security protocols when visiting dairy farms throughout the state. This information is being shared with our producers, and they are encouraged to contact the State Veterinarian if their herd shows symptoms related to HPAI.

Also, under the direction of the State Veterinarian and USDA, Dairy services expanded HPAI sampling to all dairy farms beginning January 6, 2025. Farm samples are tested at the Oklahoma Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory in Stillwater. To date, all Oklahoma permitted dairy farms have tested negative.

Dairy Services is also sharing screw worm awareness to each dairy farm.

PURCHASES/CONTRACTS

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

FY27-Oklahoma State University - Agriculture Leadership Program- \$50,000

This purchase represents a significant investment in the future of the Oklahoma Agriculture Industry. It aims to educate and train young leaders and provide a better understanding of economic and governmental systems. The curriculum covers various topics, including leadership development, communication, economics, marketing, and major issues affecting Oklahoma and US agriculture. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY27-Oklahoma State University- \$1,300,000

To provide science-based research information developed with Oklahoma State University Agricultural Extension Service and Experiment Stations. The Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station researches to develop technology/practices to address the needs of Oklahomans. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY27-Oklahoma State University- \$5,200,000

To provide funding to Oklahoma State University (OSU-DASNR) for the delivery of Agriculture Research and Education Extension program support in all extension program offices. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY27-Oklahoma State University – Robert M. Kerr Food and Agricultural Products Center- \$1,000,000

To allocate funding to Oklahoma State University for various capital improvements, equipment requirements, and operational activities at the Food and Agricultural Products Center. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY27-Langston University- \$8,500,000

To allocate funding to Langston University for the continued implementation of the Agriculture Research and Education Extension program and support of its Cooperative Extension and Outreach Programs. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY27-Oklahoma City National Memorial Foundation- \$1,500,000

To allocate funding for the continued education of Oklahoma school children about the importance of the Oklahoma City bombing. This appropriation would give every Oklahoma ninth grader an opportunity to learn this story in Oklahoma history. In 2010, the Oklahoma Legislature passed, and the Governor signed a bill requiring this story and the lessons learned to be taught to every Oklahoma school student. This is a legislative-directed expenditure.

FY27-2026 AgHERculture Conference T-Shirts-\$5,800

Purchase of 250 T-shirts for AgHERculture Conference attendees. The AgHERculture Conference is a two-day event, with the first day designed for young collegiate women and the second day for young women currently in high school. Both conferences offer networking opportunities with industry professionals, leadership and career development and valuable insights into shaping a future career path in agriculture. Attendee registration fees will offset the cost of the T-shirts, along with other related expenses for both conferences. (Pre-Approved by Secretary Arthur on 7/16/26.)

LABORATORY SERVICES**FY27 – LIMS Database System- \$117,000.00**

Purchase of year two for the subscription service of the LIMS Database System for the Laboratory Services Division laboratory's main database system for testing purposes.

Justification: Without the subscription service database, the Laboratory would not be able to maintain an accurate database for testing and sampling services. Without this service there would be a delay in the output of results.

FY26 – Incubator - \$5,950.00

Purchase of 6.3 cf Incubator for the Dairy Section for additional testing needs. (Pre-Approved by Secretary Arthur on 6/22/26.)

FY26 – Chairs– \$7,339.00

Purchase of fourteen chairs to replace employees' current broken and worn-out chairs. (Pre-Approved by Secretary Arthur on 6/22/26.)

FORESTRY SERVICES**FY26 – Aerial Firefighting Exclusive Use Contract - \$1,358,460.00**

(Funding Source: USFS 2025 State Forest Action Plan Grant - \$425,896; OFS 245 Fund - \$932,564)

Establishment of a contract for the purpose of utilizing single-engine scoopers for aerial fire suppression services. The contract will include the daily availability rate for a minimum of two (2) aircraft that will be prepositioned in Oklahoma where the highest threats exist. Remaining funds from the contract will only cover a fraction of the flying costs so this will be augmented with 245 Emergency Funds if fire activity dictates. This contract will ensure aircraft are secured and in place to help with successful initial attack efforts thus preventing significant impacts to values at risk. If this purchase is not approved, Oklahoma wildland firefighters will not have access to aircraft needed to help support on the ground operations including initial attack. Suppression aircraft enhance firefighters/public safety and assist in the efforts to protect values at risk including homes, ranches, and natural resources. The first \$925,896.00 was requested in April 2026.

FY 27 – FMAG Infrastructure Preparation - \$70,000.00

(Funding Source: OFS 245 Fund. Up to 75% of this request will be reimbursed through FMAGs)

Requesting Board approval to procure professional services to prepare the agency's accounting, financial management, and recordkeeping infrastructure to ensure the agency is fully prepared to seek, document, and obtain Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) reimbursement assistance from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). These services are needed to establish and strengthen financial tracking, cost documentation, compliance practices, and recordkeeping processes that meet FEMA and federal grant requirements, support audit readiness, and improve the agency's ability to successfully recover eligible expenditures.

Consequences: Failure to approve this purchase may result in insufficient accounting and documentation systems necessary to pursue FMAG assistance, potentially leading to delayed, reduced, or denied FEMA reimbursement funding, increased financial burden on the agency to absorb eligible incident costs, and missed opportunities to recover available federal funding.

FY27 – Project Learning Tree Books- \$20,000

(Funding Source: State Funds)

This purchase is for Project Learning Tree (PLT) books, which will directly support forestry education efforts in schools across Oklahoma. These valuable educational materials will be distributed to classrooms statewide as an integral part of comprehensive community forestry and conservation education programming. Investing in Project Learning Tree books is vital for fostering environmental literacy and stewardship among Oklahoma's youth. PLT is a nationally recognized, award-winning program that provides hands-on, interdisciplinary activities designed to help students understand complex environmental issues, develop critical thinking skills, and make informed decisions about natural resources.

FY27- Urban Tree Planting - \$5,000

(Funding Source: OFS 215 Fund)

Contract with the non-profit organization Keep Oklahoma Beautiful (KOB) to plant and grow native or cultivars of native trees in The City of Kingfisher as part of a beautification/Green Infrastructure project utilizing the "Trees Make A Difference" license plate funds.

Consequences: Without this partnership, the town could miss out on a key opportunity for enhancing local tourism, preparing for events like Route 66 Centennial, and building lasting community pride through sustainable beautification.

FY27- Invasive Plant Management- \$55,000

(Funding Source: USFS PC 16)

This funding comes from a federal grant and will be provided to landowners to manage invasive plant species currently present on their land. Implementing invasive species management practices supports Oklahoma Forestry Services' mission by demonstrating the benefits of active forest management. Removing invasive species improves overall forest resiliency and helps protect the future forest health against threats such as pests, diseases, and wildfire.

FY27 –Southern Pine Beetle- \$5,000

(Funding Source- USFS PC 87)

To prevent the spread of the invasive Southern Pine Beetle (SPB) and mitigate the severe economic threat it poses to landowner revenue. This project will also provide financial assistance to landowners for the removal of non-native invasive plant species. Proactive management of SPB and invasive plants will maintain healthy and resilient forests across Oklahoma, safeguarding landowner revenue and enhancing the landscape's ability to withstand current and future forest health threats, including pests, diseases, and wildfire. All funds spent on this program will be federally reimbursed.

FY27 –Oklahoma Forest Landowner Assistance Program-\$400,000

(Funding Source- USFS PC 76)

The Oklahoma Forest Landowner Assistance Program is a new grant designed to provide financial assistance to private landowners. The primary goal is to help them implement critical forest management activities such as tree planting, invasive species control, and wildfire mitigation, that they may not be able to afford otherwise. The program targets Non-Industrial Private Forest (NIPF) landowners, which includes private individuals, groups, trusts, associations, federally recognized tribes, and corporations without publicly tradable stocks (e.g., boy/girl scouts). This grant will be administered to eligible landowners through a cost-share model. **Consequences:** Failure to approve this program may result in the loss of federally reimbursable funding and prevent eligible private forest landowners from implementing critical forest management practices. This could increase wildfire risk, reduce forest health and productivity, and limit Oklahoma Forestry Services' ability to support sustainable management of privately owned forestlands across the state.

FY27- Invasive Species Coop Forest Health & Monitoring- \$30,000

(Funding Source: USFS PC 88)

This funding comes from a federal grant and will be provided to landowners to manage invasive plant species currently present on their land. Implementing invasive species management practices supports Oklahoma Forestry Services' mission by demonstrating the benefits of active forest management. Removing invasive species improves overall forest resiliency and helps protect the future forest health against threats such as pests, diseases, and wildfire.

FY27- Federal Pass-Through Funding for Urban IRA Grantees- \$225,000

(Funding Source: USFS PC 78)

This funding aims to provide federal pass-through grants to financially disadvantaged cities, neighborhoods, and communities. These grants will support vital initiatives that include heat mitigation strategies, promotion of food forests, and other significant values and benefits of trees in communities. The primary focus of these grants is to fund projects that directly benefit lower-income neighborhoods and non-profit organizations. This ensures environmental equity and enhances the well-being of communities through targeted urban forestry efforts. **Consequences:** Failure to approve this funding may result in the loss of federally reimbursable grant opportunities to support urban forestry projects in underserved communities. This could reduce access to tree canopy, heat mitigation initiatives, community outreach, and other environmental

benefits while forfeiting federal funding available at no net cost to the Agency.

FY27 – Oklahoma Gardening Grant- \$10,000

(Funding Source: USFS PC11)

This new grant agreement will support the longstanding education and outreach efforts through the popular Oklahoma Gardening program, which is produced by Oklahoma State University. This grant specifically funds tree-related educational programming, which is crucial for our outreach initiatives. Establishing this grant agreement is vital for our operations as a significant avenue of support and education for our community and programs.

FY27 – Oklahoma Urban and Community Forestry Council Contract- \$15,000

(Funding Source: USFS PC11)

This contract aims to establish services that will assist in the implementation of the continuing education component of Oklahoma's Urban & Community Forestry program. This initiative will utilize federal pass-through dollars specifically identified for the Council. Through this program's outreach and educational initiatives pertaining to urban forest management and individual tree care, Oklahoma Forestry Services is greatly assisted in ensuring the long-term health of the urban community.

FY27- Underserved Landowner Outreach - \$125,000

(Funding Source: USFS PC 79)

This funding is provided through a federal grant with no state match requirement to support forestry projects that improve forest health, reduce wildfire risk, protect water resources, control invasive species, and increase access to the benefits of forests in underserved areas of Oklahoma. These projects also strengthen partnerships, expand public outreach, and demonstrate sustainable forest management practices. All eligible expenditures will be fully reimbursed through federal funding, resulting in no net cost for the Agency. ***Consequences:*** Failure to approve this funding may result in the loss of federally reimbursable grant funds, limiting Oklahoma Forestry Services' ability to implement projects that improve forest health, reduce wildfire risk, protect natural resources, and expand forestry outreach across Oklahoma.

FY27-Type 6 Engines - \$871,500

(Funding Source: 2026 SPCF-SFA Response Grant & 245 Funds)

Purchase seven (7) Type 6 wildland firefighting engines. These engines will include the cab/chassis, firefighting unit, tool/storage boxes, emergency lighting, mobile radios and necessary firefighting supplies. The engines are utilized for fire suppression and fuels mitigation work statewide but will also support national wildfire response when requested and available. These engines are planned to be replacement for 2012 model engines that are requiring excessive maintenance/repair, generally having 150,000 to 250,000+ miles although final identification of engines to be replaced will occur when the purchase is initiated. If the engines and/or firefighting units to be replaced are serviceable, we plan to transfer them to local fire departments in need. ***Consequences:*** Failure to approve this purchase may result in continued operation of aging fire engines that require increased maintenance, repair costs, and downtime, reducing Oklahoma Forestry Services' ability to provide reliable wildfire response and fuels mitigation support. Delaying replacement may also limit statewide response capacity, reduce opportunities to

support local fire departments through equipment transfers, and impact on Oklahoma's ability to provide resources for national wildfire response when requested.

FY27- Crew Cab UTVs - \$72,000

(Funding Source: 2025 SFA Grant)

Purchase three (3) crew cab UTVs with trailers. These UTVs will be utilized for crew and tool/equipment transport primarily for fire suppression and hazard fuels mitigation work but will also support other forestry field work. These UTV's are planned to be replacement for UTVs that are requiring excessive maintenance and repair. UTVs to be replaced will be surpluses through OMES. **Consequences:** Failure to approve this purchase may result in continued operation of aging UTVs that require increased maintenance, repair costs, and downtime, reducing Oklahoma Forestry Services' ability to provide reliable wildfire response and fuels mitigation support. Delaying replacement may also limit statewide response capacity, reduce opportunities to support local fire departments through equipment transfers, and impact Oklahoma's ability to provide resources for national wildfire response when requested.

FY 27 -Type 7 Firefighting Slip-on Units - \$54,000

(Funding Source:2025 SFA Grant)

Purchase four (4) Type 7 firefighting slip-on units. These firefighting slip-on units will be placed in pick-up trucks and/or equipment service trucks during periods of elevated wildfire activity and to support hazard fuels mitigation work including prescribed fire operations. **Consequences:** Failure to approve this purchase may reduce Oklahoma Forestry Services' ability to rapidly deploy additional firefighting resources during periods of elevated wildfire activity and support hazard fuels mitigation efforts. Delayed acquisition of these units could limit operational flexibility, increase reliance on existing resources, and impact the Agency's ability to effectively support wildfire suppression and prescribe fire operations statewide.

FY27- CPG Urban and Community Forestry Grant Revenue Generating- \$345,000

(Funding Source: USFS PC11)

Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) requests approval to accept federal grant funding to pay for technical and financial assistance to state forestry agencies for the purpose of encouraging states to assist local governments and others in planning urban and community forestry programs, and in planting, protecting, and improving urban and community forests and associated natural resources. **Consequence:** If the grant is not approved or federal funding is not awarded, OFS will be unable to achieve the goals of the Urban and Community Forestry (U&CF) Assistance Program in Oklahoma. This grant is to help build statewide capacity that empowers communities, homeowners, businesses, schools, nonprofit organizations, and other groups to actively manage the urban and community forest ecosystem. By doing so, the program seeks to enhance environmental benefits and services while supporting a safe, healthy, and high-quality life for all Oklahomans.

FY27 -CPG State Fire Assistance Response Grant Revenue Generating - \$666,800

(Funding Source: USFS PC14)

Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) requests approval to accept federal grant funding to pay for projects that will improve Oklahoma Forestry Services wildfire management program by increasing our preparedness, detection, mitigation and response capability. These actions will serve to support wildfire incidents within its initial attack areas, requests for assistance anywhere in the State of Oklahoma and throughout the country. **Consequence:** If the grant is not approved or federal funding is not awarded, this will reduce Oklahoma Forestry Services' ability to rapidly deploy additional firefighting resources during periods of elevated wildfire activity and support hazard fuels mitigation efforts.

FY27- CPG State Fire Assistance Mitigation Grant Revenue Generating - \$272,425

(Funding Source: USFS PC15)

Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) requests approval to accept federal grant funding to complete hazardous fuels mitigation work in all identified priority zones. Funding will support the implementation of mitigation treatments, and OFS, along with project collaborators, will conduct onsite evaluations to assess treatment effectiveness and identify any necessary maintenance activities to ensure the long-term success of the project. **Consequence:** Failure to approve acceptance of this federal grant funding will limit OFS's ability to implement hazardous fuels mitigation in identified priority zones, leaving communities, critical infrastructure, emergency responders, and natural resources at continued risk from catastrophic wildfire. Relying solely on emergency response is insufficient to reduce wildfire risk, increasing the potential for greater wildfire impacts, higher suppression costs, and increased threats to public safety and property.

FY27- CPG Forest Health Management, Cooperative Lands Grant Revenue Generating - \$150,554

(Funding Source: USFS PC16, PC 25, PC30)

Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) requests approval to accept federal grant funding to pay for programs that will be used to monitor for and develop widespread awareness of important insects, pathogens and invasive plants that currently cause or pose a threat of economic and ecological damage to the urban and rural forests of Oklahoma. Examples of these include bark beetles, exotic borers, spongy moth, hypoxylon canker, oak decline, oak wilt, sudden oak death, and thousand canker disease. Additionally, Oklahoma Forestry Services personnel, other state and federal partners, and municipal and non-profit agencies will continue to be trained to deal with these issues. Pest management will be accomplished through projects incorporating numerous activities engaged in insect, pathogen, and invasive pest management. **Consequence:** If the grant is not approved or federal funding is not awarded, may result in the loss of federally reimbursable grant funds, limiting Oklahoma Forestry Services' ability to implement projects that improve forest health, reduce wildfire risk, protect natural resources, and expand forestry outreach across Oklahoma.

FY27 -CPG Volunteer Fire Assistance Grant Revenue Generating -\$335,450

(Funding Source: USFS PC29)

Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) requests approval to accept federal grant funding to pay for programs that will provide the opportunity for Oklahoma to address their critical fire management needs and to develop/improve capabilities for effective wildfire management and meet the goals of the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy (Cohesive Strategy). This project will improve the fire suppression response capabilities and safety of Oklahoma's volunteer firefighters/responders by providing wild land fire training and wildland Personal Protective Equipment. To encourage volunteer firefighters to access challenging fuels and terrain by foot when there are no other means, OFS will provide "Wildland Fire Equipment Grants" that will enable fire departments to purchase hand tools, bladder bags, and leaf blowers to enhance firefighting capacity with higher probabilities of success. Through these efforts, VFDs will be more successful at initial attack limiting the potential resource drain that often occurs during extended attack events. **Consequence:** If the grant is not approved or federal funding is not awarded, may result in the loss of federally reimbursable grant funds. This will also limit OFS ability to assist in funding the volunteer firefighters and their ability to effectively support wildfire suppression and prescribe fire operations statewide.

FY27- CPG Rural Forestry Assistance and Forest Stewardship Grant Revenue Generating - \$199,122

(Funding Source: USFS PC77)

Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) requests approval to accept federal grant funding for the purpose of the Forest Stewardship Program. The program is to encourage long-term stewardship of non-federal, non-industrial private forest lands, particularly in priority landscape areas as identified in Statewide Forest Resource Assessments and Strategies. Federal grant funds assist the State in developing and implementing core program activities for the Rural Forestry Assistance and Forest Stewardship Program. **Consequence:** Without acceptance of these federal grant funds, Oklahoma Forestry Services would have reduced capacity to provide technical assistance and stewardship planning to private forest landowners, limiting long-term forest health, wildfire resilience, and sustainable management of Oklahoma's non-federal forest resources.

FY27- Cross-boundary Wildfire Mitigation Grant Revenue Generating - \$205,000

(Funding Source: USFS PC8)

Oklahoma Forestry Services (OFS) will treat four-thousand seven-hundred fifty (4,750) acres of ecologically meaningful lands where risk reduction is targeted through utilization of the Southern Wildfire Risk Assessment Portal, current wildfire trends and risk-informed assessment of values at risk including life, property, critical infrastructure and cultural concern. OFS, leveraging a data set of effective utilization of past Cross-Boundary funding, has amended the internal business model guiding performance within this grant to maximize on-the-ground accomplishment. The accomplishments will be guided by prioritization of treatment utilizing a matrix of the utilities and opportunity on the landscape. All treatments will be turn-key in that site assessment, objective-driven plan writing, site preparation and control line construction, and execution of the plans will be implemented on an inclusive cost per acre basis based on historical accomplishment within the Cross Boundary grant program. **Consequence:** Without acceptance

of these federal grant funds, Oklahoma Forestry Services would have reduced capacity to provide technical assistance and limit Oklahoma Forestry Services' ability to implement projects that improve forest health, reduce wildfire risk, protect natural resources, and expand forestry outreach across Oklahoma.

FY27- IIJA State Nursery and Seed Orchard Assistance Grant Revenue Generating - \$250,000

(Funding Source: USFS PC89)

We are requesting funding to obtain the equipment needed for a containerized seedling production line. This consists of a bale breaker, soil mixer, tray filler, and inline tray seeder. The bale breaker will process our soil media with ease, feeding material directly into the soil mixer. The mixed media will then be transferred to a tray filler, where the machine will fill trays with soil. Finally, an inline tray seeder will provide precise and uniform seed placement. Once all trays have been planted, they will be moved to raised seedling tables. This equipment will modernize operations, improve worker safety, and support the production of high-quality containerized seedlings. **Consequence:** Without acceptance of these federal grant funds, Oklahoma Forestry Services would have reduced capacity to provide technical assistance and limit Oklahoma Forestry Services' ability to implement project seeded for a containerized seedling production line.

CONSUMER PROTECTION SERVICES

FY27-Oklahoma State University (OSU Extension IPM Program for assisting in the Cotton Survey) - \$8,000

FY27- Ideagen Software for Inspections and Data Analysis—\$60,000.00

This is for the licenses for our current software system used by CPS for our inspections. Additionally, there is an analytics component that provides us with the ability to produce reports and to establish a dashboard for all program managers and supervisors that need them. **Justification:** Without this tool we will have greater difficulty meeting reporting requirements both federal and state and will have less tools to manage programs which could increase the amount of time needed to accomplish job associated tasks.

FY27 – Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Cooperative Agreement – Revenue generating-\$807,197.00

ODAFF has delegated authority from EPA for overseeing the pesticide program in Oklahoma. These funds provide financial support for the program for the field, office, and lab. Our pesticide plan gives us primacy in Oklahoma and requires us to fulfill certain duties under the agreement.

ANIMAL INDUSTRY SERVICES

FY27-Umbrella Cooperative Agreement - \$362,276.00

The purpose of this agreement is to conduct Animal Health National Surveillance and Response activities that will provide specific information to the recipient, APHIS, and other interested parties for various commodities under this Umbrella Agreement. Without this cooperative agreement, we will not be able to meet the needs for surveillance, preparedness, response, and outreach necessary to protect American agriculture and accomplish VS mission goals.

FY27-ADT Cooperative Agreement- \$239,920.00

The purpose of this agreement is to conduct Animal Disease Traceability activities that will provide specific information to the recipient, APHIS, and other interested parties for Animal Health Technical Services (AHTS) Programs. Without this cooperative agreement, we will not be able to meet the needs for surveillance, preparedness, response, and outreach necessary to protect American agriculture and accomplish VS mission goals.

FY27-US Swine Health Improvement Program- \$55,200

Funding that is being requested will be used to support the administrative and data management conducted by the OSA Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator in enrollment and certification of participating premises. The funding will also support outreach and education efforts to increase awareness in the program and increase overall participation. Lastly the funding will be used to support travel for the OSA Coordinator and the SAHO to participate as voting members at the 2026 annual US SHIP House of Delegates meeting. ODAFF is the Official State Agency for management of the US Swine Health Improvement Program. Our goal for the upcoming cooperative agreement period is to focus on small holdings and exhibition swine to encourage enrollment and ultimately certification. Without this cooperative agreement we will not be able to support outreach and education, and we won't be able to attend the US SHIP House of Delegates meeting.

FY27-Oklahoma Veterinary Medical Association (OVMA)- \$40,000.00

OVMA is the only entity in the State of Oklahoma that has the ability and contracts statewide to enhance pet sterilization effort is the OVMA. No other entity has access to veterinarians and humane organizations on a statewide basis. This is a pass-through agreement between ODAFF and OVMA.

FY27-Acclaim Systems, Inc. - \$85,000.00

AgEnterprise is a modernization of USAHERDS and the upgrade path for USAHERDS states. The modernization focuses on increased IT security, and updated IT Framework into the newest tech stack to support the State Vet's Office requirements. AgEnterprise provides a robust platform for all functionality within animal health including Animal Traceability, Premises, Inspections, License Management, Testing, and other features. AgEnterprise will comprise of the functionality and the data elements needed by states to manage and monitor animal health within their jurisdiction, report test results to USDA's Veterinary Services and prevent, control, eradicate and recover from disease and all hazard incidents at the local level. Without AgEnterprise, we will not be able to monitor animal health within specific jurisdictions or report test results to USDA's Veterinary Services.

FY26-Conexwest- \$8,200.00

This storage unit will be used to house disease response equipment and supplies at the Goldsby OK ODAFF location. The existing shipping container currently used for storage at that location is in poor condition, with water leaks and openings that have allowed rodent access, making it unsuitable for long-term storage of response materials.

Because the scale and resource needs of disease outbreaks are unpredictable, maintaining an adequate inventory of response supplies is essential for rapid deployment. Without additional storage capacity, the program may be unable to maintain sufficient supplies on hand and would be required to order materials during an outbreak response. This could result in delays in obtaining needed resources and negatively impact response efficiency and timeliness.

MARKET DEVELOPMENT**FY27 – Oklahoma Local Ag Summit 2027 facility Rental – \$8,280.00 added for a total of \$44,280.00**

This is funded entirely by Specialty Crop Block Grant. This request went to board on April 28, 2026, for \$35,000.00 and did not account for the 23% service charge. \$8,280.00 added for a total of \$44,280.00. Justification: This project is entirely funded by the USDA Specialty Crop Block Grant Program. The purpose of this grant is to enhance the competitiveness of specialty crops in the state. If this proposed expense is not approved and therefore the project is not completed, the State not only loses money immediately that is important to the specialty crop industry through the economic impact but also runs the risk of not being awarded money from the USDA Specialty Crop Block Grant Program in the future.

FY27 – Oklahoma State Department of Education – revenue generating - \$38,000.00

Agreement to ensure research-based knowledge related to Oklahoma agriculture is available within the framework of the Oklahoma Academic Standards. Failure to continue the agreement will prevent the Ag in the Classroom Program from providing educational resources and lessons to teachers and students within the framework of the Oklahoma Academic Standards.

FY27 – United States Department of Agriculture Agricultural Market Service – revenue generating - \$45,000.00

To compile and disseminate in the State of Oklahoma market information on shipments, supplies, prices, market conditions, distribution and other pertinent marketing facts for agricultural commodities and products and make such information available nationally. Failure to continue the agreement will prevent information to be readily available to producers and the agricultural industry.

FY27 – Oklahoma Youth Expo Junior Livestock Show & educational scholarship program – Legislative Directed Spending - \$85,000.00

Justification: This amount of \$85,000.00 will directly support the 2027 state-wide spring junior livestock show. For 108 years, the youth of the state of Oklahoma have exhibited some of the finest livestock in the country at OYE, which carries the title of “The World’s Largest Junior Livestock Show” with participants from all 77 Oklahoma counties. OYE also provides agricultural scholarships and leadership-training programs for Oklahoma students. The 10-day OYE generates an economic impact of \$24.5 million to the OKC economy and provides hundreds of youth with scholarships to continue their education at a collegiate level. If this purchase is not approved, there is negative impact on conducting the 2027 Oklahoma Youth Expo (OYE) as well as a reduction of show ring achievement and academic scholarships to the youth of Oklahoma.

FY27 – Tulsa County Public Facilities Authority 2026 Junior Livestock Show – Legislative Directed Spending - \$50,000.00

Justification: The amount of \$50,000.00 goes directly for the purpose of promoting the Oklahoma agriculture industry through national agriculture events, Tulsa State Fair Junior Livestock Auction, and the Tulsa State Fair Livestock Scholarship Program. If this purchase is not approved, there will be a negative economic impact to Tulsa and surrounding communities with the loss of national ag events hosted at Expo Square. In addition, there would be a negative impact on conducting the 2026 Tulsa livestock show and a reduction of scholarships to the youth of Oklahoma.

FY27 – Made in Oklahoma Coalition – Legislative Directed Spending - \$513,325.00

Justification: The amount of \$513,325.00 goes directly to support a unique public/private partnership that establishes a marketing program for the purpose of promoting food brand awareness, trade and consumer loyalty for Oklahoma food products through a variety of cooperative marketing activities. In addition, MIO promotes business retention, increase of sales to retail and foodservice outlets and business expansion. If this support is not provided, there is a negative impact on the seventy MIO members who employ over 26,000 Oklahomans who have reported increased sales directly related to the MIO marketing campaigns. In addition, the momentum of new, small businesses benefiting from MIO resources and connections will be impaired.

FY27 – Board of Regents of the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center on behalf of Oklahoma Nutrition Information & Education Project (ONIE) – contractual services – Oklahoma Local Ag Summit – Funded entirely by Specialty Crop Block Grant - \$18,151.00

FY27 – Edible OKC – print advertising – Funded entirely by the Viticulture and Enology Revolving Grant Fund - \$9,900.00

FY27 – Small Bites – farm to school curriculum – Funded entirely by the Farm to School Formula Grant - \$10,000.00

FY27 – farm to school notebooks – Funded entirely by the Farm to School State Formula Grant - \$7,000.00

AGRICULTURAL ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT SERVICES

FY27 – Tulsa Metropolitan Utility Authority (TMUA) – Revenue Generating- \$204,000.00

To employ two (2) Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry (ODAFF) Environmental Program Specialists with the experience, training, and qualifications prescribed by State or Federal law or rules and regulations to prepare NMPs designed to properly manage poultry waste at agricultural operations and protect water quality in the Eucha-Spavinaw Watershed. Failure to continue the agreement will prevent Tulsa and ODAFF to fulfill the court's mandate on this lawsuit.

FOOD SAFETY

FY26-Ford F150 4WD Super Crew Cab -\$49,068.00

Food Safety Division would like to purchase a truck. This truck will replace ODA 87 due to having 146,000 miles and is driven about 3,500 miles per month. **Justification:** Not fulfilling this request will result in the use of unsafe, high mileage vehicles. High mileage vehicles increase maintenance and upkeep costs with the higher potential of breakdowns in remote areas. This will impede the ability to provide services effectively, efficiently, and safely to the State of Oklahoma taxpayers and our cooperators. (This was pre-approved June 22, 2026, by Secretary Arthur.)

FY27-Oklahoma State University Produce Safety Training Contract Approval -\$15,000.00

Outreach and education activities include teaching Produce Safety Alliance classes across the state, developing educational materials, assisting farms with the On-Farm Readiness Review, and measuring the effectiveness of these trainings to determine what topics need further training. The Produce Safety Alliance class is the only class currently recognized by the FDA to satisfy the produce farm manager training portion of the produce safety rule. To teach this class a team of certified trainers and a certified lead trainer is required; OSU has several personnel certified to teach this class including the only lead trainers in the state.

APPROVAL OF CASES

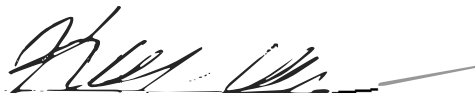

1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel ("OGC") of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

2. Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at **1:30 p.m. May 14th, 2026**, in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

3. **Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.**

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) Amendments to the pleadings; c.) the plan, schedule, and limitations of discovery; d.) Identification of admissions of fact to avoid unnecessary proof and cumulative evidence; e.) 18. That Act at 2 O.S. § 10-9.8: *“Every application shall be accompanied by an annual registration fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00), which is nonrefundable. . .”*

19. O.A.C. 35:17-5-3(a)(2) states: *“Every poultry feeding operation shall be required to renew the registration annually by January 1 to operate.”*

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

20. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

21. In September 2025, the Agricultural Environmental Management Services (AEMS) division of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) mailed renewal notices to the mailing address on file for the Respondent, with the due date of January 1.

22. On or about January 16th, 2026, AMES sent the Respondent a LOW requesting submission of the renewal registration form with the Ten Dollar (\$10.00) registration fee, with a due date of February 17, 2026.

23. To date, no 2026 renewal form or registration fee has been received. Respondent has been late with the renewal and fee for the following years: 2022, 2023, 2024, and 2025.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

24. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent has violated 2 O.S. § 10-9.4(A), 10-9.8, and O.A.C. 35:17-5-3(a)(2) by failing to submitting the renewal form and registration fee.

21. On May 15, 2026, an Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority inspector contacted the ODAFF Nursery Program Administrator to confirm that Respondent held a valid Nursery Grower License after discovering a large number of clones being sold by Respondent.

22. Further, on a May 26, 2026, Respondent's representative, Xiancai Wang, confirmed that sales of clones had been taking place.

23. On May 26, 2026, Respondent obtained their 2026 Nursery Grower License, and the Stop Sale Order was released.

24. Based on the allegations above, the Respondent's actions violated the Stop Sale Order issued on April 21, 2026, and violated the Oklahoma Horticulture Law, specifically 2 O.S. § 2-4(A)(8), 2 O.S. § 3-32.7(D), 2 O.S. § 3-32.8(8), and 2 O.S. § 3-32.8(12).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

25. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 2-4(A)(8), 2 O.S. § 3-32.7(D), 2 O.S. § 3-32.8(8), and 2 O.S. § 3-32.8(12), which are listed below.

- 2 O.S. § 2-4(A)(8): "A. The State Board of Agriculture shall have the power to: 8. Issue stop-sale and stop-use orders and quarantines."
- 2 O.S. § 3-32.7(D): "A person shall obtain a license prior to selling or dealing in nursery stock."
- 2 O.S. § 3-32.8(8): "It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly or willfully violate any of the provisions of this subarticle or any rules of the State Board of Agriculture by: (8) Doing business without a valid license."
- 2 O.S. § 3-32.8(12): "It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly or willfully violate any of the provisions of this subarticle or any rules of the State Board of Agriculture by: (12) Selling nursery stock restricted by a stop sale order."

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

26. The Department is seeking an administrative penalty in the amount of **Five Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents (\$5,000.00)**.

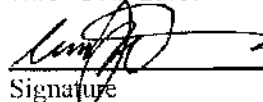

The digital image of the items purchased and the digital image of the seller. The digital image shall contain depictions that clearly identify the items sold and are captured in the common JPEG format. 20. On or about August 26th, 2025, an inspector with the Consumer Protection Services (CPS) Division of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry (ODAFF) performed a transaction records review on Respondent's firm, located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

21. On or about August 20th, 2025, Respondent purchased scrap metal (ticket #166068) but failed to retain a digital image of the items.

22. On or about August 26th, 2025, the Department sent Respondent a Letter of Warning (LOW) regarding their failure to meet record keeping requirements.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

23. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, Respondent has violated Okla. Stat. Tit. 2 § 11-92(A) and O.A.C. 35:30-45-9(a) by failing to retain a digital image of items purchased.

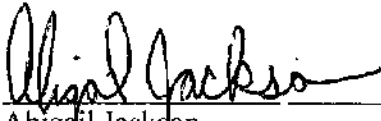

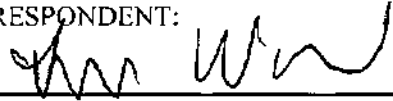

1. Complainant, the Office of General Counsel ("OGC") of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry (ODAFF) advises Respondent of the following alleged violations of the Oklahoma Agricultural Code and/or rules.

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

2. The Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on 11th day of June 2026, in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) 19. At the time of the investigation, Respondent was not on file with ODAFF as being a licensed commercial pesticide applicator.

20. Respondent was advertising his drone pesticide application services on his company website, and he was in a Channel 9 news article advertising his services, recommending pesticide use, and performing pesticide treatment demonstrations.

21. This is considered a commercial application of a pesticide.

22. In order for a company to advertise, recommend a use, or demonstrate commercial pesticide applications they must have a current commercial pesticide applicators license through ODAFF.

23. Applying a pesticide commercially without a license and certification are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-82(A), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15), and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(16).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

24. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-82(A), 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15), and 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(16) which are listed below.

- 2 O.S. § 3-82(A): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person to act, operate, or do business or advertise as a commercial, noncommercial, certified applicator, temporary certified applicator, service technician, or private applicator unless the person has obtained a valid applicator’s license issued by the State Board of Agriculture for the category of pesticide application in which the person is engaged, unless the person is applying to his or her own property.”
- 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(15): “A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made

19. This investigation was conducted in section 24-24N-10E, and during this investigation our inspector observed herbicide effects on the south side of trees on a nearby property.

20. Respondent made an application to the pastureland adjacent to the south, 1/8 mile west, and adjacent to the northwest of the complaint’s property on June 24th and 26th of 2025.

21. Respondent applied Tordon 22K and Remedy Ultra during southerly winds.

22. A vegetative sample was taken from the complainant’s property and trace amounts of 2,4-D and Triclopyr were detected.

23. A vegetative sample was taken from Respondent's application area southwest of complainant's property and 2,4-D and Triclopyr were detected.

24. According to our investigation Respondent's application resulted in an off-target drift onto the complainant's property.

25. Allowing a pesticide product to drift off-target is a violation of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(3).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

26. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(3) which is listed below.

- 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(3): "A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: (3) A person has operated in a negligent manner, thereby causing a pesticide to drift off-target."

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

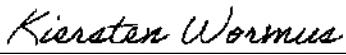

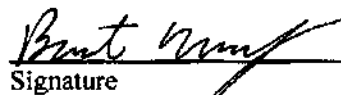

19. During this inspection our inspector observed that Respondent's company truck did not have the company license number displayed on each side.

20. The Department requires that all vehicles used by a commercial applicator while conducting business display the company's name and license number on both sides of the vehicle in 2 inch or larger letters.

21. Improper identification of an application vehicle is a violation of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically O.A.C. 35:30-17-15.

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

22. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of O.A.C. 35:30-17-15 which is listed below.

- O.A.C. 35:30-17-15: “All vehicles, including nurse tanks and self-propelled ground applicators, used by a commercial applicator during the conduct of business shall be identified by displaying the name and license number of the licensee. The display shall be on both sides of the vehicle in letters not less than two (2) inches in height.”

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

23. The Department is seeking an administrative penalty in the amount of **Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00)**.

Summary of Facts: In August of 2025, the Department conducted a drift complaint investigation in Coffeyville, OK. According to the Respondents' application records Cornbelt 4 LB. Amine and Remedy Ultra were applied to Respondents' property using a mist blower on July 28, 2025. The Remedy Ultra label states do not apply the product with a mist blower, and the Department does not allow hormone type herbicides such as 2,4-D and Triclopyr to be applied with a mist blower unless the terrain is not accessible for ground application equipment to traverse.

Statute or Rule Violation: The Respondents violated 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(4) and O.A.C. 35:30-17-24(e)(2) by applying a pesticide in a manner inconsistent with the product label and applying hormone type herbicides by mist blower.

Proposed Administrative Penalty: The proposed penalty for this case was Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00).

Deviations: The Respondents and the Department entered a settlement for One Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents (\$1000.00). The remaining penalty of One Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents (\$1000.00) is subject to a six (6) month deferment. If the Respondents have no additional infractions during those six (6) months, the remaining penalty will be waived, and the matter will be closed.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT AND CONSENT ORDER

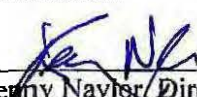

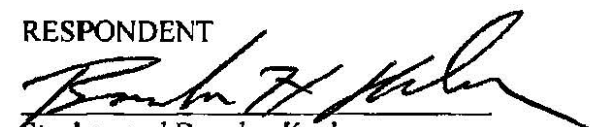

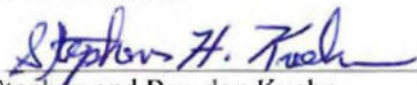

14. Respondent has substantial business operations and assets within the State of Oklahoma.

15. Based upon current information and belief, at all relevant times hereto, Respondent has engaged in the application of pesticide.

16. Pursuant to Okla. Sta. Ann. 2 § 2-4(A)(3), ODAFF has authority to regulate persons who violate the Oklahoma Agricultural Code by initiating and prosecuting administrative, civil, or criminal actions and proceedings necessary under the Oklahoma Agricultural Code.

ALLEGATIONS OF FACT

17. Based upon current information and belief, the following allegations of fact summarize the alleged violations committed by Respondent.

18. On August 20, 2025, a drift complaint investigation was conducted by the Consumer Protection Division of the Department in Coffeyville, OK.

19. During this investigation our inspector observed the trees and other vegetation on the complainant's property showing herbicide effects. Our inspector observed herbicide effects on the roadside. These roadside effects appeared to be only along the complainant's property.

20. According to Respondent's application records Cornbelt 4 LB. Amine and Remedy Ultra were applied to Respondent's property using a mist blower on July 28, 2025.

21. A vegetative sample was taken from the complainant's property, and a trace amount of 2,4-D was detected.

22. A vegetative sample was taken from the roadside and 2,4-D and Triclopyr were detected.

23. A vegetative sample was taken from Respondent's property and 2,4-D was detected.
24. The Remedy Ultra label states to not apply the product with a mist blower, and ODAFF does not allow hormone type herbicides such as 2,4-D and Triclopyr to be applied with a mist blower unless the terrain is not accessible for ground application equipment to traverse.
25. Applying a pesticide in a manner inconsistent with the product label and applying hormone type herbicides by mist blower are violations of the Oklahoma Combined Pesticide Law & Rules, specifically 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(4) and O.A.C. 35:30-17-24(e)(2).

ALLEGED CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

26. Based upon the application of the above law to the aforementioned facts, you are in violation of 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(4) and O.A.C. 35:30-17-24(e)(2) which are listed below.

- 2 O.S. § 3-86(A)(4): "A. It shall be unlawful for any person, whether or not they hold a commercial or noncommercial license, to violate any part of this subsection or rules promulgated by the State Board of Agriculture. Any license, certificate, or identification issued may be suspended, canceled, revoked, or refused issue or reissue by the Board after a notice and an opportunity to be heard has been given to the holder of the license or certificate. The suspension, cancellation, revocation, or refusal to issue or reissue any license, certificate, or identification may be made if the Board finds: 4. A person has used a pesticide in a manner inconsistent with its labeling unless prior written approval has been obtained from the Board."
- O.A.C. 35:30-17-24(e)(2): "(e) No person shall use a mist blower or other type of air blasting or misting equipment for the application of hormone type herbicides within the State except where the following specific conditions exist: (2) Range,

pasture, and crop areas where control of undesirable vegetation with a hormone type herbicide is necessary and a specific type of terrain feature such as a gully precludes the use of any other type of ground application equipment.”

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

27. The Department is seeking an administrative penalty in the amount of **Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00)**.

Summary of Facts: The Department received a report from OMMA that a batch sample from Respondent's crop failed, because Myclobutanil was detected in the sample above the tolerance levels. In May of 2025, the Department conducted an inspection at Respondent's Medical Marijuana grow in Muskogee, OK. Our inspector observed containers of Eagle 20 EW and BotaniGuard Maxx. Myclobutanil is the active ingredient in Eagle 20 EW. These products are not labeled to be used in medical marijuana production. Currently the only pesticide products that can be applied to medical marijuana are those products that are registered with ODAFF and are approved to be applied to hemp. According to the Department's investigation, Respondent had been misusing pesticide products by applying them to a crop that is not approved by the product label.

Statute or Rule Violation: Respondent violated 2 O.S. §3-86(A)(4) by using pesticide in a manner inconsistent with the product label.

Proposed Administrative Penalty: The proposed penalty for this case was Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00).

Deviations: Respondent and the Department entered a settlement for Ten Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents (\$10,000.00). The Respondent requested a settlement in order to have a payment plan. On June 2, 2026, Respondent had made the final payment.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT AND CONSENT ORDER

PARTIES

ORDER AND AGREEMENT

4. In compromise and full settlement of *this matter*, the Respondent shall make installment payments to the Department for an administrative penalty totaling Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00). The Respondent will submit payments to the Department in the amount of \$2,000.00 on the 8th day of the month starting in February of 2026 and ending June 2026.

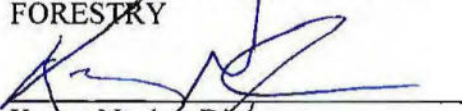

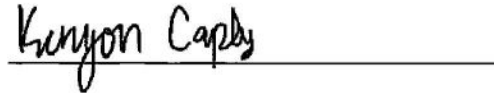

PREHEARING CONFERENCE NOTICE

2. The Respondent is hereby notified that a Prehearing Conference¹ will be held before an impartial Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) at 1:30 p.m. on 12th day of February 2026 in the Board Room on the first floor of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry building, located at 2800 North Lincoln Blvd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

3. **Please note the Prehearing Conference is not an evidentiary hearing: witnesses and evidence will not be presented at the Prehearing Conference.**

¹ Prehearing Conferences may address any of the following: a.) Identification and simplification of issues, including the elimination of frivolous claims or defenses; b.) Amendments to the pleadings; c.) the plan, schedule, and limitations of discovery; d.) Identification of admissions of fact to avoid unnecessary proof and cumulative evidence; e.) 37. If the Respondent desires to resolve this matter without a hearing or further action, the Complainant proposes an administrative penalty of **Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00)**.

38. If you wish to waive your right to hearing and stipulate to the above alleged findings of fact and conclusions of law, you may pay the full amount of the recommended penalty by check or money order and sign and return the attached Resolution by Stipulation along with your full payment of this penalty prior to the stated hearing date.
